CRAGER, ONE OF 6 KILLED In Virginia Mine; Body Is Returned For Floyd Burial

One of six men who lost their lives Thursday beneath tons of coal in a Dante, Va., mine last Thursday was Oakley Crager, 38 years old, Trammel, Va., son of Jim Crager, well-known resident of the Abbott road, near here.

The six, working near the face of the coal, were trapped as a seven-foot vein of coal suddenly shot outward beneath terrific pressure. A rescue party of 40 men worked 4 1/2 hours, it was said, in removing the bodies.

Body of the Floyd county victim was brought to the home of his father Saturday, and funeral rites were conducted Sunday from Horn Chapel, the Revs. James Roark, W. H. Horn and Deskins officiating.

Burial was made in the family cemetery on Cow Creek under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

MALONE HALL DIES MONDAY

Former County Judge, Clerk Is Victim at 89; Rites Held Wednesday

Malone Hall, former Floyd County Judge and County Clerk, died at his home at Allen Monday at the age of 89.

A son of Elijah and Margaret Clark Hall, he was born on Mud Creek, July 4, 1858. He was the last surviving member of the family. In early life he was a teacher, later was a merchant and helped establish the postoffice at Banner, this county.

Affectionately known as "Uncle Male," Mr. Hall was widely known for his hospitality, kindness and devotion to family and friends.

YOUTH DENIES ARSON CHARGE

Repudiates Confession Officers Say He Made After Glogora Blaze

A 15-year-old boy is held in the county jail here in connection with the burning at Glog, in the pre-dawn hours of last Thursday morning, of the Glogora Coal Company building at Glog which housed the company store, the engineering and payroll offices and the United States post-office.

The youth, Oliver Smith, made an oral confession, officers said, a few hours after the fire, saying he and his older brother, James, robbed the store, poured gasoline across the floor and set fire to it.

Loss in stock and furnishings of the building, a large one-story structure with full basement, was estimated by John S. Hampton, general manager of the coal operation at Glog, at \$60,000. The total loss will aggregate \$80,000, it was unofficially said.

The blaze was discovered around 3 a. m., Thursday, and had spread with such rapidity that the nearby Wayland fire department was unable to save either the building or its contents.

FATHER, SON UNDER BOND IN SLAYING

\$20,000 Bond Asked For Hamilton Release In Death of Neighbor

Jarvey Hamilton, Mud Creek farmer, was held to \$20,000 bond and his 18-year-old son, Estill, to \$5,000 Monday by County Judge Alex L. Davidson at the conclusion of their examining trial in the shotgun slaying last week of their neighbor, Monroe Bryant, 37-year-old miner, near the Hamilton home on Tinker Fork.

A quartet of witnesses, all bearing the name Hamilton, agreed in their testimony that Bryant was unarmed when his neighbor, a man in his fifties, fired a single blast from a 12-gauge shotgun into his right arm and hip, shortly after noon last Thursday. All were agreed, too, that the slaying grew out of the fact that Bryant had dug into Hamilton's bank bordering the creek in an effort to repair the creekbed-rod.

Officers of the Association will be elected at the meeting, and shortly afterward the Woman's Club is expected to transfer full control of the library to the Association. Applications for the post of librarian will continue to be received until the date of the meeting.

One sister, Mrs. Betty Tackett, of Weeksbury, also survives.

The funeral was held Sunday at the graveside in the Melvin cemetery, the Revs. P. A. Hopkins, Jerry Hall, A. J. Jones and Ellis Moore officiating. Burial was under direction of the Call Funeral Home.

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Truman Nominates Prestonsburg Man For Re-Appointment

Mr. Stephens, a former Commonwealth's Attorney of the 31st judicial district, is now ending his first four-year term as U.S. District Attorney and before that was assistant to District Attorney John Metcalf whom he succeeded.

A notable case which Mr. Stephens prosecuted and won during the term ending this year was the Gould income tax case, said to have been the largest of its kind in the federal courts of the country.

The matter of a new soft coal contract remained at stalemate this week, with only a "routine" meeting of John L. Lewis, Ezra Van Horn, operators' representative, and Senator Styles Bridges, the three pension fund trustees, the only move of the week toward an understanding.

