Senator Hays told THE TIMES the bill also will include stringent penalties for bootlegging and the manufacture of moonshine whiskey The state liquor store system he proposes would have no effect on dry counties, such as Floyd he added.

"I believe the state should sell both by the drink and by the package, but not in the same places," he said, "and should include beer and wine in the state liquor monopoly The employes dispensing beverages should be under bond. It would be blow to bootleggers."

"Kentucky needs more funds," he leclared. He pointed to budget requirements for the coming biennium totalling around \$170 million, which Governor Earle C.
