Each bank-The Bank Josephine and The First National here, and The First Guaranty at Martin-estimated it had cashed 200 bonds. The First National and First Guaranty estimated the average value of each bond at \$200; the Bank Josephine gave a slightly lower figure.

The "boys" did not form long lines at any Floyd bank, but it was evident that, all advice from their government to the contrary, most of them will convert their bonds into what is good at the store.

Of the approximately 5,000 veterans, one banker estimated 4,000 will cash their bonds. "The number of veterans visiting us for this purpose is getting heavier all the time,

A. See your nearest VA contact representative or apply at a VA regional office or hospital. A letter addressed to the nearest VA office also will suffice. A. No. All charges are borne by

Q. Can I go to a private hospital in my home town and have VA pay A. Yes, if you have a service-con-

nected disability and receive VA's nor Fair, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Pack approval first. Q. What papers should I bring and children, Mr. and Mrs. C. D.

with me when I apply for VA hospitalization? A. Bring your honorable discharge certificate or a certified copy. If you already have been granted compensation for a service-connected dis-

ability, all you need is your "C" Q. Will VA pay for the medical care of my dependents?

A. No. Under existing laws, only veterans are eligible for VA hospital

Q. Do I have a choice as to which hospital I will go?

A. Generally, a veteran is assigned to the hospital nearest his home. However, crowded conditions in certain hospitals, or the type of injury or disease suffered by the veteran and similar conditions might result in the veteran being assigned to a special center or hospital in another section of the country.

Q. Can my relatives visit me while am in the hospital?

A. Yes. All VA hospitals have special hours set aside each day for visitors, the same as civilian hos-

Q. Will my disability compensation be taken away from me if I am hospitalized in a VA hospital?

A. If you are single, your compensation will be paid you in full for the first six months but, if your treatment or care extends beyond six months, your monthly benefit payment may not exceed 50 percent of the regular rate, or \$30 per the regular rate is \$30 or less, it will not be reduced. Upon discharge by VA you will receive a lump sum equal to the amount that was withheld after the six-month period. If you have a dependent or dependents, your compensation payments will continue at the full rate for the entire period of your hospitaliza-

Success with Pike In Herrington Lake Reported by Division

The little wall-eyed pike in Herrington Lake are growing up.
First reports on the survival of a great number of the approximately 880,000 pike fry which were placed in the lake in May have been receiv-ed by the Division of Game and Fish from fishermen in this body of water. They report that many of the small fish, new about four inches long, have been captured on wormbaited hooks. The pike were released by the Division with the belief that this cannibalistic fish, which is particularly fond of gizzard shad, would eliminate this species to a large degree thereby depriving the bass in the lake of an abundant

food supply. The Division determined, after tests, that the lake contained plenty of bass but that they would not sub cumb to the lures of fishermen simply because there was an over-supply of shad, in all sizes, on which they fed. By decreasing this source of food, the Division believes, the bass will again bite and the lake will return to its fermer status as one of the best fishing spots in the South.

Catching of the small pike in the lake has proved to the Division, Earl Wallace, director, explains, that the pike project is feasible. In a few years, when the pike are larger and their appetite increases, they are expected to devour an immense number of shad and fishing in this lake should be improved by then, the director pointed out.

Minor Clark, superintendent of fisheries for the Division, announced that plans are under way by the Division to obtain muskellunge fish to be distributed in the lake this fall. It is hoped that they, like the pike will feed on the shad and besides decreasing this type fish will provide sport for fishermen. Also efforts are being made to secure a number of larger pike for distribution in the lake this fall, Mr. Clark said.
