There is no law giving the City Council the right either to grant or reject a license. Any ordinance attempting to "regulate" the number or location isn't worth the paper it's written on.

Lexington in 1941 tried by ordinance to restrict the number of saloons. The State Board promptly ignored this. They kept right on issuing licenses. They took this problem to the courts. The Kentucky Court of Appeals decided in 306 Ky. 238 Dec. 19, 1947 that Lexington was at the mercy of the State Board.

The State Board cannot legally refuse a license to any person meeting the qualifications of the law governing the granting of licenses. This was decided by the Kentucky Court of Appeals, 297 Ky. 432, May 5,

1944, granting a whiskey license to O. L. Hall in Fayette county after his application was rejected by the County Judge, the State Board, and the entire community who by petition had vigorously protested the presence of this saloon.

2 eggs  
 2 cakes of yeast dissolved in 1 c. lukewarm water  
 10 c. Snow Flour

1 c. milk  
 1/2 c. salt  
 1/2 c. fat  
 1/2 c. sugar

1. Add salt. Cool. Cream together shortening and sugar. Add to sugar mixture. Add milk to soaked yeast. With flour sifted into mixing bowl. Beat well. Add sugar, mixture. Mix. Knead into smooth dough. Place in greased bowl. Cover. Let rise until double its bulk. Knead dough down. Pack into greased bowl. Cover closely with lid. Set in refrigerator. Each day punch dough down to let out gas, returning dough to the refrigerator at once. About two hours before rolls are wanted, shape as desired. Place in greased pan. Cover. Let rise in warm place until very light. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) for 15-20 minutes.

**THEFT SERIES FELT SOLVED**

**Arrest of Trent Woods And Recovery of Loot Releases Others Here**

Arrest Wednesday near Allen of Trent Woods provided what officers consider a complete solution of three recent burglary cases in the county. While Woods was being arrested by Deputy Sheriffs Harold Conn, Ike Case, Frank Crum and Earl Tackett at the home of Mae Bentley, above Allen, loot allegedly taken by him and Johnny Henson, of Ligon, from the Martin Supply Company at Martin on the night of March 5 was being recovered by Special C. & O. officer G. L. Gray and Deputy Sheriff W. L. Rice in the vicinity of Ligon.

Woods admitted breaking into the Martin store, the Allen school and the restaurant at Allen of Mrs. Nancy Louder. Henson was reported ill at Ligon but officers were expected to arrest him today (Thursday). Practically every item taken from the Martin Supply Company was recovered, T. J. Allen, owner, said. This included three shotguns, ammunition, a rod and reel and artificial lures.

Arrest of Woods resulted in authorities directing that two others arrested in the Allen lootings be released from jail here.

Woods was quoted by officers as saying he took from the school only a ladder and some tools. The ladder he placed Saturday night in an alley between the Allen city jail and the rear of the Louder restaurant. He told officers he had the ladder sold, went Sunday night to get it but found the restaurant so inviting he decided to enter. He said he took \$16 in cash and two packs of cigarettes. He was quoted as saying he stayed inside the building two hours.

### Teacher Requirements Established By State Named By School Head

Regulations released by the State Department of Education, County Superintendent Palmer L. Hall announced last week, provide that six semester hours of college training will be required to reinstate or renew any elementary or high school emergency certificate. This work shall be done in residence or workshop.

Teachers entering the profession will be required to have 32 semester hours' college credit for an elementary permit or to be a graduate of a standard college to get a high school permit.

Teachers who can meet these requirements may be employed by the Board of Education prior to the opening of the first summer term on the condition that they earn necessary credits before the opening of the school term for positions which cannot be filled by qualified teachers by that time.

All teachers who expect to teach next year on an emergency permit should plan to do at least one summer term, Mr. Hall said. It is not yet certain whether a workshop can be held in Floyd county this summer, but it is hoped this can be ascertained in time for teachers to make their plans, he added.

The work-stoppage ordered by Lewis became effective Monday, and reported 100 per cent effective in this section, had a dual purpose—to serve as a memorial to dead and injured mineworkers and to protest the appointment of Dr. James Boyd as head of the U. S. Bureau of Mines.

