

THE city of Pikeville last week published a com-

prehensive audit which included some figures of interest to Prestonsburg and its residents.

The interesting part of this audit to Prestonsburg is the total amount of taxes collected from property-owners in Pikeville last year—as compared with tax collections here for the year.

Pikeville collected \$31. 750 in taxes from its residents last year. Prestons-burg, we are told, collected around \$10,000.

Pikeville is larger than Prestonsburg, but not three times as large. Pikeville is more fully developed, industrially, than Prestonsburg, but not by a ratio of three to one.

And, as for property values, any would-be buyer will will tell you that Prestonsburg property is priced as if it were underlaid with plat-

This admitted, it follows that either the people of Pikeville are burdened with exorbitant taxes or those of Prestonsburg are not paying enough taxes.



"In the opinion of the vast maority, the state control system is so uperior in efficiency and so economical in cost, as compared with the county system, that of those questioned, almost everyone was content that state control in West Virginia

"Virginia's overall state road income for 1947 amounted to \$51,-662,000 with \$17,971,000 of state (rural) highway purposes. From the time of the establishment of the system to date, a total of \$105,000,000 or an average of \$7,500,000 a year has been expended on secondary (rural) highways. Mileage of black-top rual roads has increased from 2,065 in 1932 to more than 8,000 miles in 1946; mileage of lightly surfaced rural roads from 9,000 in 1932 to 24,000 in 1946.

"Only 19 of the 100 counties in North Carolina had passable county roads when the state became responsible for the upkeep of all rural roads in 1931. Today, 4,500 miles have been paved and 25,000 miles of sand-clay roads have been maintained by grading.

"The state collects about \$54,-500,000 yearly for all road purposes. Out of this sum \$23,000,000, or almost half, is spen+ on rural roads. The rural appropriation is divided \$12,000,000 for maintenance and \$11,000,000 for improving additional

"North Carolina has 30 highway districts with 30 well-trained engineers in charge. Each of the 100 counties has a competent road supervisor. West Virginia has 10 districts, each with five counties. Resident enginers are in charge of the districts with district engineers in charge, and 57 sub-districts, each with a resident engineer."


