HALE AUTHOR OF FIVE BILLS

On Fish, Game; Floyd Representatives Seek To Legalize Cockpits

Five bills, all pertaining to the Division of Game and Fish, were introduced in the General Assembly Monday by Henry C. Hale, of Blue River.

One of the five bills would prohibit the use of the Division's funds for sportsmen's clubs in printing or helping in the printing of any magazine. The other four bills would:

1. Prohibit employment by the Division of more than one person from the same family, employment of any one related by blood or marriage to the director or any commissioner of the division, and employment by any state agency of an immediate dependent member of the family of the game and fish director.

2. Bar game and fish commissioners, officials and employees having any interest in any contract, purchase or fee of the division.

3. Prohibit giving away, selling, leasing or trading of any game, fish, or shrubbery produced by the division, and require that such things be used solely to restore wild life in Kentucky.

4. Require that all licenses the division issues become effective July 1, instead of January 1. A bill introduced Tuesday by Representative John Milton Stumbo, of McDowell, Henry C. Hale, Blue River, and R. B. Collins, of Letcher county, would legalize chicken fighting and charge an annual license fee of \$300, plus 15 per cent of the total admission charge and an additional 15 per cent tax on the total of all bets handled by any person who accepts bets on his premises.

HOLD SUSPECT IN SLAYING

Man Believed To Be Stephens Is Jailed In Kermit Shooting

A man believed to be Bill Henry Stephens, of Middle Creek, near West Prestonsburg, who is wanted in the slaying at Kermit, W. Va., late this afternoon, of Eddie Kirk, 24-year-old war veteran, was being held in jail at Williamson, W. Va., tonight.

West Virginia officers arrested the suspect at Naugatuck, W. Va., eight miles from the scene of the shooting, early tonight. The description they gave of their prisoner—a man 5 feet, 10 inches tall, with dark hair and wearing a white polo shirt—tallied, police here said, with Stephens' appearance.

Grover Morris Allen, of West Prestonsburg, who accompanied Stephens in a taxicab driven by Junior Stanley from here to Kermit, told police that Stephens was handling a pistol when it was discharged as they sat in a booth of the John Kirk restaurant. The bullet struck Kirk's son, Eddie, in the region of the heart, and he died within 20 minutes.

Allen and Stanley were held by police here for questioning by West Virginia authorities. Stanley said he was playing a pin ball machine when the shot was fired and could not give a clear picture of the shooting.

JAIL HOWELL IN SLAYING

Kiser, War Veteran, Shotgun Blast Victim On Dry Creek Saturday

Sherman Howell, 23 years old, was arrested Sunday by Knott county officers after he allegedly had shot and killed Elmer L. Kiser, 22-year-old war veteran, on Dry Creek, 10 miles from Wayland, Saturday midnight.

Jailer Everette Collins said here Monday he had been queried from Knott county if Howell could be brought here for safekeeping, but the prisoner was not brought here.

Details of the shooting are unavailable. A single blast from a shotgun, fired at close range, struck Kiser in the region of his heart and he died almost instantly.

The victim was a son of Alonzo Kiser, of Dry Creek. He is survived by his parents, his widow, Mrs. Ora Kiser, two children, three sisters, Mrs. Mary Caudill, of Topmost, Mrs. Woodrow Johnson, Dry Creek, Mrs. Olive Johnson, of Halo, and two brothers, Millard and Vernon Kiser, both of Dry Creek.

The funeral was conducted Monday from Providence Baptist Church, Dry Creek, and burial was made in the family cemetery under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

FLOYD-KNOTT DELEGATION FIGHTS BILL

State Senate Votes Bill to Re-District, Separating Counties

A delegation from Floyd and Knott counties was in Frankfort this week seeking to forestall a judicial redistricting plan which would, among other district changes, cut Knott away from Floyd and create new districts with Floyd and Martin counties composing the 31st judicial district and Knott and Magoffin the 36th.

