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HATCHER ASKS  
INVESTIGATION

Senatorial Candidate  
Charges Was Offered  
Bribe to Quit Race

Secretary of State George Glenn Hatcher said Saturday he had asked an official investigation of his charge that he has been offered a bribe to withdraw from the race for the Democratic nomination for U. S. senator.

Asked what agency he had consulted, Hatcher replied, "I was advised to say only that I have taken it up with the proper authorities."

Hatcher added, "I am going to get the investigation before the primary, and not wait until it is over. The FBI will give me all the agents I need to carry on the investigation."

He said he expects to file suit after a report is made on the probe.

The secretary of State, one of four aspirants for the Democratic nomination at the Aug. 6 primary, declared he has witnesses to the offer of a bribe, but he declined to name them. He said some of his friends were being threatened that their counties would get no road improvements if they voted for him.

The other Democratic candidates for the senatorship besides Hatcher are Gov. Earle C. Clements, of Morganfield, Denis McQueary, of Lexington and the Rev. James L. Delk, Hopkinsville. So far none of these has taken public notice of the charges.

Mrs. Kendrick Dies  
On Her 63rd Birthday;  
Buried on Cow Creek

Mrs. Anis Burchett Kendrick, wife of J. C. Kendrick, former resident of Cow Creek, died Friday at 10 p.m., on her 63rd birthday anniversary at her home at River, Johnson county.

Mrs. Kendrick's death was attributed to a cerebral hemorrhage. Although she had suffered from high blood pressure for several months, her condition was not considered critical and on the day of her death had been in good spirits. 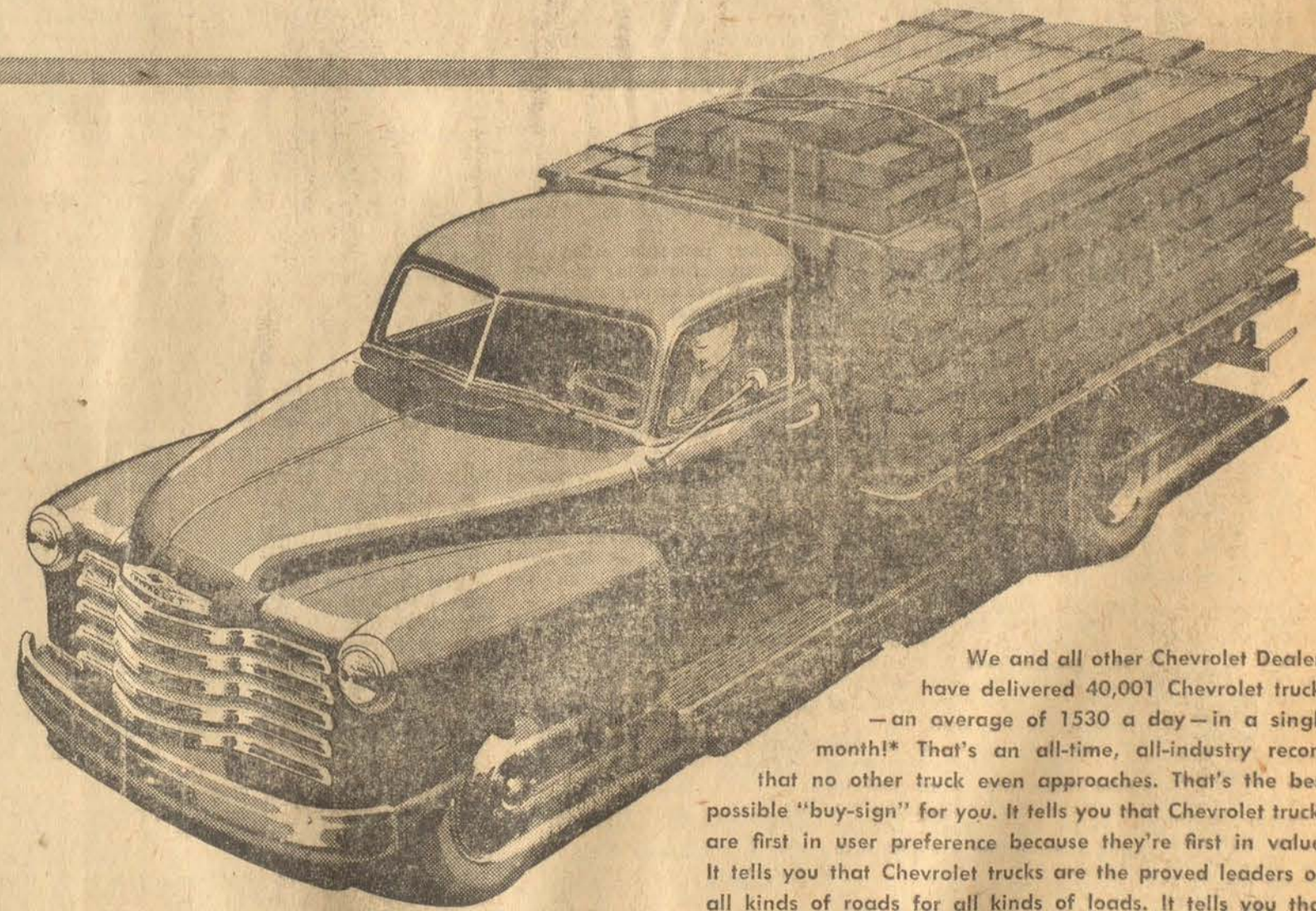

