Former Wayland Man Dies by Own Hand; Ill Health Blamed

Joseph Sheader, 70 years old, retired safety engineer for the Consolidation Coal Company at Jenkins, and for eight years an employe in the same capacity of the Elk Horn Coal Corporation at Wayland, died Jan. 17 of a self-inflicted bullet wound at his home in Van Lear. Ill health was given as the motive for his act, it was stated.

A native of Durham county, England, Mr. Sheader came to the United States in 1909 and settled at Ellsworth, Pa. He moved to Kentucky in 1916.

Upon the death of his wife in January, 1940, he moved to Van Lear and retired from active duty in August, 1941. He was well-known throughout the Big Sandy valley area and was active in Masonic work. He was a member of the Blue Lodge at Jenkins, and the India Consistory, Masons, at Covington, and was a member of the Van Lear Eastern Star.

Funeral rites were held at Painsville and burial was made in Painsville cemetery.

Ex-Lumberman Dies On Way to Hospital

George McKennis, 70 years old, former lumberman in this county, who has been residing for some time on Left Beaver Creek, died Thursday while en route in an automobile to the Stumbo Memorial hospital at Lackey. A heart seizure was given as the cause of death.

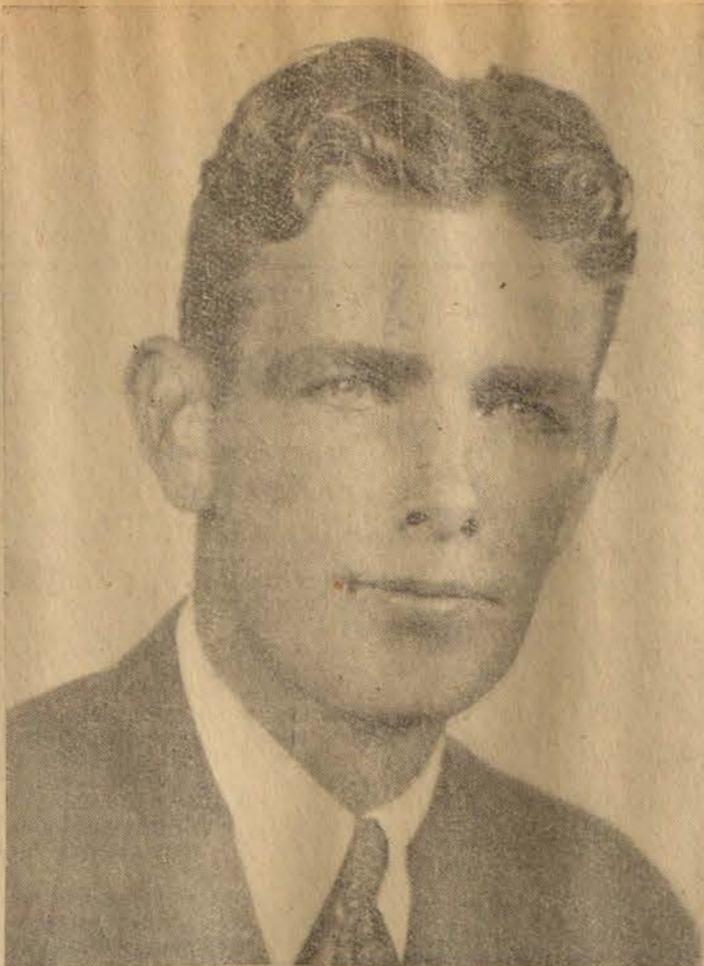

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Wayland Official Dies After Sudden Seizure In Mines Last Friday

Joe Terry, 61 years old, for years a member of the Wayland town council, died Friday at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, after suffering a heart attack while working as a timber man in the Elk Horn Coal Corporation mine at Wayland. Mr. Terry was stricken suddenly and died two hours after reaching the hospital.

He was a son of the late Bill and Polly Maggard Terry, of Hindman, and was one of his section's best men. Besides his connection with the Wayland town government, he was a deacon of both the Steele's Creek and Jones Fork Regular Baptist Churches. He had resided in and around Wayland since 1917.

Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Ella Gibson Terry, and five sons and daughters, Carado Terry, Wayland, Mrs. Reuben Miller, Coal Run, Quentin Terry, Wayland, Mrs. Janice Warrens, Wayland; Joe Terry Jr., Kentucky Wesleyan College, Winchester. He also leaves one brother, Lee Terry, of Ohio, and five sisters, Mrs. Garrett Hays, Langley, Mrs. Jim Nickles, Mousie, Mrs. Sally Moore, Hindman, Mrs. Rich Smith, Hindman, and Mrs. R. B. Stone, of Garrett.

Funeral rites were conducted Sunday from the church at Steele's Creek, the Revs. M. C. Wright, Banner Manns and E. H. Howard officiating. Burial was made in the Caroline Collins cemetery near Wayland under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

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Payment Suspension Penalty for Failure To Undergo Re-Exams

Suspension of disability compensation payments will result for all Kentucky veterans who fail to report for physical re-examination when notified by the Veterans Administration Regional Office, it was announced by Dr. O. P. Miller, chief medical officer. He said re-examinations are scheduled periodically until it became apparent that no further improvement in the veterans' disabilities can be expected. Dr. Miller also pointed out that veterans who have applied for disability compensation must report for physical examinations when they are scheduled, otherwise adjudication of their claims may be delayed indefinitely.

In addition, each month of active duty, including the first three, prior to the termination of the war, entitles you to another month of post-service education, up to 48 months. Your tuition, laboratory fees, etc., up to \$500 per ordinary school year will be paid by the government. Also, you will receive \$65 a month living allowance; \$90 a month if you have dependents. Q. What about family allowances? A. For men enlisting or reenlisting now, family allowances will continue until six months after the war is officially ended. Q. What are my chances of going overseas? A. If you enlist for 3 years, you may select to serve in any overseas theater which has openings, especially Japan or Korea. Q. Can I still choose the branch of service I want to serve in? A. Yes. You can pick any branch which has quotas to be filled by you enlist for 3 years. Q. Is there any way I can reenlist in my old grade? A. Yes, you can, if you reenlist for a 3-year term within 20 days after your honorable discharge. Q. Is there any other way I can reenlist in grade? A. Yes, if you held one of certain military occupational specialties, and were discharged on or after May 12, 1945, you can reenlist in a grade depending on the length of time you held the desired M. O. S. Visit your nearest U. S. Army Recruiting Station for answers to any other questions you may have, or for further details on the above questions.

