ownership of the company and then write letters to people saying he owned it," Smith said. "He spoke of it as 'his' company the way a grocer's clerk might say 'come down to my store,' or a freight agent 'ship by my railroad.' If the Garssons had bought him, do you think they'd have done it by checks and corporations—easy to trace?"

"His eyes are dim from age and use," Smith said with fervor. "His body is tired and he is approaching the time when a man comes apart from teeth to toenails."

"But he is an honest, upright and honorable man. On the law and the evidence I'm confident you'll decide that Andrew J. May has suffered the greatest injustice ever done in this courthouse—it can never be righted. His name has been dragged in the mire—his family has been made to suffer."

TUESDAY—Charles J. Margiotti, former attorney general of Pennsylvania, called the case the "biggest little case I ever heard of."

"Little because there is no evidence; big because of all the fuss that has been made over it," he said. Addressing the jury, Margiotti charged that the ambition of former Senator James M. Mead to become Governor of New York prompted the original probe of the Garsson-May connection by his Senate War Investigating Committee.

Turning from indignation to irony, he observed: "After the Mead committee, the Department of Justice, and the F. B. I. worked for years on this case, lo, we find the mountain has labored and brought forth a mouse."

After tracing the history of the Cumberland Lumber Company in Letcher county, he ridiculed the government contention that the Garssons bought the company for May as a "pay-off" for favors.

"It just doesn't make sense. It just doesn't sound right. It isn't the way those things are done. If the Garssons set out to buy Congressman May and did it with checks that can be traced and corporations that keep records they not only should be found guilty, but they should also have their heads examined: We all have heard of those things. Bribes are paid in cash that can't be traced."

He cited the evidence that Murray Garsson paid off a \$5,000 note of May's.

"That transaction resulted from a legitimate business deal that occurred a full year before the events charged in the indictment and the government knew it," Margiotti thundered. "But they put it in anyway. They didn't even put that in the indictment. It was an afterthought."

Turning to the long list of requests May transmitted to high War Department officials for the Garssons, Margiotti repeated the defense assertion that these were legitimate requests for fair treatment instead of the discrimination the Garsson companies received from lower echelons of the army.

"Not a single contract was obtain-

ed by May for these companies and the government has failed to prove that he accomplished a single thing for them," Margiotti said.

Then giving it the full charge of a powerful chest: "A lot of these contracts were for us, to save our democracy, to save our institutions. These men labored to produce to save those very things. Those are the men—Congressman May, Henry Garsson, Murray Garsson—that this government of ours want you to put in jail. Why, you'd think the war trials had been moved from Nuernberg, from Tokyo to this courtroom. Not Hitler, not Mussolini, not Hirohito, ever put on a worse performance"

Although pyramids have always been thought of in connection with Egypt, there are actually more of them in Mexico, built by the Incas and the Aztecs.

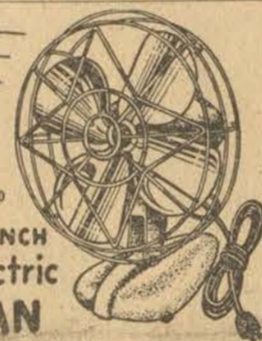

Case did not name the House members who had criticized the project but said they had told him the project has "no great flood control value and is bitterly opposed by people in the basin."

Here, the reaction was immediate and caustic against Congressman W. Howes Meade, of Paintsville, and THE TIMES advised him of this reaction in the following telegram Saturday:

"Citizens here have read report that two Congressmen protested dam completion and that these Congressmen had received protests from Johns Creek residents. They believe these people naturally would protest to you and, therefore, that you fought the appropriation. Will appreciate and give full publicity to your side of matter."

Tuesday afternoon, this week, Congressman Meade wired THE TIMES:

"Effort is being made to get funds appropriated for completion of Dewey dam. This is rank discrimination against the people of Kentucky. I am today on the floor of the House attacking this action and offering an amendment to include funds sufficient for completion."

