Commission Reports Reduction in Rates To Utility Customers

A reduction of \$1,152,733.50 annually in utility rates in Kentucky was effected and the construction of 8,212 miles of additional electric distribution lines was authorized in 1946, according to a report to Governor Willis by Charles E. Whittle, chairman of the commission. Of the new construction authorized 80 miles are in Floyd county, according to the report. "There were 12 separate rate adjustments during the year," Whittle said. "Of these, five were increases and seven were reductions; but the increases aggregate only \$35,244.50, while the reductions total \$1,187,978." All of the seven reductions reported were for electric service and affected 142,291 customers, of whom 85 per cent were domestic customers. The average annual saving to each customer was \$8.35. "The 8,212 miles of new construction authorized extends in 115 counties and is designed to serve 50,000 new customers to whom no existing electric distribution system is accessible," the report sets forth. "Preliminary surveys have been completed for all of the extensions authorized, several hundred miles have already been built and energized, and the construction of others is proceeding as rapidly as materials become available."

Seeks Descendants To Settle Estate

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 23 (Sp.)—The brothers and sisters of the late James Nelvin Stuart who would be quite aged if still living, and therefore more likely their children, are being sought throughout Ohio and Kentucky to claim a \$10,000 estate of which they obviously never heard. This was revealed here today when W. C. Cox, probate genealogist, 208 S. LaSalle St., Chicago, took charge of the search. "Stuart, who was about 85 years old, was reportedly born in 1880, either in Ohio or Kentucky," Mr. Cox said. "He talked about his boyhood in both states to friends. He left no clue, however, as to the exact localities from which he came. "His middle name, Nelvin, is unusual and is believed to be a family name, or perhaps the maiden name of his mother. If his brothers or sisters are dead without living descendants, then we want to contact other relatives who may claim the estate."

2,000 Farmers Enter Kentucky Corn Derby

A report on the Kentucky corn derby, made at the recent Farm and Home Convention, indicated that over 2,000 farmers entered the corn-growing contest and that more than 400 of them produced 100 bushels or more to the acre.

Highest production in the one-acre division was 164 bushels, made by W. A. Scott in Carlisle county. Winner of the five-acre division was Everett Simpson, of Bullitt county, who produced an average of 155 bushels an acre.

Hughes, Martin county, 149.4 bushels; Homer Riley, Jackson county, 149.2, and Joe Grant Neal, Johnson county, 147 bushels.

State Insurance Head Starts Fight on Boost Of Auto Liability Rate

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 17.—A petition to prevent a raise in automobile liability insurance rates pending a hearing before him was filed in circuit court here today by State Insurance Director Harry G. Wilson.

Circuit Court Clerk Kelly C. Smither said he expected to sign an order tomorrow restraining the insurance companies from charging more for liability policies. It will be effective until Circuit Judge W. B. Ardery can hold a hearing and either dismiss it or grant an injunction.

The National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters announced the increase would become effective today in 27 states including Kentucky, and in the District of Columbia and Alaska.

The new rates include a 30 per cent increase for private passenger cars and 40 per cent for commercial vehicles insured for property damage. A heavy increase in traffic accidents and greater cost of settling such claims was given as the cause. Insurance Director Wilson said a protest had been made to his office by the Kentucky Association of Insurance Agents. Wilson took the position the insurance companies lacked right to enforce the higher charges until a hearing on the proposed increases is held in his office. Wilson's petition was directed against the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters and an insurance concern, the U. S. Fidelity & Guaranty Company, the latter the representative of the companies proposing to raise rates. The new rates should be held in abeyance until after a hearing is held on them here February 28, Wilson said.

AN ALLERGY WE CHERISH

THE people of Kentucky have no affinity—they have, rather, an allergy—to machine politics.

The Democratic and Republican parties, please take notice.

In the last gubernatorial election the *deus ex machina* became the "sprag" in the flywheel and Lyter Donaldson and the Democratic party went down to defeat in a political era when the party should have been at its strongest in a traditionally Democratic state.

Although obviously a candidate with little popular appeal and with some mud from the highway department machine smudging his political countenance, Donaldson was the choice of the machine, which was represented by the Administration. The unorganized voter spoke his little piece in the primary, but his voice was lost in the clank and whir of the gears.

So, tired of the Chandler-Johnson regime which smacked of a hierarchy as it offered Mr. Donaldson for the Succession, thousands of Democratic voters staged a quiet rebellion and upset the apple cart.

Not much is left now of that old machine, but here and there rusting parts lie about the Commonwealth. And there are some "plug" mechanics in the party who would pick up the pieces, wire them back together and get them running in time for the coming primary.

This newspaper doesn't go in for politics. Least of all, the machine brand. And that kind of thing is what we would advise the voters to shun. You can't blame any candidate for accepting support wherever he can find it, but you can keep an eye out for the Old Gang. It's not hard to recognize.

And it is certain that whomever it supports will be expected to "go along" as a machine man, and not necessarily as a man of the people.

