



Only a Board of Education looking to Prestonsburg vot-ers for support will be able to consider residents of the town their constituents. As matters now stand, with the City Board elected by the voters here, and the County Board elected by persons liv-ing outside Prestonsburg, the school system here is some-thing of a step-child to the County Board.

For this unfortunate state of affairs the County Board members do not deserve all the censure Prestonsburg residents may be inclined to voice. Their failure to meet Prestonsburg's peads while Prestonsburg's needs while attending to those of other schools is quite natural and very human. Men dependent upon votes to retain their po-sition must work where the votes are, it must be conced-ed, if we view the matter from the standpoint of ex-igency or politics. igency or politics.

So the only solution is a final dissolution of the unhappy partnership between the two Boards. Either the City Board should throw the whole thing into the lap of the County Board and cease to exist, or it should acquire the county's interest in the high school here and operate the entire system itself.

Other individuals, by sheer force of circumstances or because of reluctance to adjust their living standards, supplement their current expenditures by dipping into savings, and by using their credit more extensively. In this connection, it might be mentioned, however, that here in the Fourth Federal Reserve District, about 50 per cent of all purchases at department stores are regular charge account sales. Back in 1941, and earlier, the proportion of credit sales was slightly larger than it is today.

Another reason for the high level of sales is the fact that for a large number of people the monthly bill is absorbing a considerably smaller portion of personal income than was the case in prewar times, which leaves that much more to be spent in other ways.

One of the pronounced characteristics of this year's retail business is the changes that have occurred in consumer preferences over the past year. Some kinds of merchandise have pried a considerably larger portion out of consumers' pocketbooks than was the case last year.

Deadline for reports does not affect disabled veterans training under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act farm trainees or veterans in schools of higher learning, VA explained.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I served in the U.S. army durng World War I. Am I eligible for government life insurance now?

A. As a veteran of World War I you are eligible to apply for up to \$10,000 of U.S. Government life insurance, whether or not you took out such insurance while you were in the service or have let such insurance lapse.

Q. Will the government pay funeral expenses for a World War I eteran who dies of a non-servicennected disability?

A. Funeral expenses, up to \$150, vill be paid by the government in he death of any World War I vetran discharged under conditions ther than dishonorable.

The first Kentucky test of the long standing law was brought here by two Glasgow chiropractors, D. H, Mos'er and W.V.N. Stuart, after Barren circuit court had upheld the

Their counsel contended enforcement of the regulation, or barring children from school violates rights guaranteed under state and federal

In addition, it was claimed vaccithe health of the Mosier and Stuart children and that there is no danger of smallpox in Barren county In behalf of Stuart, it was asserted raccination was against his religious

Counsel for Glasgow's Board of Education argued there are always some smallpox cases in the count and that one case in Glasgow migh start an epidemic. Soldiers returnng from foreign lands might bring n a case any time, it was added Glasgow is the seat of Barren coun-

The Board's counsel also stated that Stuart is a Baptist, that there is nothing in the Baptist faith that makes vaccination repugnant, and that "a person can not use his reigion as a cloak to enable him to ndanger his neighbors."

It was added that the United States Supreme Court approved compulsory vaccination regulations in a test case from Massachusetts.
