RENEW OPTION ON LOCATION

For Big Coal Plant At Cliff After Delay Forced by Shortages

Option on the Highland Coal & Land Company land at Cliff for location of a coal preparation plant has been renewed, to extend to September, it was announced this week as a delay in shipment of materials has caused beginning of work on the project to be delayed.

Coal crushers, however, are available immediately, and work on the million-dollar plant is expected to be started this summer. Items causing the delay in construction are conveyors and vibrating screens, it was said.

The plant, originally planned for completion in 1950, will clean and process 5,000 tons of coal a day when in full operation. The tract leased by a group headed by B. F. Reed, of Drift, contains 106 acres near the railway station at Cliff.

FAMILY TIFF CAUSES RAID

Booze Valued at \$2,000 Taken from Martin Home, Premises Here Thursday

A family quarrel resulted today noon in deputy sheriffs confiscating at a Prestonsburg home an estimated \$2,000 worth of whiskey and beer.

The haul was made at the home and surrounding premises of Fred Martin, former Wayland liquor store owner, after Mrs. Martin had sworn out a search warrant. It consisted of 38 cases of whiskey and one case of beer.

Mrs. Martin also swore out a peace warrant this morning for her husband, and he executed \$500 bond. She stated that he had beaten her.

Martin, who recently completed one of the town's most modern homes and who now is building a motel in the same Mayo Trail vicinity, told Magistrate Burchett he and his wife had had a dispute and that she left home, taking with her \$7,000. Her return led to incidents which developed in the raid.

Deputy Sheriffs Epp Laferty, Leva Rice, Troy Shepherd and Crum on their first visit to the home found only one case, this containing Old Taylor. A second trip netted from a building in the rear of the home the other 38 cases.

LEWIS LASHES MINE OWNERS AT MEETING

Union and Operators Believed Far Apart In Contract Talks

With John L. Lewis, United Mine Workers chieftain, opening the soft coal talks Monday with a scathing denunciation of coal operators and the coal industry as "magnificently opulent" and "the most corrupt of our native fat cats," and with the operators and Lewis apparently as far apart in their views as ever, odds were being offered freely this week that midnight June 30 will see a cessation of work in the bituminous mines of the nation.

Lewis made no specific demands, but he reminded the operators the union insists on payment of nearly \$20,000,000 of welfare benefits to distressed miners "as a condition precedent to a contract."

With these words the labor leader, it was held, posed the threat of a strike; "We assume you would deplore any impairment of your abnormal income after June 30."

Operators next day accepted Lewis' challenge to make a contract offer in an effort to avoid another strike after July 1.

BRUCE HOPSON CRASH VICTIM

Woman Driver, Named In Tragedy, Says She Did Not See 'Cyclist'

Robert Bruce Hopson, 23 years old, of Prestonsburg, died at 8:45 Tuesday evening at the Prestonsburg General Hospital, approximately three hours after he had sustained a skull fracture in a collision of his motorcycle and an automobile at Lancer.

Mrs. Bernice Pauline Biggers, wife of Hubert Biggers, an employe of the William Construction Company in the relocation of a gas line in the Johns Creek section, was placed under \$5,000 bond Wednesday afternoon as driver of the automobile. She was named on a voluntary manslaughter charge.

Deputy Sheriff Harold Conn, who investigated the tragedy, said he was told Mrs. Biggers pulled from her lane, driving upriver, to the left lane of the highway to drive up Brandy Keg, in the vicinity of which her husband was working. Hopson, approaching from the opposite direction, reportedly at rapid speed, was unable to check his motorcycle in time to avoid a collision.

The motorcycle struck the front portion of the auto on its right side, catapulting Hopson against the windshield and on into the branches of a tree near the C. F. Conn store. He fell onto pavement, approximately 20 feet from where his twisted motorcycle lay against the car.

The auto was badly damaged, but its occupants were unharmed.

Mrs. Biggers and Miss Emma Lou Taylor, who was a passenger in the car, said they did not see Hopson's approach when the car was cut across the highway.

