The Kentucky Court of Appeals decided in 306 Ky. 238 Dec. 19, 1947 that Lexington was at the mercy of the State Board.

The State Board cannot legally refuse a license to any person meeting the qualifications of the law governing the granting of licenses. This was decided by the Kentucky Court of Appeals, 297 Ky. 432, May 5.
