**Funk Says Failure  
To Bracket Names  
Is Law Violation**

Some Kentucky counties have violated the law in printing the November 2 ballots, according to Attorney General A. E. Funk.

He based his view on information from Edward F. Seiler, Democratic state campaign chairman. The latter advised the Attorney General that some counties—not identified—failed to inclose in brackets the names of the presidential and vice-presidential candidates of the same political party.

Citing Kentucky election laws, Funk said failure to use brackets, which assures both candidates being voted for as one, "in my opinion is a violation of the law." Then he added:

"It is my opinion that if the ballots are sent to a precinct on election day, where the candidate for President and Vice-President are not in the same bracket, that the election officers of the county should count the vote for either the President or Vice-President as a vote for both, and that they should be so tabulated as to give the electors of that political party or organization a complete vote for said electors."

Under Kentucky law, a ballot would be void if a voter stamped "X" for the presidential candidate of one party and the vice-presidential candidate of another. But that point was not covered specifically in the opinion.

At least two counties in the Seventh Congressional district were reported last week as having printed their ballots without the bracket. Floyd county was not one of these.

**STITH LOSES  
GAME FIGHT**

James O. Stith, 25-year-old railway brakeman, lost his valiant battle for life Monday morning, 10 days after he had lost a leg and had been partially dismembered in an accident at Martin.

The former Ashland high school athlete and native of Martin died at the Beaver Valley hospital. His condition had been critical since his injury, and last Thursday his other leg, which had been crushed, was amputated in an effort to save his life. From this second operation he rallied gamely but pneumonia developed Sunday night.

He was injured October 15 when he either missed the step on the water tank of a moving train or slipped from the step. Before other trainmen learned what had happened, he had been dragged a distance of approximately 40 feet. One leg was severed, the other crushed, and a sand pipe had penetrated his abdomen. Forty-five minutes were required, it was said, for workmen to extricate him.

He was a veteran of World War II.

**CHILD DIES  
'NEATH WALL**

At the Carter & Callihan Funeral Home here today (Thursday) was the body of 10-year-old Rocky Craft, son of Mr. and Mrs. Allan Craft, who was crushed and asphyxiated Sunday night when the walls of a Rochester, N. Y., building collapsed on him and his parents.

Craft sustained a dislocated shoulder and a bruised chest and his wife, Barbara, 18, stepmother of the boy, sustained head injuries.

The couple and the boy had gone to the home of Ambers Nelson, also a former Prestonsburg man, for a Sunday evening visit and were leaving, walking between the Nelson home and a story-and-a-half concrete and tile wall of a ruined home when the wall suddenly collapsed, trapping all three. The tragedy occurred in what is known as Cannery Row, structures erected for temporary use in World War I, and now rented to seasonal cannery workers by the Webster Canning & Preserving Company at a rental of \$1 a week.

The Crafts, the Nelsons and the Morgan Rose family are among those from this county who have been employed there by the cannery industry. And since their arrival in Rochester, it was said, misfortune has hounded them.

"We had nothing but bad luck since we got here," said Jefferson Nelson, brother of Ambers. First, Nelson's two daughters, aged 3 and 5, were burned severely when a kettle of scalding water toppled onto them. After that, another child in the neighborhood fell into a nearby waste hole. Then Sunday night's tragedy.

Surviving the victim, besides the parents, is a brother, Loren, 5.

**COURT CURBS  
GAS, OTHER  
PURCHASES**

The Floyd fiscal court gasped almost in chorus Monday when it received at its special meeting here a bill of more than \$1,000 from one service station supplying gasoline, oil and accessories for road machinery. Immediately steps were taken. The big step:

An order, unanimously voted, forbidding purchases from filling stations against the county's credit, unless such purchases are by an order of the County Judge or one of the county's four Magistrates.

This one statement, covering a period of less than three months, is by no means all the fuel costs incurred over the county at service stations by machinery operators, it was pointed out by officials.

The itemized statement showed, authorities said, that one truck operator signed purchase slips for approximately 300 gallons of gasoline at Imes' Service Station, Allen, last month. As much as 27 gallons of gasoline was bought in one day, and 30 gallons were purchased in two days, August 30 and 31, for an air compressor.

The county has two dump trucks and an air compressor operated by gasoline. Its graders and bulldozers operate on diesel oil.