The redistricting bill, introduced by Senator Ollie M. Lyons, Morehead Democrat, originated in this section as independent districts are being sought for Pike and Boyd counties. It was said here, the move to cut Pike away from Letcher and Boyd from Lawrence necessitated a reshuffle of the judicial set-up.

But Floyd and Knott leaders are strongly opposed to their severance. The delegation now in Frankfort is working to get the bill amended and back in committee. "We have no objection to separate districts for Pike and Boyd, but we do object to separation of Knott and Floyd, counties which are closely allied as neighbors and in almost every respect," a spokesman for the group said. "Under the new plan," he added, "for a Knott resident to attend all courts in his district he would have to travel through Floyd county, and unless the Middle Creek road is improved, through Johnson to reach Salyersville, and vice versa. And for us folks from Floyd to go to the other county seat in the district, we would have to pass through Johnson county. It just doesn't make sense."

The Senate voted the measure, and last hope for its defeat lies with the House or with a veto by Governor Clements.

Other provisions of the Lyons bill would create a new district of Breathitt, Powell and Wolfe counties, another of Johnson and Lawrence and form the 25th district of Clark, Jessamine and Madison.

Floyd and Knott opponents of the bill agreed on this proposed set-up: Separate districts for Pike and Boyd, Floyd and Knott to remain unchanged, Johnson and Martin unchanged, Magoffin, Morgan and Elliott in a district, and Perry and Letcher in another.

RYAN AMENDS COURT ACTION

Challenges Akers' Right to Judgeship In Amended Petition

An amended petition designed to revive the claim of G. D. Ryan to the police judgeship of the town of Martin, was filed in the Floyd circuit court Saturday by Ryan's attorney, Joe Hobson.

The original Ryan suit, filed last month, was a mandamus action seeking to force the surrender by Kessie Akers, who was elected Martin police judge, of records of the office after Governor Earle C. Clements had appointed Mr. Ryan to the office. The appointment followed notice from members of the "old" board of trustees at Martin that the office had been declared vacant. The petition was dismissed, three weeks ago, by Circuit Judge E. P. Hill, Jr., following a hearing.

The amended petition filed Saturday states that it was the duty of Mr. Akers after his election to the office in November, 1945 for a four-year term to qualify for the office on or before the first Monday in January, 1946. This, the petition alleges, he failed to do, since he neither took the required constitutional oath nor executed bond "at no time till Jan. 14, 1946." This date was the day when Ryan, with his commission from the Governor, came here and qualified by executing bond and taking the oath of office.

Because of Akers' failure to meet the legal requirements of an officeholder, the amended petition sets out, a vacancy in the office existed from the outset. SMITH WEBB, TRAIN VICTIM

Miner's Body Is Found Near McDowell Station Hours After Death

Body of Smith Webb, 51-year-old miner, was found Tuesday morning alongside the railway tracks at McDowell where he was believed to have been killed by a train during the preceding night.

Although two youths admitted having seen him lying beside the tracks around 10 o'clock Monday night, they did not investigate, fearing, they said, court involvement similar to that following a death in the vicinity by train, a few years ago. The body was found about 5 o'clock Tuesday morning, by Bob Stewart, Duran Hall and Fred Ward, who were en route to work.

A jury empaneled by Coroner Brady Shepherd returned a verdict of death by train. It was said Webb had left home Monday to procure medicine for a heart condition. Both legs were severed and were found lying inside the rails. Remainder of the body, apparently unscathed, lay outside the rails. Contents of his pockets were found intact and there was no hint of foul play.

The victim was a native of Lawrence county. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Webb, one daughter, Mrs. Sallie Holbrook, of McDowell, four brothers, Nelse, Bud and Bird Webb, all of Lawrence county, Ed Webb, of Ashland, and one sister, Mrs. Maggie Marshall, of Ohio.

Funeral rites were conducted from the McDowell high school auditorium today (Thursday), the Revs. M. C. Wright, Johnny King and Vernon Hall officiating. Burial in the Lucy Hall cemetery there was directed by the Arnold Funeral Home.

