2-1/2 c. sifted Snow Flour 4 tsp. tartrate or phosphate

1/2 tsp. salt 4 tbsp. fat 2/3 c. milk

Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance, Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to one-half inch thickness. Dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If crusty biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.


