TO ORGANIZE JR. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Pikeville Jaycees Tell Service Opportunities; Music Heads Group Here

Full organization of a Junior Chamber of Commerce here was considered a certainty and a matter of only days after members of the existing Jaycees met at the club here last Thursday evening for the purpose of the organization and of the movements undertaken and effects obtained by the Pikeville Junior Chamber.

More than 40 younger business and professional men, including a dozen members of the Kiwanis Club, heard the Pikeville group outline the work the Junior Chamber of Commerce has done in Pikeville and Pike county and what a Prestonsburg group could do locally and in the county.

Marvin Music was elected temporary chairman of the Prestonsburg group, with Kilmer Combs as temporary secretary.

The visitors were headed by James W. Wine, president of the Pikeville Junior Chamber, and he was joined in defining Jaycee work by J. Perry Cline, secretary, Garrod O. Cline, past president, Chas. B. Christian, Jimmy Miller, Ferrell O. Wellman and Gene Hale.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce, it was explained, offers young men the opportunity to assume roles of leadership in the business and social life of the community and in its government. Higher business standards, business expansion, greater social and recreational activities and smooth-working relations with all civic clubs and city and county governments--these were cited as in the Junior Chamber of Commerce field of activity.

Age of Junior Chamber of Commerce members may range from 21 to 35 years. It was explained, however, that the youthful outlook is more important than youth in years.

Explaining that their members come from all walks of life, the Pikeville group told of their undertakings during the comparatively short time the Jaycees have been functioning there. Following his selection as manager Sunday afternoon at a meeting held in the office of W. C. Rimmer, Roark announced that spring practice for the team will begin March 26. Any player desiring connection with the team will be given a try-out.

WASPS FACE OWENSBORO IN 1ST TILT

Floyd County Fans In Heavy Numbers Go To Louisville

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They had just witnessed the dethroning of the Inez Indians, rated Kentucky's No. 1 team by many, from the top of the Eastern Kentucky basketball roost and decided then and there to follow the new regional champs, the Wayland Wasps, to Louisville for the coveted crack at the state title.

Inez' 41-38 defeat at the hands of Wayland came on the Indians' home floor and with a decisiveness that removed the results from the nature of an upset. Led by Ed DeCoursey, who returned from the navy to school this year to become just about Kentucky's best high school basketball player, the Wasps jumped into the lead in the first quarter, never relinquished the lead except for a scant few minutes at the close of the second quarter, then came back to grab the lead again and hold onto it, despite the desperate efforts of Russell Williamson's fighting, well-coached team.

Wayland led, 8-5, with the close of the first quarter, but dropped behind, 22-21, at half after Ed DeCoursey had accumulated four fouls and was taken out in the last few minutes of the period for a rest. Then Wayland came back to lead at the end of the third quarter, 31-24.

With less than two minutes to go the Wasps led the Indians by seven points. Throwing all caution to the winds, Inez scored twice on long shots to draw within the three points by which the losers trailed when the tournament ended.

Wayland's coach, "Copper" John Campbell, star of the state championship basketball team of a few years ago, left with his team Wednesday for Louisville and Wayland's first game tonight (Thursday) is with a veteran Owensboro team. It is Wayland's first trip to the state tournament and Campbell's first year of coaching. It is the first trip of a Floyd county team to the state since the heyday of the Betsy Layne five, a decade or more ago.

RE-SURFACE BIDS SOUGHT

On Left Beaver Road And Other Highways For April 4 Letting

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Included in the group of projects to be let to contract are 7,983 miles of the Left Beaver Creek road beginning 3.3 miles north of (below) Clear Creek and extending to Wheelwright Junction. The road is to receive 4,400 tons of Class F surface.

Other road projects in this section on which bids are asked: Re-surfacing of the Wayland-Beaver Gap road, 3.4 miles, beginning one-half mile north of Punchfork and extending to approximately half a mile north of the Letcher county line; grade, drain and traffic-bound surface.

Hindman-Lackey road, 10.06 miles, from 4.9 miles east of Hindman to Floyd county line; 5,580 tons Class F surface.

Paintsville-Salyersville road, 7,192 miles, from point near mouth of Mud Lick Creek to Magoffin county line; 3,380 tons Class F surface.

Paintsville-Salyersville road from east city limits of Salyersville to Johnson county line, 6,588 miles; Class F surface.

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Among the cases docketed for trial are 11 for murder, 24 for carrying concealed deadly weapons, four for voluntary manslaughter, 12 for shooting and wounding, and five for shooting at without wounding.

The grand jury in its final report expressed the opinion that others were involved in Osborne's death and asked that the next grand jury continue the probe.