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Nomination of Claude P. Stephens, of Prestonsburg, to re-appointment to the post of U.S. District Attorney for the Eastern district of Kentucky has been made by President Truman and confirmation by the Senate is expected soon.

RYAN SWEARS OUT WARRANT FOR LABORER

Bus Union Leader Contends Contract Changed by Firm

Labor disputes Tuesday caused suspension of operation of the Sparks Brothers Bus Company for the second time in the last 45 days and paralyzed work at the Dewey dam.

Out of the work-stoppage at the Johns Creek operation Tuesday developed court action by Phillip A. Ryan, vice-president of the Ryan Construction Co., who swore out a peace warrant for Tivis Little, one of the common laborers who staged the walk-out and threw out the picket line which closed all work at the dam.

When Ryan failed to appear here Tuesday afternoon for the hearing of Little, and after workmen accompanying Little to the courthouse had stated Little did not carry a revolver or make threats of any kind, County Judge A. L. Davidson released the worker. He did not, however, dismiss the peace warrant, saying that if the contractor insists on a hearing it will be given.

Suspension of bus service came in a new dispute over a work contract, a matter generally believed to have been settled May 15 when bus service was resumed after a four-week shutdown. Bill Allen, of Martin, president of the drivers' local union, said the drivers refused to work without a contract. He alleged that an official of the company had caused to be inserted in the contract without the local's assent, a clause pertaining to the Taft-Hartley act and that this was unacceptable to the union.

"Now Sparks won't sign anything," Allen said. "We went ahead working 15 or 16 days without a contract, thinking everything was settled, but evidently it isn't."

At the Dewey dam, said spokesmen for the 13 workers who came here Tuesday afternoon after Little had been arrested on the peace warrant, an increase from 85 cents an hour to \$1.20 was asked for common labor. A strike developed last week but the workmen agreed to return to work Monday for a 10-day period during which negotiations were to be carried on toward an agreement. The construction company agreed, the workers said, to return to work all the men who had been working, but declined to re-employ approximately 15 of them when they appeared on the job.

Mr. Ryan declined to make a statement when queried about the situation Wednesday.

Digging of the trench for diversion of Johns Creek prior to work on the dam itself was under way when the strike came.

Bill Ousley, 24 years old, of Langley, was fatally injured near Coldwater, Mich., May 17, when his auto left the highway and crashed into a tree. He died Tuesday of a broken neck.

The body arrived in Ashland Wednesday night and was taken to the home at Langley of his mother, Mrs. Lizzie Ousley Prater, by the Arnold Funeral Home. Funeral rites will be held on Salt Lick Creek Friday by the Revs. M. C. Wright and Earl Howard.

'Blanket' Increases Are Unjust

COMMISSIONER of Revenue Reeves recently stated a truth which tax officials have either evaded or overlooked, over the years.

He pointed to the fact that the "blanket" increase in tax assessment is no way to do justice in the collection of taxes; that such a procedure is unjust and does not effect equalization.

That is "elementary." Take the assessment picture here. Property of a few taxpayers is perhaps assessed at a fair figure. That of most others is far down the scale, and still others make "token payment." What would a "blanket" assessment raise achieve in Prestonsburg, then?

Make the raise ten per cent. That would raise the assessment of the high-paying few past a just figure, bring the next group up nearly to where their property valuation should be—but the others who have been paying on farcical assessments would still be far, far below a sensible and just tax.

Hard, honest work, work without prejudice or favor, needs to be done on tax assessments. Then, with the figures all in, and if the amount of collectible taxes is found to exceed the need for revenue, a blanket cut would be the just and proper thing to put into effect.

Why a Traffic Light?

SOME Hurry-Along Harrys are going to kill somebody, perhaps more than one, here at a spot where the danger signal flares red for all to see. And, unless this dashing, show-off breed of motorist is taught, and soon, that a red light is a signal to stop tragedy isn't far away.

A traffic light disregarded by one motorist running it on red, with drivers crossing the intersection on green—with the reckless driver escaping the arrest and imprisonment he deserves—is worse than no traffic light at all.

That "good guy" who is permitted to violate without penalty a regulation necessary to his own safety as well as to that of others will not be so good after he has plowed into the side of another car and taken a ghastly toll in human life.

