A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION?

No reason actually exists for regarding a constitutional convention with misgivings. The "fears" expressed by certain reactionary leaders have the ring of propaganda.

It doesn't do to say that what was good enough for pappy is good enough for us. The fact is what was good enough for one generation is never good enough for the next.

It seems to us, however, that a deeper point is to be found in this professed uneasiness of the gentlemen who shy away from a convention.

We say rubbish. We say that what dead Kentuckians have done, live ones can do—and can do with due attention to developments undreamed of by deceased elders.

We aren't afraid of the people, and we aren't afraid, as are these backward-looking men, that a new constitution will be a case of out of the frying pan into the fire.

Through the decades Kentucky has got along pretty well through a democratic, or, if you prefer, a representative system of government.

RENEWAL OF FAITH SEEN CURE FOR PSYCHIC ILLS

"Nothing would do more to keep people from needing the help of psychiatrists than a renewal of intelligent, vital, personal religion," declares Harry Emerson Fosdick.

Citing the fact that there are today 4,011 "accredited psychiatrists" in the United States, Dr. Fosdick sees "more disordered lives being produced than they can possibly deal with."

"An inner serenity," which the author holds necessary to true religion, is impossible to many, he believes.

Goodwill, even toward those who are unfriendly, is not an impractical ideal but an indispensable factor in emotional and mental health.

Some psychiatrists are suspicious of religion, even hostile to it, because in many cases it produces "silly, irrational remorse over moralistic peccadillos, threatens people with penalties for breaking nonsensical codes, and thus causes complex for which there is no sound reason."

Liberty No. 2 Mine Adds Almost Score Of Safety Measures

To supplement nearly a score of recent safety improvements in the Liberty No. 2 mine at Samson, this county, a federal coal mine inspector has proposed further precautionary measures in a report released by the Bureau of Mines.

Recent safety improvements included the removal of coal dust from the tippie and haulageways, effective rock-dusting, purchase of equipment to allay coal dust during cutting operations.

To strengthen generally good operating conditions, Inspector Shaw recommended adherence to the timbering standards, sufficient timber to protect face workers against roof falls.

**Webb-Nunley Vows
Solemnized Aug. 24
At Garrett Church**

The marriage of Miss Elizabeth Ellen Webb, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Webb, of Lackey, to Mr. Church Nunley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doty Nunley, 111 Watson Court, Frankfort, was solemnized in the Garrett Methodist Church Aug. 24 at 1 p.m. The Rev. S. B. Rucker officiated.

English ivy, ferns and baskets of white gladioli, mums and a row of candelabrae decorated the church. Miss Alice Ann Howard, pianist, played a program of wedding music while Mrs. Christine Francis sang, "Because" and "I Love You Truly."

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a gown of ivory satin made with a fitted bodice, buttoning to the waistline in back with satin buttons, sweetheart neckline, tight sleeves pointed over the hands, and a full skirt with a long circular train. Who's Splotching the 'Scutcheon Now?

WHAT'S the world, more particularly Kentucky, coming to? Opponents of a new Constitution for Kentucky infer that the state which now has four native sons on the Supreme Court of the United States cannot or will not supply men capable and honest enough to do a good job of re-writing the Constitution and that its people as a whole are incapable of judging, after it is written, if it is a good or a bad job.

Which is another reason why THE TIMES would like to see the matter put to test: a new Constitution written and submitted to the people for approval or rejection.

If the people of this state haven't the sense to compare the present Constitution with the revised version a Constitutional convention would produce, and then eschew the bad and keep the good—it don't make no difference, nohow.

This Interests Us

OUR contemporary, The Salyersville Independent, and Highway Commissioner Watkins engaged, during the recent primary election campaign, in an interesting exchange of views on the matter of road-building as affecting Magoffin county. At the risk of appearing to judge the scrap from one of the principal's corners, we give the victory to The Independent on points.