COAL COMPANY EXPANDS AID

Adds Third U. of K. Scholarship, Drops High School Help

Discontinuance of four high school scholarships and expansion of the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company's college scholarship program for the coming year was announced last week by the company president, David L. Francis.

The high school scholarships were eliminated from the program, which was initiated two years ago, because youngsters in Stuart-Robinson high school as scholarship students returned home because of homesickness.

Three four-year scholarships, instead of two, will be offered for study at the University of Kentucky, and two for girls for two years each at Pikeville College.

The two University of Kentucky scholarships in the past were earmarked for sons of employees to study mining engineering. But in the coming year, two of the three successful applicants may apply the value of the scholarships—\$400 each—to work for degrees in mining, electrical, or mechanical engineering.

The third will go to some Floyd or Johnson county student who need not be the son of an employe. He will have the option of studying one of these phases of engineering, or of taking a course in teaching or regulating work.

The Pikeville College scholarships, for \$75 each, are intended for daughters of employes. But if no qualified applicants from this source should be found, Francis said the company would consider offering one award to some other student from the two counties having a good academic record.

Scholarship recipients will be determined by company general manager William Crawford and personnel director Max C. Burns, with the help of principals and teachers after they review all applications.

Lukemia Claims Osborne, Well-Known Floyd Man, At Martin Wednesday

OPERATORS ARE NERVOUS

As Lewis Bides Time In Calling His Miners In Pension Difference

John L. Lewis has the soft coal industry on edge again. The coal producers are wondering whether the United Mine Workers' president means to turn his pension dispute into a full-blown contract showdown around April 1.

If he does, he must give the operators—and the federal and state conciliation services—30 days notice some time this week.

Many operators, displaying customary optimism, were saying privately they think Lewis would not do anything immediately upon his return from Florida. Some thought he would time his notice to end the contract at the close of a week or pay period like April 3 or April 10, instead of March 31, which comes at midweek.

Or he could permit the contract to continue until its expiration date June 30, building up pressure meantime for his pension plan and possible wage demands.

Lewis has proposed a \$100 monthly pension for miners 60 years of age, to have due coal for 20 years. By union estimate this would amount to \$24,000,000 a year.

The 10-cent royalty per ton provided by his contract of last July is yielding about \$60,000,000 a year for the union's welfare and retirement fund.

The operators say the plan Lewis has in mind, coupled with other benefits planned under the contract last July, would cost far more than that. Some operators guess it would require another 40 cents per ton royalty.

The UMW leader sent letters to the operators Feb. 2 notifying them that a dispute exists over the pension plan. He said he would terminate a contract.

FULL EFFECT OF PROGRAM

To Protect Timberland To Be Seen This Year, County Warden Claims

This year is expected to see in Floyd county full realization of benefits derived from the forest fire protection program put into effect last summer through cooperation of the fiscal court with the State Forestry Service, Palmer Crum, Betsy Layne, county fire warden, said this week.

Two observation towers are now complete, one on Brandy Keg and the other at Maytown, and the third and last will be started soon on Mud Creek. To the towers completed telephone lines have been strung and these were expected to be connected with the Southern Bell system this week.

Approximately 40 deputy wardens have been named, and soon every community in the county is expected to have a deputy warden. During the "fire season" in the spring and fall, Mr. Crum has two salaried assistants, Claude May, of Maytown, and Jim Dameron, of Ivel, who patrol assigned areas, and three crew leaders at strategic points will be paid for fire season work.

Meanwhile, an educational program will be carried out through the schools, and an organization of Boy Scouts for the war on forest fires will be attempted through the county.

Last year, Boy Scouts on occasion rendered excellent firefighting aid notably at Weeksbury and Wayland, Mr. Crum said. Weeksbury had the county's most destructive fire during the year, with approximately 400 acres of forestland burned over in a three-day fire. Crum said. In all, there were 38 fires in the county last year. (See Story No. 2, Page 5)

BETSY LAYNE BURIES FOUR MINE VICTIMS

School Gymnasium Packed at Funeral Held Last Sunday

Sunday morning and afternoon saw all other activities halted at Betsy Layne as residents of the town and visitors from other communities over the section paid last tribute to four Betsy Layne men who met death last Wednesday afternoon by monoxide poisoning in the Southern Elkhorn Coal Company truck mine at Blairtown, near Boldman.

