Last week, this office installed an offset press at a cost of approximately \$2,800.

That's the well-known chicken-feed alongside the \$25,000,000 Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company says it is spending in new telephone facilities in Kentucky. But to a one-hoss outfit such as is admittedly ours, it's more.

Here's where The Floyd County Times and Southern Bell differ: Southern Bell says it needs to raise its rates to pay for all these new facilities.

The Floyd County Times says it needs the business necessary to work out the money to pay for its press. And it does not propose to raise prices to do this. Whatever raises it makes will be based on rising cost of materials, and such raises would have been necessary, even more necessary, were we printing on a Washington hand-press.

Let's put it another way: The telephone company's new facilities and The Floyd County Times' new press are necessities in the business of serving the public. Both, it is expected, are intended to earn money for the purchasers. Both are capital investments which, at least in our case, could have been shunned.

Neither should be paid for through higher rates charged simply because these improvements were made.

JEEP DRIVER
BADLY HURT

In Crash with Bus
Driven by Wells
Monday Evening

Zora Patrick, 32-year-old Knott county miner, is in a serious condition at Hurst-Snyder hospital, Hazard, as the result of internal injuries suffered early Monday night when his jeep collided with a Sparks Brothers bus driven by W. E. (Everett) Wells, of Prestonsburg.

The collision occurred near Clear Creek, Knott county, 10 miles west of Hindman. Thrown from the bus into a ditch by impact of the smash-up, Wells sustained an injured leg and two of five passengers on the bus, Mrs. Winnie Combs, of Elmrock, and Mollie Noble, of Vest, were slightly hurt. Patrick, a resident of Montgomery Creek, was cut and bruised as both his jeep and the bus were badly wrecked.

Wells said he was driving at a speed of about 30 miles an hour and was slowing down for a curve, approximately 100 feet away, when the jeep driven by Patrick came around the curve on the wrong side of the highway. "About 20 feet of me, he cut to the right and the jeep was in the middle of the line of the road, and then cut back to the left and hit my bus in the middle," Wells' statement to state police authorities said.

Barring complications, Patrick is expected to recover. State police headquarters at Hazard said they had not procured sufficient evidence to fix responsibility for the wreck.

SANITY TEST
FAILS WEBB

Martin Slayer Awaits
Trial at Inez Monday;
Term To End Dec. 4th

A move to have Columbus Webb, former West Virginia convict now held in the Floyd county jail for safekeeping declared insane failed Monday and he will go on trial next Monday in the Martin circuit court at Inez for the recent murder of Lige Davis.

Alice Davis, an aunt of the accused man, filed a petition asking a sanity hearing. The hearing was held and Webb was examined by two Martin county physicians. He was declared sane.

Upon entering the courtroom Monday morning, the defendant declared in tones audible through the courtroom that he wanted to enter a plea of guilty. He also said others were guilty in the slaying and he would like to see them brought to justice, but identity of such persons has not been established.

Also slated for trial Monday is Elbert Copley who was indicted last week in the death of Harvey Fraley. These are the only two murder cases before the court, Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill said.

Webb's victim was found on Wolf Creek, Sept. 28, hidden behind a log. The current court term at Inez, the first in which Judge Hill and Commonwealth's Attorney John Chris Cornett have taken part under the new redistricting act held valid last Friday, will end Dec. 4.

Form Hospital Council
At Meeting Held Here

13 HOSPITALS
REPRESENTED
BY COUNCIL

Group Names Ashley
President; Archer
To Be Successor

Representatives of 13 hospitals in eight towns of this section organized the Eastern Kentucky Hospital Council at a meeting held Friday at the Prestonsburg General hospital. Formation of the Council, it was said, constitutes the first recognized organization of a hospital group in this section having an alliance with a strong central group. The Council will be a part of the Kentucky Hospital Council.

The Rev. Thomas B. Ashley, superintendent of the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, was named president, and Dr. George P. Archer, of the Prestonsburg General hospital, was chosen president-elect, to succeed Dr. Ashley next year. Sister Mary Edgar, of Our Lady of the Way hospital, Martin, was elected first vice-president; Sister Mary Gabriel, of Hazard, second vice-president, and Mr. Hogan, secretary-treasurer.

Future heads of the Council will be named as elected officials advance from year to year.

