Preponderance of assessment raises made was on mining machinery and equipment. Some real estate values were lowered, some increased, with a raise of \$45,355 the net result.

H. Clyde Reeves, head of the Revenue Department, wrote Tax Commissioner Clive Akers that these valuations on the coal firms' real estate holdings and machinery were recommended by representatives of the department after a visit to this county and urged that no change in the figures be accepted.

These values were prepared by persons experienced in the valuation of property. Any coal property owned by anybody other than the companies reviewed... should be assessed by you.

The Department of Revenue, Mr. Reeves added, is ready to assist in explaining or sustaining the assessment. "You," he wrote Mr. Akers, "are to use these figures in accordance with KRS 132.420 and keep us advised as to any appeals to alter them. If any of these values are contested before the Board of Supervisors, this office should be informed in order that representatives can be present. We urge... that you agree to no change involving judgment of values without representatives of this department being present."

Prof. W. L. 'Bee' Mayo, Famed Educator, Honored at Home, 31 Years after Death

Last week, 31 years after his death, grateful Texans paid to Prof. William Leonidas Mayo, who founded one of the state's great educational institutions, honor in the county of his birth.

In the circuit courtroom here was hung last Wednesday a portrait of the late educator. Later, a plaque will be added as a companion-piece to the painting by Leighton. The plaque will read, in part: "Presented in grateful appreciation by 100 Texans who also will publish the 'History of Mayo and His College.'"

A copy of the "History of Mayo and His College" was left here by Dr. H. H. Mayo, of Martin, to be placed later in the library of the Prestonsburg public schools.

The history, written by James Marcus Bledsoe, names Prof. Mayo as the man "who touched and blessed the lives of more than 30,000 men and women of the great Southwest" during the 28 years of his work at Cooper and Commerce, Texas as founder and president of the East Texas Normal College.

ordained to the ministry of the Methodist Church, South, and his brother, Dr. Marion J. Mayo, who was associated with him in the Texas college, tells in the history of his first sermon—an earnest, intellectual discussion of the joys of religion but nothing of the hell's-fire and brimstone frightfulness which were the pulpit stock-in-trade of the day.

After his failure in the timber business, Mayo left for the West at the age of 24. He was ready for the work he found there. He had attended Cedar Bluff Academy in Virginia, then had received his A.B. degree—probably the first Floyd countian to receive a collegiate degree—from Central Normal College, Danville, Illinois. He had taught in his home county and after his graduation from Central Normal was called to Cedar Bluff Academy as principal of the institution.

Arriving in Texas in the spring of 1886, Prof. Mayo went to work at manual labor. In July and August of that year he taught a subscription school. For three years he taught the Pecan Gap school, and there his great ability as a leader became apparent.

His reputation became so promising that the people of Cooper, Texas employed him as superintendent of their school. Later, he purchased the public school there, and thus was born the East Texas Normal College.

stitution grew to a student body of more than 3,000.

After the Cooper school was destroyed by fire residents of Commerce, Texas offered 10 acres of land and a cash grant of \$10,000 if Professor Mayo would re-establish the college there. And so Commerce became the home of a college at a time when the town had a population of not more than 1,500, at a time when there were more saloons there than there were drygoods and grocery stores combined.

At Commerce, Prof. and Mrs. Mayo were joined on the faculty by his brother, Marion, who was described as "more nearly a specialist in all departments of the college than any other person who ever served as an instructor in the institution."

Through three fires Mayo's college survived, to grow and spread its influence. The Beaver Creek boy who headed it set an example for his pupils through his consecration to the task at hand, his industry, his ingenuity and stout heart. Did something need doing, something built, and no funds available, soon would appear materials; soon would the president of the school and pupils who owed for tuition and room and board be seen at work.

was denied him or her in the school. Professor Mayo was the first man to undertake in Texas on a large scale the education of young men and women without means. He was the first to provide an all-the-year program of education. His was the first private institution in that state ever to survive three disastrous fires and to emerge from each "bigger and better."

Not only Texans attended his school. To East Texas Normal went David L. Clarke, of Allen, later to teach in the school and now professor of English at the University of Texas; the late W. P. Leslie, of Emma, who became chief justice of the Texas Court of Appeals; the late W. P. Mayo, Prestonsburg attorney and one-time County Attorney of Floyd county; Dr. J. W. Martin, now head of the Department of Economics, University of Kentucky; Talmadge D. Mayo, of this county, now a teacher in Dallas, Texas.