## Paul Derringer, Former Reds' Pitching Ace, Slated as Guest At Drift Benefit Wednesday

Paul Derringer, one of the major league's most outstanding pitchers of a few years back and a familiar mound figure to a number of Cincinnati Reds' fans of this section who travelled all the way to Cincinnati to see him perform, will be guest of honor at a benefit game between Drift and Wheelwright at the Drift baseball park Wednesday night, July 19, Drift business manager Alvin Reed announced today.

The game, slated to start at 7:30 p.m., is sponsored by the recently organized Beaver Valley Kiwanis Club for the benefit of underprivileged children.

In addition to his speech in which he is expected to recall some interesting highlights of his successful major league career, Derringer will award a personally autographed ball and bat as a fitting contribution to the fund-raising effort.

The sponsors said that an effort will be made to have the former fireball artist deliver a few of his specialties, even though he is retired, in a short exhibition session against players of the teams, barring any

consequential painful injury to his arm.

The appearance will afford many, Reed said, an opportunity to see and hear in person the former Cincinnati star who, while in his prime, attracted untold thousands through the gates of the Reds' home field and abroad.

He and his "workhorse" buddy, Bucky Walters, harnessed to Cincinnati schedule commitments, are credited by sports scribes and experts for personally tossing the Reds to two National league pennants and a world championship.

Considering the purpose of the game, the appearance of Derringer is highly significant.

Happy-go-lucky and boy-like boisterous at the peak of his career, Derringer's style of concealed delivery was adopted and used since as a model to train hopeful young hurlers in beginning their careers. Famed as a "fast ball clutch-pitcher" who took it easy but could always be relied on for effective delivery in the pinches, he became the ideal of big and little boys alike.

Native of Kentucky, Derringer is a former student at Georgetown College and started on his road to baseball fame with the Louisville Colonels.

The benefit program will also feature the music of the Wheelwright and McDowell high school bands. A group of Boy Scouts will act as ushers.

Reed stated that in addition to being a benefit tilt, the result of the game will count in Elkhorn league standings and keen competition is expected between the two teams.

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### What Is Due the Mother?

While Mrs. Florine Shouse sat in a Louisville bar drinking beer last Saturday night, her three-year-old daughter, Joyce Joan, who had been toddling back and forth in the cafe, walk-out of the place with a man who is believed to be sexually abnormal.

This child whom her mother professes to love, and for whom she may indeed have a genuine affection, disappeared into the night, and by this time may have been the victim of a brutal crime.