Formation of the branch in this section completes the organization of all Kentucky hospitals in a group with not only state but also national influence. The Council, it was explained, will maintain hospital standards and through its meetings will jointly discuss and attack hospital and regional problems and improve hospital facilities.

Hospitals represented at Friday's meeting are the two in Hazard, two in Martin, three in Paintsville, two in Louisa and one each in Prestonsburg, Lackey, Pikeville and Jenkins.

OFFICIAL LEAD
FOR TRUMAN

In Kentucky Placed
At 125,546 Ballots;
Perkins Lead, 13,706

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 22—President Truman beat his Republican opponent, Thomas E. Dewey, by 125,546.

The official totals, tabulated today, also gave the Democratic President a majority of 110,854 over all six of his opponents. Totals in the vice-presidential race, in which Senator Alben W. Barkley, of Paducah, ran with Truman, were by law the same as for President.

Truman's total was 466,756 and Dewey's 341,210. Representative Virgil Chapman, Democrat, was elected to the U. S. Senate by 24,480 majority over John Sherman Cooper, Republican incumbent. Chapman's total was 408,256 and Cooper's 383,776.

In this race W. A. Sandefur, Socialist, got 1,232 votes; H. G. Standfield, Progressive, 924; David R. Cox, Socialist-Labor, 254; John Young Brown, 26; O. G. Gains, 1. The Brown and Gains votes were "write-ins."

In the Presidential race, J. Strom Thurmond, States' Righter, ran third with 10,411 votes. Other candidates received: Henry Wallace, Progressive, 1,567; Norman Thomas, Socialist, 1,284; Claude W. Watson, Prohibitionist, 1,245; and Edward A. Teichert, Socialist-Labor, 185.

Included in the totals are the Bourbon county votes which were reported officially to Secretary of State George Glenn Hatcher before the ballots were impounded by federal court order for an investigation of ballot-box stuffing. Hatcher explained he received no official notice of seizure of the ballots.

Appellate Court Clerk Charles K. O'Connell, chairman of the State Board of Election Commissioners, said its members agreed to accept the Bourbon votes in certifying the winners. He explained the board lacked official notice of any federal action and added: "The winners' majorities would not be affected even if Bourbon were thrown out."

Official totals in the Congressional race in the Seventh district: Carl D. Perkins, Democrat, 39,783; W. Howes Meade, Republican incumbent, 26,077; Barney W. Baker, two write-ins.

Court of Appeals, Seventh Appellate District: Roy Helm, Democrat, 87,262; Eugene E. Siler, Republican incumbent, 73,836.

McCALL LAUDS
MINING DEPT.

Tells Sisk Personnel
Best in 20 Years; Cost
Removing Bodies, \$3,500

The State Department of Mines and Minerals, headed by A. D. Sisk, who for years was secretary of the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Association, has the best personnel "the Department has had in 20 years," in the opinion of M. C. McCall, Birmingham, Ala., supervising engineer, District D, United States Bureau of Mines.

McCall wrote Mr. Sisk, chief of the Department of Mines and Minerals, expressing thanks for courtesies shown and co-operation extended U. S. Bureau of Mines personnel during the recent recovery of 20 bodies from Belva No. 1 mine, Kentucky Straight Creek Coal Company, Four Mile, Bell county.

The bodies had been in the mine since an explosion December 26, 1945, which trapped 31 miners in the mine. Eleven bodies were removed from the mine at the time by rescue workers. The others could not be reached due to raging fires.

"I think you and your department have a justifiable right to be proud of the smoothness and expediency shown in the recovery of these bodies," McCall wrote Sisk. "I was very favorably impressed with the personnel of your department. I have had some connect on with the Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals off and on for a period of 20 years, and I am honestly of the opinion that the present personnel is the best the department has had in this 20 years."

"I was very much impressed with the calibre of men on the force and was very pleased with their willingness to work at a dangerous and extremely unpleasant task."

The mine was penetrated October 18, after an ailing out period, the bodies located and the last one removed October 21.

Cost of removing the bodies was less than \$3,500, too, according to Sisk, who explained that following a ruling that the \$100,000 legislative appropriation was unconstitutional, that a local committee in Pineville raised \$4,625 with which to accomplish the task of removing the bodies.

COST, \$75,000

Glogora Coal Company
Installs Equipment
To Clean Product

The Glogora Coal Company expects to begin operation at Glo within the next two weeks new tipple machinery and improvements made at an outlay of \$75,000. J. S. Hampton, superintendent, said this week. One new steel section has been added to the original tipple structure. Mechanical equipment added includes two vibrators, shakers and three conveyors. The improvements increase the capacity of the tipple to 1,200 tons daily.

