Actually the mines were idle 11 days, not including Saturdays and holidays, because of strikes and the threeday work week. For the 10 days durearnings amounted to \$86.250 or \$150 per employee, and so, it was pointed out, the idle periods forced them to lose more than they actual-

In 1949, the spokesman continued, the company had sufficient orders to keep the mines working full-time every week since the three-day week started last July. Since that time the miners have been idle a total of 85 regular work days for a total loss in wages of \$741,750, or an average of \$1290 per employee,

It was also pointed out that these lost payrolls, in addition to greatly reducing the purchasing power of the miners, have also in general taken away from the merchants and businessmen in the Floyd and Johnson county areas, and as this money normally turns over in circulation three to four times, it means that the purchasing power in the area during the last six months has been reduced by to three million dollars from idle time with this one com-