Florine Shouse, who liked "to sit and have quiet conversation over some beers," drank and became so drunk she was arrested, so drunk her child, a mere baby, left the cafe with a man believed to be a sex pervert without the mother knowing her baby was in mortal danger.

She loves the child, she says. If she gets Joyce back, she'll never drink again, she says. If her baby comes home, she will be a better woman. She hopes her abductor doesn't tease or torment Joyce. Her story is good sob-sister stuff. One would be less than human to be insensible to the remorse she must now be suffering.

But, for all her love of the child, she took Joyce from home to surroundings foreign to baby-innocence; and, because of her love for "a quiet conversation over a few beers," permitted her child to slip into the hands of a stranger who must be supposed to be more devil than saint.

The question is: Who is more guilty—the abnormal man who walked away with the child, or the mother who drank her beer and let her child be taken? If the electric chair for the abductor, in the event harm has befallen little Joyce, what does society owe Joyce's now-repentant mother—a medal?

**FLOYD ADAMS FOUND GUILTY**

**In Second Greenup Trial; Sentenced to 12 Years, Instead of Life Term**

The amounts appropriated for 10 of the 14 Kentucky projects were larger than those called for in the House-passed bill, and for three of the 14 were more than was set out in the budget.

This is attributable in large part to the work of Senator Chapman, who served on an appropriations subcommittee that considered rivers, harbors and flood-control projects. The full committee accepted the report of the subgroup.

The Senate committee granted funds for two Kentucky projects left out by both the budget and the House. They are the Jessamine Creek Reservoir, designed to protect Frankfort and other points on the Kentucky River, and a cutoff of the North Fork of the Kentucky at Jackson to protect low-lying sections of the Breathitt county seat.

The committee granted \$100,000 for planning the Jessamine dam, whose ultimate total cost is estimated at \$29,000,000. It granted \$180,000 for the Jackson cutoff, and that amount will do the job.

The committee granted \$50,000 for planning and \$500,000 for constructing a floodwall to protect Pineville from waters of the Cumberland. The budget called for the planning funds only, and the House granted nothing. Citizens of Pineville have voted a bond issue of \$490,000 to pay their share of the total cost, estimated at \$1,242,000.

Louisville Floodwall — Budget, \$4,500,000; House, \$3,500,000; Senate committee, \$3,800,000.  
 Ashland Floodwall — Budget, \$1,733,000; House, \$1,100,000; Senate, \$1,283,000.  
 Covington Floodwall — Budget, \$2,300,000; House, \$1,500,000; Senate, \$2,015,000.  
 Newport Floodwall — Budget, \$733,000; House, \$700,000; Senate, \$700,000, which is now estimated to be enough to complete it.  
 Maysville Floodwall — Budget, \$800,000; House \$600,000; Senate, \$600,000.  
 Wolf Creek Reservoir, the big project on the Upper Cumberland costing a total of \$82,700,000—Budget, \$22,100,000; House, \$19,000,000; Senate, \$22,100,000 which is due to finish it.  
 Cheatham Lock and Dam on the Lower Cumberland—Budget, \$3,000,000; House, nothing; Senate, \$2,250,000.  
 Dover Lock and Dam on the Lower Cumberland — Budget, \$100,000 for planning; House, nothing; Senate, \$100,000.  
 Falmouth Dam — Budget, \$50,000 for planning; nothing granted by either House or Senate.  
 Greenup Floodwall — Budget, \$30,000 for planning; nothing granted.

A second murder trial for Floyd Adams, 53, former Left Beaver Creek man, for wilful murder resulted Tuesday in a 12-year imprisonment sentence rather than the life term first imposed on him last September. The jury deliberated two hours after the defense and the Commonwealth had completed their cases last Tuesday, July 11. The verdict returned convicted Adams of manslaughter and sentenced him to 12 years' imprisonment. The sentence will be served at LaGrange Reformatory.

Adams was convicted last September and sentenced to life imprisonment for the slaying of tenant farmer Millard Wampler on August 1. The Kentucky Court of Appeals ruled that the trial judge had erred in his charge to the jury and granted Adams a new trial. After two continuances, the second trial opened July 10.