One point that interested us, in particular, concerned the Salyersville-Prestonsburg highway. This is the route that Mr. Watkins on one occasion was quoted as saying would be surfaced before he left office (a quote that he, incidentally, later denied). It is the route that remains unsurfaced while the state is spending above \$40,000 to re-surface a sector of Route 40 between Paintsville and Salyersville—a lily-gliding project on a road that already is one of the best in Eastern Kentucky.

What interests us most was Mr. Watkins' alibi for the state's failure to blacktop the Prestonsburg-Salyersville road. This, as published in The Independent, was to the effect that the roadbed was of too recent construction to be strong enough to sustain or justify surfacing.

All the more interesting does this

statement become when it is recalled that Mr. Watkins approved surfacing of the route to David, which connects with this same Prestonsburg-Salyersville road, although the David roadbed was not more than three years old when surfaced while the main Middle Creek route dates back to WPA days.

If the Middle Creek roadbed isn't strong enough for surfacing, when and how will it become so? Nothing is being done to make it stronger.

Worth Considering

DISCUSSED at the district Bankers' Association meeting here recently was a matter that was not strictly banking but which could mean money in the bank to this and other sections of Kentucky.

The Jefferson county forester explained what is being done within a few miles of the city of Louisville. In brief, his talk dealt with the county forest established in Jefferson county under authority of a recent Kentucky statute.

This law empowers a fiscal court to issue bonds for purchase or establishment otherwise of a county forest preserve. Such bonds are an indebtedness only against the forest holdings themselves and are amortized only through sale of forest products. Bonds for this purpose may be issued without approval of popular vote, inasmuch as they are not a liability against the taxpayers.

Acting under such authority, the forester said, the Jefferson fiscal court established the Jefferson county forest preserve.

That is the story. THE TIMES does not, at this time, say such a move would be the most feasible within the range of the Floyd fiscal court, but it would remind members of the court that the plan is one deserving of study and careful consideration.

Floyd county's area is, theoretically, 68 per cent forest. Actually, at least half of that 68 per cent represents land that should be in forest but which is nothing but denuded hillsides. Erosion is unimpeded, as a rule. Waste of remaining forest resources continues. Whether a reserve or a huge reforestation undertaking is most needed, it is certain something should be done—not years from now, but soon—if ours is not to become a wasteland.

Paintsville, Ky., Sept. 6.—Mrs. Barbara Blanton, 18, Staffordsville, Ky., about four miles west of Paintsville, was found dead on the highway in front of her home at 8 o'clock Friday night by her husband, Quentin Blanton, the victim of what Guy Preston, Johnson county coroner, said was apparently a hit-run driver. The coroner said she received a fractured skull and numerous other bruises.

Funeral services for Mrs. Blanton, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Smita Bevin, will be held Monday at the Preston Funeral Home in Paintsville. In addition to her parents, she is survived by a five-month-old child.

The Sports Round-Up

By J. R. EIBNER, Coach

UNDERSTANDING THE "T" FORMATION

In days of yore, the football tactics employed were exceedingly simple. It was merely to point out the direction the ball carrier was going, then line up and slab it out until the whistle was blown. The roly-poly individual who weighed in the vicinity of 250 pounds and who could hardly move out of his own tracks was called upon to utilize his bulk as a lineman. Any man who had the intestinal fortitude to throw his bulk at that stationary tonnage was called a backfield man.

Several decades later, football developed into the single and double-wing back, initially started by the grand old master of football, Pop Warner, Jack Sutherland, now coach of the Pittsburgh Steelers, developed it into a power system when it was still in its embryonic stage. He used double opponent and moustache blocks. It quickly engulfed the country and remained the foremost system for many years, even though the Notre Dame system with its balanced line proved successful. The Warner system is still widely used, although having been discarded in professional ranks.

Now in the immediate years passed, football has taken a definite turn toward an exceedingly new and different system commonly called the "T" formation. It was primarily used and introduced by Clark Shaughnessy, then coach of Stanford. It was he who introduced the rudiments of the basic "T" which was later fully developed by George Halas of the Chicago Bears and Greasy Neale of the Philadelphia Eagles. The man in motion was quickly installed and so the system was on its way to completely revolutionize football. The question is often asked, "What is the 'T' and what makes it so dangerous?"

