The two neighboring teams met for the best three out of five final series after winning a play-off series against Drift and Maytown.

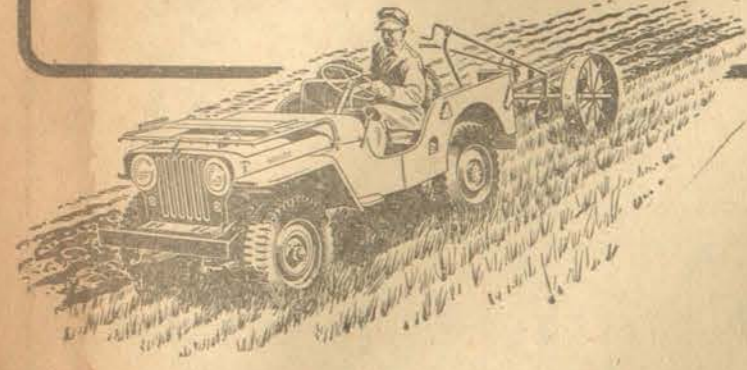

In the face of the biggest snake-handling project yet, Kentucky highway patrolmen in Harlan county stood by last Sunday, strictly in the role of their department impler—to handle traffic.

Virginia state police were there to make arrests if the cultists ventured across the nearby state line. But not the Kentucky officers. Their duties were described in news dispatches as "only to keep order and to keep the highway clear of cars."

THE TIMES is not in the mood to be excessively critical of the Kentucky officers, even if they did see their duty as set out by state law and didn't do it. They probably had their orders. And, too, the law may be unconstitutional in that it conceivably could restrict freedom of worship, though we shall never know how sound or unsound it is, unless the minions of the law become as willing to put it to the test as are those who, under the guise of religion, flout the law. Besides, there's the no minor matter of public sentiment in certain sections of the state to be reckoned with, and there is a day of reckoning coming soon. No, we are not over-critical.

Judge Pauley Dies At Pikeville Home Of Heart Seizure

Pikeville, Ky., Oct. 4—Judge H. Pauley, 63, recognized as Pike county's best-known citizen and long-time Republican leader, died here Saturday afternoon following a heart attack suffered early Thursday in his home. In addition to his years of public service Mr. Pauley operated the Pauley Lumber Company. He was a native of Pike county.

Judge Pauley served from 1911 to 1913 as Sheriff of Pike county, after which he served 16 years as treasurer. His county judgeship covered the periods 1928 to 1932 and 1941 to 1945. From 1937 to 1941 the late jurist served as Mayor of Pikeville. Immediate relatives surviving are a son, William C. Pauley, of Pikeville, two daughters, Mrs. Fauntine Shively, of Pikeville, and Mrs. Atheltha Coleman, of Louisville, a brother, J. F. Pauley, Pikeville, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Young and Mrs. Sally Jackson, both of Pike county.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m., Monday from the Pikeville Methodist Church, with the Rev. O. B. Johnson officiating. Burial will be in the Pauley family cemetery. Survivors announced that because of Judge Pauley's "deep affection for so many men" no honorary pallbearers would be named.