Another pupil of Prof. Mayo's who is nationally known is Sam Rayburn, Texas Congressman and veteran Speaker of the National House of Representatives.

The Floyd countian who helped make Texas great died March 14, 1917 of a heart attack he suffered en route home from the school. At that time the Texas Legislature had before it a bill authorizing the purchase of the institution and its conversion into a state normal college. The bill passed the House at 2:55 p.m. that day, March 14. A telegram was sent Prof. Mayo, two minutes later. At 3 o'clock—before the wire reached him—he was dead.

Silver Star Soldier Rites Held at School He Formerly Attended

Auditorium of Maytown high school from which he was graduated in 1938 was the scene today (Thursday) of last rites for Staff Sgt. Herman L. Osborne, Floyd soldier who won signal honors for gallantry in the battle for France, and who was killed in Belgium, Dec. 30, 1944.

The son of W. E. (Bev) Osborne and Mrs. Vada Smith Osborne, he was born at Lackey, Nov. 21, 1919. After attending Caney Junior College following high school graduation, he enlisted for army service in 1940.

With the 94th armored field artillery battalion of General Patton's army, he landed at Utah Beach, Normandy, for his part in the invasion of France, and within five days came the action which won for him the Silver Star. As a result of a vague situation at Sainteny and the inexperience of the troops, the lieutenant was captured. Staff Sgt. Osborne withdrew the observation post, organized scattered elements of Company A and withdrew them safely to American lines.

Little more than a month later, he was wounded in bitter fighting for Troyes, France. He was back in the fighting when his battalion did brilliant work in opening the corridor into Bastogne, Belgium, and here he was killed by an enemy shell.

During his army training at Pine Camp, N. Y., he was married to Miss Valeria Burrows. She, his parents and the following brothers and sisters survive: Edward Osborne, Bayonne, N. J., Emmett Osborne and Mrs. Hawley Martin, both of Ypsilanti, Mich., Everett and Charles Osborne, both at home.

The funeral service was conducted by the Revs. Bennett Adams and Willard S. Akers. Burial was made at Eastern, the Ryan Funeral Home directing.

Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If crusty biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.

