

KILLS CHILD NEAR HERE

Holbrook Faces Charge Of Manslaughter; Says Sun Glare Blinded Him

Jun'or Holbrook, 21-year-old Edna Jane Goble died of injuries sustained Monday afternoon when hit by Holbrook's truck near the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs Floyd Goble, at Lancer.

The child, a pupil in the third grade at the Lancer school, died at the Prestonsburg General hospital at 12:55 Tuesday afternoon of a skull fracture and other injuries including a broken leg.

Arrested by Deputy Sheriff Ed Craft, Holbrock claimed he was blinded by glare of the sun on an aluminum-coated trailer he was passing on the fill, near the Goble home, and that he did not see the child. The little girl was en route home from school at the time she was hit, and was almost five feet off the pavement, her father said, when

After striking her, the truck cut back onto the highway, striking the trailer, which was drawn by a dump truck knocking it over the fill. The vehicles were traveling upriver in the same direction as that followed by

the victim Holbrook was not drinking, and was disconsolate over the tragedy officers said. Robert Carr, Jr., Flatwoods, Ky., driver of the other truck, was uninjured.







ory at LaGrange. Fortunately, John Young Brown, Lexington attorney, took an active interest in the boy's case, and so young Casebolt is now in the friendly environs of Father Flanagan's Boys Town instead of on the 'La-Grange second team" at Greendale, as Mr. Brown aptly describes this reform school that does not reform.

Full credit belongs to Mr. Brown and Father Flanagan, But all cenure does not belong to Judge Fields.

The circuit judge in the case was imply following the law. The boy had been given a juvenile hearing and, whatever the faults of that nearing, nobody had discovered hem until Mr. Brown entered the case at the eleventh hour. Kentucky has no real school for the errant young who need guidance rather than punishment, who need training for life rather than coaching at the hands of older criminals for a career in crime.

Whatever measure of brame the state escapes belongs to the elders of the boy and all other wayward boys and girls. Wherever a crime is committed by one so young, there is an older criminal in the back-

And tragically often that criminal is in the youngster's own home. Perhaps an unwitting criminal but guilty, nevertheless, of the awesome crime of permitting the ruin of a

In crediting the Kentucky Elknorn Mining Company's 500-ton-aday Columbia No. 2 mine with numerous recent safety advances, a federal coal mine inspector also proposes an expanded coal-dust control program and several other prere-inspection report released by the Bureau of Mines. Fifty-six men were employed at the McDowell development when it was re-examined in

August by Inspector Harold Wiley More than 30 between-inspection improvements were listed by Inspector Wiley. They embraced generally adequate roof control, provision of suitable containers for carrying blasting materials, use of permissible explosives in an approved manner, face and roof tests before and after blasting, recording of daily fan inspections, erection of concreteblock stoppings between main intake and return airways, prompt closing of ventilating doors, purchase of two permissible flame-safey lamps, and pre-shift examinations for explosive gas and other hazards. Also listed were audible warning devices for the locomotives, further precautions against electrical and mechanical hazards, placing of rock-dust at strategic points underground for fire-fighting purposes, 100 per cent wearing of "hard" hats, maintenance of complete accident records, and a ban on using openflame lights in the mine.

Although noting that some rockdust had been distributed in the mine, Wiley recommended rockdusting of several working entries to within 80 Feet of the face as well as application of additional rock-dust in a number of other active areas. Use of water to allay coal dust during cutting operations also was sug-

As further aids in promoting safey, the inspector proposed maintenance of unobstructed clearance along the main haulageway, use of permissible trip lights and prohibition of certain risky haulage practices, correction of remaining electrical hazards, increased use of safety posts in face regions, direction of more air to several working places pressure-recording gauges and automatic stop-signals for the fans, upiversal wearing of safety-toe shoes, eye protection for workers exposed to flying particles, and prohibition of smoking underground.