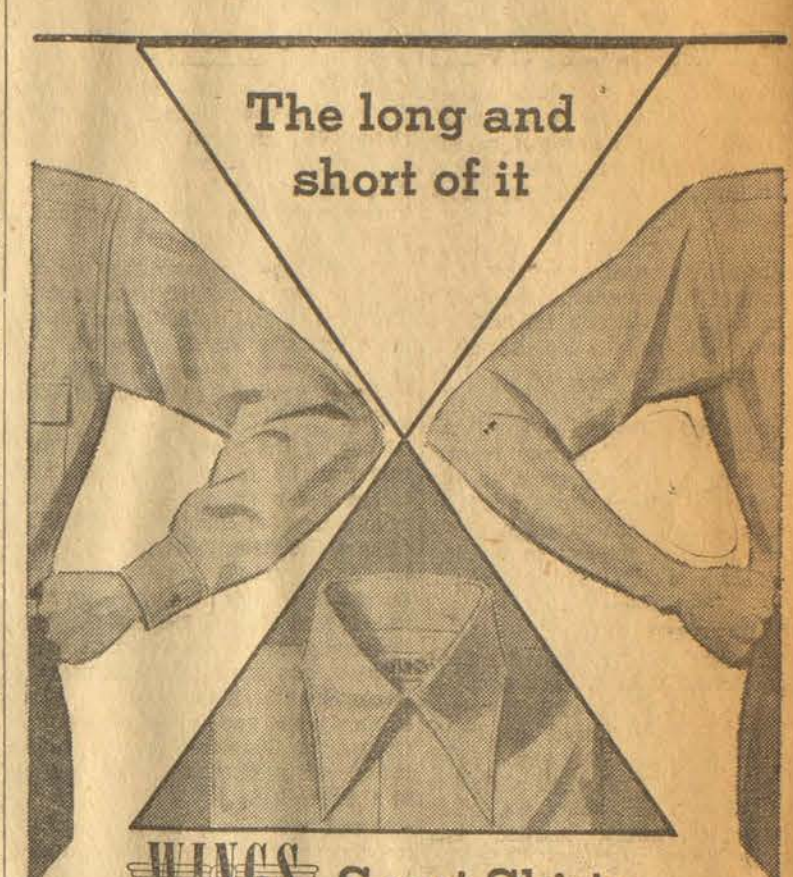

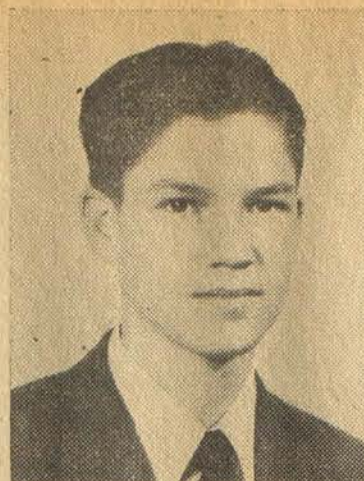
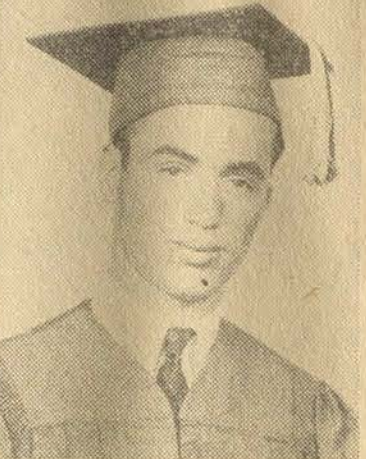
Receive Princess Elkhorn Awards

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

A printed explanation of the new law increasing limitations on earned income and government subsistence for veterans studying or training under the G.I. Bill will be enclosed with May subsistence checks, due in June, Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus, O., said this week.

The new law, effective April 1, increases ceiling limitations from \$175 to \$210 per month for a veteran with no dependents, from \$200 to \$270 a month for a veteran with one dependent and from \$200 to \$290 for a veteran with two or more dependents.

The new law also provides that proportionate subsistence increases will be payable to certain trainees under the G.I. Bill and Public Law 16 (Vocational Rehabilitation Act.)

Veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky who are in receipt of monetary benefits from VA are reminded to report immediately any change in address to the appropriate VA office. VA said this procedure is particularly important to the many veterans who will change addresses at the end of the current school year. Failure to report change of address may result in an indefinite delay in subsistence or compensation payments, VA said. If possible, veterans should indicate if the changes are temporary or permanent.

Veterans Administration insurance officials recently emphasized that there are six available types of permanent National Service Life Insurance to which World War II veterans may convert their term policies.

VA insurance officials in Columbus, O., explained it is not necessary to convert all of a \$10,000 term policy and that any combination of permanent plans may be obtained.

G.I. insurance may be converted to any of the following policies: Ordinary Life, 20-Pay Life, Endowment at age 65, Endowment at age 60 and 20-Year Endowment. From this list, a veteran, with the aid of a VA representative, insurance agent, or representative of the Red Cross or the various service organizations, may select a policy most appropriate to his needs.

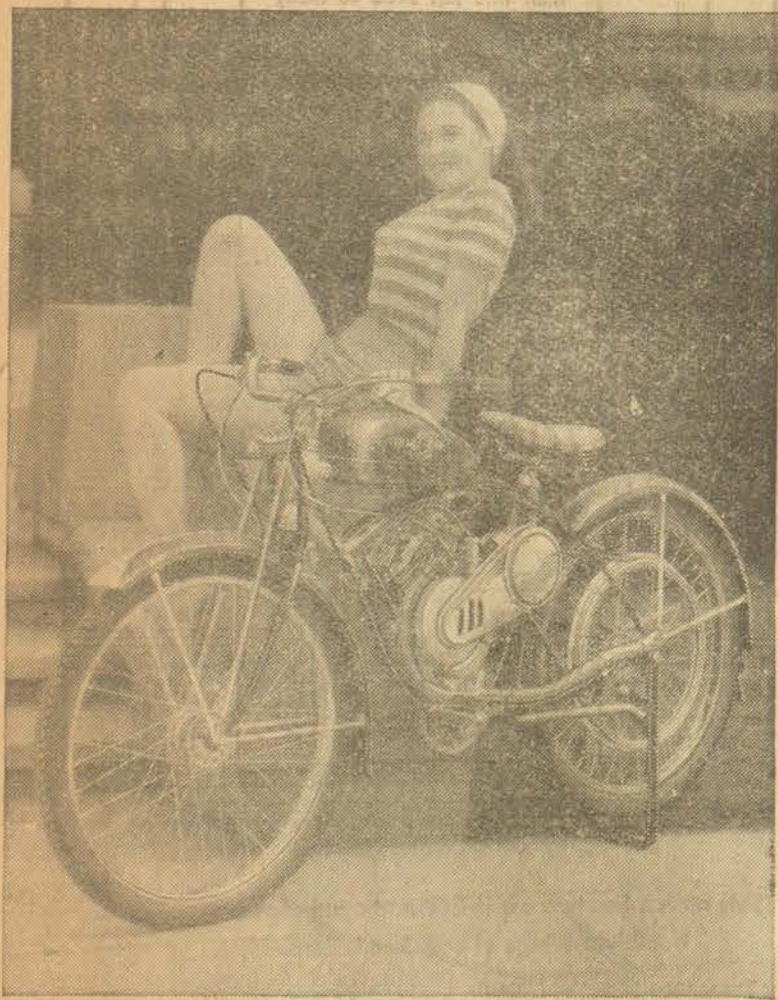

After Bryant's death officers failed to locate Hamilton, but the accused man contacted the Sheriff's office by telephone and promised he would be here Monday morning. This promise he made good. His son was brought to jail here by Deputy Sheriff Steve Hamilton.
All witnesses in the case said, however, that the younger Hamilton merely accompanied his father to and from the scene of the shooting.



LEWIS REVEALS REPORT BACKING \$100 PENSIONS

John L. Lewis made public Saturday a pension expert's report which concluded that the present 10-cent-a-ton royalty on coal could pay 60-year-old miners \$100 a month and still leave a \$210,000,000 fund at the end of 10 years.

The report was prepared by Murray W. Latimer, former chairman of the U.S. Railroad Retirement Board, who was asked by the United Mine Workers to make a study. It attacked a study in the same field by a firm of Philadelphia actuaries hired by Ezra Van Horn, the soft-coal operators' trustee.

