Truman Directs Registration For Draft To Begin Aug. 30

President Truman issued a proclamation Tuesday calling for the draft registration to start Aug. 30.

The proclamation also fixes the following dates for the registration of other youths between the ages of 18 and 26:

- 1. Persons born in the year 1923: Aug. 31, and Sept. 1.
2. Persons born in 1924: Sept. 2 and Sept. 3.
3. Persons born in the year 1925: Sept. 4 or Sept. 7.
4. Persons born in the year 1926: Sept. 8-9.
5. Persons born in the year 1927: Sept. 10-11.
6. Persons born in the year 1928: Sept. 13-14.
7. Persons born in the year 1929: Sept. 15-18.

8. Persons born in 1930 before Sept. 19: Sept. 17-18.

Boys born on or after Sept. 19, 1930, under the proclamation, will be registered on the day they are 18 years old or within five days thereafter.

The President's proclamation called on the governors of each of the states, and the territories of Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands...

There was nothing in the proclamation to indicate when actual induction into the armed services will begin.

Selective Service officials may make their first grab at 25-year-olds who otherwise would be ineligible after one more birthday.

Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, Selective Service director during World War II, made that known Monday as he was sworn in as head of the new draft setup.

The draft law passed by Congress last month requires men 18 through 25 to register, although none can be drafted until after reaching 19.

There has been quite a little discussion of starting with the older ones first, he said.

Eighteen-year-olds can avoid the draft by enlisting for one year and then serving a longer period in the reserves.

The library building on Third avenue will be open next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday during the local book drive, and persons who wish to contribute books are asked to bring them to the building during this time...

Date of the library opening has not been set, but will be within a few weeks, it was said. The extension division Kentucky Library Service, will send a representative here to train the librarian and also is expected to supply the library with 1,000 volumes.

Although local and county governmental groups have promised financial aid to the library, the only funds accrued to date are those contributed by the old City Council amounting to approximately \$550...

The Prestonburg City Council, the Floyd fiscal court and the county and city school boards have been asked, and are expected to, aid the library movement.

The Stone building, on Third avenue, has been leased as a library and shelving was completed, several weeks ago.

Miss Harris emphasized the position taken by those interested in a county library that only the failure of persons from other parts of the county to attend the meeting here last week resulted in only Prestonburg residents being named to key positions in the organization.

HINDMAN MAN GUN VICTIM

Wallace Amburgy Dies In Louisville Hospital; Is Wounded at Hazard

Wallace Amburgy, 23 years old, of Hindman, died in a Louisville hospital Tuesday night, and County Judge Taylor Witt said Buster Fugate, 35, had been charged with murder in connection with Amburgy's death.

The victim was a son of Mark Amburgy and a grandson of Judge Robert Amburgy. He was unmarried, it was said here.

Amburgy died at Nicholas Veterans hospital. An autopsy was performed, but a hospital spokesman said results of the examination could not be revealed without consent of the man's family.

Judge Witt said Amburgy's death resulted from a shooting affray last Thursday night at a night club near Hazard. After the shooting, Fugate was charged with assault with intent to kill and was released on bond Saturday.

MALONE SAYS LOCK-AND-DAM HEARING SURE

Col. Pockras Declares Valley Coal Deposits Minimized by Railways

Proponents of Big Sandy river canalization heard U. S. Senator George W. Malone (R. Nev.) promise Monday at a luncheon in Paintsville that "you'll get your hearing."

Senator Malone, Congressman W. Howes Meade, Col. A. M. Neilson and Col. Harry Pockras, of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, were accompanied to Paintsville and on through the tour of the valley by Ashland city officials and business men.

Senator Malone is chairman of the Rivers and Harbors sub-committee. "The project will be brought before the 81st Congress," he flatly promised.

The motorcade up the valley was under sponsorship of the Big Sandy Valley Association. The Paintsville Chamber of Commerce was host at Monday's luncheon.

Dr. O. W. Thompson, Pikeville, president of the Big Sandy Valley Association, presided at the luncheon. Following the presentation of city and county officials of the valley, John Fred Williams, of the Ashland Oil & Refining Company, and former State Superintendent of Public Instruction, welcomed the motorcade and touched on the traditions and history of a "proud Big Sandy valley."

Colonel Pockras stated that the canalization of the river had been justified economically by extensive surveys and investigations by U.S. engineers. "We have leaned over backwards in making recommendations to Congress on the project," he said.

