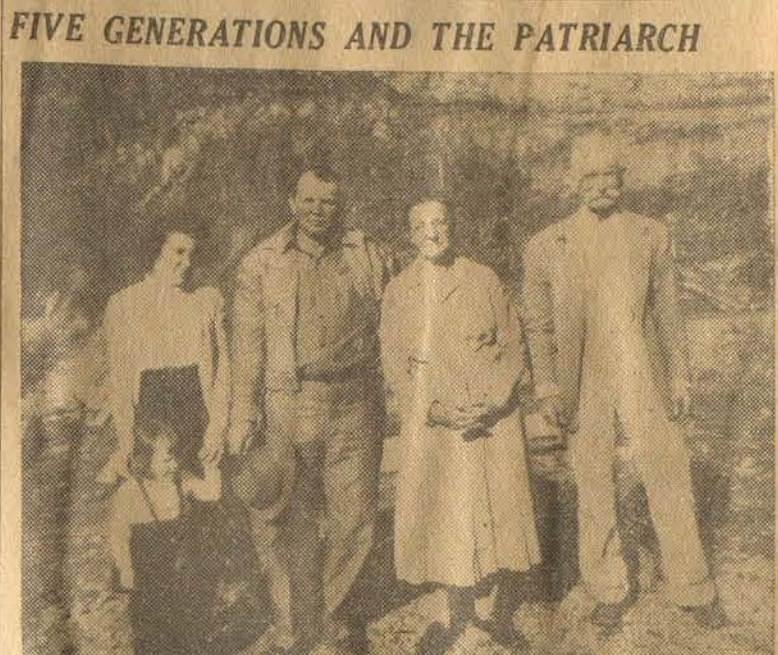

baby-sitting, interferes with the maneuvers of Uncle Sam's air force.

Although only 20 years old, he's an old baby-sitter from "way back." As a lad in Prestonsburg he used to "baby-sit" for neighbors while taking care of a younger brother.

Queried as to how he happened to take up baby-sitting in the army while his buddies pursued other obvious means of off-hour leisure, he replied that he needed the money to supplement his army pay of \$100 per month and, "besides, I like it!" His only competition on the post is two girls and the baby-sitting sergeant's services are preferred over the girls, his "customers" assure him. His regular rate is 25 cents per family call per hour. His rate jumps to 50 cents if he is called on a night when he has a date or when baby-sitting services are at a premium. The busiest nights are Wednesdays and Saturdays—and sometimes Sundays, he added. He has earned as much as \$20 in one month.

The hours are hard, he says, when folks stay out "overtime" on occasions until 4 a.m., leaving scant time to get back to his barracks, grab a few winks and report for early morning roll call. Some of his customers among the non-coms on such occasions "bunk him for the night" and feed him breakfast as a bonus.

On one occasion he handled five tots representing three families which made the night worth \$1.50 per hour. Three of the babies started bawling at once. Even a sergeant has only two arms, so he began walking the floor with one on each arm and left the third sitting in the middle of the floor carrying on as it was. While he pacified the two babes in arms, number three eyeing the floor-pacing of the baffled sergeant began to grin and gurgle encouragement which made the situation all quiet on the baby-sitting front.

On his very first assignment he had to face the diaper-changing problem and, he confided, "I was awfully awkward and certainly did a poor job." He's used to it now and doesn't mind it at all.

Girls?—yes, he likes girls, all right. But girls for a steady pastime—definitely, no! Not yet, anyway. For the present he has other ideas. Furthermore, he avows, girls are more trouble and expense and, most of the time, less interesting than babies.

He is saving his money from baby-sittings and army pay so that when he gets out of the army in May, 1949 he may enter college. If it becomes necessary, he plans working his way through college, baby-sitting. This likeable youngster, who enjoys a marked measure of popularity among the folks at home and with his buddies in the army, says, "I just like to get along with kids and the little fellers like to get along with me." He does just that so well that mothers, marveling at his knack, have asked his advice on their "getting along" problems with their offspring.

He hopes to leave college as a lawyer, to follow a life work of helping people to get along "or helping grown-up babies" who can't get along with each other to settle their problems according to law.

2 Burned, House Destroyed In Powder Keg Explosion

3. Allocation of sites to private clubs and individuals is a matter for the future, depending upon what accommodations are made by commercial interests. The federal government will not appear as a competitor in the area to persons who would establish commercial fishing and camping facilities and the like.

4. The Corps of Engineers hopes—and State Division of Game & Fish officials join them in the hope—that a refuge for both small and large game, including deer, beaver and wild turkey, will be established in the area.

5. The Corps of Engineers solicits applications for commercial leases and for camp sites to be used by organized groups, such as churches and the like. But, it was emphasized, applications by private individuals should not be submitted at this time. The public will be notified when and if private camp sites are available.

Mr. Myers explained that the government will be glad to turn over to the state the administration of regulations governing the lake. Some action should be taken, it was admitted, to control activities on the reservoir, and it was pointed out the state can do it more easily than the federal government, since its courts and officers are in the immediate vicinity.

Speaking of fish propagation and fishing prospects in the reservoir, Mr. Clarke pointed to the rapid increase of fish in such waters, adding that at the end of the first year the lake will have more fish in the matter of pounds per surface acre than at any future time in its history. Bass and goggle eye are native to Johns Creek, with only a few pike. Black crappie will be added. One pair of bream, he pointed out, will spawn five times a year, adding approximately 75,000 fry to the lake per annum, and a pair of bass will add a spawn of around 15,000 a year.

Mr. Myers commended Kentucky on a youth program which places it in that respect at the head of all the states in the Ohio river division. "Kentucky," he said, "starts with youth—at the grassroots, with a new generation, and we will give these youngsters first rights."

Mr. Bunce said that Ohio on small lakes such as the Dewey reservoir has established regulations restricting the size of motors used to six horsepower. He pointed out that, above the Brandy Keg bridge on to the head of conservation pool slacks-water at German the lake will be no more than 400 to 600 feet wide. Of recreation facilities along the lake he pointed out:

Somewhere near the dam at Dewey picnic tables, ovens, shelters, etc., will be placed for the convenience of the public; tent campsites are planned; live bait, boats, motors and other facilities for fishermen are planned by the time water is impounded to sufficient depth for the sport.

"The next step," he said, "is to determine what lands to allocate for all the various purposes."

A year ago, he said, the U.S. and state park services were called in for studies of the area. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will soon make a detailed study of the region. A study of malaria dangers in the area by the U.S. Public Health Service found such danger non-existent. The University of Kentucky is making a historical and archeological survey to prevent the loss of anything of value in either field through the inundation of the Johns Creek valley.

Mr. Currie told the sportsmen that the Division of Game and Fish is working to find refuges in the valley for both large and small game. "If we can persuade the Pittman-Robinson people that we need some money," he added, "perhaps we can have some deer, turkey and beaver in addition to small birds and animals."

Several thousands of acres would be required if any part of the area were to be stocked with deer.

Meanwhile, the proposal appeared wide open.

Of the 10 members of the two boards who take office next month only two would express tentative opinions, The Lexington Leader said after a survey of board members.

R. D. Short, incumbent on the County Board, said, "From studies to date it looks like the merger has great possibilities."

Another County Board incumbent, Melbourne Mills, said he would "like to see it on a good, equal footing, taking all phases of it into consideration."
