
U.S. 23 at the upper limits of Prestonsburg, a large section of the Left Beaver highway, and the road from Lackey to Wayland are in miserable condition.

"First consideration must be given the heavily traveled roads with emergency repairs until such time as the weather will permit permanent patching," Commissioner Garrett L. Withers said. "Designs are now being prepared and major work will be let to contract just as soon

as the roads are dry enough to war rant. We will use our own facilities as far as is practicable, but the damage is so wide-spread and extensive that the contract method is being