Complimenting the U.S. engineers, Senator Cooper said, "They have never spent more money on a project or asked for more than was

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WOUNDED MAN THREATENED?

Visitor at Night In Hospital Here Causes Excitement

Fear of an attempt on the life of Cpl. Homer Howard, of the Kentucky state police, as he lay wounded in the Prestonburg General hospital threw hospital nurses into a furor of excitement Tuesday night.

The threat was seen with the appearance at the hospital, shortly after nightfall, of an unidentified man and Liza Baker, Floyd woman who was in the automobile of Harry Conley when Conley and his sister, Mrs. Susan Conley Page, were killed in a gun battle July 5 with state policemen.

Deputy Sheriff Epp Laferty was called to the hospital around 9 o'clock but when he arrived neither the Baker woman nor the male stranger was there. A window screen had been torn out in a rear room near that occupied by the wounded officer.

Mrs. Howard, who was keeping vigil by her husband's bedside, told Deputy Sheriff Laferty that Miss Baker had asked to be permitted to enter the room, explaining that she was in the car at the time of the shooting. Miss Baker, it was said later, went to the hospital, however, to visit James Campbell who had been injured in a car wreck Tuesday afternoon.

Campbell told officers that the strange man was his brother-in-law. He also claimed nobody had left the window through the screen.

State policemen quickly arrived at the hospital and remained throughout the night. Howard, though temporarily affected by the excitement, is believed recovering from a bullet wound through his liver. He was shot by Harry Conley during the gunfight at the mouth of Jenny's Creek, Johnson county.

A warrant charging him with the shooting and wounding of Forrest Conley and the slaying of Conley's sister, Mrs. Page, was executed last week by Deputy Sheriff Harold Conn on Patrolman B. J. Music, who was with Cpl. Howard at the time of the shooting. The officer executed \$5,000 bond.

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MOTHER LOSES COURT FIGHT

For Child's Custody In 3-Day Hearing In County Court

A woman who "gave away" her 14-months-old daughter eight years ago when she was friendless and penniless returned to this county last week to fight a losing court battle with a Floyd county miner and his wife, the only father and mother the child ever knew, for custody of the youngster.

The woman and her husband, Dorothy Fields Belderes and Michael Belderes, stated they are now worth at least \$50,000. Mrs. Belderes, a former resident of Floyd and Martin counties, claimed she had twice earlier sought whereabouts of her daughter but had not succeeded in locating her till recently.

Jesse and Margaret Jones, of Wheelwright, who took Mrs. Belderes' daughter, Alma Sue Fields, and reared the child, testified during the three-day hearing that the mother brought the baby to their home, at that time at Garrett, and assured them she would never give them any trouble, that the child would be theirs. Their story recounted childhood illnesses, watchful hours at the tot's sick bed, long and loving care they had given Alma Sue.

H. R. Burke, counsel for the Jones couple, produced witnesses assailing the mother's character. It was testified that Mrs. Belderes, then Miss Dorothy Fields, left this county with a street carnival, toured a part of the country with it and there met her future husband.

Asked whom she wanted to be with, Alma Sue cried, "Mamma!" and ran to Mrs. Jones. She shunned her mother as a stranger.

Evidence at the hearing stated the Jones couple, childless, was given another baby, Joyce Potter, a few months after Alma Sue was brought home.

Railway, Gas Companies Pay Two-thirds Floyd-co. Taxes

The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company and the gas companies pay two-thirds of local taxes while the coal companies and citizens pay the remainder in this county, it was pointed out last week as Kentucky railroads, truck lines and utilities protested to the Department of Revenue against paying taxes on 80 per cent of value while other property is assessed at half value.

On this situation Allan M. Trout reported in The Courier-Journal. Commissioner H. Clyde Reeves asked these firms to allow him one more year to bring the lower assessment nearer to parity with the higher. His request was granted.

At stake is the huge sum of \$25,000,000 a year in state and local revenue. The question is: Shall the companies valued at 80 per cent continue to pay that sum, or shall they be assessed at 50 per cent and pay only \$15,625,000 to the state, counties and local school districts?

Because these companies are worth more than the tangible property they own, they are known as franchise companies. Other franchise companies assessed in Kentucky at 80 per cent of value are barge lines, water utilities, telephone and telegraph systems, air transport, and gas lines.