On the stand in his own defense, Adams testified that on August 1, he began moving his furniture into a three-room house on his 180-acre farm. The Wampler family had been occupying the main dwelling, about 100 yards from the smaller building.

After he and his wife had retired for the night, Adams said, he was awakened by loud talk and swearing. He got up and looked out the window and saw three men grappling over a gun. Then, he said, he made out Wampler walking toward the house carrying a shotgun.

Adams said he grabbed his shotgun and fired it twice through the window, "as fast as I could."

After the first shot, the defendant said, Wampler whirled around and fell to the ground. Adams said he guessed that's why the coroner found wounds in Wampler's shoulder and back.

Several days before the shooting, Adams reclaimed the large house which Wampler had been renting but the tenant refused to move. A court suit later established that Wampler could remain to fill out a one-year tenancy.

### JEST AMONG US

BY JACK WILD

Some of the rigorous rules and regulations governing private schools in Kentucky a hundred years ago have been unearthed by Lyman Ginger, of the University of Kentucky education faculty. Dr. Ginger, in a study of the elementary school principal in Kentucky, lists among others the following from the 1855 catalog of Greenville Institute, Harrodsburg:

1. Pupils must refrain from all hurried movements, loud talking, and laughing in every part of the mansion.  
2. No pupil shall enter other than her own apartments, without an invitation or permit from the matron.  
3. They shall not visit any store, nor without the knowledge of the principal make any purchase whatever.  
4. At meal time, the pupils will be required to observe the usual proprieties—modesty and kindly deferring to one another.  
5. They must abstain from eating slate pencils, chalk, fire coals, unripe fruit, or salt, except in food.  
6. No pupil shall, without permission, have any interview with any person who may visit the Institute.  
7. Pupils will seldom be permitted to make visits, or to attend weddings, parties, night meetings, exhibitions, or places of amusement.  
8. Pupils must, under all circumstances, decline the attention of gallants, either directly or indirectly, through any agency whatever.  
9. All letters and notes written or received by the pupils must pass through the hands of the principal, and will be subject to his inspection, except letters known to be from parents, guardians, or near relatives.  
10. At the ringing of the curfew bell, the pupils shall immediately repair to rest.

I suppose any pupil who insisted on eating the slate pencils, chalk, or fire coals mentioned in Item 5, was required to repair to rest, or to rest to repair, without waiting for the ringing of the curfew bell.

director of Selective Service, said it would take about 60 days for his re-activated organization to provide recruits the army could start turning into soldiers.

The new draft law which took effect Sunday makes no change in the ages of men who can be drafted. Every male must register when he becomes 18. Only those who have reached 19 and who have not yet become 26, can be drafted (certain groups are exempted). They can be kept in service for 21 months. National guardsmen and reserves can also be called for 21 months.

Exempted groups include ministers and ministerial students, aliens who have not applied for citizenship, mentally, morally or physically unfit persons, state and federal judges, Congressmen and members of state legislatures, and other officials elected by statewide vote, conscientious objectors, sole surviving son of families who already have lost a member in military service, and war veterans who served at least 90 days between December 7, 1941, and September 12, 1945, or at least 12 months between September 16, 1940, and June 24, 1948.

Draft boards may grant deferments to others, such as men who have dependents or who are engaged in essential work, but these deferments can be revoked.

