





Those who have also been there could find their way; the rest of humankind would be lost before

It has been my good fortune to spend many vacations in national Caldwell county in pasture mixtures parks. All of these contain areas that used to be owned in small private with Dadino clover. holdings. In early spring it is not unusual to find long-deserted walks outlined with narcissus in full flower. Tell-tale remnants of former flower gardens are often to be found in the young second growth. Often I find myself wondering what was the name of the lane that led down past the barn and across the fields to Uncle George's or Grandpa Brown's. Now it is overgrown with beggar lice and sawbriars; formerly it had its prominence in a neighborhood that is now only a memory.

Going back still farther, what did the Indians call this stream that now bears some chance English name? Was my favorite knob particularized by some specific name that was as distinctive as the knob itself is? How many times in the century and two-thirds that white men have been here has a new name been applied to this same feature on the landscape? I can recall three such in 40 years. How many more it may bear in the next nobody can guess. Of course, names have a tendency to become fixed if they once get into print on a map. Also if the name becomes associated with an event of importance, it stands a fair chance of remaining long past even the language that called it forth. Many of our streams and mountains in America bear names that the Indians applied ages before our coming, but often there has grown up some other name that gradually superseded the old and poetic one. Modern efforts to restore old names is usually ludicrous, for the lack of sincerity in this type of naming is rather obvious. I have been on lakes in the glacial area of America that had had old Indian names reapplied to supersede Grass Lake or Duck Lake, but only a few poetic souls would use the old unpronounceable names, preferring the plain, even harsh names given by early white settlers. Imagine re-naming Deadman's Gulch after some poetic or imaginary Indian name that one finds in same old record!

This tendency to name places and objects also applies to animals, I doubt whether there are many actual names any longer applied to beef cattle, for the cycle from calfhood to slaughterhouse is so brief and so obvious that few tender memories cluster around any such animal. But the family cows, long a part of the farm, would be lost without some designation; it would be as unthinkable as having a race horse without a name. A few people whom I used to know even named all their livestock, including sheep, brood sows, goats, and at least the most obvious chickens. After all, if there is need to designate any particular animal, no matter how much it may resemble any other one, what can be better than a name? Of course, highly favored show animals always bear names, aristocratic ones that show pedigrees that any animal should be proud of. If it were not for this tendency to apply names to objects around us, we would feel lost in a world of unfamiliar things; once give a name to an object, and it takes on, really, a personality not known

The public does not have and could not have a fair idea of the work attached to the Sheriff's office in regard to law enforcement. To give you some idea of the work that has been done in my office I will use two examples: I. The jail records will show that, during the year 1946, Harold Conn. chief field deputy sheriff, arrested and placed in jail 562 law violators What do you think the records will show with all my deputies? 2. At the April term, 1949, of Floyd circuit court my office summoned more than 1,200 witnesses for the Commonwealth alone. We usually have more witnesses for the defense than for the Commonwealth. We can assume the Sheriff's office will have 2,500 or more people to summon as witnesses for both the Commonwealth and defense from every section of the county at each term of court. This does not include the number of warrants served and other processes executed. Every warrant of any kind, search warrant or otherwise, delivered to my office for any person or personss has been diligently and honestly executed. The records show that more 50 different places have bee earched two or more times for ilit possession of liquor. All my eputies will tell you by word or affidavit that they were instructed by me to serve any warrant of any kind on any person or persons for any offense. A sheriff or his deputies cannot impose the penalties as prescribed by law against criminals. Only one major crime committed

during my term of office remains unsolved or where there has not been an arrest or indictment made. This is the brutal murder of Muriel Baldridge and these closely connected with this case know that I have spent more than \$400 of my own money, know that my deputies and myself have worked days and nights and traveled hundreds of miles that the public knows nothing about, attempting to catch this heinous criminal. As a private citizen now, my time and services are available to the family or officers

in solving this crime. 3. 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