The Department of Revenue assesses franchise companies, but other property is assessed by

Pfc. Tackett was wounded June 23, 1944 while serving with an infantry division in France, and died three days later. He was a son of Clarence and Anna Brown Tackett, of Little Paint. Surviving, besides his parents, are four brothers, Edward, of Jenny's Creek, Sam, of Abbott Creek, Henry and Parrish, both of Little Paint, and four sisters, Evelyn Marie, Molly, Clara and Malta, all at home. His funeral was conducted from the parents' residence Wednesday afternoon, the Rev. Moses Kitchen officiating, and burial was made in the family cemetery under direction of the Carter & Callahan Funeral Home.

Funeral of Pfc. Ousley was conducted Thursday morning from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Ousley, of Risner. He was killed in the battle for France, four years ago. Besides his parents, he leaves his widow, Mrs. Virginia Adkins Ousley, and several brothers and sisters. Burial in the family cemetery was under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

Body of T/4 King arrived in Martin today (Thursday) and will be taken by the Ryan Funeral Home to Jackson, Ky., where his mother now resides. His father, a resident of this county, was reported as critically ill.

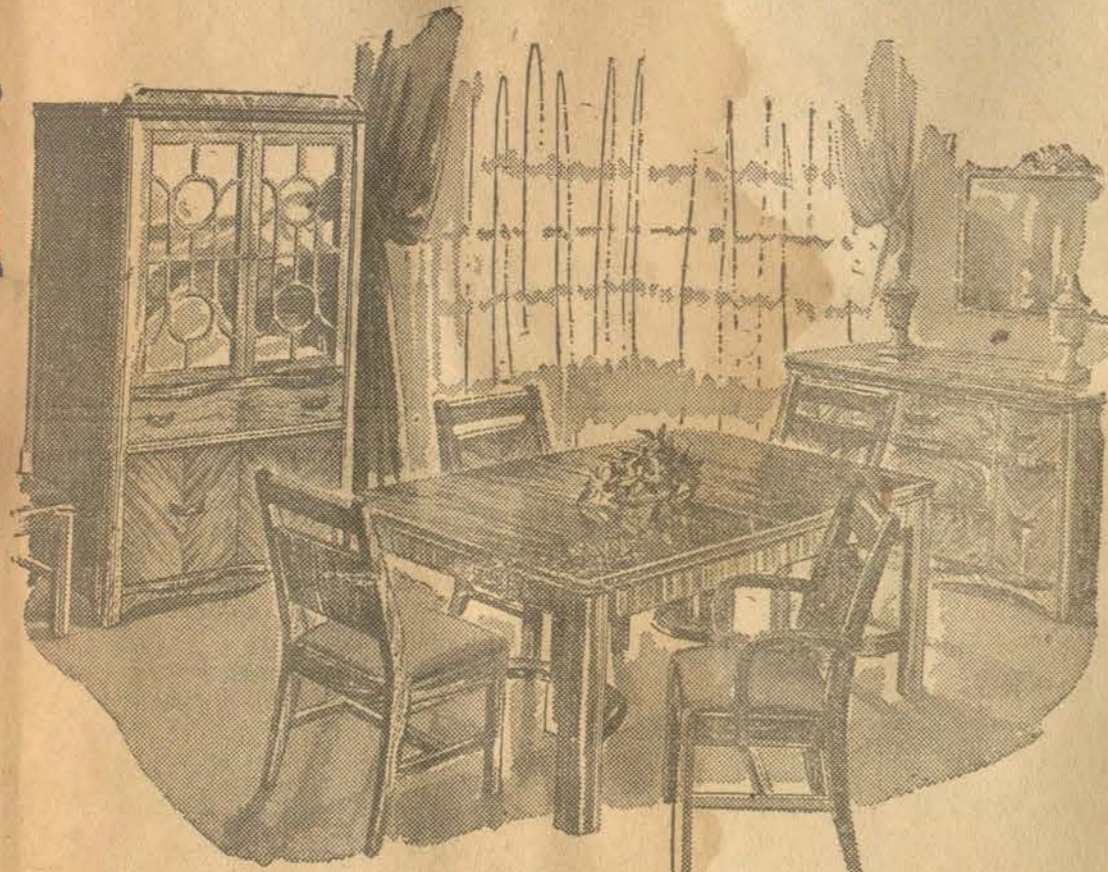

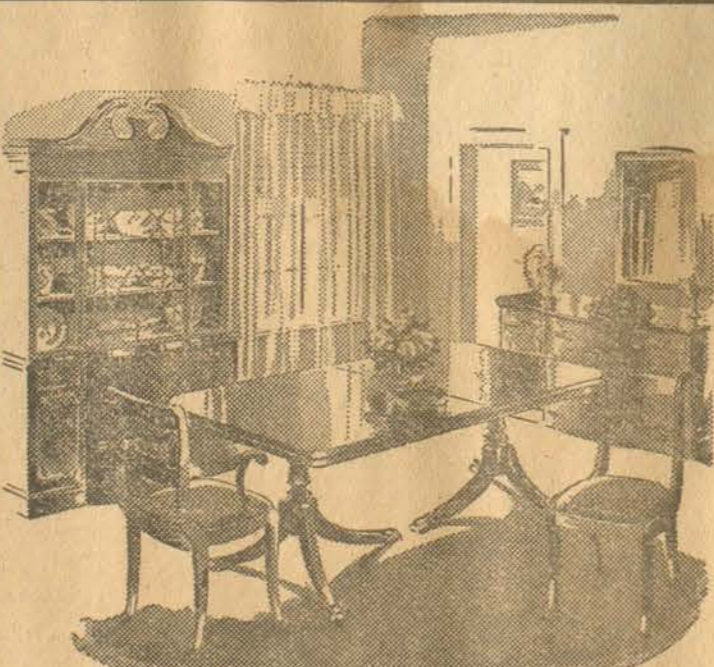

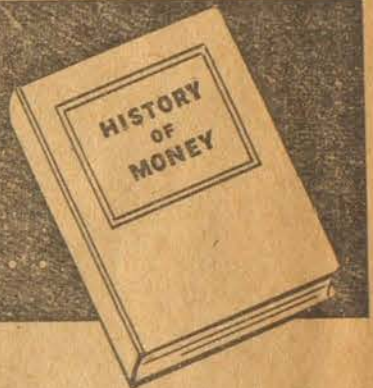

needed. I have been convinced time and again of the abilities of our engineers."

"Progress hurts no one—not even those who at first feel it will hurt their interests," Cooper declared. "I firmly believe you will get the best (referring to Congress action)—you deserve the best," he told the backers of the project.

He pointed out the wise move of the Big Sandy Valley Association and Congressman Meade in having Senator Malone to inspect the river for possible canalization. "George Malone is the only successful engineer in the Senate; he understands the need for strategic materials; he has the technical knowledge, and is particularly in an advantageous position as chairman of the Senate Rivers and Harbors Subcommittee to help you."