For that reason the report was useful to Lewis as part of his word battle with the operators. But it could hardly be used to bolster any move for an increase in the 10-cent royalty in forthcoming contract negotiations.

On the other hand, the operators' report painted a much darker picture of what could be done with 10 cents a ton. The Philadelphia firm said that \$35,000,000 would have to be set aside annually just to finance a \$50 monthly pension for miners over 65 years old.

Lewis has served notice that pensions will be a big issue in negotiations when they get going.

Scheduled negotiations between Lewis and the operators toward a new contract halted abruptly May 20 because Lewis would not agree to seat the representative of the Southern Coal Producers Association. He called it a "propaganda organization."

Latimer said that miners could be made eligible for retirement at 60 instead of 62 as agreed to temporarily by Lewis and Senator Bridges (R., N.H.), the other trustee of the pension fund.

Latimer said that Lewis' original proposal—\$100 a month for miners 60 years old with 20 years' service—would cost \$26,400,000 a year.

He said the current 10-cent royalty, provided in the one-year contract signed last July, would yield \$55,710,000 annually. Of this \$710,000 could be used for administration of the fund. He thought 22,000 miners would retire in the first year.

At that rate, Latimer estimated, the income "will pay all pensions

due in full and with a balance left at the end of 10 years of operation, of more than \$210,000,000."

"On any basis," he said, "there is no reason for delay in activating the miners' pension fund."

Meanwhile, the National Coal Association demanded that Congress put the United Mine Workers under the antitrust laws and forbid collective bargaining on welfare and pension plans.

It said in its weekly bulletin that coal and other industries will ask Congress for such a law "in due course of time."

The coal association said the industry believes that "labor unions should be put under the anti-trust laws and be held responsible for their acts in exactly the same manner as any business group that attempts in any way to interfere with or obstruct the free flow of interstate commerce."

The association said the developments of recent weeks "also clearly demonstrate that the law of the land should be that welfare and pension plans have no place in labor contracts."

