Fires 6 Pistol Bullets Into Body of Neighbor, Is Arrested in Knott

Mrs Riter Hall, 40-year-old house wife, whose six revolver shots fatally during the preceding night

Her victim, mother of eight, die at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, at 5:55 a.m., Thursday

The shooting, officers said, was an aftermath of a series of family quarrels and fights. Mrs. Hall claimed Mrs. Johnson was beating her at the time the shots were fired and had two days earlier, beaten two of her

Five hundred thousand cattle at average of \$125 a head add up to 00,000. Quite a lot of spondulix in times when billions make single-column headlines, isn' And Kentucky farmers are muf fing an opportunity to add that much to their annual income by failing to avail themselves of their

opportunity to make their grass land produce all the livestock, particularly

beef cattle, that it could produce.

On a recent trip of 600 miles thru 28 counties, I saw fewer beef cattle and pasture than we have in one magisterial district in Henderson county. Eight of the counties are in the rich bluegrass region, six are in mountains of north-eastern Kentucky, the rest are just average ounties. In some of the poorest cate country in the southwest it takes square mile to sustain one cow. In he hilliest counties in Kentucky our acres will produce a beef animal n a year of average rainfall. In the luegrass districts an acre and half will do the trick.

With 300 acres of bluegrass I keep around 200 brood cows, calves and yearlings and in good years like 1947 could handle 100 more without overgrazing the land. Mixed pas-

Most farmers with 100 acres could keep 10 good beef cows and market nardly any labor, and the manure yould fertilize their land every day the cattle grazed on it.

I know a farmer who says he would raise cattle even if they didn't yield him any profit at all when he narketed them, because that is the best way to maintain the fertility of

In this corner of the state most cattle and sheep raisers depend mainly on redtop and lespedeza, the edtop for year-round grazing, the eza to fatten the animals in eptember and October. Thus far, here are only about 50 bluegrass pastures in each of our three main attle counties-Henderson, Daviess

Enlistments Wanted For European Duty

Information has been released by gt. Chas. J. James, recruiting officer of the U.S. Army and Air Force Recruiting Service, that enlistments and re-enlistments in the regular rmy for initial assignment to the European Command, including the Mediterranean theatre, are authorized for personnel of the fallowing

Men from civil life who have had prior service in any of the armed forces, either army, navy, Marine Corps, or coast guard; men whose current enlistments are terminating and who desire to re-enlist immediately for initial assi European Command; men who are eligible and desire immediate discharge under governing army regulations for the purpose of re-enlistment for initial assignment to the European Command.

Applicants taking advantage of existing vacancies will enlist "European Command Unassigned," for periods of three, four or five years. Individuals applying under the provisions of War Department pamphlet 12-16 whose prior service qualifies them for enlistment in the air forces only will not be considered for enlistment.

Enlistments and re-enlistments for assignment to the European Command are to fill shortages and are limited to white applicants for the third enlisted grade or below.

CLOW DEATH isn't so horrifying

It couldn't be. Otherwise, we would be doing something about it. Otherwise, we would feel such mounting horror that every man and woman of us would do something-anything!-to halt the fearful threat at Stephens

If it were death from infantile paralysis or spinal meningitis or Mr. Snyder. some other disease that swoops draloved ones who, only a few short Saturday. hours or days ago, were healthy and delightfully alive, the full sense of norror would be ours.

But tuberculosis doesn't work that way. In widely segregated homes Ann. This is their second child. there are isolated cases. At first, the malady is only seldom recognizable Margaret D. Spurlock either to the sufferer or others. Follows the loss of weight, the spasms of coughing, the awful death that creeps by inches, inexorably to demand full satisfaction.

If those 30 had died within a few weeks, in one or two communities, we all would have been properly impressed. But the slow death, stretched over weeks, over the miles, insidiously crept up on us unimaginative souls, stalked us so tediously that none of us became frightened.

Thus has tuberculosis infiltrated cur communities as successfully as any foreign ism or any wartime enemy, without diturbing the defenders to action.

The Floyd County Tuberculosis Association has done a fair measure of good work. But it cannot ever achieve its major aims unless the rank and file of the people become aware of the threat tuberculosis presents to persons of all ages, in every walk of life.

As of this year-while were dying, being drawn to the grave by inches-the County Tuberculosis Association could not get as many as a dozen of all the thousands of persons in this county to meet to plan further work and to carry on drives for funds. This, despite the fact that every person who buys as much as \$2 worth of Tuberculosis Seals has a right to vote in the Association's affairs as much as even an official of the Association.

Floyd is one of the two Kentucky counties designated by the State Tuberculosis Association as demonstration counties for an experiment in intensive work toward the curb and eventual eradication of the White Plague. Under this plan the state association will pay one-third the salary of a fulltime nurse, or up to \$800 a year, with the county association paying the remainder, or about \$1,800. This is a three-year plan and if the results at the end of that time justify such support, it has been authoritatively said, the U.S. Public Health Service will pour money into Kentucky in an all-out drive on tuberculcsis.

It should be explained, too, that the county association itself retains a larger share of funds raised locally through Seal sales than are retained by any other group in similar public health endeavor. If the people of this county, for example, buy \$1,500 worth of Seals, the Fleyd County Tuberculosis Association retains, for work in this county, fully 75 per cent of that amount.

Last year, there were 30 known unerals resulting from the ravages of tuberculosis, as deadly a killer as ver stalked humankind. There doubtless were some whose deaths were unreported. Next year, many mere may die. Those who have died had their contacts; there is no way to meet the foe without public interest and the public support necessary to employ a nurse spending all her time in seeking out the sick of tuberculosis, all their contacts, all the breeding places of the disease.

That is only a small part of the story. What the people of Floyd county, particularly the leaders and Floyd county parents, do this year will write another chapter for next year and the years to come.