The protest against Boyd apparently was ineffective as the Senate Monday, beginning of the work-holiday, approved his appointment by a 10 to 1 vote. Senator Byrd, Virginia Democrat, had urged Boyd's confirmation "as a reply" to the mine shutdown.

George H. Love, president of the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Company, world's largest commercial coal producer, said of the shutdown:

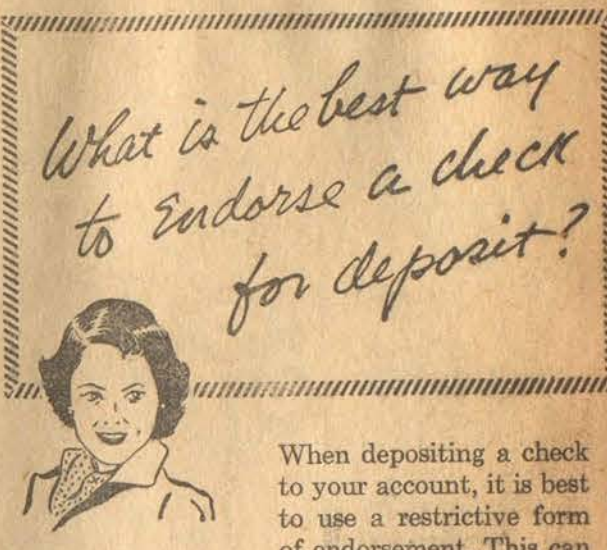

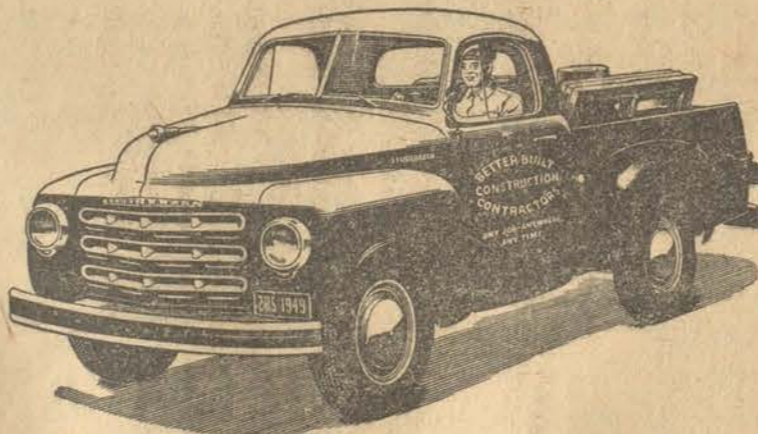

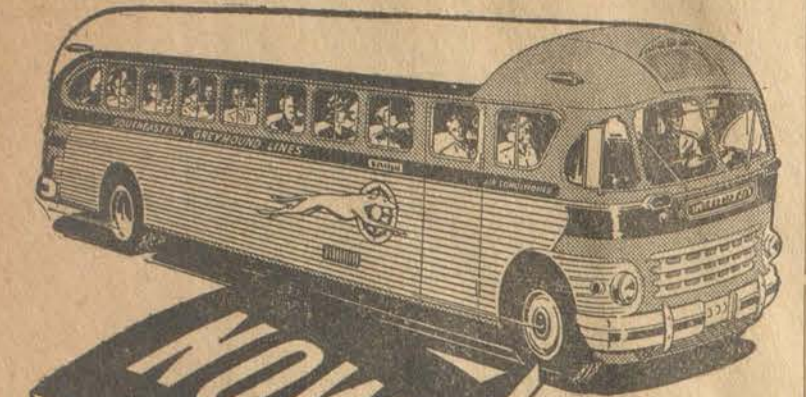

## "House of David" Beats Undermanned VFW Team By Several Whiskers

The "House of David" basketball team, the famed group of be-whiskered hoopers who have averaged 63 points for 178 games during this year, had their average lowered considerably in defeating a tired and undermanned Prestonsburg VFW team, 42-35, here last Wednesday night.

The Prestonsburg team had just returned from winning the state VFW championship in Lexington on the night before and only five of the squad were in the line-up.

The "Whiskered Winners" were well in control of the game and found time to amuse the spectators with a full bag of stunts.

Pikeville's Panthers scalped the Inez Indians, 37-34, "by the skin of their teeth" in a game-closing scoring sprint for the 15th regional championship in the final game of the high school tourney at the Pikeville College gymnasium Saturday night before an estimated crowd of 3,000 fans from all over Eastern Kentucky.