Court Session Lasts
After Dark Monday;
Trials Draw Many

Two drunk driving trials and the widespread interest in both extended Monday's county court session past nightfall. The Anderson case developed from a collision with the auto of the Rev. Gilbert Adams. Anderson claimed he was not the driver, that he was in the rear seat of the car at the time of the collision and that the force of the impact threw him into the front seat, beneath the wheel.

Buoyant Stock Leads
Officer to Capture
Of Two in Looting

When Deputy Sheriff Ike Case, hot on the trail of two suspected of breaking and entering a Betsy Layne lunch stand, arrived at a home near Harold Wednesday, he found one of the two pushing something into a washtub filled with water.

Investigation disclosed the tub held between \$8 and \$9 in silver said to have been taken from the restaurant. This lay at the bottom of the water, but some chewing gum dumped also into the tub persisted in floating; hence, the occupation of the person at the tub.

Mike Smith, aged about 24, and Gene Meade, a teen-ager, were arrested and jailed here.

Also taken from the restaurant, it was said, was a cedar chest and other articles.

Stephens Asks Seizure
While Investigation
Made of Election

All ballots and other records of the November 2 presidential election in Bourbon county were impounded Friday by the federal government while it investigates the stuffing of ballot boxes.

U. S. District Attorney Claude P. Stephens, of Prestonsburg, said he asked a court order to seize the records after it had been determined federal election laws were being violated.

He said certain individuals are under suspicion as the result of an F. B. I. investigation now in progress, but said no names could be mentioned immediately.

Deputy U. S. Marshal J. M. Moore went to Paris Friday and picked up all the ballot boxes, ballots, stubs, stub books, tally sheets, and other records. They were taken to the district clerk's office in Lexington for safekeeping and investigation by federal agents.

Tabulators reported finding 254 forged ballots in the boxes, all carrying a straight Democratic vote, except one scratched against U. S. Senator-Elect Virgil Chapman, who lives in Bourbon county.

Federal Judge H. Church Ford issued the order to impound on a motion by Stephens.

The District Attorney's motion said fictitious ballots were cast "with the intent to increase the Democratic vote for the candidates for President and United States Senator and thereby dilute and affect the Republican votes cast for Republican candidates."

Stephens said the F. B. I. probably will turn over to him its findings when the investigation is completed. Warrants would be issued for those charged with complicity. They would be arraigned before the U. S. Commissioner in Lexington for preliminary action pending the next session of the grand jury, he said.

KNOTT, FLOYD
SEPARATION
TO STAND

Cornett Still Given
'A Reasonable Time'
To Change Residence

The last word was said Friday on the judicial redistricting bill affecting this section, and that word, spoken by the Court of Appeals, was that the 1948 act of the Legislature stands.

Thus were separated Floyd and Knott counties in the 31st judicial district and Floyd paired with Martin county, with Knott going into the 36th district with Magoffin.

The decision followed oral arguments at Frankfort recently, with J. D. Harkins, Sr., and Joe Hobson, Prestonsburg attorneys, arguing against the legislation as representatives of Commonwealth's Attorney John Chris Cornett, Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill and other officials affected by the act.

The controversial measure, fought in the Legislature and in the courts by officials and attorneys of this section, makes Boyd county a separate district with a court of continuous session in Ashland.

The Appellate decision, written by Commissioner Clay, explained that, despite the continuous session provided by the act for Ashland, three terms may be held in Catlettsburg, the county seat. ("Continuous" is defined in Webster's dictionary as "joined without intervening space; without cessation or interruption.")

In addition to the changes affecting Floyd and neighboring counties and Boyd county, the act makes these judicial district rearrangements:

The 24th district will consist of Johnson and Lawrence counties. Lawrence formerly was in the 32nd with Boyd, which retains the number 32.

The 25th drops Powell county, but retains Clark, Jessamine, and Madison counties.

The 36th, which was Breathitt, Magoffin and Wolfe, now consists of Magoffin and Knott.

The new district, the 39th, consists of Wolfe and Breathitt from the old 36th and Powell from the old 25th.

