

VA SELECTS SITE FOR HEART DISABILITY STUDY

Intensive research into heart disease-which claims the lives of more veterans than any other diseasewill be centered at the Veterans Administration Mt. Alto hospital in Washington, D.C., VA said this week.

The new research center, a part of which already is in operation, was developed under supervision of Dr. George P. Robb, widely - known cardiclogist and assistant medical director of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

All the newer, modern, safe methods of studying the behavior of the human heart will be employed in the center-cardiac catheterization, special x-rays of heart and blood vessels, and thorough electrocardiog-

A. Yes, A service-connected blind veteran is entitled to receive, at government expense, a guide dog and various devices necessary to assist him to overcome his handicap. Q. Does a veteran have to have 10 per cent or more service-connected disab lity to be eligible for out-

patient treatment? A. Any veteran with an established service-connected disability is entitled to out-patient treatment for the service-connected disability, regardless of the degree of disability.







The inspector proposed strict compliance with the adopted timbering standards requiring the setting of permanent posts close to the working faces. Removal or effective support of loose roof along two haulageways and instruction of employes in approved roof-testing methods also was suggested.

More than 30 recent safety gains were cited in the report. They encompassed generally adequate ventilation, prompt closing of crosscuts, installation of additional air-locks, pre-shift examinations for explosive gas and other hazards, setting of safety posts close to all working faces, use of permissible shot-firing units only, ordering of employes to give ample warning before firing shots, correction of several electrical hazards, discontinuance of jumping on and off moving trips, posting of escapeway-direction signs, universal wearing of protective headgear, and a ban on using open-flame lights underground.

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

NOW on a year's tour of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and other historic documentary evidence of America's plans and battle for liberty.

The fact that these thousands of the young, the old, black and white, those of all religious faiths and in every walk of life, proudly sign the Freedom Pledge as the voluntary act of good Americans makes it particularly difficult for us to understand the refusal of certain labor leaders to affirm that they are Americans and not Communists.

John L. Lewis, head of the United Mine Workers, and Phillip Murray, CIO leader, are notable instances of what appears to be plain stubbornness in the face of the Taft-Hartley Act which they abhor. It would appear that, for the simple reason that they hate this particular law, they are unwilling to make a clearcut statement of their American-

The United Auto Workers, headed by Walter P. Reuther, only this week voted compliance with the anti-Communist requirement of the law. Those workers are affected by the Taft-Hartley Act even as the UMWA or the CIO.

But the fact is, it is not a question of who is affected or not affected by the Taft-Hartley Act. or who likes it or who doesn't like it. Personal grudges become insignificant beside the future of America. Joseph Stalin, Molotov, et al, viciously assert their un-Americanism-why not counter with pledges of loyalty from American leaders?

John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers, as individuals, would violently resent impugning of their Americanism, So would the rank and file of other labor organizations. There is no reason for their Americanism to be impugned, and their leaders should with typical boldness assert theirs in these days when Communism is the enemy of everything and all that is American.

It strikes us that the idea back of

Some labor unions have become infested with Communists. This ountry, in time of peril, is dependent as much upon the forces of production as upon its armed forces; therefore, it is important, at any rate, that those at the top be avowed enemies of the forces that would destroy America.

In short, now is the proper time for good Americans to stand up and be counted.