Both teams were in the midst of staging fighting finishes with less than one and one-half minutes remaining of regular playing time with the Panthers' diminishing lead reading at 33-32 as the rallying Indians were busy getting well fast from a five-point deficit. At this point of the frenzied fracas, it was Lou Prater's boy, Dickie, who used to attend grade school at Garrett, coming through in a pinch in a grown-up hardwood fashion with two quick field goals to extend Pikeville's lead, 37-32, and put the regional crown on ice for the Panthers. Inez tabbed a field goal to pull up to the 37-34 count. The final buzzer sounded a second before another floor shot by the Indians was launched to swish through the net which, had it been good, would still have lacked one point of a tie score and the subsequent chance of an overtime period.

Dickie "Chew" Prater was high for Pikeville with A. Harmon tops for Inez with 12 points. Prater was ably assisted by Woody Preston, son of Mitchell Preston who, a few years back, was in the lumber business here in Prestonsburg. Preston took charge of the rebound situation for the Panthers.

Official referees were Preece, of Inez, and Junior Castle, of Pikeville.

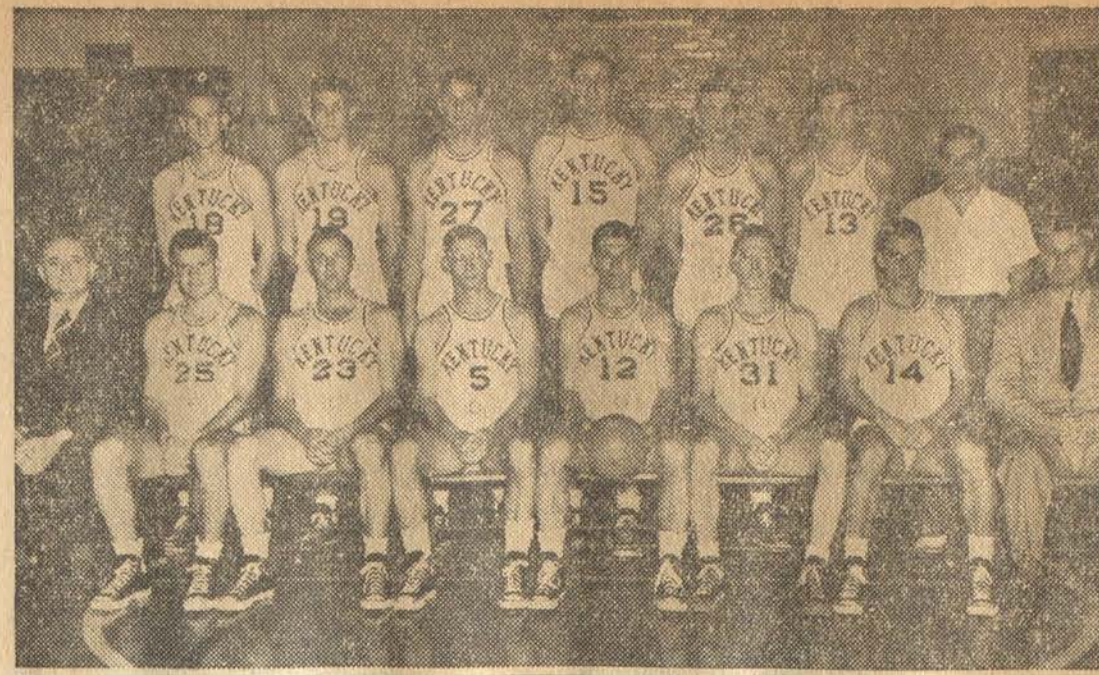

The Floyd county teams of Martin and Betsy Layne gave the Inez Indians a tough warpath to travel in reaching the final tilt. In the Friday night semi-final, the Indians had anything but a war dance on their hands in disposing of a stubborn Martin Purple Flash, 41-33, who were certainly more formidable than just a "flash in the pan." "It looks like Kentucky all the way."

That was the good word from up New York way Monday morning. That was before B.D.—Before Disaster, of course.