What further investigation will be made of the purchases was not indicated.

Contract for construction of the Ivel bridge was awarded to Roy Hughey on his bid of \$1,500. This was the original bid received at an earlier court meeting. Further bids were asked and the two additional bids exceeded the original.

The court authorized County Attorney W. W. Burchett to advertise for bids to be received till November 8 on construction of a low-water bridge across Right Beaver Creek at the mouth of Steele's Creek.

Ireland Thompson, 87 years old, died Saturday at his home at Wonder, victim of a paralytic stroke.

He was a life-long resident of the Johns Creek section, and was a farmer. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Louann Scaff Thompson, four sons and four daughters, Burley Thompson, of Auxier, Dewey, Harley, Chester, Mary Belle, Susan, Frances and Tennessee.

His funeral was conducted Sunday by the Rev. Henry Crider and burial in the family cemetery was made under direction of the Carter & Callihan Funeral Home.

**UMWA Sends Fourteen  
To California; Four  
From District 30**

Fourteen more paraplegic members of the United Mine Workers of America—10 from District 28 of the UMWA, and four from District 30—entrained at Norton, Va., today (Thursday) for hospitalization in California.

For these 14 men whose spinal columns were severed in mining accidents, the trip will symbolize hope for the future when once again they may perhaps become useful, productive citizens of their home communities.

Physical and vocational rehabilitation at the Permanent Hospital for the men has been arranged for by officials of the UMWA welfare fund. The hospital, part of the Kabat-Kaiser Institute, is located at Vallejo, California.

Accompanying the men on their 2,500-mile, cross-country journey will be Dr. Phillip Woods, of the medical staff of the UMWA Welfare and Retirement Fund. A special Pullman car will carry the group to California.

The miners from District 30 were taken to Norton, Va., by ambulance to be placed aboard the special car. The four District 30 miners are: T. Alan Slone, 31, Garner; Lawrence Watts, 52, Kona; Sam McKenzie, Lookout; Linville Wicker, 56, Wayland.

**Justice Arraignment

**Middle Creek Store  
Burns, Plant Here  
Damaged by Blaze**

The store and living quarters of T. J. Fitzpatrick at the junction of the Middle Creek and David roads, near here, with all contents of the building, were destroyed by fire at 9:30 Sunday night.

The loss, which was only partially insured, was estimated at \$5,000. Mr. and Mrs. Fitzpatrick, sleeping in an upstairs room, were roused barely in time to escape. Cause of the fire was not determined, though wiring to a freezer unit was suspected.

Here Wednesday afternoon, the frozen foods storage plant being installed by Miss Jo Pack was a hot spot for a few minutes as a smoldering fire caused damage.

**HALL, OTHERS  
BEGIN TERMS**

Albert Hall, former Floyd county deputy sheriff, was taken Tuesday to the LaGrange reformatory to begin serving a 21-year sentence given him recently by a jury of the Floyd circuit court on his guilty plea in connection with the slaying at Wheelwright last year of Bill Bryant.

With him two other prisoners were taken. These are Robie Harmon, convicted of storehouse breaking, and Ironton Vance, child desertion—both for one year.

Brought here Tuesday for safekeeping from Martin county was Ray C. Perry, charged with cutting and wounding with intent to kill.

**RAILWAY MAY  
BE DEFENDANT**

The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company can be prosecuted for bootlegging even as a private individual is, the Attorney General's office said, in effect, last week.

Assistant Attorney General William F. Simpson has given that opinion to J. A. Runyon, Commonwealth's Attorney at Pikeville. State law prohibits sale of liquor and beer in legally dry territory, Simpson said, adding that that includes sales on trains.

In his query, Runyon said law enforcement officers in Pikeville and Pike county are meeting increased trouble with drunks since the county voted dry. One man brought into Pikeville police court on a charge of being intoxicated said he bought the stimulants while on board the C. & O. train operating between Ashland and Elkhorn City.

The entire route of this train is through dry territory, Runyon noted. The agents, servants and the company itself are subject to prosecution for violating the no-sale in dry territory law, Simpson said.