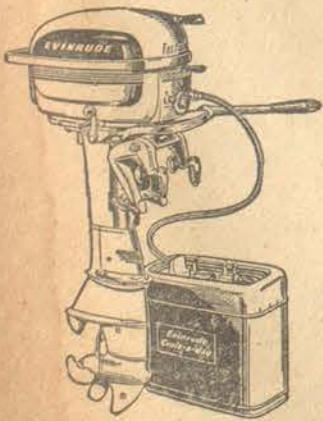

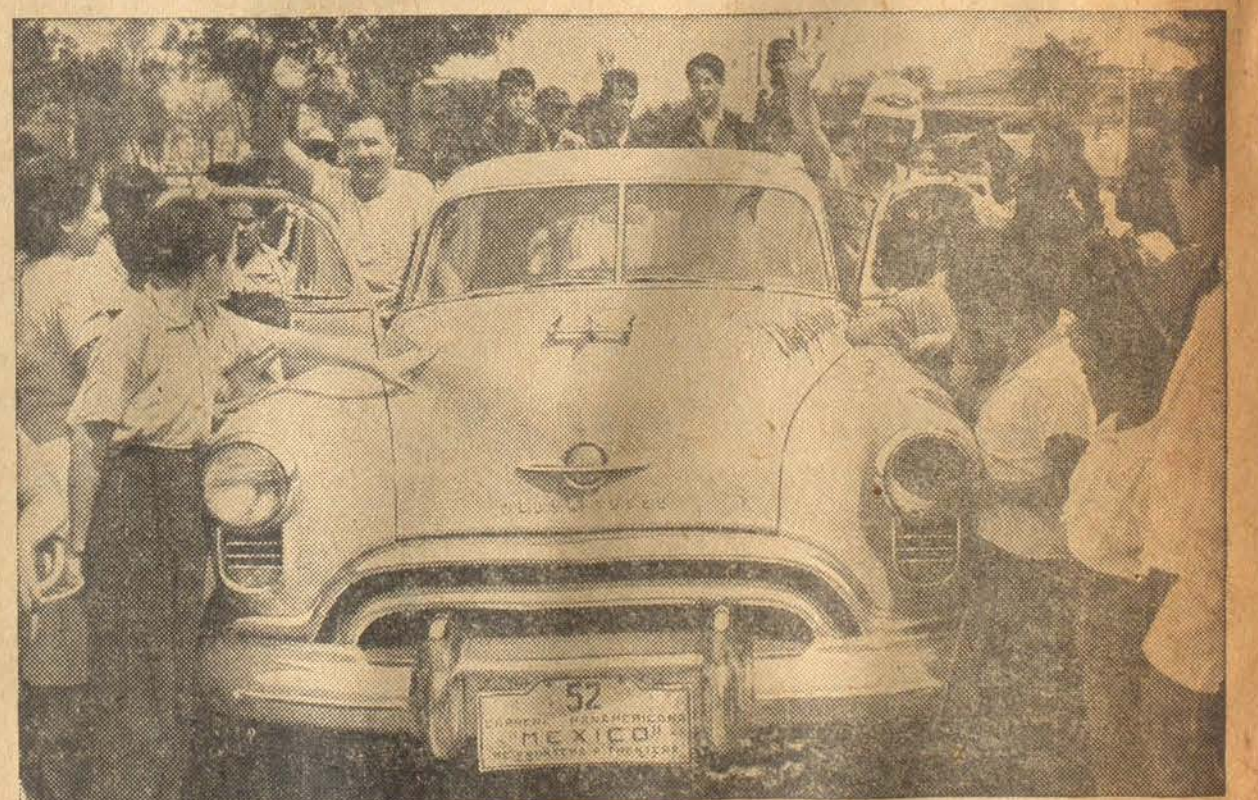

## BETTING RING IS DISCLOSED

### In Raid on Pikeville Poolhall, Says Sheriff, Reaching into Floyd

A Pikeville poolroom was described by Sheriff Roy Conway after he and upwards of 30 deputies had raided it Saturday as "the biggest gambling operation this side of Louisville" and as part of an operation embracing Floyd, Pike, Perry and Letcher counties.

Court action later was threatened to close the poolroom which, the Sheriff said, was operated by Homer Sowards Conway asked County Attorney L. D. May to start action to close the place as a public nuisance.

In the raid, which was made shortly before midnight Saturday, 12 persons were arrested, and a shortwave radio set, tip boards, bookie sheets and \$510.75 in cash were confiscated.

Sowards was fined \$200 and court costs before Magistrate B. E. "Buck" Moore.

