Approximately 227 Floyd county ancer patients were either examined or treated last year, Dr. Marvin Ransdell, county health officer, announced this week in stressing the importance of the Cancer Control program in Kentucky and urging the observance here of Cancer Month.

April is annually designated as Cancer Month by proclamation of the President and Governor, and funds raised during this time are used to finance much-needed research, education, case finding and care of the indigent.

Kentucky ha sreal reason to partiipate in the observance of Cancer Month because the state has led the way in many phases of the program, according to Charles E. Tucker, director of the division of cancer control of the state health department. The state was the first to have every county organized for cancer control work, he said.

Kentucky's advertising is paying

Approximately 71 per cent of the 36.866 vacationers, who requested travel literature in 1949, accepted Kentucky's invitation to visit the state, according to an announcement of the State Highway Department.

The announcement, based on replies to questionnaires sent out by the department, added that eight per cent of those who replied said they "did not get to make the trip," but planned to come to Kentucky this year. 





No Fatal Explosions Reported

The 297 rail mines last year employed 44,585 men. Truck mines numbered 5,492 with 25,826 workers. The 73 strip mines in the state employed 3.354 men. The report also listed 29 clay mines

with 950 men producing 1,000,000 tons. No fatalities were reported from these mines

Sisk commented that no mine explosions causing death were reported in Kentucky last year.
