Kentucky Mishap Rate Poses Health Problem, Health Dept. Declares

More people driving more cars are having more accidents, state and national statistics show. Since accidents are responsible for the fourth largest number of deaths in Kentucky, this constitutes a very real public health problem.

According to J. F. Blackerby, director, Division of Vital Statistics, Kentucky State Department of Health, deaths from traffic accidents during the first four months of 1950 showed a 42 percent increase over the same period in 1949.

There are a number of factors which may contribute to this increasing death toll. For one thing, more new cars are being manufactured and sold, and there is a corresponding increase in the use of old, outmoded cars. Unimproved highways also contribute to the accident toll.

Some of these factors cannot be controlled from the driver's seat. However, there are certain precautions which, if observed, can do much to lower the death rate from motor vehicle accidents.

If, for example, every driver in Kentucky would stay within the legal speed limits, there would doubtless be a marked reduction in the number of accidents occurring on the state's network of highways.

Then, too, there has been a noticeable slackening of personal responsibility for accidents. A lack of caution too often results from this irresponsible attitude, and too often this lack of caution can lead to a serious motor mishap.

Another national holiday has just left in its wake the usual quota of death and destruction. It is, therefore, particularly timely for the motoring public to give some serious thought to ways and means of curbing and preventing accidents which are crippling and killing so many Kentuckians.

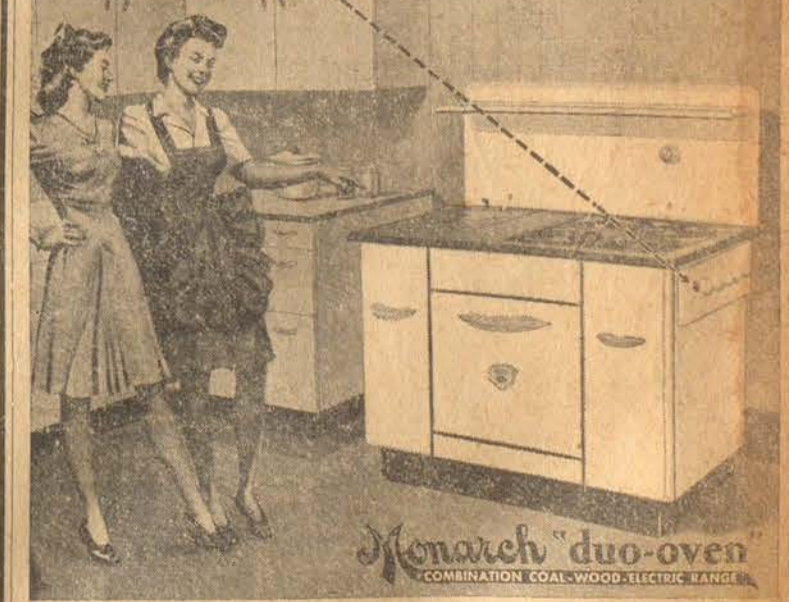

Makes Safety Proposals For Coal Mine at Martin

Washington, D. C. July 2—(Sp.) Although a number of safety measures have recently been instituted at the Utilities Elkhorn Coal Company's Martin No. 8 mine at Martin, Floyd county, Ky., a Federal reinspection report issued today by the Bureau of Mines proposes more adequate rock dusting and several other precautions. The mine employed 248 men and averaged 1,150 ton soft coal daily when it was re-visited in May by Inspector John S. Eakins.

Rock dust had been distributed in this generally dry mine, but more was needed in specified areas, Eakins reported. He also recommended extending the rock dusting to within 80 feet of designated faces and using water to ally coal dust during cutting and loading.

While noting that face ventilation was adequate, Eakins proposed coursing more air through specified last open air connections, driving air connections at approved intervals, installing air-lock doors, and making on-shift examinations during the coal-cutting shifts in the hand-loading sections.

Under haulage and electricity, the inspector advocated cleaning loose coal and rock from the haulage tracks, removing materials obstructing haulage clearance space and shelter holes and prohibiting certain hazardous haulage practices, as well as safer installation of the underground electric-light wires, overload protection for designated electrical face equipment in the hand-loading sections.

Eakins' summary of recent safety advances included good permanent timbering, discontinuing getting off moving man-trips, safe installation of the power wires to the pumps, keeping the trolley wires taut and isolating them from combustible materials, overload protection for the trailing cables on the locomotives, removing water from the main haulage road, and a well-enforced "no smoking" rule.

Recommended also were better face timbering and continuing the haulage roof-control program, making gas tests immediately before and after blasting on shift in the hand-loading sections, and eye protection for workmen exposed to flying particles.

