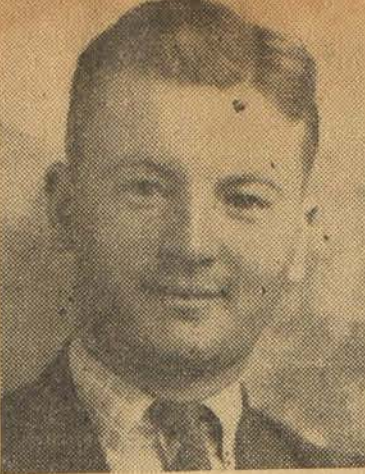

In Cleveland, President Charles M. White of Republic Steel Corporation said the contract "has placed an unbearable burden on steel costs in relation to selling price."

White said he did not see how the price of steel can be held at its present level.

Lewis told a news conference in his office that it was "reasonable to assume" the remainder of the industry would meet the same terms in a few days.

Lewis referred derisively to the Taft-Hartley Act, which he said had been designed to "scuttle" the mine workers' welfare fund as well as the union. He also served notice on the Southern Coal Producers Association, which has bucked at his demands, that he was out to smash it.

Lewis cockily announced to the news conference that contracts in the past had been signed by the dozen or so Associations, and that as those smaller groups chose to accept his contract, they could step up and sign it. Their mines then would work.

Lewis told reporters he had negotiated a "bread-and-butter" agreement which "had more real value for the individual worker than has hitherto been negotiated in this or any other industry through collective bargaining."

"We hope that it will be the beginning of a new era in the industry," he said. "It represents a change over to a policy of feeding the mine workers of the country rather than clubbing them."

Lashing out at Senator Taft, who he said had "personally forfeited the Presidency of the United States" by sponsoring the labor bill, Lewis also turned his wrath on Republicans in general. The U. M. W. chief long had been a Republican, and supported the late President Roosevelt's Democratic candidacy only in 1936.

Lewis accused the Republican party of "selling out to finance an industry" by working for the labor law, and he added:

"One thing about a Republican Congress—they stay bought."

Asked by a reporter why the operators had given him such "a favorable contract," Lewis grinned and retorted:

"Who can look into the mind of a coal operator?"

The Southern Coal Producers Association was the only sizable group to leave it. They assailed Lewis for modifications in a closed meeting, apparently got nowhere, and decided to convene Wednesday for a "final decision."

One of the Southerners predicted they would be "forced to accept," as a group or individually. In fact a scattering of them already had accepted. But Southern mines producing 25 per cent of the country's coal and employing 100,000 miners; stood idle.

Some 2,000 miners in the South were covered by the "captive" interests—the mines owned by steel companies who signed along with the Northern non-captive negotiators.

In addition, a number of individual Southern operators had signed. These included the Trucking Association of Kentucky, West Virginia Coal & Coke Corporation, Lillybrook Coal Corporation of West Virginia, Consolidation Coal Company of Kentucky, and five companies in Virginia, Eastern Kentucky, and West Virginia represented by George Campbell.

Coal prices will shoot up, Senator Taft forecast a rise of 70 cents a ton, but some operators said the jump would exceed \$1. Taft guessed steel would rise \$1.10 a ton and steel products proportionately.

To the Veterans of Floyd County:

Our attention has been called to certain statements made by a few supporters of Earle C. Clements for Governor, and this is to give you our views on the matter. We have no objection to having the merits of any candidate, or the faults of any candidate, pointed out to us. We think it is the duty of every citizen to examine, as thoroughly as possible, any man seeking the high office of Governor.

But we resent this attack on Mr. Clements' opponent, Harry Lee Waterfield, which assails Mr. Waterfield because he was not in military service during World War II. He answered the call. But he failed to pass the "screen" test given by medical men. An injury he had sustained, some years before, made him unfit for military service.

That is the story, regardless of what you have been told. If necessary, we will produce for any person's complete satisfaction a sworn statement from Mr. Waterfield's draft board. We do not want to see one veteran misled. However you vote, we want you to vote, knowing the truth. Now, has Harry Lee Waterfield committed any crime against his country, simply because he was physically unfit? Have all the thousands of other good Americans who did not wear a uniform because of physical disability earned the scorn of their

fellows? You will recall that Franklin D. Roosevelt was 35 when World War I started. He did not wear a uniform, but we maintain he made his country a great President. This "big issue" they've started in this county gets to be a little ridiculous. Mr. Clements served in World War I. Since that time, he has been richly honored by the people. He has been County Clerk, Sheriff, County Judge, State Senator and Congressman from his district. If he must be further remembered on his service record, why not all of us start a fund now to memorialize him forever with statues in every courthouse square in Kentucky?

We would be the last to say that any young man who fought for his country and who made the sacrifices so many of us made is not due a full measure of gratitude. But there is a struggle on the Home Front, in war or peace, that never ends. We must continually fight for Good Government, for Good Leadership, to the end that no one class or a chosen few, but all the people, benefit.

We as voters have a part still to play at home next in importance to the part we played in the victory at arms. We did not fight that war for any small group. We fought against dictatorship, in whatever form. Our battle was for the weak, not the strong. We hold today to the same principles.

Harry Lee Waterfield, who did not wear his country's uniform because of physical inability, through no fault of his own, is our hope for the common people of Kentucky. We count ourselves in this group. He has boldly taken his stand for the people. We feel that he will be just toward all, and more than that we do not ask.