Former Congressman A. J. May, of Prestonsburg, was praised by Cooper for having championed the cause of the river canalization when he was in Congress. He also hailed Congressman Meade as one who has been working hard on the project.

"We are living in a rather fictitious prosperity at the present time. But the coal business is becoming more competitive, and Kentucky must be prepared to enter the competition on an improved basis," Cooper stated.

Senator Malone followed Cooper in speaking to the meeting. He told of conferring with the advocates of the Big Sandy canal in Washington and promised to come to Kentucky to inspect. "My committee cannot possibly approve every project put before us. We do the best we can, and hear them in order of their importance."

Before returning to Washington for the special session of Congress, Malone will inspect other projects in Arkansas and Texas.

He said that many things are being done in Washington now which will affect the Big Sandy region economically. He referred to the National Resources Economic Committee of the Senate, of which he is chairman, and said that research is being done to find synthetic uses of coal and other minerals. "When it is all worked out, we will be needing industries in this region, as well as others. The United States has all the resources to our own people (referring to foreign gifts and loans)."

In pointing out the importance of developments for better and more transportation facilities, he declared, "I have never seen a development yet, no matter what, that doesn't help a community as a whole, the railroads, power companies, and what have you. More business than ever before results."

Time was when boys were given a tanning for reading Nick Carter. I myself have stayed up late, nights, to keep a clandestine appointment with thrillers about Jesse James and brother Frank, the Younger brothers, etcetera. Many times I have shivered in my copper-toed boots in fear that daring Jesse was going to get his come-uppance. We boys assumed hard-ridin' straight-shootin' roles, at play.

But not one of us ever got the idea we should hold up a bank, rifle an express car or ride as guerrillas. And we were certainly no brighter than the usual group of boys today.

I also recall the Loeb and Leopold case of a decade or so ago, before comic books were in circulation.