Ag College of University Lists Substitute Crops For Flooded Land

With thousands of acres of corn and other grains, hays and grasses destroyed or damaged by rains and floods, there still is time to plant corn, soybeans, sudan grass and sorghums, according to the College of Agriculture and Home Economics University of Kentucky.

Such hybrid varieties as U.S. 13 and Ky. 103 will make corn yet, if the season is favorable. County agents also know of several other varieties that still can be grown.

Most any kind of soybeans can be sown yet. They can be harvested any time, without regard to maturity. For seed production, only Lincoln and Hawkeye varieties are recommended.

There is yet time to sow sudan grass. Broadcast or drilled at the rate of 25 pounds to the acre, sudan can be grazed when about a foot high, and cut for hay when the first heads appear 30 to 50 feet apart. Sudan will make more hay than either soybeans or millet. Satisfactory hay can be made after moderate frost, but care should be taken in grazing sudan after frost.

There still is time to plant such early sorghums as Martin's Combine Milo and Early Combine Hegari.

Weeds in corn can be controlled by spraying with 2-4-D. Where too big to use a tractor outfit, spraying can be done with an airplane.

Floyd Countian Among 20 Injured When Bus Overturns on Curve

Two Kentuckians, one from Floyd county, were among the 20 persons injured Sunday when a Greyhound bus carrying holiday passengers overturned on U. S. 23, 11 miles southeast of Bowling Green, Ohio.

The Floyd countian was James Gibson, 18, of Wheelwright, who suffered head cuts and bruises on his legs. John Erwin, 19, of McRoberts, was bruised. Two passengers were seriously hurt.

Driver of the bus said he was attempting to negotiate a short curve on a downgrade when the bus veered to the left, hit a culvert, skidded and overturned.



Change-Over in System Omits 1950 Assessment For State, County Taxes

For the first time in the memory of most Floyd countians, there will be no assessment of property for state or county taxes as of July 1.

In fact, there will be no assessment at all made this year. The next assessment will be made on January 1, 1951.

The tax bills you pay this fall will be based on assessment made on July 1, 1949.

Reason for the change is to bring the date of assessment closer to the date of payment of taxes. This will make it easier for the taxpayer to know how much tax he is paying for what year. From now on, taxes will be paid in the same year they are assessed. Also there will be less confusion over payment of taxes where property is bought or sold.

In many respects, the new assessment date will be more convenient for the taxpayer, since it comes at the usual inventory and bookkeeping date. This is in accord with the trend in other states.

Although county Tax Commissioners will not be busy taking the assessment this year, they will use the time to prepare property record cards and gather information to help in making a more accurate and fair assessment next year.

Hatcher Brands As Lie Report He Will Quit

Branding as "liars" all those who have hinted he will withdraw from the race for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Senator, George Glenn Hatcher, Kentucky Secretary of State, last week announced a 13-point platform on which he will base his candidacy against Governor Earle C. Clements.

In his platform, Hatcher hit out strongly against what he charged was "centralization" of power in Frankfort and Washington and "Clements' high-handed tactics using threats, state funds, free vehicles and non-taxed gasoline in the race for the United States Senate."

Hatcher said his entire campaign will be based on the fact that "the people should and must govern rather than be governed, and that tax money must be used for the common good, rather than for selfish and political machines."

The two-time Secretary of State declared his full support would be given to the repeal of the Taft-Hartley law, federal aid to education, especially in the matter of increasing teachers' salaries, exempting such salaries from income taxes, because teachers are not employed the year-round; a national farm program that will best benefit the farmers, and establishment of a guaranteed market for their products.

Touching on the problem of adequate manifestation of a nation's gratitude to its war veterans, Hatcher stated he would initiate and support a program for veterans which would include merited benefits, a bonus in some form, housing and financial aid. He pointed out, too, that he would support a "job at home" program for veterans, whereby men who fought to preserve their homes would be able to find jobs at home instead of leaving their own localities to find them.

In the field of social security, Hatcher declared he was wholly in support of broadening the law so as to bring more and deserving Americans within its scope, and that he would vote for increases in hospital aid and benefits to the aged. He said he would also seek federal aid for the handicapped, sick and afflicted.

Hatcher said one of the major planks in his platform was one calling for a 400-million-dollar federal park and access road project with increased aid for the present road system for all Kentucky, including a national park for Eastern Kentucky's populous center connecting it with Dewey Dam, Carter Gages, Breaks of Big Sandy, Cumberland Gap, Cumberland Falls, Mammoth Cave and Kentucky Lake, and proposed park areas for Louisville and other central, western and eastern localities, including mountain "sky-line" roads, streams and riverside and other developments. He explained that this project would be in conjunction with similar ones already a reality or under consideration in surrounding states. He pointed out that this