Primarily the "T" formation has unshackled the center. It has completely emancipated him. In all other formations, the center must squat down with both hands on the ball, absolutely defenseless and open to receiving any amount of punishment that may be dealt him at the leisure of the defense guard. For this reason the center as a blocker can only be called "half a man," thus only half a blocker. But in the "T" formation, the center does not have to look at the receiver—he can pass the ball blind, keeping his head up to see what is going on and where his blocking assignment is playing. He can cock his left arm

on his knee, ready for a smashing delivery to his opponent's body, while with his right hand he can easily make the short hand-back to the quarterback. But while the "T" frees the center from involuntary servitude to snapping the ball, it makes additional demands of him. He must be doubly careful to make an accurate passback to the quarterback, not becoming too interested in his own personal charge that he dashes off without delivering the ball properly. The center like the tackles and guards must be good actors, looking straight ahead nonchalantly, to avoid a tipoff of their own offensive plays.

The guards and tackles are real artists in the "T," and their job is to apply the "brush" and "screen" to opposing linemen. The single wing and other systems instruct their tackles and guards to completely drive and block their opponents out of the play and for this purpose, a full body block is thrown at the defensive man. Often when he is a key man, he is double teamed by two offensive men. The "T" attack, however, works out a balanced line and most of the blocking is individual. The tackle or guard is assigned to the job of trapping or brushing his man at the exact moment the back reaches the line of scrimmage. The "T" men play for a slight advantage to give themselves an opportunity to knock their opponents momentarily off balance. This is altogether different than trying to drive a huskier opponent off the line of scrimmage. His aim is to get his body between the defending player and the ball carrier or perhaps only to screen his opponent's vision for a split second. To make this opportunity possible, he must be adept at faking and feinting the opposing lineman in the wrong direction, then merely bumping and screening him quickly.

The feinting and faking of the backs designed to draw opposing linemen out of position, is a great help to the brush and screen blocker. For instance, the right half-back may fake past the quarterback, cutting quickly to the right and pulling the defense in that direction while the fullback cuts over the center on a counter play. In the "T" there are three halfbacks and a quarterback—a blocking back usually found in the fullback has finally been done away with. Every man in the "T" backfield is a dangerous man and should be able to go the distance at any time. He should be able to play any position and can. His most important job is to fake, fake, and more fake. In fact there is no other system where there is so close coordination between line and backfield play. The "T" attack demands such precision that all players must count out such plays carefully to be in the proper places at just the split moment called for. Without perfect synchronization between the faking backfield and the feinting lineman, the brush off blocker would most certainly be dusted off as a screen blocker.

The man in motion has been looked upon as a man wasted and decreases the power of the backfield. This is not true for the man in motion is always taking a man out of the defense every time that he goes in motion and he also has a running start on all of his blocking assignments. The quarterback is the "be all" of the "T" formation. He must be an excellent ball handler, a great backstop when it comes to faking, and a good passer. "T" quarterbacks are said to be able to play when still sitting in a wheelchair, for chances of injury are very slight at this position.

The work of the offensive ends on the line pumped new life into the "T" because it helped give the revived formation striking power on the flanks. Ends may be split two yards or twenty, it makes no difference to the offensive but does plenty to the defense. If they spread with the ends, all plays should naturally be run inside of the end, and if they do not spread with the ends, it should prove disastrous on all end run plays.

Working as a unit with all faking and feinting done in a perfect manner, the team should at least 50 per cent of the time fool the spectator as to where the ball is and who is carrying it. This requires hours of practice to a well versed professional ball-carrier and to ask this of a high school ball player in his early years of ball playing is probably asking too much. Some may develop others may not—who knows until we see for ourselves? We hope that we can fool you some time and if we can't it means that weeks and weeks of practice have gone for naught. If we can, that means that we will probably fool one of our opponents this year.

TAXPAYERS

Many of you have not listed your property for taxation. It is your duty to do this before Sept. 1, 1947. Please attend to this duty at once.