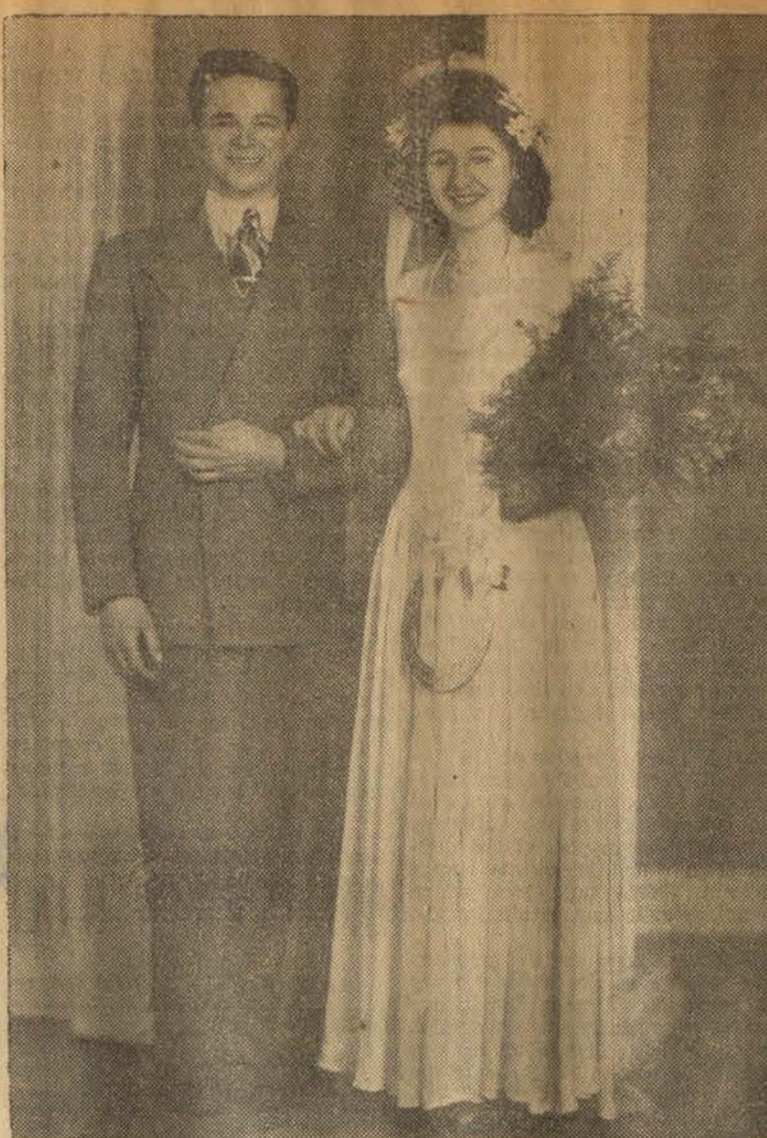

Floyd or any other county. It is a long battle that will be won. I wouldn't go into it unless I intended to stick with it," he added.
Sportsmen at the banquet hailed with enthusiasm announcement of the fiscal court's proposed co-operation in the fight against forest fire destruction.

County Attorney W. W. Burchett, first speaker of the evening, paid tribute to the type of citizenship exemplified by sportsmen and to the work of the Floyd county club. He expressed on behalf of the club appreciation to County Clerk Jarvis Allen for permitting the club to set hunting and fishing licenses and thus benefit financially from these sales and commended Circuit Judge E. P. Hill, District Supervisor Burke and County Conservation Officer Bernard Baldrige for their work in the field of conservation.

Mr. Burchett added that of the 24 violators of fish and game laws brought into county court last year, 22 were convicted and the other two had their cases continued "on good behavior."
Earl Wallace, director of the Division of Game and Fish, and moving spirit in the statewide conservation movement, told the gathering of the long-range plan of the division from which immediate results are not visible but from which splendid results are certain for the future.

"While we have not yet put any more wildlife in the woods for the hunter to kill or made fish in our streams appreciably more plentiful, we have laid the foundation any one would have had to lay to make the long-range program effective," Mr. Wallace explained.
"Every year you will see some increase in game and fish. We are behind you and we are going to help you a lot more than you think," he assured the sportsmen.

Wallace pointed out that the Division of Game and Fish started two years ago under the new civil service system, free of politics, but with an annual income of only around \$150,000. "We had to spread this amount pretty thin to cover the 120 counties of the state," he said. Last year, after hard work to increase revenues, the division's income was \$550,000. The fish hatcheries are now getting into heavier production, he added, and will produce more fish for state streams from year to year. In 1947 the division will raise 80,000 quail for distribution; the state nursery will distribute 18,000 young trees for planting on eroded hillsides and fields; and the nursery will increase its product steadily; a Junior sportsman's movement on a 10-year plan to provide a better type of sportsman for the future—these were items of the state program the speaker pointed to, expressing full assurance of their success.

Mr. Wallace paid tribute to State Senator Doug Hays and Representatives W. G. Biggers and J. P. Howell for their complete cooperation in enacting the legislation needed by the Division of Game & Fish and commended County Judge A. L. Davidson, Circuit Judge Hill and County Attorney Burchett for their full cooperation with the conservation movement in this county.

Other state conservation officials attending the banquet were Frank Phipps, superintendent of conservation officers, and Bill Schessor, Division of Game & Fish chemist. County officials present were County Judge Davidson, County Attorney Burchett, Judge Hill, County Clerk Allen, Magistrates Glenn Burchett and John May.