In another opinion, Simpson said members of a Veterans of Foreign Wars post in Ohio county, which is legally dry territory, may keep beer in a private locker in the clubhouse but they cannot be made to pay a five-cents-a-bottle cooling charge. This statement went to Otto W. Martin, Commonwealth's Attorney at Hartford.

The beer can be placed in the locker if it is to be consumed by club members, he added. The cooling fee would be illegal because the law forbids anyone from handling beer in any manner for the use and benefit of another person in dry territory, Simpson said.

Call the state cops, he suggested to I. H. Baker, Slade, Powell county, in another opinion. Baker said a motion picture theatre there draws an "undesirable gang of bootleggers" on Saturday night, causing a nuisance. Local officers and the Sheriff's force don't have the man-power to keep a steady watch on the place, Baker said.

Simpson said an injunction might be obtained to close down the show in the grounds it is a nuisance. If that fails, the Sheriff can request assistance from the state police, he added.

G. E. Childers, assistant trainmaster for the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway at Ashland, formerly of Allen and Martin, has been promoted to terminal trainmaster, according to an announcement received from the Cleveland office of the company.

**Attorney General Rules  
Policeman Must Reside  
In Town Where Working**

An assistant to Attorney General A. E. Funk ruled recently, in response to an inquiry from this county, that a policeman employed by a town of the sixth class must be a bona fide resident of the town in which he is employed.

The ruling recalled to attorneys here that the same law governs cities of the fourth class, such as Prestonsburg. Emergency legislation to meet conditions during the war, however, permitted the employment of officers outside the corporate limits of such towns. It is not known if the emergency statute still prevails.

**BIG STRIKES  
HASTEN LINE**

Natural gas from three new wells in the Bee Tree Fork field, near Royaltown, Magoffin county, one of them said to be the largest ever struck in Eastern Kentucky, will be flowing soon to industrial plants in Ashland and Olive Hill, Ky., and Huntington, W. Va.

The Inland Gas Company, Ashland, announced it is speeding work on a 2½-mile pipe line from its mains serving the Royaltown and the Bee Tree Fork area. Inland serves only industrial firms.

The main objective is the third and largest of the wells, brought in recently by W. David Compton and Associates, drilling concern of near Louisa.

When the well was brought in recently, the roar of escaping gas could be heard for several miles. It continued to disturb the sleep of the isolated district for more than a week until it was capped.

Compton, who made the original strike in the field, spends virtually all his waking hours at the scene. He could not be reached for an estimate of the third well's production.

However, an experienced gas man in Prestonsburg said its flow was gauged at "more than 20,000,000" cubic feet a day. The estimates ranged to 22,000,000.

The derrick stands along the creek of the wooded district about six miles from Iynton.

Compton's original well was gauged at 10,000,000 cubic feet a day, and since then, another, the Endicott, was struck and gauged at 19,000,000.

The Compton No. 2, largest of all in this or any other Kentucky field now producing, blew in at 2,800 feet.

Several other wells are now being drilled in the field. Virtually the entire district is under lease as a result of the scramble that followed the first strike.

Oil and gas men decline to make any predictions about the future of the field. But they doubt that it will be long-lived.

They base their pessimism on results in the near-by Royaltown field, along Board Tree Fork, about five miles away. It is on the downgrade after little more than a year of furious activity.

Some 45 derricks, most of them erected by Raymond Long, Salyersville, still dot the field, and the volume of gas still produced is heavy. But oil men said a definite decline has set in.

VIE FOR VOTE  
NEXT TUESDAY**

Democratic and Republican forces, from the heads of the national tickets down to precinct workers, worked this week in preparation for the showdown at the voting places of the county next Tuesday.

At Pikeville Saturday, Kentucky's veteran Senator Alben W. Barkley, Democratic candidate for the Vice-Presidency, addressed a crowd estimated at 2,600, with many Floyd county Democrats in the crowd. Appealing for a straight Democratic vote, he assailed the Republican leadership. Of the Taft-Hartley Act he said, "I would vote to repeal it tomorrow, if I had the opportunity."

U.S. Senator John Sherman Cooper addressed the voters in Paintsville in behalf of the Republican ticket Wednesday.

A scheduled appearance here Monday of Congressman Rivers for States Righters was not filled.

Meanwhile, local Democratic speakers continued to address gatherings in various communities of the county.