Six other persons pleaded guilty to gambling charges and were fined \$34.50 each. They included Gus Paulis, Henry Hall, Marvin Ratliff, Bill Spears, Harlan Cook and Homer Sowards, all of Pikeville.

Four others pleaded innocent to gambling charges and appeared in court Wednesday before Magistrate Moore. They are Riley Hall, Floyd county, and Emzy Luster, Paul Mays, Dave Weddington and Claude Huffman, all of Pikeville. A fifth, Press Sowards, Pikeville, did not enter a plea. He also appeared Wednesday.

Sheriff Conway said he had been told by state police that the establishment had been in operation five years or longer.

## UNITED FUEL WINS RAISE

### Increase Only Half Amount Firm Sought In Eastern Kentucky

Frankfort, Ky., July 7—The United Fuel Gas Company was authorized today to raise its rates by \$131,000 a year. The firm applied for a \$262,000 increase.

United Fuel serves 16,000 customers in Ashland, Catlettsburg, Greenup, Inez, Louisa, and other Eastern Kentucky communities.

Rates to bring in \$262,000 have been charged by the company, under \$200,000 bond, since last November 26. The Public Service Commission ordered the firm to refund to customers about \$87,300 of excess rates charged since then. It was estimated the average refund would be about \$5.60.

The P. S. C. order said \$131,000 a year would give the company a return of about 7 per cent which is adequate. United Fuel contended it hadn't changed its rates since 1923 and needed more money to meet higher costs of operation.

The company does business in Ohio, West Virginia, Virginia, and Kentucky. The commission said about 2 per cent of the firm's business is done in Kentucky. United Fuel's headquarters is at Charleston, W. Va.

IT DOES PAY TO ADVERTISE

Chief Justice Sims Says Tourist Revenue Exceeds Cost of Ads

Cost of advertising space and making maps to attract tourist trade to Kentucky is relatively nothing compared to the revenue returned, highlighted an opinion written by Chief Justice Porter Sims in Frankfort Friday as the Court of Appeals explained how road taxes can be spent for tourist advertising.

The opinion elaborated on the court's bare ruling of June 23. Advertising Kentucky's attractions in newspapers and magazines gives the potential tourist advance information on what he can see in the state, the opinion said.

The opinion said out-of-state tourists bought 87,000,000 gallons of gasoline last year and paid more than \$6,000,000 in fuel taxes.

It would be the department's duty to advise motorists if a catastrophe occurred making Kentucky's roads and bridges impassable.

The case stemmed from Finance Commissioner John W. Manning's refusal to pay claims for tourist advertising. Highway Commissioner John A. Keek filed suit to compel Manning to honor the claims.

Manning contended the Constitution limits road-fund spending to the administration, construction and repair of roads and bridges and the enforcement of traffic laws.

The Court of Appeals reversed Circuit Judge W. B. Ardery. The 1950 Legislature appropriated \$250,000 for the cost of tourist advertising, maps, booklets, photography and road information put out by the Highway Department.

The money comes out of the road fund.