Mrs. Bentley had not been arrested Monday of this week, it was said. Her trial is slated on the first day of court.

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The \$2,000 bond of Troy Hall and Raymond Anderson, charged with the murder of Johnny Holbrook, was forfeited at the January term when they failed to appear for trial and is marked on the docket as forfeited. John Hall is the bondsmen and hearing on the bond forfeiture has been set for April 14.

COURT ASKS NO STRIKE

Tension Relieved In This Section By New Action

Nervousness of Floyd county business and uncertainty in the minds of many coal miners were relieved this week with the action of the Supreme Court in telling UMW A chief, John L. Lewis, in effect, that a strike March 31 will not be tolerated.

Speeding up its procedure, the court ordered its mandate in his case to go out officially on March 20, instead of March 31 as it would have otherwise.

The ruling commands Lewis to cancel his notice terminating his soft coal miners' contract with the government and notify the miners he has done so, under pain of a \$2,000 fine against the United Mine Workers. Lewis has five days after the issuance of the mandate in which to comply.

In ordering the striking miners back to work Dec. 7, Lewis told them to carry on till March 31 but did not give his contract termination notice--equivalent to a strike call, for the miners traditionally do not work without a contract.

The Supreme Court's ruling was issued March 6 and under the normal course it would not have operated in time to avert a March 31 walk-out. The decision upheld contempt convictions against Lewis and the union for the previous strike but rejected Judge T. Alan Goldsborough's \$3,500,000 fine against the union to \$700,000, conditional upon complying with the ruling.

The government then moved to have the mandate issued "forthwith" to safeguard "the public interest." However, the 11-day speed-up meets its purpose just as well. Counsel for Lewis had opposed any speed-up on the ground it would jeopardize his interests.

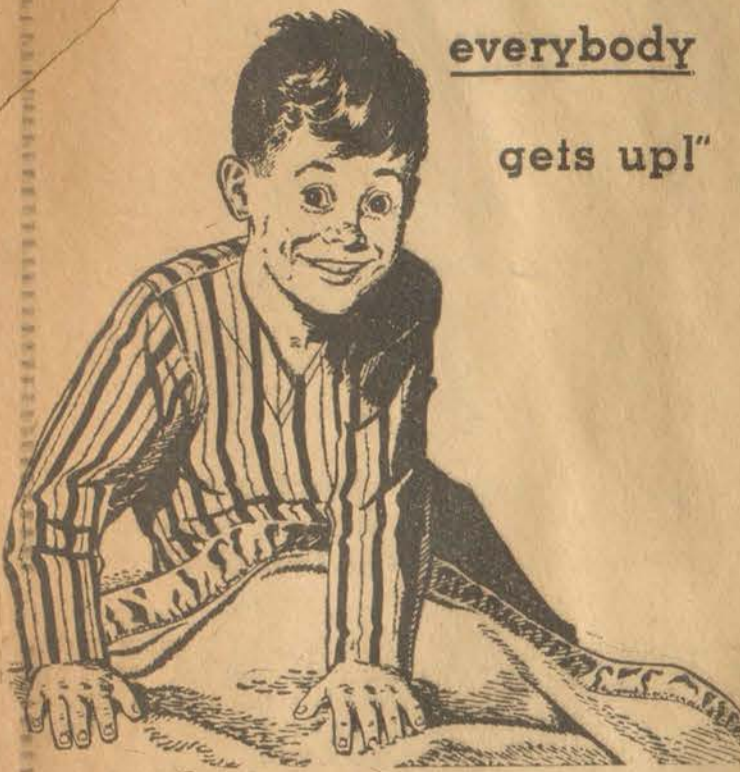

Lackey Club Joins Teachers in Asking Boost in Salaries

Lackey, Ky., March 10 (Spl.)—The Lackey-Garrett Women's Club has joined teachers in urging Governor Willis to call a special Legislative session to make possible increased pay for teachers. The club at its last meeting unanimously adopted the following resolution, a copy of which was sent to Governor Willis:

"WHEREAS, the public school system constitutes one of the most important factors in the welfare and progress of the state, and

"WHEREAS, the schools of Kentucky are faced with the danger of rapid deterioration unless something is done immediately to alleviate the shortage of qualified teachers, and

"WHEREAS, persons of superior ability can be retained in the teaching profession or interested in entering this profession only through the payment of more adequate salaries, and

"WHEREAS, further state aid is necessary if salaries are to be raised to a sufficiently high level,

"THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Lackey-Garrett Women's Club urges the Governor of Kentucky to call a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of enacting legislation to make possible at least a \$500 increase in salary for every Kentucky teacher, the same to be retroactive to January 1, 1947."