Kentucky, the nation's No. 1 team with 29 victories and only one loss, had practically all the season's honors tucked away, by the so-called experts who indulge in the folly of picking basketball winners, to take the National Invitational Tournament crown this week and follow up with the N.C.A.A. title a few days hence—a grand slam in basketball and a feat no team has been able to accomplish.

Monday afternoon, UK's Wildcats were upset, 67-56, by lowly Loyola, of Chicago, and the not so lowly six-foot six-inch Jack Kerris who tabbed 23 points. Kentucky was leading, 47-46, when the stinking business of fouls began taking its toll among the Wildcats. First to go was "Wah Wah" Jones who was followed in short order by Groza, Barker and Hirsch.

Monday was "UD Day" in the N.I.T. games. Indeed, it was a great day for the "under dogs." Western Kentucky, the No. 4 team, was pulled down by Bradley, 95-86, as both teams set a scoring record with 181 total points. St. Louis, the country's No. 2 team, got flipped by Bowling Green Falcons, 80-74, and San Francisco tagged Utah, 64-63, in one of those "customer's money's worth" thrillers.

Kentucky's upset was one of the biggest in the history of basketball. The New York welcome, the honey-dripping words and pre-game praise of the Cats leads one to wonder if

someone succeeded in "choking the cat with cream." It's a cinch someone "fouled up" somewhere. Adolph Rupp, the Wildcats' mentor, commented, "It was bound to happen, sooner or later, but it was a shame it had to happen here." With that in mind, the loss may be charged up to percentages.

The Wildcats, defending NCAA champs, enter the National Collegiate Athletic Association meet in New York, March 21, with an eye to advancing to the finals at Seattle, Wash., March 26. To this the experts are again clamoring, "It looks like Kentucky—" P.S. (Printer Goble, please leave this dash in this quotation pending the outcome of the N.C.A.A. venture of the Cats!)

### Two-Time State Winners Hurt by Lack of Funds And Eligibility Limits

The Prestonsburg VFW Ramblers, wearing the state VFW independent crown for the second consecutive year, will not represent Kentucky in the national VFW tournament at Anderson, Ind., April 4-9, announced Manager Jack Hyden, yesterday.

He stated that because of the national tourney restrictions on eligibility, the inability of some of the team members to make the trip and the possible lack of funds virtually eliminated all possibility of Prestonsburg's participation.

The limitations on the eligibility of players require that any team member in the meet must be a member, in good standing for the year, of a Veterans of Foreign Wars post. Only four of the Rambler line-up meet the requirements while the remainder of the squad hold honorary memberships in the Prestonsburg VFW Post 5839. These memberships, though recognized in the recent state meet at Lexington, will not be honored in the Anderson tourney.

The Ramblers, who played their home games this season with little, and upon several occasions no, gate receipts, are without sufficient funds to bear expenses of the venture. Should the team be hastily re-organized for Kentucky's representation

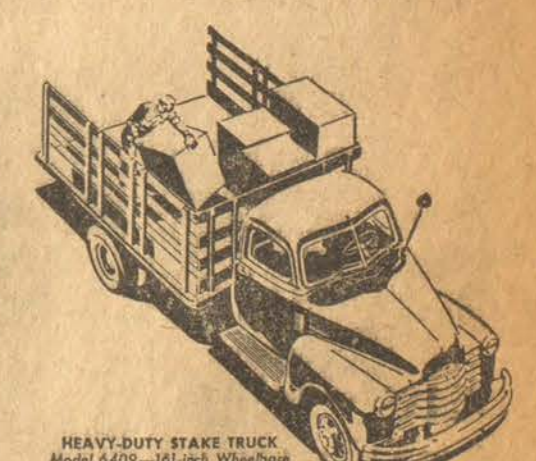

Whereas, it further appears to the court that the number of signers to said petition, totaling approximately 325 voters of the city of Prestonsburg, Floyd county, Kentucky, is equal to twenty-five per cent or more of the votes cast in said city of Prestonsburg, Floyd county, Kentucky at the last preceding general election and that said petition bears the date of the signing and the post-office addresses of said petitioners.

It is therefore ordered that an election be held in Prestonsburg, Floyd county, Kentucky, for the purpose of taking the sense of the legal voters of said city upon the proposition of whether or not spirituous, vinous or malt liquors shall be sold, bartered or loaned therein, and election shall be held on Saturday, the 26th of March, 1949, A.D.