A crowd of approximately 1000 persons crowded Betsy Layne gymnasium Sunday morning for the joint funeral of three of the victims, Raymond Carter Goble, 28, Ben Eugene Blackburn, 24, and George Moles, Jr., 25. ## THE STATISTICS

It is generally agreed that daily newspaper production is a marvel of efficiency and speed. In the same breath, most folks commiserate with the weekly newspaper on its slowness—why, getting out one paper a week should be mere child's play. And why in tunket don't you get it out on the dot?

Here are some figures we found right interesting. Ralph Pulitzer, publisher, says:

"In a big newspaper office, in a night, 160,000 words are written by about 2,000 different contributors, reporters and correspondents; some news comes in by wire and some by telephone."

That's not all Mr. Pulitzer said in pointing out the efficiency of the daily newspaper. But it's enough for us to enjoy giving some comparative figures.

An edition of The Floyd County Times, picked at random (it would be at random, if picked from my desk), shows that Page 1 contained approximately 5,000 words, of which yours truly wrote not less than 4,300, plus headlines, etcetera. On through the paper there are other stories adding up to 2,850 words pecked out on this typewriter. All contributed copy was edited and proof-read by one man, who reads proofs on all ads.

That figures up to this: In a five-day week I'm batting out an average of 1,470 words a day, while those big city tellers have been soldiering on the job with a puny 80 words a night. Could these figures be wrong?—(maybe they sleep, nights, like we weekly editors do).

After reading these figures over, darned if I'm not surprised that we ever get a paper out!



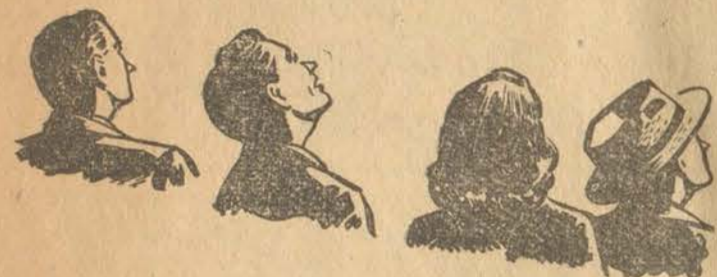

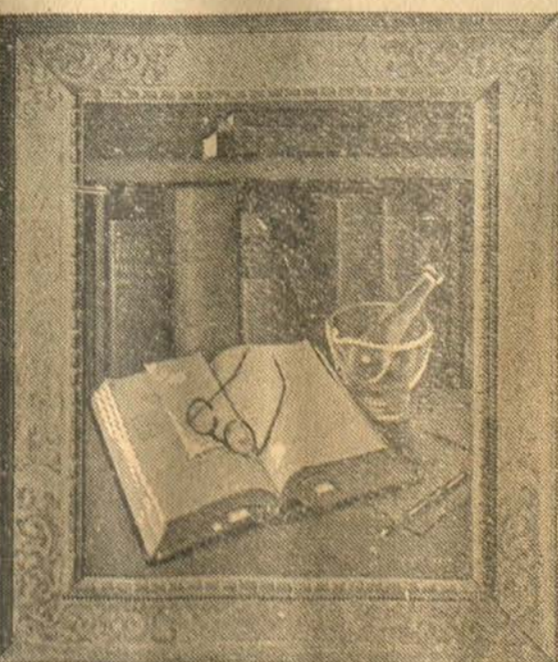

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

Blind veterans, who have been issued equipment by Veterans Administration to aid them in overcoming their handicap, now may obtain minor repairs to such equipment without prior VA approval, VA Branch Office officials in Columbus, O., said this week.

Approximately 6,400 blind veterans are eligible for the new VA prosthetic service cards, similar to those used by amputees to obtain immediate minor repairs to their artificial limbs.

