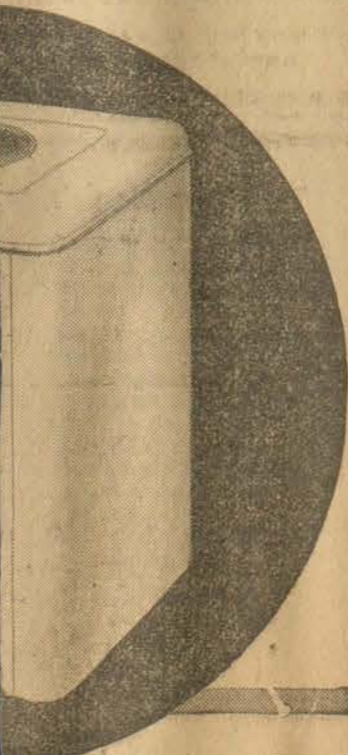

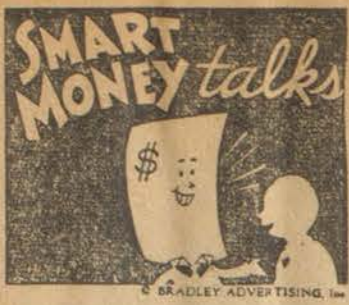

VA LAUNCHES NEW PROGRAM

To Inform Veterans Of GI Life Insurance And Offer Assistance

The Veterans Administration Regional Office Tuesday launched an intensive National Service Life Insurance information program designed to assist 266,616 Kentucky veterans of World War II in retaining or re-instating G.I. insurance. Of this number 63 per cent have permitted the insurance to lapse.
Harry W. Farmer, regional manager, said the state plan is being co-ordinated with a nation-wide drive to bring NSLI information to the 14,000,000 veterans of World War II. Only 4,000,000 still retain G.I. insurance.
"The VA feels that the majority of veterans who have let their NSLI lapse are not familiar with the privileges and economic security that this insurance affords them," Mr. Farmer said. "We believe that NSLI will provide protection against privations and heartaches that enter the lives of veterans' families who are left without security for the future."
The VA official emphasized that cost of NSLI is low "because Uncle Sam pays all overhead expenses out of the national treasury."
Mr. Farmer urged veterans to continue NSLI term insurance during their readjustment to civilian life, and to convert only after they have become established and know what their financial capabilities and insurance needs will be.
After term insurance has been in effect for one year, it may be converted in whole or in part to one or more of the following permanent forms of insurance: Ordinary life, 30-payment life, 20-payment life, endowment at age 65, endowment at age 60, and 20-year endowment.
Complete NSLI information is available at all VA offices in Kentucky and insurance collection units have been established at Ashland, Corbin, Covington, Hopkinsville, Lexington and Louisville. Premiums may also be mailed to the Collections Division, Veterans Administration Branch Office No. 5, 52 South Starling Street, Columbus 8, Ohio.
The local Veterans Administration contact office is located in the Kentucky State Employment Service office, Midland Bldg., Prestonsburg.
When paying premiums or in submitting inquiries, it is of utmost importance to include complete information, specifically: full name, present mailing address, "N" or "V" insurance certificate numbers, service serial numbers, date of discharge from service, and date of birth.

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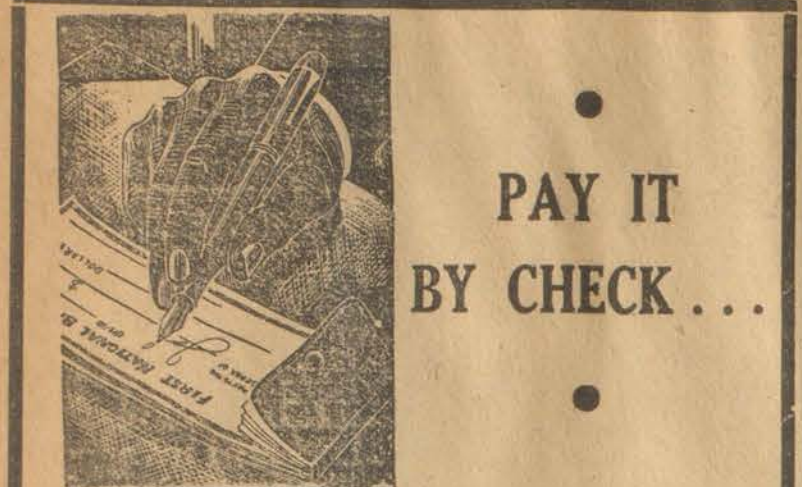

that the department allocated \$10,000 for two bridges, one at the mouth of Caney Creek and the other at Jack's Creek. "And," it is pointed out, "the department's plans are such that the cheapest estimate we can get on either bridge is around \$18,000."
For 11 roads in Magisterial District No. 2 1500 tons of crushed stone were ordered but none received. The same figures, the same results apply in District 3, the court says.
Mr. Watkins wrote that, in addition to the funds he cited as already having been spent on Floyd roads, "I have set aside \$25,000 for improvement of the David road, Ky. 404, when the right-of-way has been secured. . . ." He added that contract on the Melvin-Weeksbury road has been awarded to the Codell Construction Company and that this work should have been completed in 1946 "but had to be carried over along with 18 other contracts in various parts of the state, due mainly to the inability of the contractor to secure needed materials and equipment."
Mr. Hailey stated that the rural highway department also placed 1800 tons of gravel on the David road without expense to the county. The gravel purchased for the Bosco road for 1945 delivery was not delivered till 1946. The road was omitted from the maintenance program last year, Magistrate John May said, because the highway department gave its promise that the route would be obliterated.
"To help the highway department along, in the hope of getting roads built and gravel on before winter, the county has furnished air compressors and graders for whatever grade and ditch work that has been done in the county," Magistrate Burchett said. But, he declares, the program is not a success—"and we are not pleased with it."
And not a member of the court dissents from that opinion!

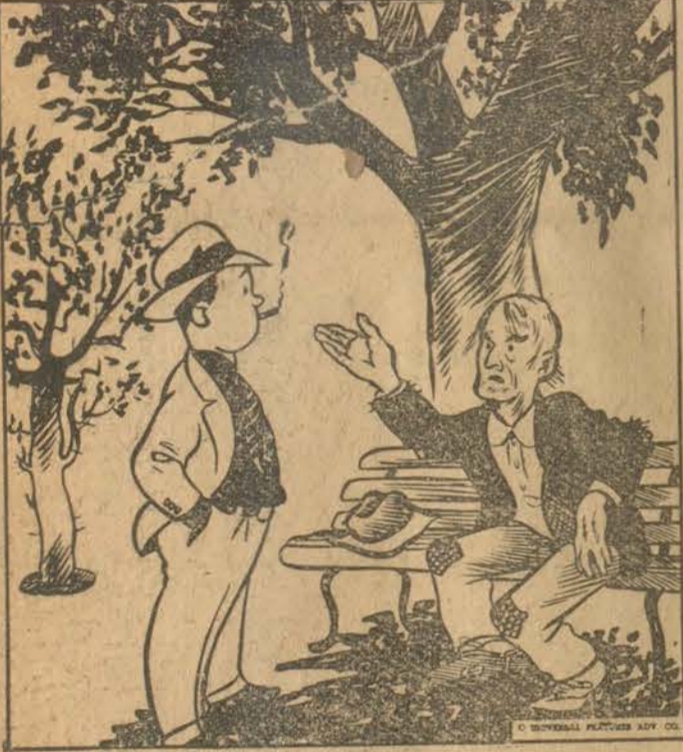