MINOR TRAGEDIES NECESSARY TO PREVENT GREATER ONES

NEIGHBORING Pike county last week had its first conviction under the new state law declaring war on gun-totin'. The defendant drew a two-year penitentiary sentence.

In this county several indictments have been made for the same offense, but not yet has a trial been had under the new law. Fighting desperately for time, defendants have contrived continuances. Yet Circuit Judge Hill and Commonwealth's Attorney Cornett have indicated that, despite all pleas by defendants and their friends, the court is determined not to permit friendship or influence, or both, to interfere with the processes of the law.

This is no easy task court officials face, that of enforcing a new law that hits hard citizens of the county, some of whom are influential. The defendants and their friends find it hard to see in the carrying of the traditional ".38" anything criminal as long as it is not belching flame and bullet. They cannot see the ends of justice met in sending to the penitentiary from two to five years a man who has done no more than carry a revolver, his own personal possession.

But this law was not enacted impulsively, without thought of its effect. It was enacted to attain an exact effect—to stop men and women from carrying death-dealing weapons and thus to halt a disgracefully tragic murder rate. This new pistol law did not creep upon us stealthily. It was heralded by the press; all who could or would read or listen to the radio knew of it, of its effective date, of the penalty it provided.

Then there is no excuse for the offender. And there is no excuse for any citizen to seek to defeat its aims.

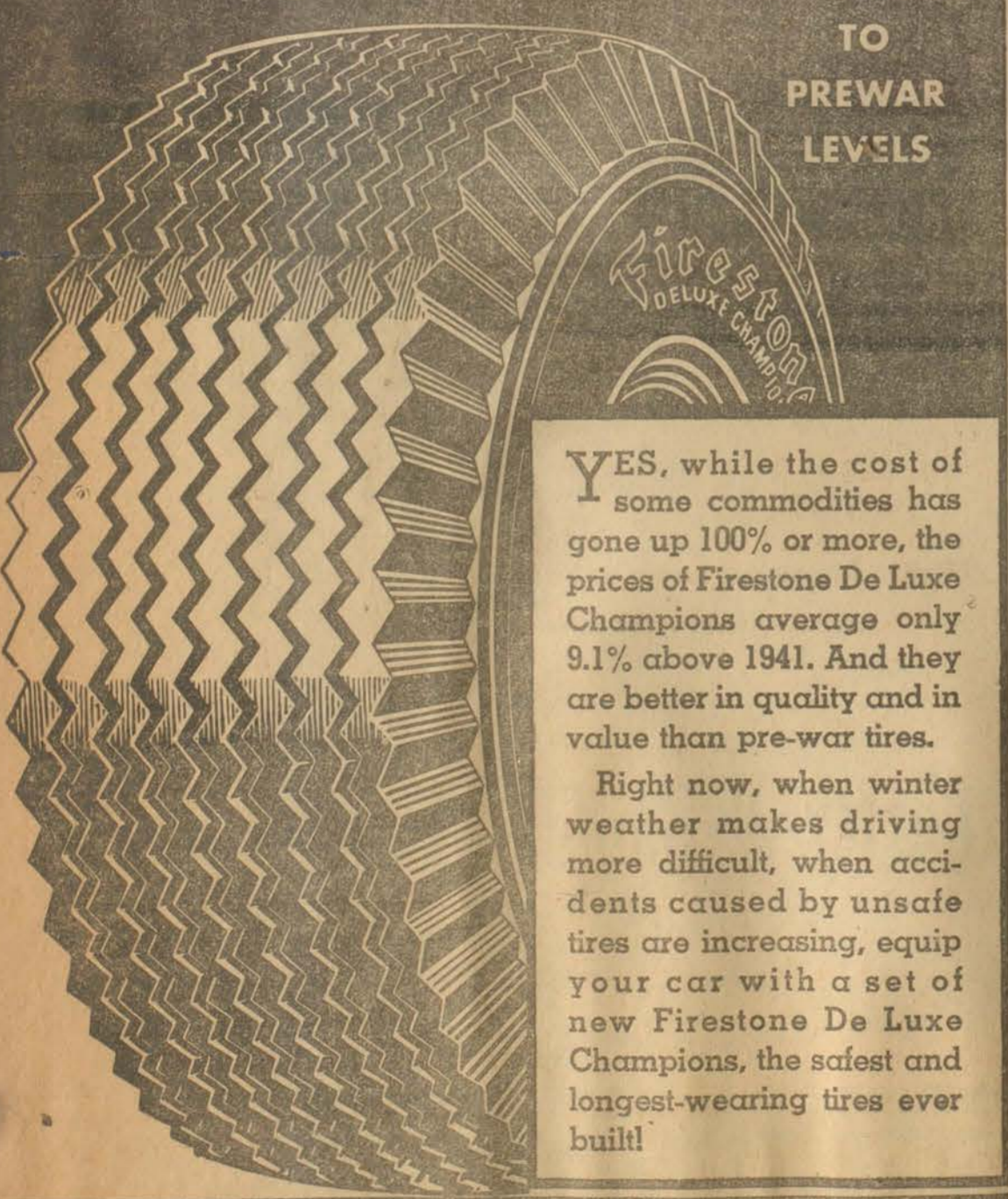
Because of the sometimes onerous duties this law devolves on public officials, peace officers and officials of trial courts should have the support of good citizens to the end that the new law may receive a thorough and fair trial. What part will you plan in the matter—the role of a good citizen of courage or of a weakling who is always ready to whine about conditions but unwilling to stand up and be counted?