By presenting their cards to any repair shop in any section of the country, blind veterans will receive, without delay, repair service up to a limit of \$20, without VA's prior approval.

Under the new plan, repairs to the following items are authorized: typewriters, radios (excluding batteries), Braille writers, recording equipment, electric razors, Braille watches of any type.

The cards will be issued by the Prosthetic Appliance Unit in each VA regional office.

Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus, Ohio, recently urged veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky to keep appointments for medical or dental care which has been authorized in their respective cases by VA.

Veterans should make every effort to obtain prescribed examination or treatment within the time limit in their respective cases, VA said. Broken appointments frequently cause unnecessary delays in medical or dental care.

The new payments, affecting veterans enrolled under the G.I. Bill and also disabled veterans studying under Public Law 16, will be at a monthly rate of \$75 for a veteran without dependents, \$105 for a veteran with one dependent, and \$120 for a veteran with more than one dependent.

The old rate of \$65 monthly for single veterans and \$90 for those with dependents still apply for on-job-trainees and part-time student veterans.

The higher rates become effective April 1 and will be payable at the end of each month. Single veterans and those with one dependent need not apply for the increased payments as VA records contain sufficient information to make the adjustments. However, veterans entitled to \$120 because they have more than one dependent will be required to submit proof of dependency. If this proof is furnished prior to July 1, they will receive retroactive payments at the new rates back to April 1.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I am a World War II veteran and would like to know if I have the right to choose the hospital I prefer in case of service-connected ailment?

A. The VA probably will offer such treatment in the VA hospital nearest your home, or in the nearest VA hospital equipped and staffed to take care of your particular case.

Q. Can veterans of the Spanish-American War get government insurance because of their service in the armed forces?

A. No. Government insurance first was made available to veterans of World War I.

Q. I am now drawing 10 per cent compensation for a service-connected knee condition. Will VA pay for a knee-brace which my doctor advises me to wear?