Date of assessment of property; when, where and by whom listed; in whose name assessed.

Following is copy of the law governing listing of property for taxation purposes:

(1) All taxable property and all interest in taxable property shall be assessed and valued as of July 1 of each year unless otherwise provided by law. It shall be the duty of all persons owning or having any interest in any personal property having a taxable situs in this state to list or have listed between July 1 and September 1 of each year such property with the county tax commissioner of the county where it is located, except as otherwise provided by law. All persons in whose name property is properly assessed shall remain bound for the tax, notwithstanding they may have sold or parted with it.

(2) Real property or any interest therein shall be listed in the county or district where it is located by the owner of the first freehold estate therein, and it shall be assessed without reference to conflicting title. If the owner fails to list the property, the county tax commissioner may swear witnesses in order to ascertain the person in whose name to make the list.

(3) Real property shall be assessed in the name of the owner, if ascertainable by the tax commissioner, otherwise in the name of the occupant, if ascertainable, and otherwise to "Unknown owner." The undivided real estate of any deceased person may be assessed to the heirs of such person without designating them by name.

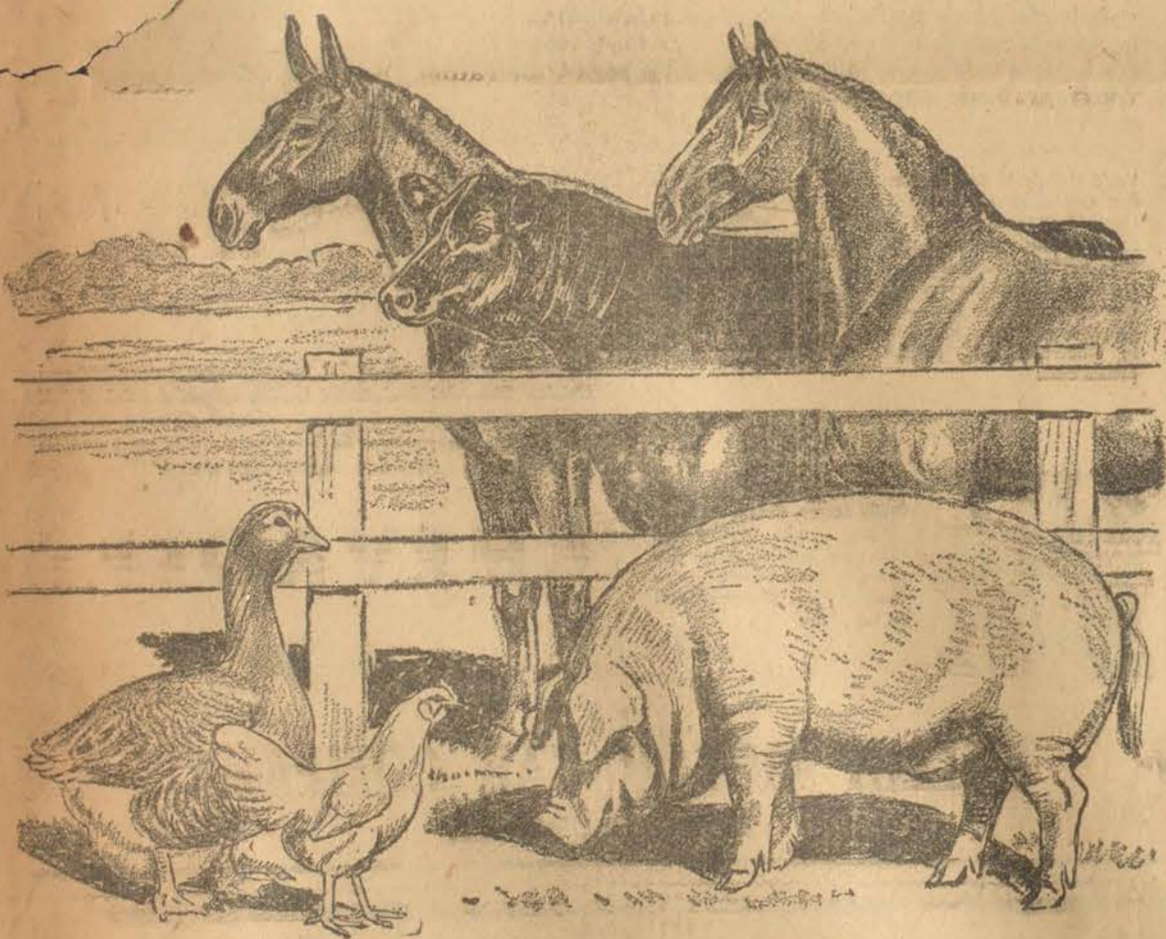

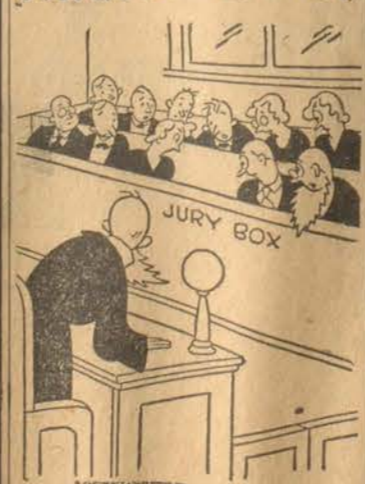

**INFORMATION
OF INTEREST
TO VETERANS**

(No. 5 of a Series)

OUT-PATIENT CARE

Veterans Administration has answered the six questions most frequently asked by veterans about out-patient treatment in a VA hospital clinic or by their own physicians at government expense.

The questions were asked in a survey that VA conducted recently to learn how much veterans know about their federal benefits. The questions and answers follow:

Q. Am I entitled to treatment in an out-patient department?