The circuit judge for the 39th is Ervine Turner, Jackson. He was appointed to the post last summer by Governor Earle Clements after Franklin circuit court upheld the act. Douglas Graham, of Campton, was named Commonwealth's Attorney for the district by Clements.

Both were elected to their offices on November 2.

The Appellate Court gave John Chris Cornett, Commonwealth's Attorney for the old 31st, and J. Blaine Clark, Commonwealth's Attorney for the old 24th, a "reasonable time" to move into their new districts or forfeit their jobs.

Cornett lives in Knott county and will move to Floyd or Martin. Clark lives in Martin and will have to shift to either Johnson or Lawrence.

The high court did not specify what constitutes a reasonable time and left the question open.

On its way through the Legislature, the redistricting bill was attacked on the grounds it was drawn to create a judgeship for Turner.

But the high court did not question the Legislature's intent. Under the Constitution, the General Assembly may make a county a separate judicial district if the county has a population of 40,000, including a city of 20,000, the opinion said.

Boyd county meets these specifications. The Legislature was within its rights in making Boyd a separate district, the decision continued. When Lawrence county was shorn from Boyd, a realignment of other districts had to be accomplished, it said.

The act directed that a term of court of Knott county should start on June 14. But the act did not become effective until June 17. Thus, Knott was deprived of one of the three circuit court terms to which it is entitled annually.

Wrote Commissioner Clay: "We must take a practical view of this matter. The June, 1948, term of court in Knott county is now lost and gone forever. To declare the act unconstitutional could never restore this particular term. For the future, the Constitutionally required three terms, are established. This was the second 1948 redistricting act approved by the high court. Several weeks ago it upheld an act making Harlan and Pike counties separate districts.

RABBITS CAN BE DANGEROUS ANIMALS

As the hunting season opened Saturday, the State Department of health warned hunters and their families they may be exposed to the very real danger of tularemia. "The necessity of acquainting the people of the state with the seriousness of this disease, and of providing them with information about methods of preventing it cannot be overemphasized," said Dr. Bruce Underwood, State Health Commissioner.

Dr. Underwood pointed out that: Tularemia, also known as "rabbit fever," appears most often in Kentucky during the hunting season. This, together with the fact that domestic rabbits have not been known to be a source of infection, would seem to indicate that the person most frequently exposed is the hunter or the member of his family who cleans the rabbits he kills. Since more cases are reported among women than among men, we may infer that infection most often occurs in the cleaning and dressing of the carcass in preparation for cooking. The blood of the diseased animal contains germs which enter the human body through small scratches or cuts on or about the hands. Less frequently, the germs may gain entry to the bloodstream by way of the mouth when poorly cooked meat of infected rabbits is eaten. For this reason it is absolutely necessary that the meat be cooked slowly and thoroughly, so that no trace of blood or red meat remains. Proper cooking and sufficient heat will destroy any germs present.

Statistics furnished by the division of Epidemiology, State Department of Health, plainly show that tularemia should be cause for genuine concern, and should be carefully guarded against at all times. Over a 10-year period, the average number of reported cases per year in Kentucky was found to be 72. Three of the cases reported for 1947 resulted in death.

The only sure way to combat this disease is to prevent it. If everyone who handles wild rabbits is thorough and conscientious in following a few simple rules for avoidance of infection, we may see a substantial drop in the number of cases this year. If, however, there is cause for

the slightest suspicion that the disease may have been contracted, the family physician should be called at once. He will be able to confirm his diagnosis by means of blood tests, and there is more chance of successful treatment of tularemia if it is reached by the doctor in its early stages.

In an effort to call this problem to the attention of as many people as possible, the State Department of Health has, this year, prepared cards of warning of the danger of tularemia, and has requested county clerks to distribute them with all hunting licenses purchased. The cards give five simple precautions to observe in the hunting and handling of wild rabbits. They are:

1. Shoot your rabbits on the run. A lazy rabbit may be a sick rabbit.
2. Never handle a rabbit found dead, or brought in by a dog or cat.
3. Always wear rubber gloves when dressing a rabbit.
4. If the internal organs of the rabbit show small white spots, throw it away. It may be infected.
5. Cook rabbits thoroughly so that no red meat or blood remains. Cooking destroys germs.