The proposition to be voted upon shall be stated upon the voting ballot without emblems and two spaces left upon the right side of same, one for votes favoring the proposition to be designated by the word "YES" and one for the votes opposing it designated by the word "O." The voter shall designate his vote by a cross mark placed opposite the word "YES" or the word "NO."

The question to be submitted shall be in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

Are you in favor of the sale of alcoholic beverages in Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky?  
YES .....  
NO .....

The County Court Clerk of Floyd county shall within five days from the entering of this order give to the Sheriff of Floyd county, Kentucky, a certified copy of this order and it shall be the duty of the said Sheriff to have same published in The Floyd County Times, a news-

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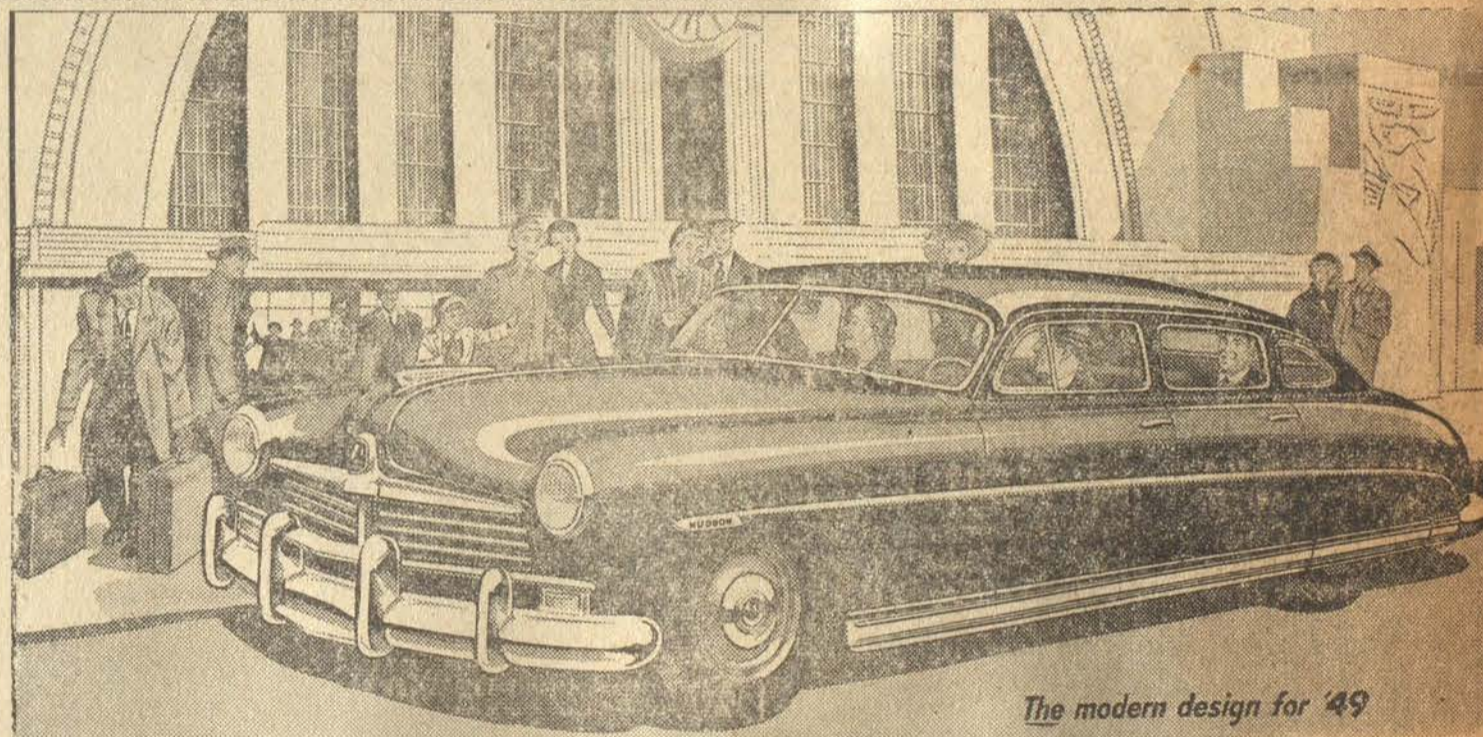
