

EVERY group that has made a detailed study of the Big Sandy canalization program has given the proposed river improvement its unqualified approval.

The Congress of the United States would be the exception, but it has made no detailed study of the projected improvements. Sectional rivalries, championship by legislators of economic causes and a dismal ignorance of the importance of the waterway contributed to last year's failure of the Congress to join those who had made a careful study of the program.

The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company quite naturally opposes the program. Although its officials conceivably could feel, as many others do, that the waterway would not be injurious to the railroad in this section, they naturally do not welcome competition.

This newspaper has never been unfriendly to the railroad company. This attitude rises from two considerations: the railroad's pioneering in industrial development of this section and its contri-