School board races in Prestonsburg and in three educational divisions of the county were expected to draw a better-than-average vote to the polls Tuesday.

Next in point of local interest is the race between Carl D. Perkins, Hindman Democrat, and W. Howes Meade, Paintsville Republican, for the Seventh district Congressional post.

**CITY WET-DRY  
POLLS LEGAL**

Judge Winn's decision in Montgomery Court; Returns Contested

Constitutionality of the 1948 law permitting cities of the first four population classes to hold local-option elections separate from the counties has been upheld by Circuit Judge John J. Winn in Montgomery circuit court.

Judge Winn's decision was handed down in overruling a demurrer by dry forces in a suit filed by Mt. Sterling wets. The suit contested the result of a local-option election last month in which Mount Sterling voted dry by seven votes.

The dry's demurrer attacked the law as being unconstitutional, saying it violated four sections of the state charter.

Meanwhile Judge Winn recessed hearing of the election-contest suit until the second week in November. Thirty-eight witnesses called by the wets were heard prior to the recess. The drys expect to call witnesses later.

**POWER RATES  
HIT BY ELLIS**

Representative of REA Says Kentucky Costs Among U.S. Highest

Wholesale electric power rates in Kentucky are about twice as high as they should be, a national R.E.A. official said in Louisville Sunday.

Clyde T. Ellis, Washington, general manager of R.E.A., said Kentucky is a "power desert," although it sits on top of coal fields and most of its rivers run unharnessed toward the sea.

The state's power rates, he said, are among the highest in the U.S. Rates are lower, he pointed out, in an area of the Southwest into which the R.E.A. has to haul coal to generate power.

Ellis was in Louisville to address a regional meeting of the National Rural Electric Co-Operative Association.

Citing a report that nearly half of Kentucky's farms still lack electric power, Ellis said R.E.A. means a new life to farm families. City people, he said, do not realize the difference rural power can make.

To give an idea of what rural electricity has meant in Kentucky, some of the changes it has brought were enumerated by Seth Thompson, public-relations officer for the Kentucky Rural Electric Co-Operative Corporation.

The county seats of McKee in Jackson and Booneville in Owsley county had no electric power before the co-op came. Thompson said. Stores, offices and homes alike relied on oil and gas lamps.

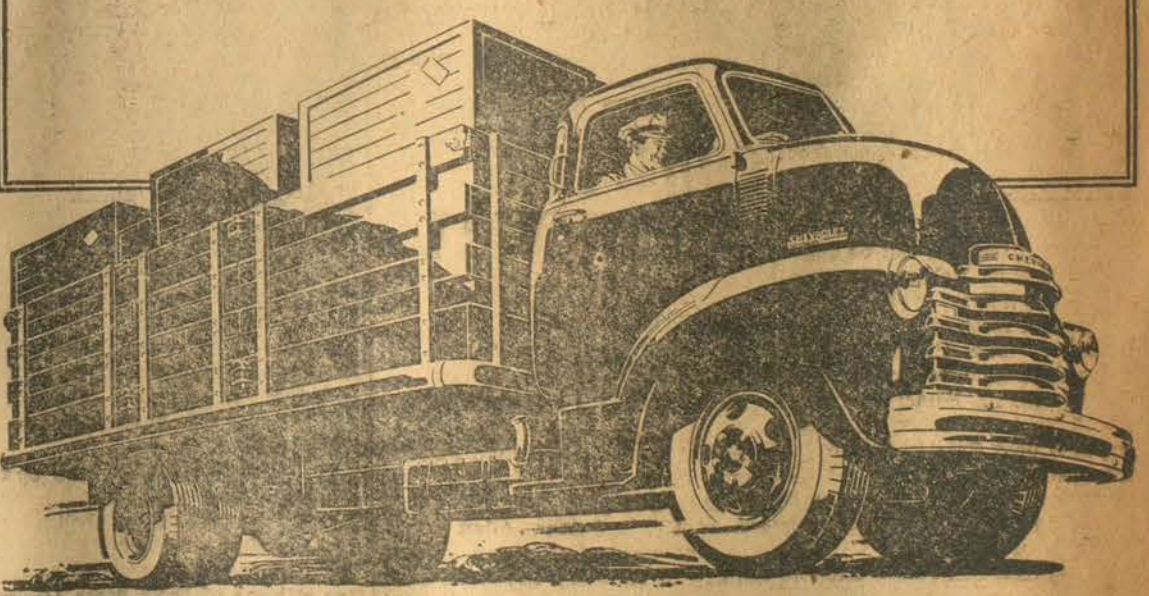

Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to one-half inch thickness. Dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If crusty biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.