It is true, enforcement of this law will remove a few men from homes and families for a year or two. By any yardstick, that is a circumstance fraught with unhappiness. But such minor tragedies created by law enforcement may prevent those darker tragedies wherein men and women are removed forever from homes and loved ones by the bullets of their gun-totin' fellow-humans.

Is a Jeep a Jeep, A Peep or Maybe Sump'n Else Again?

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 17—Is a jeep a truck or a passenger car?
Hundreds of owners of the war-surplus midget vehicles have been asking that question as the March 1 deadline for obtaining 1947 license stickers rolls around.
The Revenue Department already has sent its answer to the county clerks of the state.
If all the seats are still in the jeep and the owner declares it is used primarily as a passenger car, the license fee is \$5.
If all but the driver's seat is removed and the jeep is used for commercial hauling or delivery, it is a "commercial truck" and the fee is \$10.50.
Of course, some farmers use them both as light trucks and as passenger cars, with only the rear seat removed. These farm trucks must pay the same \$5 required of regular car owners.
A farmer who uses his jeep to pull his plow or as a substitute tractor doesn't have to pay any license at all, under state law. Furthermore, he can get a refund of the tax money he spends for gasoline.

laws meant by "reasonable walking distance." County school boards generally have considered anything under 2 1/2 miles a reasonable walking distance.

The territory of the Shelbyville Independent school district, created in 1871, comprises the city and outlying areas within a radius of three miles from the county courthouse.

Generally, independent, or city school districts are limited to boundaries of the municipality, but a few, including Shelbyville and Versailles, extend beyond the city limits.

Tuesday's ruling, affirming Shelby circuit court, was given in a suit by six parents of 10 pupils residing some two or three miles south of Shelbyville, on Zaring Mill Pike.

The Shelby board of education contended the law requiring county school districts to furnish buses did not apply to the city, or independent, districts. It also argued that boards of education have power of discretion to say what is a reasonable distance.

The board also stated that while 10 roads come into Shelbyville there are no crossroads connecting them within five miles of the town, thus making bus trips difficult.

In his opinion Appellate Judge Eugene E. Siler said the state's revised school laws make no difference in the responsibility of county and city school boards for transporting pupils requiring that aid.

Combat Disabled Veterans May Enlist in Army

The War Department last month inaugurated a plan to enlist 5,000 physically handicapped combat veterans of World War II in the regular army. If the experiment is successful, quotas may be enlarged and the same opportunity may be offered to qualified non-combat disabled veterans.

Enlisting these disabled veterans will help satisfy the army's need for skilled manpower. The plan was not designed as a gesture to the handicapped, but simply with the desire to utilize the services of trained and potentially trainable ex-soldiers.

Study of the development of special skills by partially disabled men has proven that, in many occupations, such men are as valuable as men unhandicapped by any handicap.

The applicant must meet all the usual standards for enlistment and general military service, with the exception of the established physical qualifications. Medical officers will pass finally on each man's physical condition. Generally, to be accepted, the combat disabled veteran must be capable of caring unaided for his own personal needs; he must be physically capable of performing useful service in the job for which he is selected; and his condition must be such that further hospitalization or time-loss from duty because of the combat-incurred disability may not be expected.

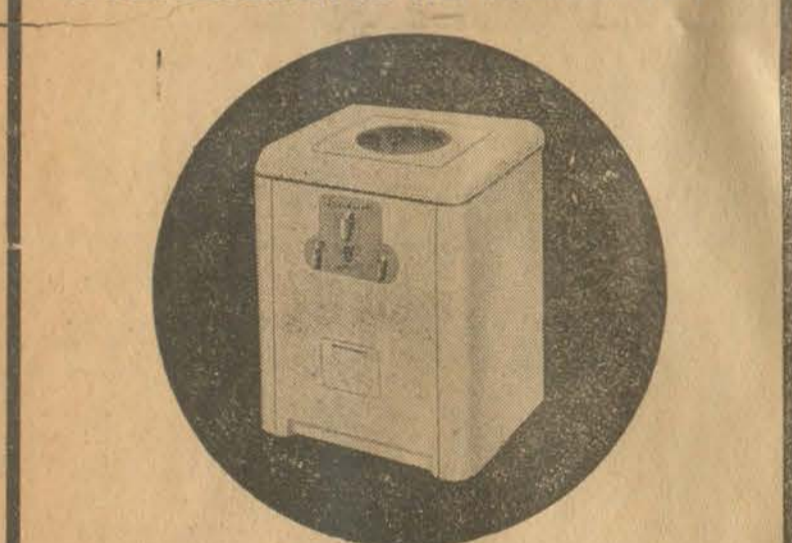