I am all for getting the youngsters to read good juvenile literature. The day mine forego these "funny books" for a more intellectual fare of reading matter, I'll be very happy.

But I do not believe the way to get girls and boys away from this trash is to start out on crusades, with bonfires clearing the scene of such putrid reading matter. If we start that, we shall have to carry it on to clean out all these cops-and-robbers films, a lot of these sensational radio programs—and, too, we adult readers will have to clean our library shelves of a lot of downright dirt beside which we'd prefer that the boys and girls just stick to Dick Tracy, Cueball and all the rest of that motley crew.

I myself might have to forego Porky Pig, on the theory that reading about him m-might m-make me s-stut-stutter.

\$100, and, in most cases, the school rate of \$150. There also is applied whatever rate prevails in cities where franchise property is located.

These franchise values are the backbone of local revenue in many counties and school districts. Not counting revenue paid to cities, the franchise companies pay around \$20,000,000 a year to counties and school districts. In Caldwell county, for example, the LC pays one-half as much as all other taxpayers combined.

The state rate of 50 cents yields some \$5,000,000 on the franchise assessments.

The conferees told Reeves they are more interested in reaching a fair standing with other taxpayers than in a reduction of the 80 per cent value they pay on.

A company attorney said: "We had rather the others were pulled to 80 per cent than for us to be reduced to 50 per cent. That is simply because we don't believe the state could operate at the lower figure."

Reeves told the group he is trying to correct the inequality by forcing improvement in local assessments. He asked for one year of grace.

The request was granted, upon his promise to correct the situation in one year. And then, in essence, came this ultimatum: If the situation is not corrected by next year, we will consider ourselves in position to insist upon the relief we think we are entitled to this year.

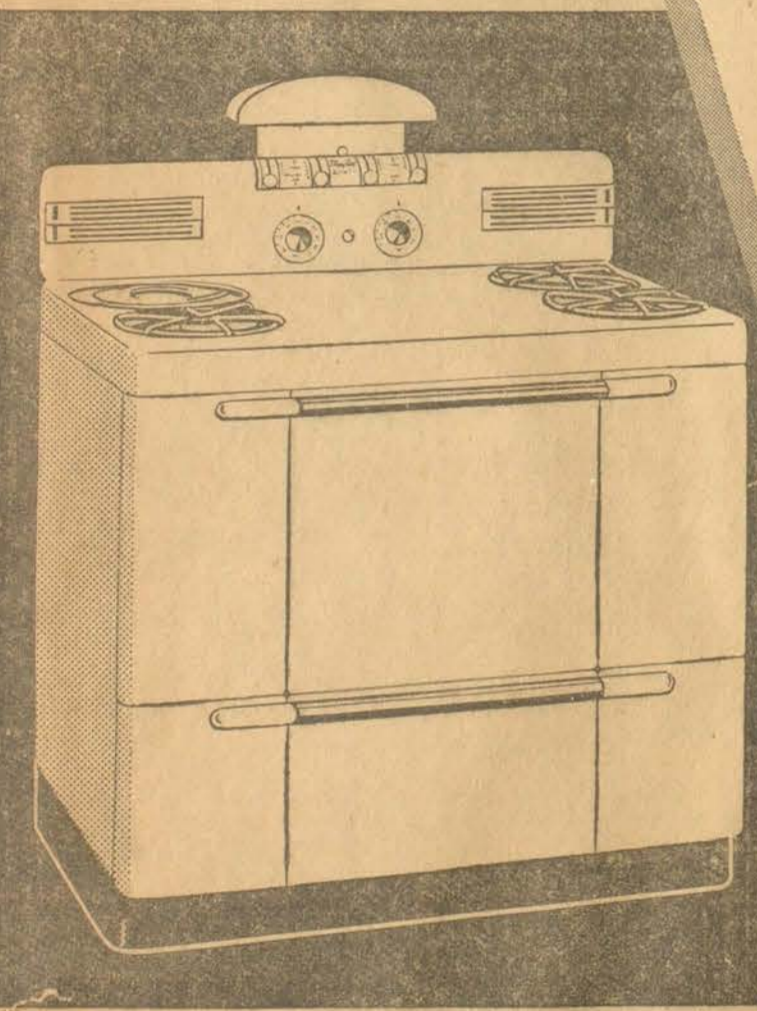

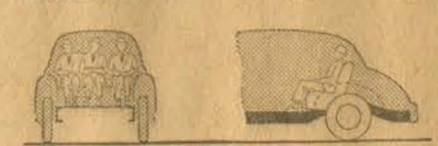



Thursday, in an opening round game, 8-0, and Louisa eliminated Weeksbury, 8 to 4.