**Thrice-Defeated Black Cats Still Contenders for Title**

The Prestonsburg Black Cats stood hapless and helpless here Friday night before the fury of Louisa's undefeated Bulldogs, with the Lawrence countians proving to the satisfaction of the last Doubting Thomas as their superiority in the field of Big Sandy football.

Sparked by the superlative performance of David Preston, the Bulldogs atoned by a 44-0 score last year's 7 to 6 defeat by the Black Cats at a time when Louisa entertained high hopes of going through the season, undefeated.

Except for the running of Hill, smallest regular on either team, and Willis, Prestonsburg was not in the game. Gene Boyd, fastest Cat backfield man, was lost for most of the game, and possibly for the remainder of the season, as the result of a severe foot injury.

For greater part of the game Neeley and Delong, substitutes, performed in the Prestonsburg backfield.

Louisa scored early in the first quarter when Preston fumbled the ball across the Cat goal, then recovered for the touchdown without any interference to speak of from his opponents.

After that, the Cats staged a strong running offensive of their own, piling up five consecutive first downs. But the attack stalled on the Louisa eight. On the next play Louisa's Linkhous swept around end to gallop, behind perfect blocking, 92 yards for a touchdown.

Preston's scoring jaunts were for 95, 30 and 20 yards. His long run was a burst through tackle after a Prestonsburg punt had thrown Louisa back on their five. Blankenship and Blackburn chalked up the sixth and seventh Louisa markers.

An encouraging feature for the losers was the performance in the backfield of Delong, substitute for the injured Boyd. "He's a regular now in our backfield," Coach Ted Benedett said this week.

Louisa had a weight advantage in the backfield. Prestonsburg had it in the line, but the invaders made up for size with the ferocity and accuracy of blocking and tackling fundamentals.

For the next two weeks the Cats are away from home—at Belfry Friday night of this week, at Wayland the following Friday night. They close their season here Friday night, Nov. 5, in the role of hosts to their ancient athletic rivals, the Paintsville Tigers.

With the Louisa defeat behind them, the Cats still have a splendid chance to win the Big Sandy Conference championship, since they are still undefeated in the conference. Belfry and Paintsville are their last conference foes.

Although Hazard, a conference member, is undefeated in the loop, the team plays only four other conference teams and under the Dickenson rating system will not win the title if Prestonsburg escapes further defeat.

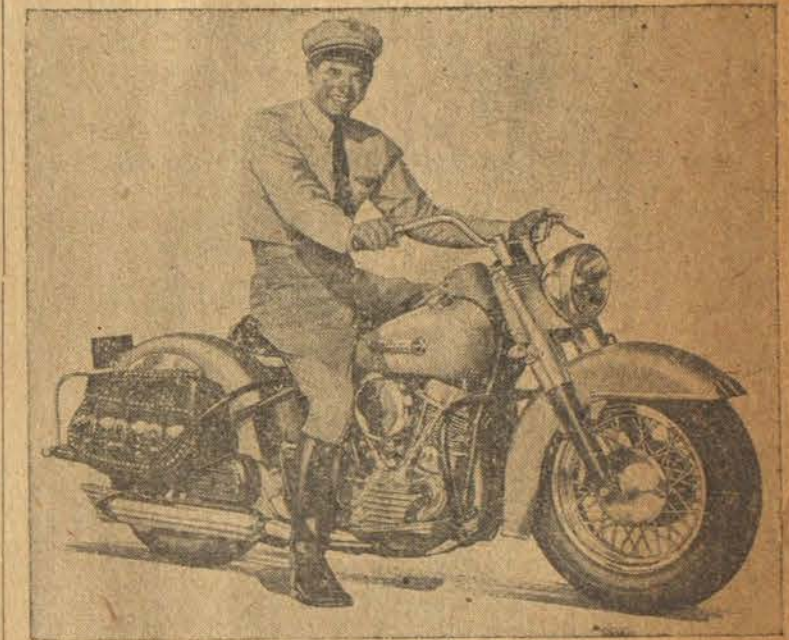

### FATHER, SON ARE ACCUSED

#### In Riceville Slaying Of Huntington Man At Rural Church

Everett Pinson, 30 years old, of Huntington, W. Va., was shot to death October 18 at Riceville, 10 miles south of Paintsville, and Sheriff Wiley Hall said at Paintsville that a father and son are charged with wifful murder in the case.