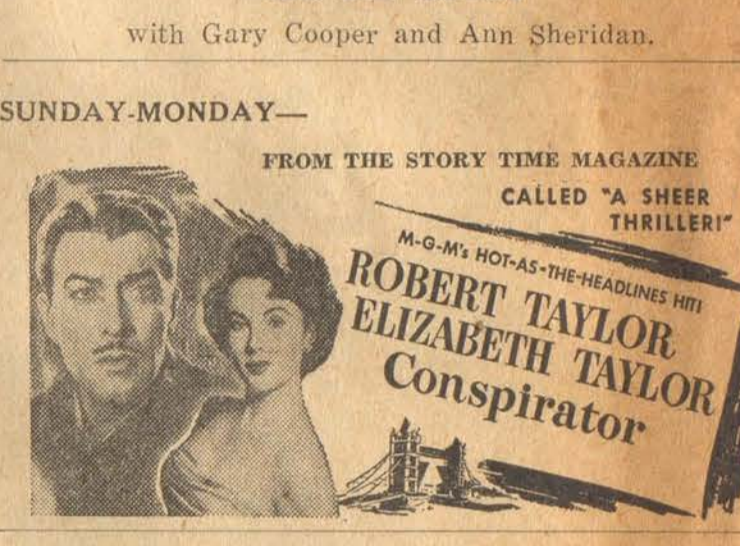

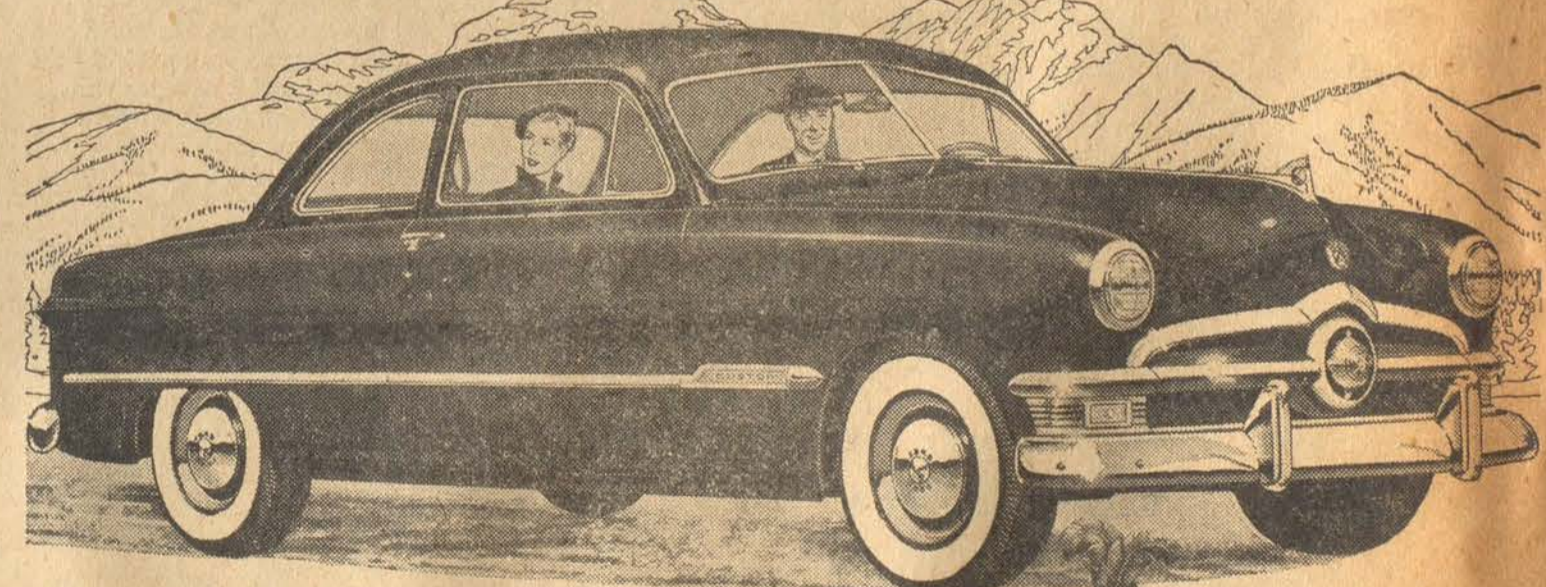

**SYNTHETIC PETROLEUM**

If necessary, enough coal, oil shale and natural gas could be obtained from four states to supply the U. S. with nine to ten million barrels a day of synthetic petroleum for up to 40 years, a survey by the Bureau of Mines has found. On the basis of these findings, a survey of potential synthetic oil materials in 37 states and Alaska has been started by the government. The preliminary check covered coal resources in western Kentucky, coal and shale in northwestern Colorado, natural gas in southeastern Texas, and coal in southeastern Montana.

**Certain Health Rules Cited As Essentials In Summer Camping**

Kentucky summer camps offer boys and girls a chance to participate in organized recreation and handcraft. Camping can be healthful as well as a happy experience if certain health rules are observed.