A. Only if you have a service-connected disability, or if you have a non-service-connected ailment and are on leave from a VA hospital and ordered to report to an out-patient clinic for periodic treatment or examination. Eligibility for out-patient treatment is set by law and, except in rare instances, treatment is limited to those with service-connected ailments.

Q. Under what circumstances may a veteran be admitted to a VA hospital through the out-patient department?

A. Veterans with service-connected disabilities who requested out-patient treatment and who then are found to be in need of hospitalization, often are assigned to hospitals by doctors in the out-patient clinics. Also, veterans who have no service-connected disabilities may apply to out-patient clinics for hospitalization. If physical examinations disclose the need for hospitalization, such care will be arranged for by the staff of the out-patient clinics.

Q. Does VA provide maternity care to veterans or their dependents thru out-patient clinics?

A. No. Only veterans with service-connected ailments are eligible for treatment in out-patient clinics, except under rare circumstances.

Q. What is the waiting list for hospitalization?

A. Veterans with service-connected disabilities must be provided medical care first. Then, if beds are available and if veterans with non-service-connected ailments say they cannot afford to pay for treatment elsewhere, they may be admitted to VA hospitals. Inasmuch as VA almost always has more applications for hospital care from veterans with non-service-connected ailments than it has beds, there is always a group of veterans awaiting their turn for hospitalization.

Q. How long does a veteran have to wait before he is hospitalized?

A. If a veteran has a service-connected disability he does not have to wait to receive hospitalization. If he has a non-service-connected ailment and he is in an emergency case, he is admitted immediately. But if he has a non-service-connected ailment that is not emergent, he must wait until a bed is available. The time he must wait varies. Some hospitals are more crowded than others and thus have longer waiting lists.

Q. May a veteran be treated by his own physician, on the outside, at VA expense?

A. Yes, if he has a service-connected disability and receives prior VA approval for such care.

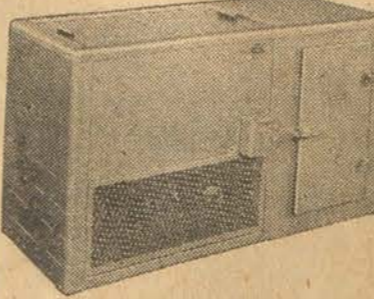