The Sheriff added that the son, 20-year-old Manuel Gibson, of Riceville, was arrested by deputies Sunday morning, but that Nathan Gibson, a farmer, continued to elude arrest. The warrants were issued by Magistrate Earl Fitzpatrick.

Hall said that Pinson, who had been employed as a truck miner in the district, was both shot and knifed. He added that the killing occurred in front of a church where services were being held, and that the attack was the outgrowth of a "brawl."

The Sheriff said that Pinson's coat had been "cut to shreds," but that the knife wounds were superficial and that death apparently was caused by a single shot in the left chest.

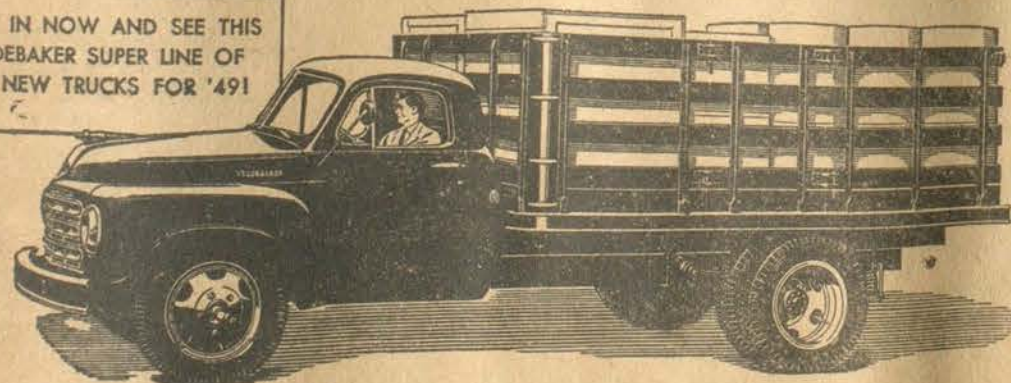

### Bates' Home, Auto Blasted; Combs Held

Whitesburg, Ky., Oct. 17—An automobile and a house owned by Sam Bates, operator of the Star Elkhorn Coal Company, near here, were blasted with dynamite early today.

Letcher County Sheriff Herman Combs has arrested Ed Combs, 35, in connection with the explosion, and is looking for Combs' brother John, who also has been linked with the bombing.

Sheriff Combs said that dynamite was planted under a new Oldsmobile parked beside Bates' home. The car was demolished by the blast, and the Sheriff estimates damage to the house at about \$2,000.

The Sheriff said the engine of the car went through the roof of the house and that a corner of the building was jarred off its foundation. Windows and doors were damaged, but no injuries were reported.

The officer said that Bates had refused to go bond for John Combs. He said that Bates previously had paid bond for John's brother, Ed, and that the latter had failed to appear for trial. Ed Combs had been arrested for possessing whiskey in Letcher county.

Ed Combs is being held on charges of bond forfeiture, and aiding and abetting in the dynamiting case.

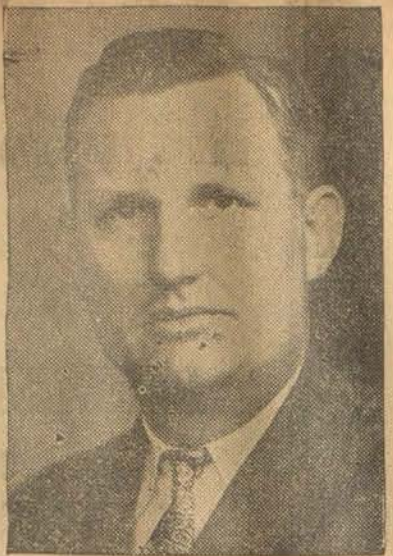

The Ellender-Wagner Bill contained substantial benefits for Veterans and other low income groups and was supported by the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars—but Mr. Meade and his colleagues in Congress defeated it by passing the substitute Woolcott Bill—thereby committing a farce and a fraud

upon all the Veterans whom he now claims to love so much. On the day after Congressman Meade voted for the Woolcott Bill, a member of his own party, Senator Tobey of New Hampshire had this to say about it:

"Millionaires are behind this monstrosity sent over from the House — The Veterans have been flim flammed by this Legislation."

