KNOTT MAN SLAYS SON AND SELF

Youth, Shot Thru Heart. Dies Almost Instantly: Father Dies Saturday

ld, retired miner, shot and illed his 19-year-old son, Carroll Tipton, last Friday afternoon at the Collins home at Dema, Knott county, then turned his revolver to fire a bullet through his

The youth died almost instantly with a bullet wound over his heart. His father succumbed at 1 a.m., Saturday at the Stumbo Memorial hospital, Lackey.

A report on the tragedy from official sources was lacking here. It was said that Collins had been drinking and had threatened his wife Mary Combs Collins, shortly after she had returned home from the funeral at Wayland of Daniel Hicks.

This version of the murder and uicide said the Collins boy returned home after buying a rod and reel and called his mother from the garden to tell her of his fishing plans. Soon afterward, it was said, he heard his father threaten Mrs. Collins. He went into the living room where the couple was, and as he entered his father fired one shot rom a .38 Special revolver.



Two major changes in leave poli-

1. Allowing these veterans to apply for 15 days' leave at the end of their period of enrollment, in addition to whatever leave they might have been authorized while in training.

2. Placing full responsibility for granting leaves of absence taken during training—within a limit of 30 days a year-upon schools below college level and job-training establishments. This responsibility does not extend to the 15 days given at the end of an enrollment period.

Leave at the conclusion of enrollment periods may be obtained only if the veteran has enough remaining entitlement time to cover the requested leave.

Under the new policy, leave taken during training now becomes a matter strictly between the veteran and his school or employer-trainer.

Only absences to be reported to Veterans Administration in the future are those considered by the school or establishment to be unauthorized, as well as time off in excess of 30 days in a calendar year, exclusive of Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

These reports are necessary so that VA may make appropriate reductions in veterans' subsistence alowances

VA emphasized that all schoolsincluding colleges-are to continue to notify VA of all interruptions in training.

Ninety-eight per cent of the World War II veterans who have entered training under the G.I. Bill are eligible for additional training, according to figures disclosed by the Veterans Administration.

The bills would provide also for establishment of a rural-roads Division of the Public Roads Administration. It would maintain representatives in each of the states participating in the program.

Appropriations amounting to one to \$3,000,000 annually would be distributed among the states on the basis of land area, rural population, and road mileage. Up to 50 per cent of the cost would be paid by the U.S. government; the remainder in such manner as the state Legislatures provide.

Testifying in behalf of his bill, Stennis declared: "There is no aid available now for roads connecting the farmers' homes with school-bus routes, mail service, churches, and nearby trading centers. A federal rural road program should be established and continued until every farm in the country has access to an all-weather road outlet."