The victim, a bulldozer operator for Henry Porter, of Allen, was a

LABOR GROUP IN MAJORITY

As Floyd Democrats Gather To Prepare For State Meeting

Eighty-five per cent of the delegates attending the county Democratic convention called here last Saturday for the purpose of naming delegates to the state convention in Louisville were mineworkers, and approximately that percentage of the delegates to the state meet were of the miners' ranks.

The Floyd delegation left here with resolutions condemning the Taft-Hartley act and the Republican party as its creator. A move by miners to include in the resolutions opposition to the candidacy of Virgil Chapman for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senator was withdrawn. President Truman was given Floyd Democrats' endorsement in the resolutions.

In Louisville Tuesday, Walter Scott Harkins, Prestonsburg attorney, and W.G. Biggers, Prestonsburg, were named with Dr. K. N. Salyer, Hazard, and Dr. J. E. Johnson, Pike county, as delegates to the national Democratic convention in Philadelphia, July 19.

Robert Humphrey was elected chairman of the state executive committee to succeed J. Lyter Donaldson. Members of the executive committee from the Seventh district are: J. A. Runyon, Pikeville, Charlie Cornett, Hazard, Mrs. Della Bates, Jenkins, Mrs. Kash Holbrook, Salsberyville.

The county caucus was called by County Judge Alex L. Davidson, party chairman, and State Senator Doug Hays presided as temporary chairman. Alex H. Spradlin was elected temporary secretary of the meeting.

Prestonsburg Cats in Finals Of State Baseball Tourney

Prestonsburg high school's Black Cat baseball team, for the fourth consecutive year in the state tournament at Louisville this week as regional champions, found themselves today for the first time battling for the state championship.

They reached the finals, which will be played tonight at 8, by defeating Central City, 10 to 7, this morning in the semi-finals. A game this afternoon between Newport and Manual of Louisville will determine their opposition in the championship set-to.

The Cats squeezed past Ft. Knox, an old tournament foe, in the first round Wednesday afternoon by coming from behind, scoring two runs in the seventh and last inning of the regulation game, then putting the foe to rout in the extra frame with a four-run outburst.

In that game "Blue" Childers started but gave way to Harmon

after Ft. Knox had scored six times in the first inning. Howard Burchett finished up, doing a strong job of relief pitching and in the final inning contributing the payoff blow, a triple, driving in Garber and Childers and scoring himself on Porter's infield roller. Bill Goble took batting honors for the day with five for five. In all, Prestonsburg had 14 hits, while Ft. Knox was held to six.

Today in the semi-finals, Harmon started and was succeeded by Bill Goble. When Central City scored five of its six runs in the fifth, Burchett again went to the mound, Prestonsburg never was behind in this game, scoring five times in the opening frame, one in the second, two in the third and one in the seventh. Central City scored a run in each the third and seventh in addition to their fifth inning threat. Prestonsburg had 11 hits to Central City's five.

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Demand for Cabin Sites on Lake May Precipitate Small Land Rush

A miniature "land rush" is a possibility as sportsmen and other residents of this section have begun filing applications for cabin sites along the shores of the Dewey reservoir.

And, as recreational possibilities of the area are being studied by the recreation division, U.S. District Corps of Engineers, and being urged by citizens of this section, such applications are being welcomed, the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club was told recently.

Several residents of Prestonsburg and vicinity have already filed for cabin locations, as has the Young Men's Christian Association, Huntington, W. Va. The district Girl Scout organization, it was said, has applied for lease on a 200-acre tract in the reservoir area, and a similar tract is expected to be sought by Lonesome Pine Council for Boy Scouts of the region.

A petition, accompanied by supporting resolutions from the Floyd County Fish & Game Club, the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club and other civic and sportsmen groups of

2. There are 513,000 people living in these Kentucky counties alone. There are approximately 800,000 people living in the sum total of these counties. 'CONFESSION' NAMES TWO

In Glo Arson Case; Boy Says Brother, Craft Are Guilty

A second "confession" by 15-year-old Oliver Smith last week brought into the investigation of the fire which on May 21 destroyed the Glogora Coal Company building and contents at Glo at a loss of approximately \$80,000 the name of a third resident of the Glo vicinity.