A. VA will pay for the knee brace if VA doctors approve the recommendation of your physician.

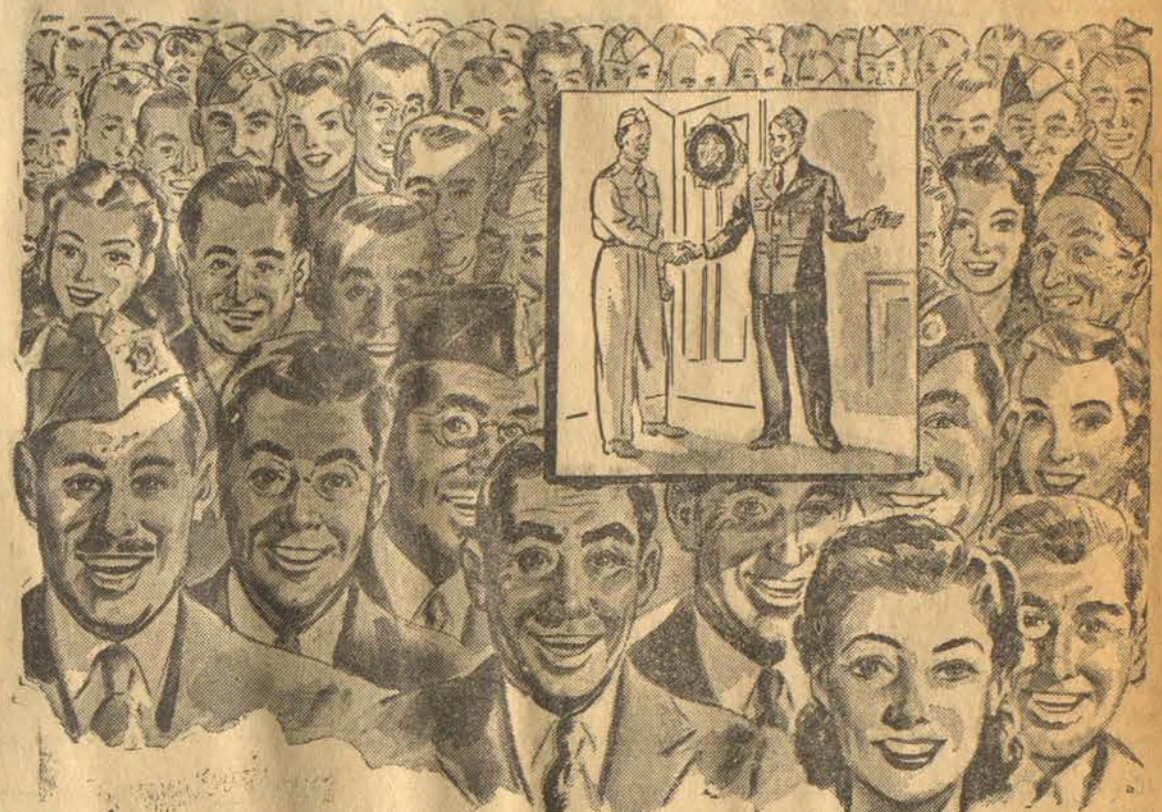

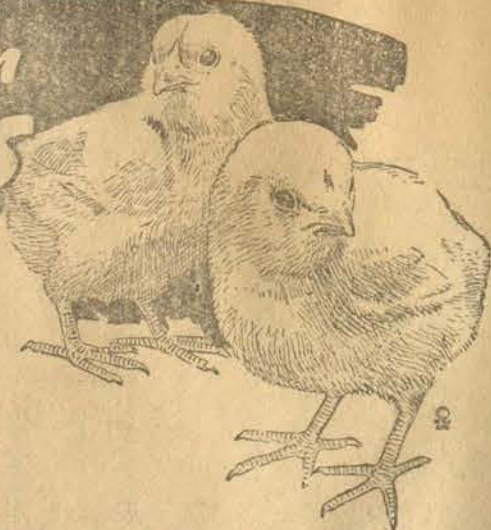

**Attorney-General Says Local Option Bill Has No Joker Clause in It**

Attorney General A. E. Funk said Friday, "There is no joker in the local-option bill" passed last week by the General Assembly.

This view was shared by Robert K. Cullen, chief statutes reviser. Cullen said he had made a thorough study of the local-option liquor bill and was "convinced there's no joker in it."

Senator Ira W. See, Louisa Republican, charged Wednesday he had found a "joker" in the measure which would make prohibition unenforceable in counties containing no cities of the first four classes.

The bill is now on Governor Earle C. Clements' desk. He has until midnight next Wednesday to sign or veto it. If he takes no action it will become law the following day and will go into operation June 19.

Backed by the wets, the bill breaks down the county-unit system of local option. It would enable cities of the first four population classes to vote wet or dry independently of their counties. There are 52 counties which have such cities. There are 68 counties with no cities of the first four classes.

The measure, House Bill 197, repeals a section of the present wet-dry law. Senator See claimed repeal of this section would prevent any of the 68 rural counties from enforcing prohibition if they should vote dry.

But Funk and Cullen took an opposite view. Funk told reporters: "House Bill 197 in no way affects or makes changes in the enforcement provisions of local option in any counties which do not contain cities of the first four classes."

If a court should construe the bill did prevent such enforcement, Funk said he thought the entire bill would be unconstitutional because its title fails to mention such a provision.

Funk said repeal of the section, which See brands as the "joker" in the bill, would not affect the city-less counties. "There are other sections of the law which provide for enforcement when any territory votes dry," he added.

Cullen said that if the language of the bill is "taken literally, there is nothing to prevent a precinct of a fifth or sixth-class city, from voting wet in a dry county which doesn't have a city of the first four classes in it."

"But," Cullen continued, "a court certainly would construe the new bill to mean that the only place in any dry county you could hold an election would be in cities of the first four classes."

"If a county does not have such a city, then no other precinct or district in that dry county could vote wet until the entire county voted wet."

"Any other construction would render the law meaningless," Cullen added.