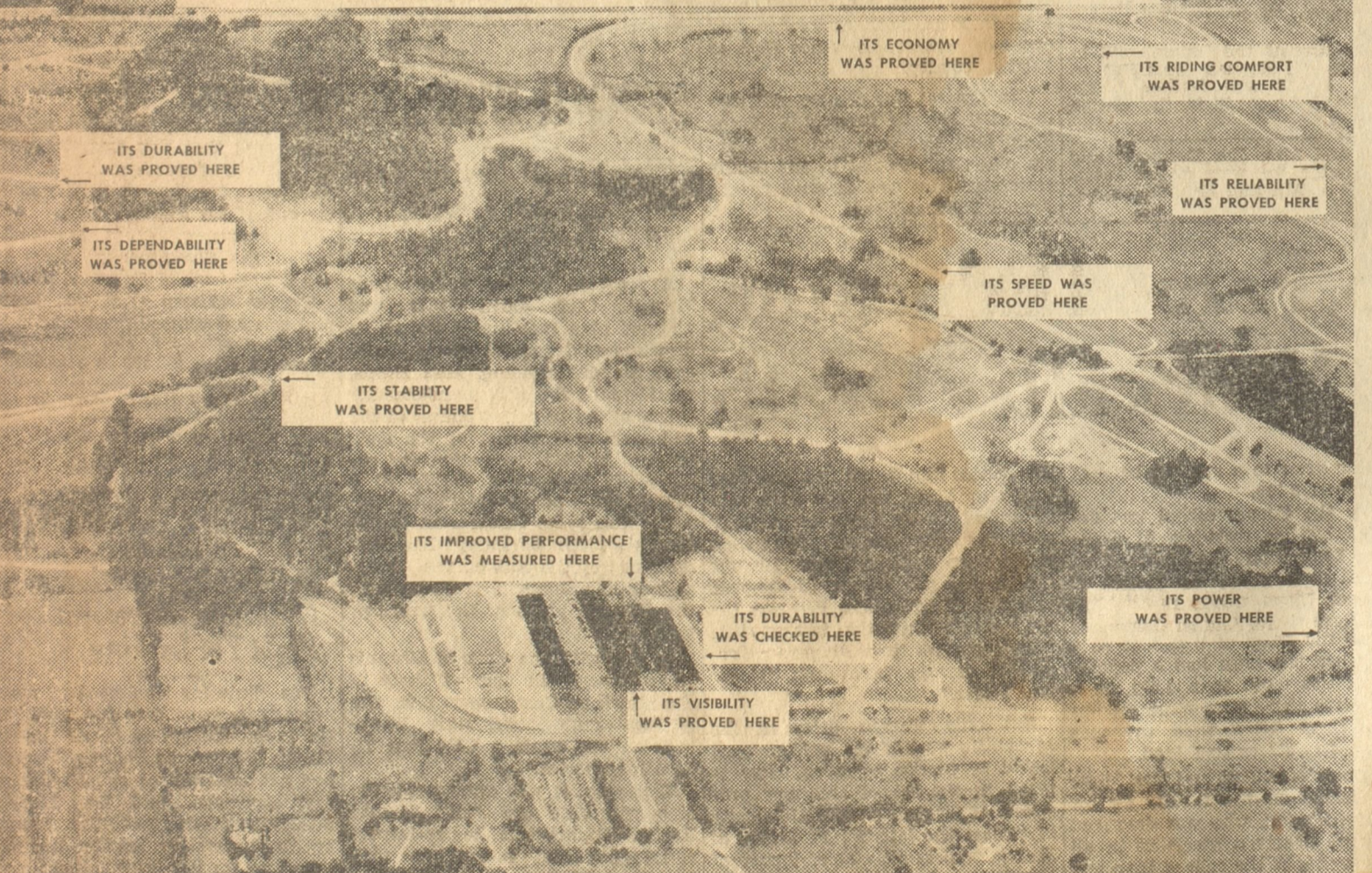

Ted Benedett ended his brief stay in Prestonsburg as athletic coach Monday morning, day after Johnny Carrico had published in his Courier-Journal column, "Hoopin' It Up," a blast considered by Prestonsburg school officials and citizens as aimed at the entire populace of the community.

He resigned the coaching post last week upon his return to Prestonsburg from Wheeling, W. Va., where he spent Christmas, but had agreed to remain until the end of the semester, Jan. 19.

Sunday, Carrico's column quoted Benedett as saying:

"My reason for leaving is quite simple. I and my family have been treated like reptiles since my arrival in Prestonsburg. Some people were dissatisfied and showed resentment when I was hired. They wanted a 'big name' coach to follow Eibner."

The Eibner referred to is John Eibner, who last year coached Prestonsburg to a Conference football championship, to a victory over Pineville in the Flood Bowl post-season game, to a district basketball championship and a state baseball championship.

After the Louisville newspaper was circulated here and the coach's statement had become widely discussed, school authorities considered Benedett's usefulness as a coach and teacher in the schools here at an end. He was told Monday morning that his services were no longer needed.

Asked for a statement, City Superintendent Chalmers H. Frazier merely commented: "Mr. Benedett's claim that he has been treated badly is like the little boy's report to his mother that somebody had been rude to him. When he yelled, 'Hello,' a voice said, 'Hello.' A question, 'Who are you?' was echoed by the same words. Then, when the boy retorted, 'None of your business!' back came the same retort."

Asked if he knew or Benedett's claim he or his wife had received rude telephone calls after losses by his football team, Mr. Frazier said he asked the coach for a specific report on the matter but that none was supplied.

Benedett, an all-KIAC fullback at Eastern State Teachers, Richmond, and an artillery lieutenant in the European theatre during the recent war, was warned when he accepted the coaching job last fall that he was stepping into a tough spot, with several stars of last year's team gone, school officials said. Early in the season, the services of "Set" Branham, later to be named to a halfback position on the 1948 All-State eleven, were lost. Despite this, the Prestonsburg football team shared the Big Sandy Conference title with Fleming high school.

Benedett's basketball team has lost two games while winning one, the first of the season.

Shortly after resigning last week—an action taken, it was said by school authorities, on his own initiative—Benedett said he had no definite plans for the future.