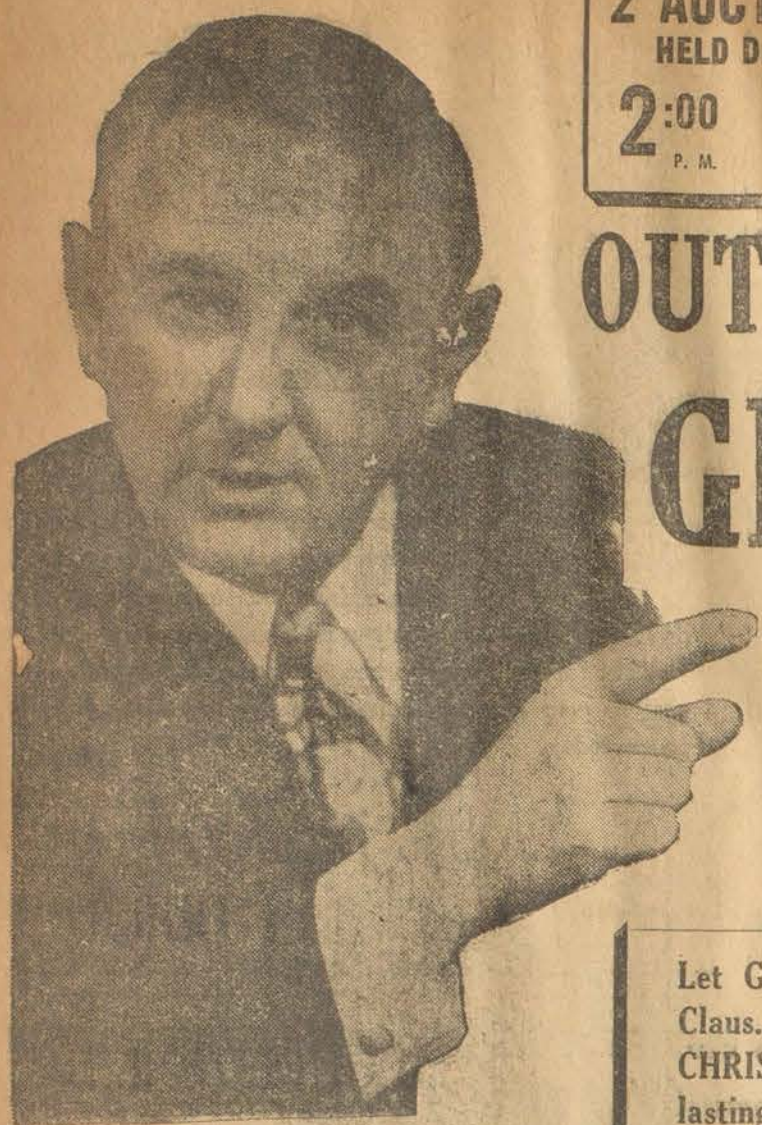

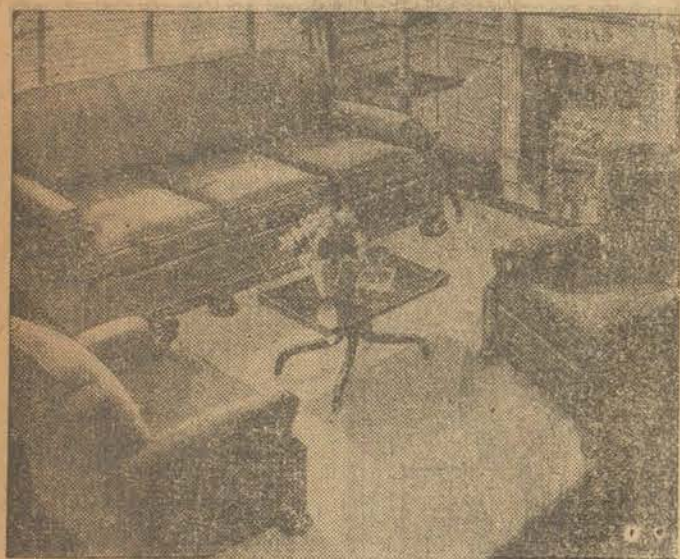

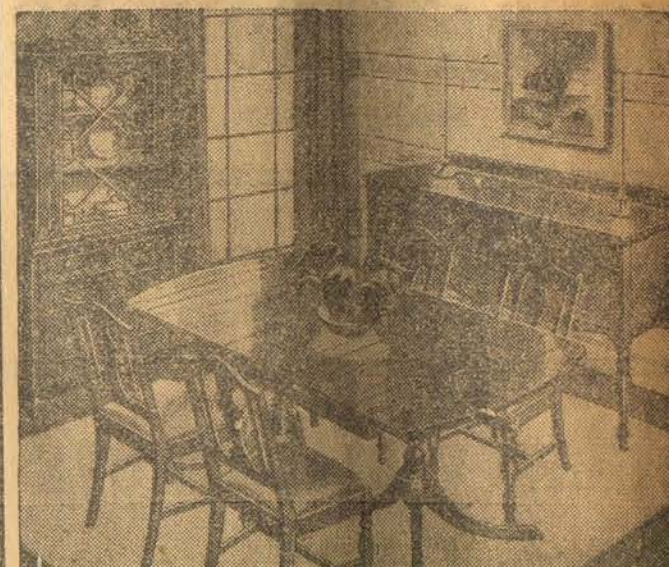

Look Elsewhere, Mr. Ferguson!
WHILE the Ferguson committee's sleuths were giving the boys in Floyd and Knott counties the jaundiced stare during the recent election, high-jinks were happening around at unsuspected and unguarded points.

So flagrant were the election law violations in Bourbon county, down in the Bluegrass, while Ferguson's minions were eyeing the political game here in the mountains that now the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the federal courts and numerous others are interested. While all this was going on, Senator Ferguson himself was being re-elected from the state of Michigan under circumstances which may result in a Congressional investigation.

The Times proudly reports that in the meantime the Ferguson investigators were racking up to a disappointment hereabouts. They found Floyd and Knott counties engaged in the good, old American business of conducting an election such as Bourbon county and the state of Michigan should have conducted. Time