Although the fiscal year ended June 30 without the needed appropriation, work continued at Dewey this week with funds from the previous appropriation that had not been expended.

How long work will continue or what will be the ultimate fate of the project, H. W. Witte, resident engineer at the dam, said he could not say. "I am getting my information from the newspapers and, naturally, have no comment to make," he said.

This week, with \$1,645,000 hitherto allotted for construction of the dam, the Dewey project was slightly more than 20 per cent completed. The scheduled completion date is June 19, 1948, but the Ryan Construction Company is approximately seven months behind its original schedule as a result of last winter's suspension of work.

As of this week, driving of the tunnel in the left abutment was being completed. Virtually completed was all excavation in the outlet works and being prepared were foundations for concreting the tunnel and the upper end of the outlet works. Contractors have recently been pressing spillway excavation and have extended the upper channel area of the spillway angle to an elevation of 600.

Even though Senate committee approval of the appropriation is made, subsequent House concurrence is necessary to see the project through.

except Congressman Meade. They, quite naturally, surmise that residents of the reservoir area would protest to their own Congressman, not to some other, and, consequently, that he must have been one of the two who, actively or passively, saw the appropriation to defeat.

This, despite the fact that the chief of the army corps of engineers had testified to the flood control value of the barrier; despite the fact that the dam would cut the flood crest in Congressman Meade's home town of Paintsville three feet. This, after more than a million and a half dollars had been appropriated and, presumably, spent on the dam.

If, indeed, Mr. Meade did fight against, or did not fight for, the reservoir project, none other in Congress can be blamed for failure of the appropriation, inasmuch as the work is in his district, not in that of any other legislator.

But, wires Congressman Meade on July 1, four days after the committee's action: "... This is rank discrimination against the people of Kentucky. I am today on the floor of the House attacking this action and offering an amendment to include funds sufficient for completion."

Has the Congressman had a change of heart or was he for the project, all along, and his attitude misconstrued by the people? Or is he staging a modern meller-drammer, rushing to the rescue of the fair maiden, arriving in the nick of time to snatch her from the foul clutches of that dirty villain?

Are dam politics more of the damndest even than Old Kentucky's?

Actions Speak Louder than Words

There are those who would like to mislead the teacher, the farmer and the laborer. They would like for you to believe that Waterfield is your friend but he has not showed in the past the friendship which he is preaching today.

He promises the teacher great increases in appropriation so that they may draw higher pay. In 1944 a budget bill which contained the largest appropriation for schools up to that time was passed by the Senate where Earle Clements was majority leader. The bill was voted down by the House where Harry Lee Waterfield was Speaker.

A special session of the Legislature was called and the Senate passed a budget bill without a dissenting vote. In the House, where Mr. Waterfield was Speaker, again there was trouble and, according to a report of The Courier-Journal of June 24, 1944, "J. Lee Moore, caucus chairman, had to go to bat for the bill because Harry Lee Waterfield, Speaker of the House, failed to see eye to eye with the Senate."

Mr. Waterfield promises a \$10,000,000 appropriation for rural highways. Only last year a bill to provide additional funds for the rural roads in Kentucky came before the General Assembly. The Senate passed the bill but Waterfield refused to let the House consider it. It was necessary for the House to unseat him in order to pass a bill which more than doubled rural road funds.

He says that he is a friend of labor and has helped the miners. It is true that the miners have a safety law passed by the General Assembly, but ask members of the committee who were in Frankfort lobbying for the bill if Waterfield is their friend. They can tell you what kind of a friend he was to them and to their bill. They can tell you why they had to get an order from the circuit court before entering a mine for an inspection.

Earle C. Clements as a State Senator and a Congressman, has left a record which proves his interest in the common people. He has always worked for the best interests of the farmer, the teacher and the laborer.

How well do the miners know how Congressman Clements voted and worked on the TAFT-HARTLEY BILL. Yes, he voted against it. He was also there and voted to uphold the President's veto.

If we had more men in Washington like Clements the miners would not have lost. They know their friend and will show this on August 2.