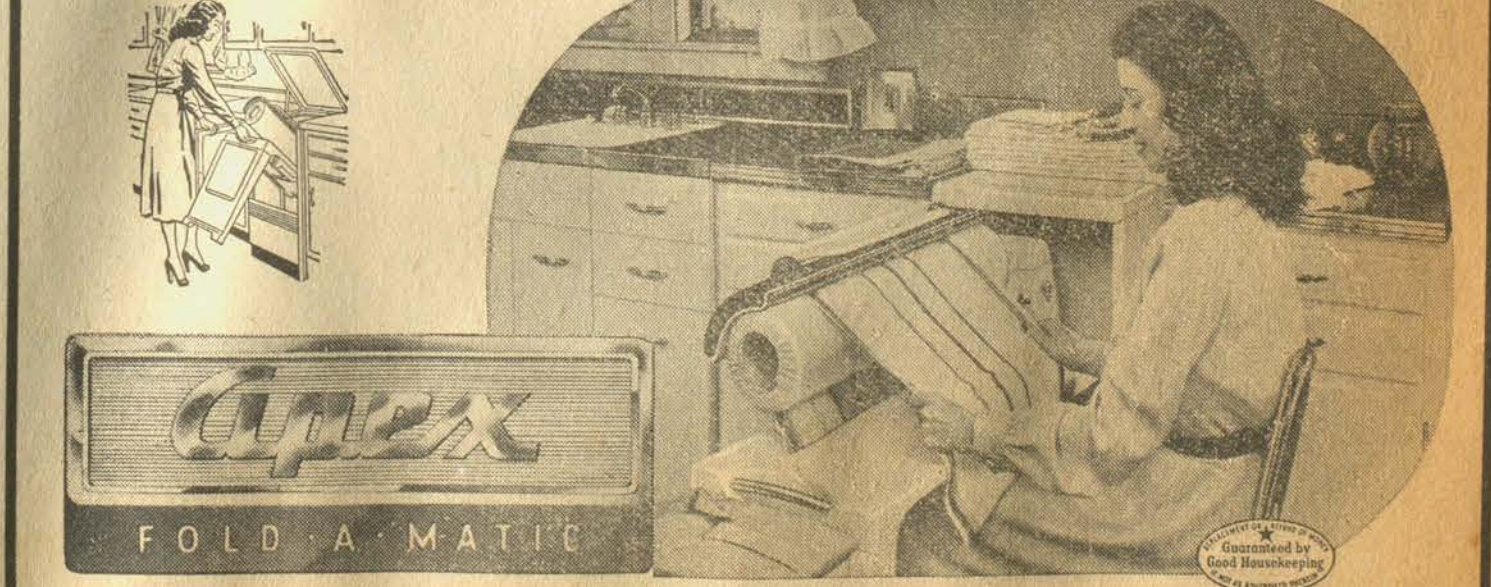

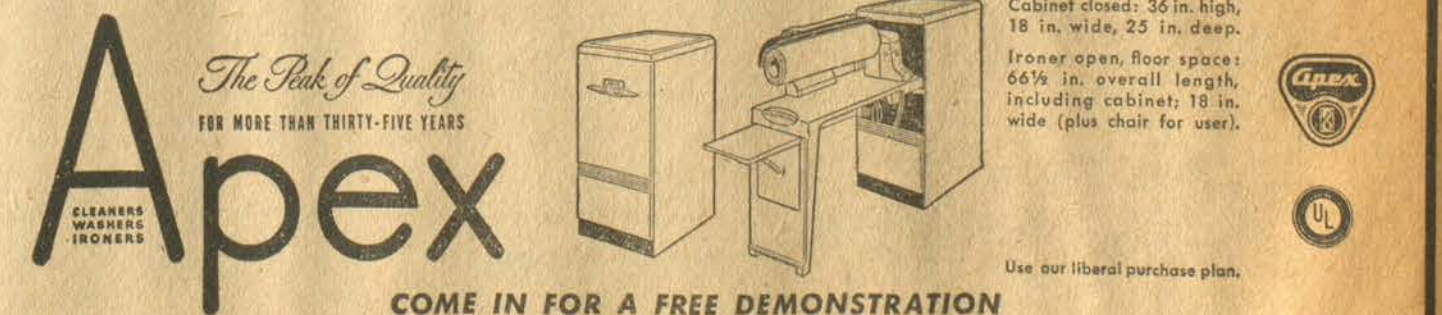

For the fourth consecutive year the Prestonsburg high school Black Cats are in the state baseball tournament at Parkway Field, Louisville, representing the Eastern Kentucky region.

This fourth Louisville trip they won last Saturday at Grayson, defeating Catlettsburg, 6 to 0, as Burchett, strapping Prestonsburg righthander, staged the most spectacular performance of his career.

Pitted against Ed Moore, stellar Gate City righthander, Burchett in the full seven innings permitted only one single, allowed only one ball to be hit to the outfield for an out, and struck out 18 Catlettsburg batters.

Burchett started the game by walking Caldwell, Catlettsburg lead-off man, who was out stealing. Then he struck out the next seven batters in a row. In the third, after fanning the first two batters, Burchett walked Barker and Caldwell fled out to right. The lone hit off his delivery came in the fourth as Caldwell led off with a single. Then came seven more strikeouts in succession.

In the sixth, with one out, Caldwell again walked. The next batter fanned and Caldwell was out stealing. Burchett wound up in a blaze of mound glory by striking out the side in the seventh and final inning.

Prestonsburg scored twice in the first inning when Burkett walked, stole second and came home on Garber's single. Garber was sacrificed to second, advanced to third on an outfield fly, then stole home. Moore held the Cats from that point till the sixth when Burchett singled and went to second as Porter drew a base on balls. Burchett stole third and made the circuit on an error by Childers, the catcher. The last three Prestonsburg runs were in the last inning. Weddington doubled, stole third and scored on the catcher's miscue. Garber tripled and came home as Kirk juggled Childers' grounder. Childers scored on Burchett's double.

The Black Cats go to Louisville for the state tourney June 9 and 10. They reached the finals by defeating Meade Memorial last Friday afternoon, 7 to 2, behind the four-hit pitching of Paul Harmon. In this game Porter and Childers hit homers for Prestonsburg and the outcome was never in doubt.

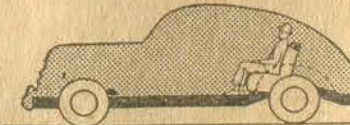