was when Floyd county needed, at election-time, a small army of investigators, followed by a regiment of iron prosecutors. Those days—now gone forever, we hope—saw ballot boxes stuffed, stolen, looted. Precincts were "set up"; the individual voter and his wishes counted for little. Now, however, Floyd county compares favorably with any in Kentucky in the matter of elections. Vigilance must yet be practised—we have not reached that political millennium yet when either one party or one individual can be trusted with the political fortunes of others—but the days when skulduggery at the polls was the rule rather than the exception are, happily, no more.

The Times mentions this improvement with the thought of commending the men and women of this county who at a sacrifice serve as election officers and perform a very real service to their county, state and country by so conducting elections that the people's wishes in the matter are regarded more than those of one or more politicians.

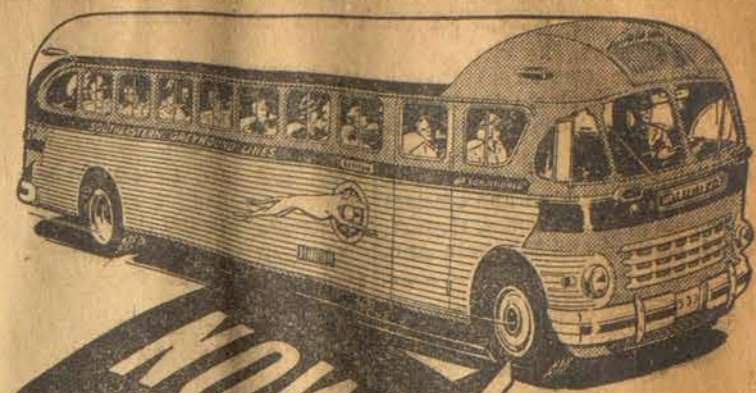

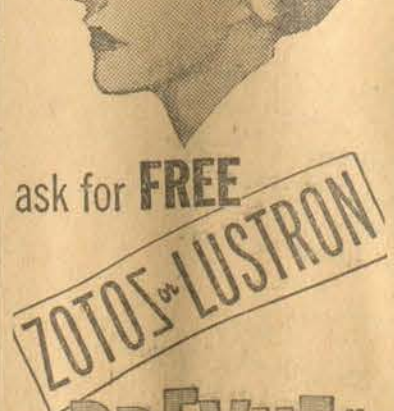

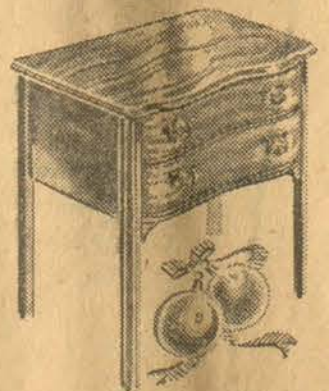