After questioning by Sheriff Troy B. Sturgill and G. L. Gray, special C. & O. agent, young Smith signed a statement implicating Ellis Craft as well as Smith's older brother, James Smith. Smith denied that he had any part in either the robbery of the store and postoffice or in the burning of the structure.

James Smith and Craft returned from the scene of the blaze, the statement said, showed Oliver watches and other items they had taken from the company store and told him of setting fire to the building. "Well fix John Hampton for accusing people," he was quoted as saying.

Mr. Hampton's automobile had been smashed, 24 hours before the fire, in a collision with another car, which Oliver Smith allegedly had stolen.

Oliver Smith claimed he was in bed when his brother and Craft told him of the robbery and burning of the building.

Neither James Smith nor Craft has been arrested. The razed building contained the company store, the U.S. postoffice and offices of the coal company.

Young Smith's first confession admitting his and his brother's guilt was later repudiated. He claimed this first statement was made under duress.

Wright Brothers Buy Leete Store

Announcement was made this week of the purchase of the Leete Jewelry Store here by the Wright brothers, of Louisa, who assumed management of the business Wednesday.

The business will be operated by Clifford and Homer Wright under the firm name, Wright Brothers. Chesley Wright, a third brother, will remain in Louisa in charge of their jewelry store there.

Floyd Soldier Drowns In German Lake, Says Army's News Release

News dispatches of June 3 reported that Pfc. John M. Clifton, 22 years old, of this county, was drowned, Tuesday of last week, when his boat capsized on a Berlin lake. Announcement of his death was made by the army. A companion was rescued by harbor police.

Clifton's body had not been recovered last Tuesday. He was a son of Dick Tracy Clifton, whose present address was given as Albion, Michigan. The victim was attached to the 16th infantry division.

SUIT CHANGE WOULD HALT APPOINTMENT

Petition Here Quashed As Special Judge Not Available Immediately

Governor Earle C. Clements was enjoined Tuesday by suit filed in the Franklin Circuit Court, Frankfort, against the appointment of a Circuit Judge for the new Breathitt-Wolfe-Powell judicial district formed by the 1948 General Assembly in its reshuffling of district boundary lines in this section.

Commonwealth's Attorney John Chris Cornett, one of the judicial district officials leading the fight on the act which would separate Floyd and Knott counties in the 31st district, said the injunction was filed as a means of getting immediate action in the case.

A delay in hearing of the suit filed here recently, attacking the constitutionality of the legislative redistricting act, became a certainty this week as Judge Colvin P. Rouse, Versailles, Ky., whom the Court of Appeals had designated special judge to hear the suit filed in the Floyd circuit court, notified litigants that Attorney General A. E. Funk, named as a defendant in the suit, is out of Kentucky this week at a time when Judge Rouse could come here, and that after this week the judge could not come to Prestonsburg for a hearing before July 6.

The delay would permit the Legislature's act to become effective and would seriously impair the attack on its validity, it was said. So the court action here was reluctantly withdrawn and the whole matter transferred to the Franklin circuit court.

Effective date of the act, unless barred by injunction or court decision, is next Thursday.

The new suit filed in Franklin circuit court follows the general lines of the suit filed here. The petition filed in Floyd circuit court assailed the redistricting legislation on 10 points.

Transfer of the case came after depositions had been taken at the office here of Joe Hobson, Prestonsburg attorney, one of local counsel representing Commonwealth's Attorney Cornett, Earl R. Cooper and J. Blaine Clarke. This testimony was offered by Circuit Judges and Commonwealth's Attorneys of the section affected. Only the testimony of Circuit Court Clerk W. W. Cooley, of Prestonsburg, remained to be taken by plaintiffs when the decision to transfer the suit was forced.

