Van Horn Speaks Out On Welfare Fund

Charges Lewis with attempts to thwart public law and violate contract

The following is the record of a press conference on March 16 when Ezra Van Horn, one of the trustees of the so-called Miners' Welfare Fund, was interviewed by news-

Q. You don't propose to do any bargaining with Mr.

Lewis until the other trustee is appointed? A. I am ready and willing to meet with Mr. Lewis at any time in an attempt to work out all of these matters per-

taining to the welfare fund. Q. Under the contract you have the right to go to court by yourself, don't you?

A. I understand so. Q. Do you think you might do that if Mr. Lewis doesn't

act within a reasonable time? A. That may be true.

Q. Have you approached Lewis personally since

Friday

A. No, sir. I talked to him last, a week ago. Q. You sought to have him agree to the third trustee at that time?

A. That is right.

Q. Can you tell us the name of any person you suggested?

A. No. I suggested several names. Q. Did he reject them? A. He said he would take the list under consideration.

Mr. Van Horn dwelt at some length on the eligibility proposition, saying that was a highly controversial point. He said Lewis insists all members of the United Mine Workers in good standing should be eligible regardless of whether they are employed by employers signatory to the 1947 agreement, and he (Van Horn) insists that only employes of employers signatory to the agreement and who contribute to the welfare fund should be eligible.

Q. Must the twenty year period be continuous or may it be over several years?

A. It may be over several years—not necessarily con-

Q. Have you proposed any alternative amount for the

pension fund against Lewis' \$100?

A. No sir.

Q. What is Lewis' attitude with regard to going to

A. He insists this is not a matter that should go to court. Q. Are you willing to say how much longer you will wait before going to court?

A. No sir.

Q. How much money is in the 1947 fund at this time?

A little over thirty million dollars. Q. Has anything been done toward merging the two

A. No, nothing has been done. It has been discussed a

great many times but nothing has been done regarding it. Q. Is it considered possible to do it?

A. There is always some question as to the procedure in merging funds of that kind.

Q. Why isn't this fund invested?

A. Mr. Lewis has refused to invest the money.

Q. Have you suggested that it be done?

A. Yes sir. Q. What is the reason for his refusal?

A. The only reason he has given me is that he could not legally invest the money until the fund had become acti-

Q. Doesn't that seem spurious?
A. Well, it doesn't seem to be the consensus. Q. What did Murray think?

A. Murray thought the funds could be invested. Q. Couldn't you two have agreed to invest it?

A. It never came to a vote.

Q. Did anything come to a vote?

A. There were some things—routine matters—that were voted upon, on which the vote was unanimous. Q. Since September, when Lewis made the first pro-

posal for \$100 per month, the whole thing has held on dead center because of the eligibility matter, is that right? A. That is right.

Q. How about the Burke resolution?

A. That resolution was that the money was to be paid to all UMWA mine workers. The basis that we discussed was as to the proposal for \$100 per month, at sixty years of age, and after twenty years of service in and around the

Q. Mr. Murray proposed a resolution which was not satisfactory to Mr. Lewis, that it was not on an actuarial basisin general what were its terms? A. I don't just recall what it called for. It applied to

employes of the employers and to some of the other men. Q. Was it satisfactory to you?

A. No, it was not satisfactory to me because it referred to some employes who are not employes of the employers. It is my belief that there are some 336,000 men who are employes of employers under the 1947 wage agreement. Of that number about 81/2 per cent will become 60 years of age or older in the year 1948. If you take 81/2 per cent of 336,000 and multiply it by 1200, you would have the number of dollars that could be paid out during 1948 - that would be roughly \$33,600,000. Bear in mind under the contract there are other benefits to be paid to the mine workers, such as hospitalization, death benefits, disability payments, etc. Q. Could the welfare fund afford a pension?

A. It could afford a pension of some kind but not of this proportion. It must also be borne in mind that the only contract in the industry is one running up until June 30, 1948.

The following letter was addressed March 16 by Mr. Van Horn to John L. Lewis, the other trustee of the Welfare Fund

Dear Mr. Lewis: As a result of your letter to all members of the United Mine Workers, given widespread publicity on March 12,

and a press conference held on that date, I have addressed a letter to those signatories to the 1947 Wage Agreement of whom I have a record and to the beneficiaries of the Welfare Fund outlining the factual situation pertaining to said fund and the reasons why said fund has not been activated. A copy of said letter is enclosed. You are Chairman of the Board of Trustees of this Fund

and as such Chairman and Trustee you have made impossible the establishment of a program under such Welfare Fund by your actions, among which are the following: 1. You have insisted on disregarding the Labor-Man-

agement Relations Act, 1947, by demanding that persons not entitled or eligible for benefits be paid benefits. 2. During the year 1947 you were absent from Wash-

ington for many weeks and no meetings were held during your absence.

3. On January 31, 1948, Mr. Murray's resignation as Trustee was accepted. I promptly submitted to you a list of suggested persons to serve as a successor Trustee, and you advised me that you would take this list under consideration. Thereupon you went on a vacation and for many weeks your office would not disclose your whereabouts; even though I called your office many times requesting you to call me, you did not respond to such requests, and to date you have not suggested a single name for the successor neutral Trustee.

4. I have repeatedly requested that you supply to me, in my position as one of the Trustees of this Fund, a complete list of names of the signatories to the Contract, so that I may know the companies which have employes who are entitled to benefits of the Fund. You have adamantly refused me this information.

5. In 1947 the Trustees employed a firm of actuaries to make an actuarial study and report to be used by them for the establishment of a program of pensions under the Welfare Fund. This firm of actuaries submitted their report on November 17, 1947. You did not like the facts reported therein, therefore you caused the termination of their employment and ignored their report.

6. The report of said actuaries did not substantiate your position. You then secured an additional study from the Social Security Board of the United States Government. Such report was submitted to the Trustees and for all practical purposes contained the same conclusions as those of the actuaries employed by the Trustees and you have insisted on ignoring both reports because they do not substantiate your

7. I have caused an accurate age inventory of those employed in and about the coal mines to be made from the employes' Social Security records and have secured this information from signatories to the Agreement, which covers more than 82 per cent of the industry, so that there is now available sound actuarial data for the establishment of a program under the Welfare Fund. You refuse to give any consideration to this study.

8. You refused to agree upon a third Trustee. I now request you, in accordance with the Wage Agreement, to join with me in an application to the District Court of the United States for the District of Columbia for the appointment of a neutral Trustee. Failing to hear favorably from you on or before March 19, 1948, I will feel free to take such action as I deem appropriate without your joinder.