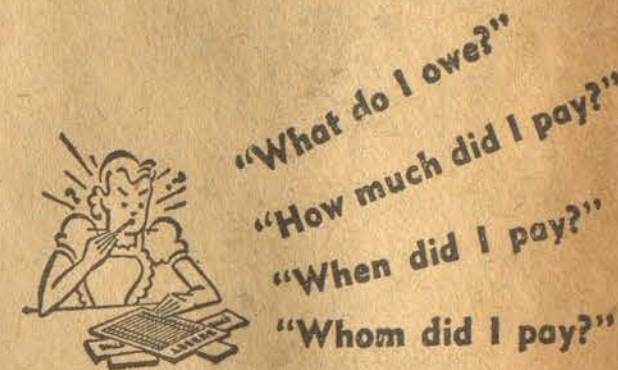

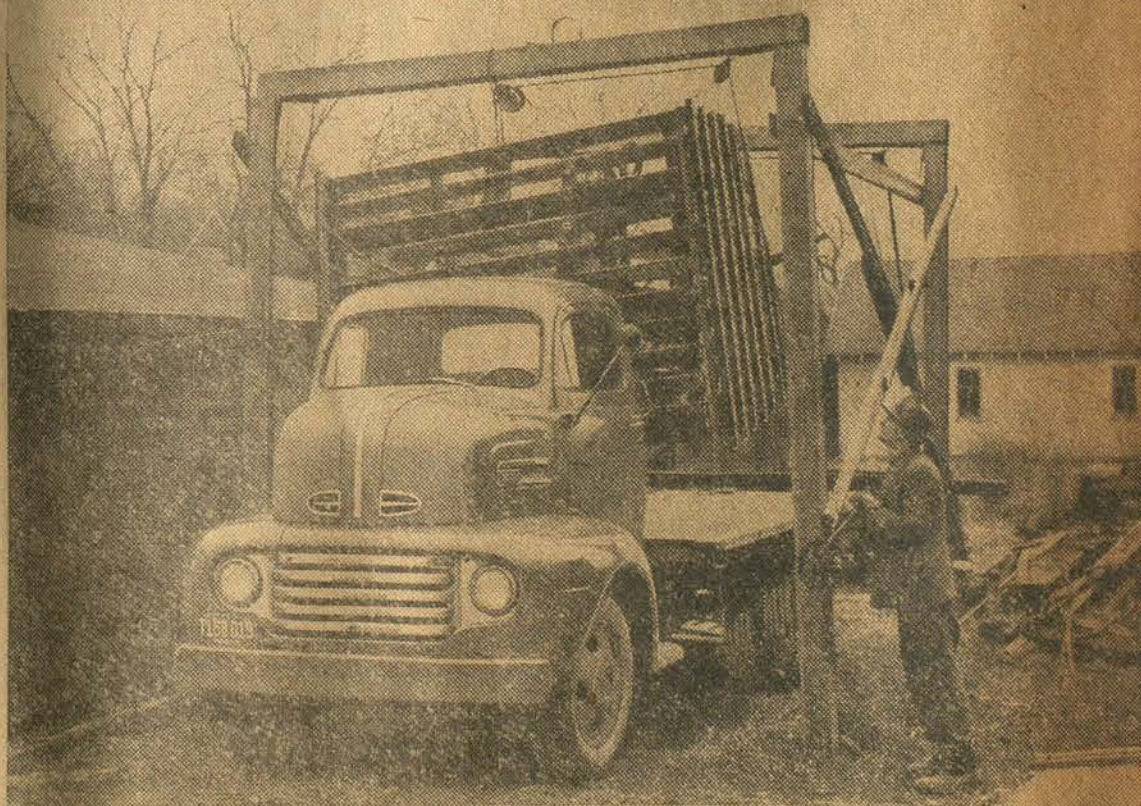