TELEPHONE WORK TOLD

Southern Bell Spending \$70,000 on Facilities In County This Year

Floyd countians found hope of relief from inadequate telephone service in the announcement made this week by the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company to the effect that the company not only is currently working to improve telephone facilities but that the work will continue through remainder of the year.

In Prestonsburg, over the last 18 months, \$20,000 has been spent by Southern Bell and an additional \$15,000 will be spent during the remaining months of 1948. With \$15,000 already spent at Allen and Martin for local facilities, \$20,000 more will be spent during the next six months toward improving service.

Cable and office facilities are being added for both the Prestonsburg and Allen-Martin areas, the improvements in the Allen office to be installed within the next 60 days, Mr. McCreary, district Southern Bell manager, said this week.

Over the state, more than \$10,000,000 will be spent by the telephone company this year. This figure, according to J. M. McAllister, Southern Bell state manager, is five times the 1936-39 pre-war average of expenditures for new facilities, and just

The mine owners said nothing about the nature of the proposals they will make, but they asked for another 24 hours to go over them. There was no indication whether the proposed contract will be ready in that time.

Conferences between Lewis and the operators' negotiating committee were scheduled to resume Wednesday afternoon.

During the lull in negotiations Lewis's attorneys went to federal court and filed an answer to the petition of Operator Ezra Van Horn for an injunction. Van Horn seeks to block any payments from the \$50,000,000 welfare fund under a pension system compromise which ended the recent strike. The plan was approved by Lewis and the third trustee, Senator Bridges (R-ND), over objections from Van Horn as operator trustee.

Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough will hear arguments on Van Horn's petition Saturday, June 19.

In his answer, Lewis furnished to the court copies of the minutes of meetings of the trustees at which unsuccessful efforts were made to set up a pension plan.

"I am making these minutes available for inspection by the court," Lewis said in an affidavit, "so that the obstructive, destructive, delaying and frustrating acts and conduct of the plaintiff may be fully, completely and finally disclosed and revealed to the end that the court may see and observe the naked truth of plaintiff's pernicious actions."

about double the outlay for 1946, which was by far the biggest year up to that time.

Pointing out that telephone construction is extending to the cities and towns and rural areas throughout the state, Mr. McAllister said that the number of Southern Bell telephones through which Kentuckians make and receive their telephone calls has more than doubled in the nine years since 1939. There are now more than 225,000 Southern Bell telephones in the state.

On January 1, 1946, there were 21,079 people in Kentucky waiting for telephones whose installation had to be delayed pending construction of new equipment. Since that time, Southern Bell has pushed its improvement program till more than 122,000 telephones were installed in the past 28 months through April, 1948. Yet the new applications for service have been coming in so rapidly that the waiting lists continue large, despite the record number of installations. Mr. McAllister said the demand stems from significant economic, industrial and agricultural progress in Kentucky which goes far beyond the aftermath of war.

SPORTS AFIELD

Old cherished beliefs are worn like old school ties, but the person who discards tradition will be a better fisherman, claims Bill Wolfe, iconoclast among our modern outdoor writers.

If you're of the wet-your-hands-before-unhooking-a-small-fish-school, you had better go back to school. The truth is that wet hands probably injure more hooked fish than any other factor, except bait taken deep in the throat.

A wet hand increases the difficulty of holding a fish. The angles apply more pressure and is apt to injure vital internal organs. A dry hand helps hold a squirming fish, with less pressure.

As part of an experiment conducted by the New Mexico Department of Fisheries to determine the chances of survival of undersized fish released after being caught, four anglers took, then freed 232 trout. Of that number, only 4.3 per cent died.

Sixty were caught on barbless flies and were handled with care (three died); 51 were taken on barbed flies and no special care was used in removing them from the hook (three died); 60 were taken on bait and moderate care was exercised (two died); 61 were caught with bait and were allowed to lie in the sand and dirt for a few minutes before being removed from the hooks (two died).

As a result of these experiments it was assumed that released fish will survive under normal conditions if average care is exercised and no vital organ is injured.