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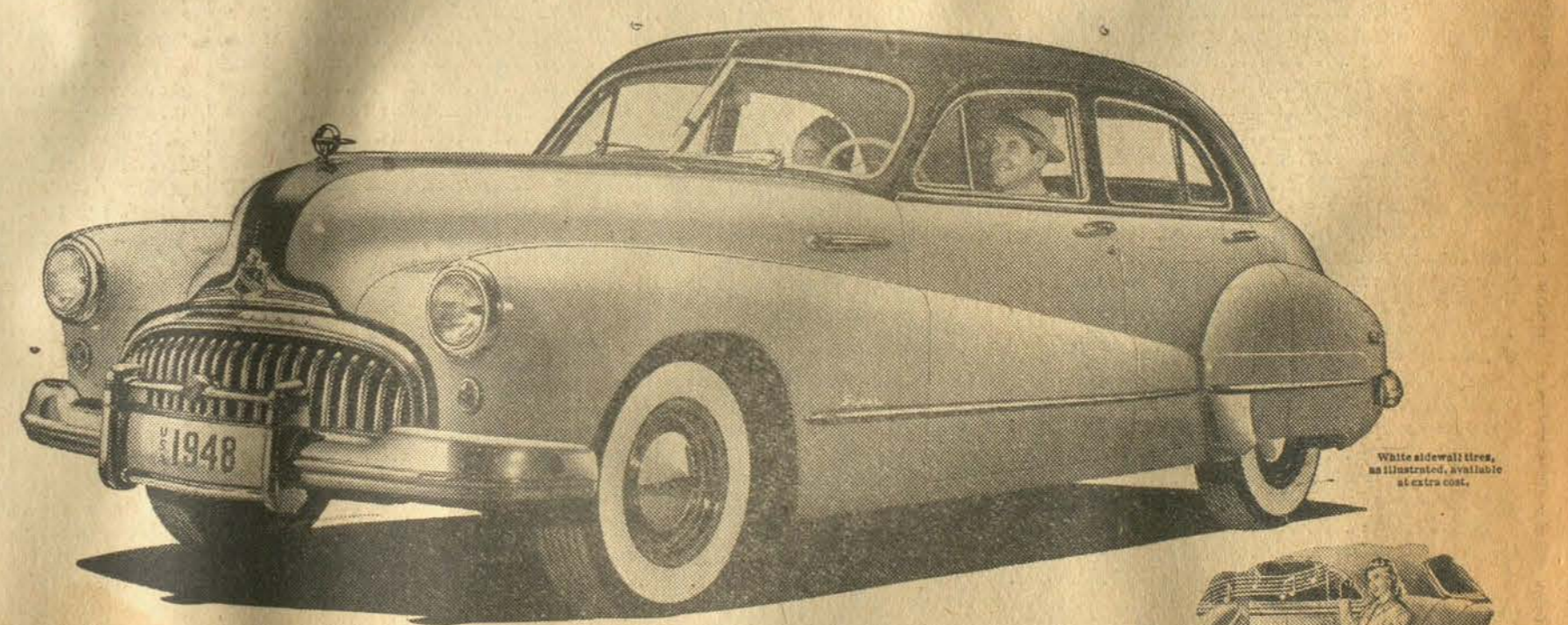

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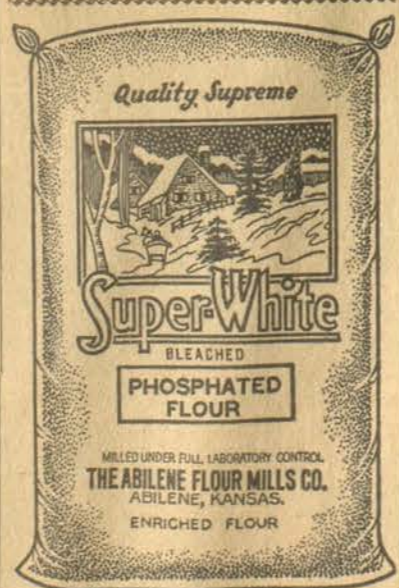


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