Superintendent Frazier himself may take over the job of coaching the basketball team, with Wilbur Schu, former University of Kentucky star, assisting.

MAY TO BREED RACE HORSES

Former P'burg Man And Texan Associated In Glen Ary Project

William H. May, of Frankfort, formerly of Prestonsburg, said last week he and Kenneth Murchison, of Dallas, will devote Glen Ary Farm near Frankfort to breeding race horses.

May, former state Commissioner of Agriculture, and Murchison, a Texas oil man, have about 45 head of thoroughbreds on the 260-acre tract now. They have been breeding for several years.

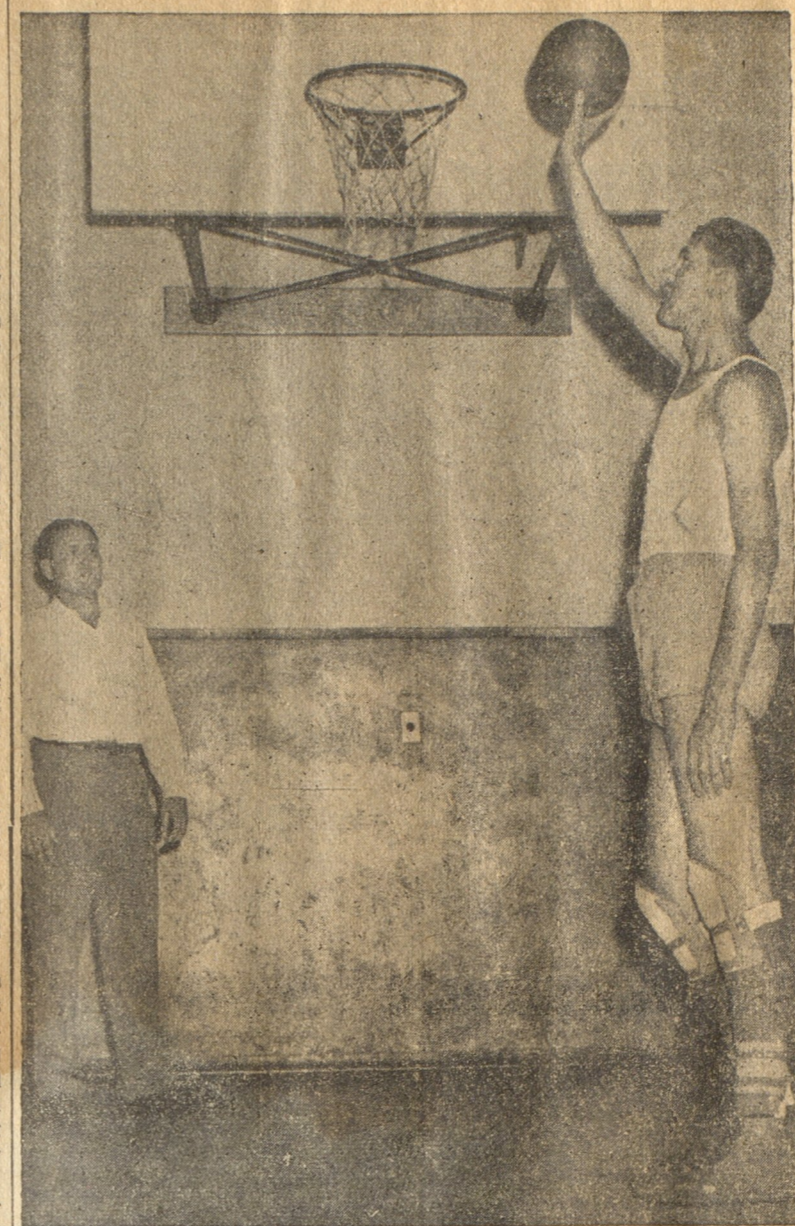
"We'll get rid of our cattle," May explained, "and give the place over to race horse breeding. We may do some racing, but mostly we'll breed racers."

The farm now has 20 brood mares and three stallions, St. Andrews, 2d, imported from England, and two Kentucky-bred sires, Deliberator and Swahol. St. Andrews 2d set the world's record, 1:59 4/5, for the mile and a quarter at Brighton, England, in 1939. The mark was equaled last year by Shannon II at Tanforan.