Adkins, Wayland pitcher, who played the outfield for Prestonsburg in the first two games, and who twirled the championship tilt, was the outstanding player for the winners and was the No. 1 selection for the all-tournament team. The entire Prestonsburg team played aggressive, heads-up ball.

Patton and Bradley hurled the shutout against Paintsville, with A. Blackburn catching. Bradley pitched the win over Louisa, with Wells receiving. In the final game Adkins went all the way, with Wells again behind the plate.

Prestonsburg was slated to meet Glendale in the state tournament at Elkhorn City Wednesday afternoon, but it was reported Tuesday that Glendale may not arrive in time for the contest. In this event, Prestonsburg may not play till tonight (Thursday).

Winner of the state tournament will probably play the Tennessee titlists for the right to represent this region in the national tourney at Wichita Falls, Kansas.

## While Game Club Makes Record Its Brood Quail Hen Lays One

While systematically going about the business of setting marks for other similar groups of the section to shoot at, the Floyd County Fish & Game Club has come into possession of a hen quail which is setting a record of her own.

Ken Vanderpool, of Midas, who handles some of the club's brood quail, is authority for the statement that this particular Bobbiewhite has quail has already laid 91 eggs this year since beginning of the laying season around April.

Anyway, the club has been experimenting, with marked success, in keeping its own quail brood and incubating the eggs. Twenty-five pairs of quail owned by the club are averaging 17 eggs a day. The club has two incubators of 125-egg capacity each which turn out a hatching every two weeks. At the present rate the eggs are being set, the club figures to set approximately 500 more eggs during the current season, which will end around the last of August.

The club is otherwise adding to the quail supply by rearing birds from the day-old stage. Of 600 birds received July 1, 200 went to the colony brooder constructed by the club and kept at Langley by Bernard Baldrige, county conservation officer. Only 12 of these had died as of this week. The other 400 went to Ken Vanderpool at Midas, and only 16 of these have died. The Division of Game and Fish figures to lose 20 per cent of young quail on the first day after hatching.

Of the eggs laid by quail kept by the club, 81 eggs comprised the second setting, and of 77 quail hatched not one died. The first setting was of eggs, some of which were as old as 20 days, but 36 of the birds are living.

In the stream division of its activities, the club spent \$450 for 3,300 smallmouth bass which were released June 30, in the Big Sandy from a mile south of Prestonsburg to Banner. An allotment of bass from the Division of Game and Fish, as well as crappie, is expected later in the year. The crappie, it has been decided, are destined for Beaver Creek. These waters were decided upon for crappie upon proof that this species is doing well there, with several nice catches reported. A month ago, between 7,000 and 8,000 sun fish from the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company's cooling ponds at Dwale were released in Floyd streams before acid was added to the water to kill weed growth.

The club's sixth annual fish fry will be held August 8 on the Mayo farm, one mile south of Prestonsburg. For this event the club has planned a program which it expects to be better than any of the previous five.

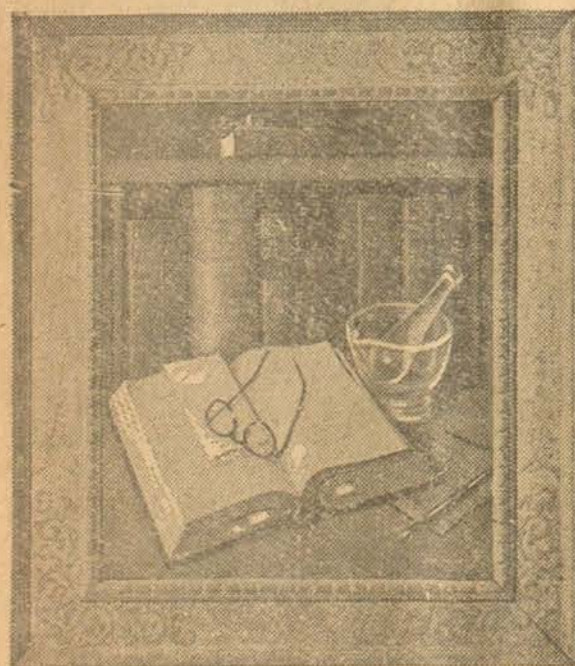