Before sending a child to camp, parents should make sure that the camp measures up to the standards set up by the Kentucky State Department of Health. The food is important and it is also important that the kitchens and dining areas are kept clean, screened and free of insects.

Parents should check with camp authorities to make sure that adequate water safety instruction is provided. Certain personal precautions on the part of the children are also essential if swimming and boating are to be properly safeguarded.

Children should be cautioned not to indulge in rough play in the pool, on the runway, diving board, dressing rooms or shower rooms. Horseplay has often resulted in accidents and, in some instances, in the loss of life.

Pools usually require swimmers to go to the toilet and to take a warm, soapy shower bath before donning a bathing suit. The importance of this precaution should be explained to the child. Further, it has been found that the proper drying of the feet after taking a shower is an aid to the prevention of athlete's foot.

Since water decreases the defensive power of the mucous membrane, it is particularly important that children with any communicable disease, skin disease, nasal or ear discharges, should not be permitted to go swimming. Over-crowded pools should be avoided, especially when there is a prevalence of disease. County sanitarians inspect swimming pools in boys' and girls' camps in their area, but just having a safe pool is not enough unless safe practices are also observed.

**Power Plant Opening Ceremonies Planned**  
More than 500 guests, including representatives from the states of Kentucky, Ohio, Virginia, West Virginia, and Tennessee, will attend ceremonies at Graham Station, West Virginia, July 27, when the first two units of the Philip Sporn steam-electric generating plant are dedicated to the public service. Okey L. Patterson, Governor of West Virginia and Philip Sporn, president of American Gas and Electric Company, for whom the plant is named will speak.  
On Saturday and Sunday, July 29 and 30, the Kentucky and West Virginia Power Company will hold "Open House" when it invites its customers and employees to visit the plant on these days, from 10 a.m. until 12 noon and from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. The plant will be open for public inspection. Guides will be on hand to conduct visitors through the plant.  
At the time of the dedication the plant will have in operation 300,000 kilowatts from the first two units of the projected six units. Two additional units which will add another 300,000 kilowatts are under construction. The plant is designed for an ultimate capacity of close to a million kilowatts, to become one of the world's great power stations.  
The plant is owned by Appalachian Electric Power Company and the Ohio Power Company, which with the Kentucky and West Virginia Power Company and three other companies, all inter-connected by high-voltage transmission lines, form the American Gas and Electric System serving over 1,100,000 customers in 2,100 communities. Most of the power distributed by the Kentucky and West Virginia Power Company is produced by Appalachian Electric Power Company.

A plastic thigh bone, carved from a block of polyethylene plastic, has been substituted for the natural bone in the leg of a 12-year-old boy. The natural bone was diseased and had to be removed. In the surgical operation, even natural muscles and tendons were attached to the plastic bone. Polyethylene plastic is a product of petroleum-derived materials.

**FEDERAL TAX COLLECTIONS In Ken'ucky Set New High At \$856,282,457 in '49**  
 Federal tax collections in Kentucky broke all records last year with \$856,282,457 collected by the office of Selden R. Glenn, collector of Internal Revenue, it was announced in Louisville last week.  
 Except for about \$1,500,000 collected in import duties, Glenn collected all taxes for the federal government in Kentucky.  
 The comparative figures for the two years on the principal tax items are listed in round figures:  
 1949-50 1948-49  
 Income ... \$234,000,000 \$207,000,000  
 Alcohol ... 358,000,000 320,000,000  
 Cigarette ... 185,000,000 161,000,000  
 The tax on alcohol represented almost 40,000,000 gallons of 100-proof whiskey bottled in the last fiscal year. The tax is \$9 a gallon.  
 The tax on cigarettes represented more than 50,000,000,000 cigarettes, or a rate of manufacture of about a billion a week.  
 The tax on cigarettes reached an all-time high in June of 1949. Kentucky is now the third largest center of cigarette manufacture in the United States. All the cigarettes made in the state are manufactured in Louisville.  
 Glenn said he believed the Kentucky district would be one of the very few in the United States to show an increase in collections over the previous fiscal year.

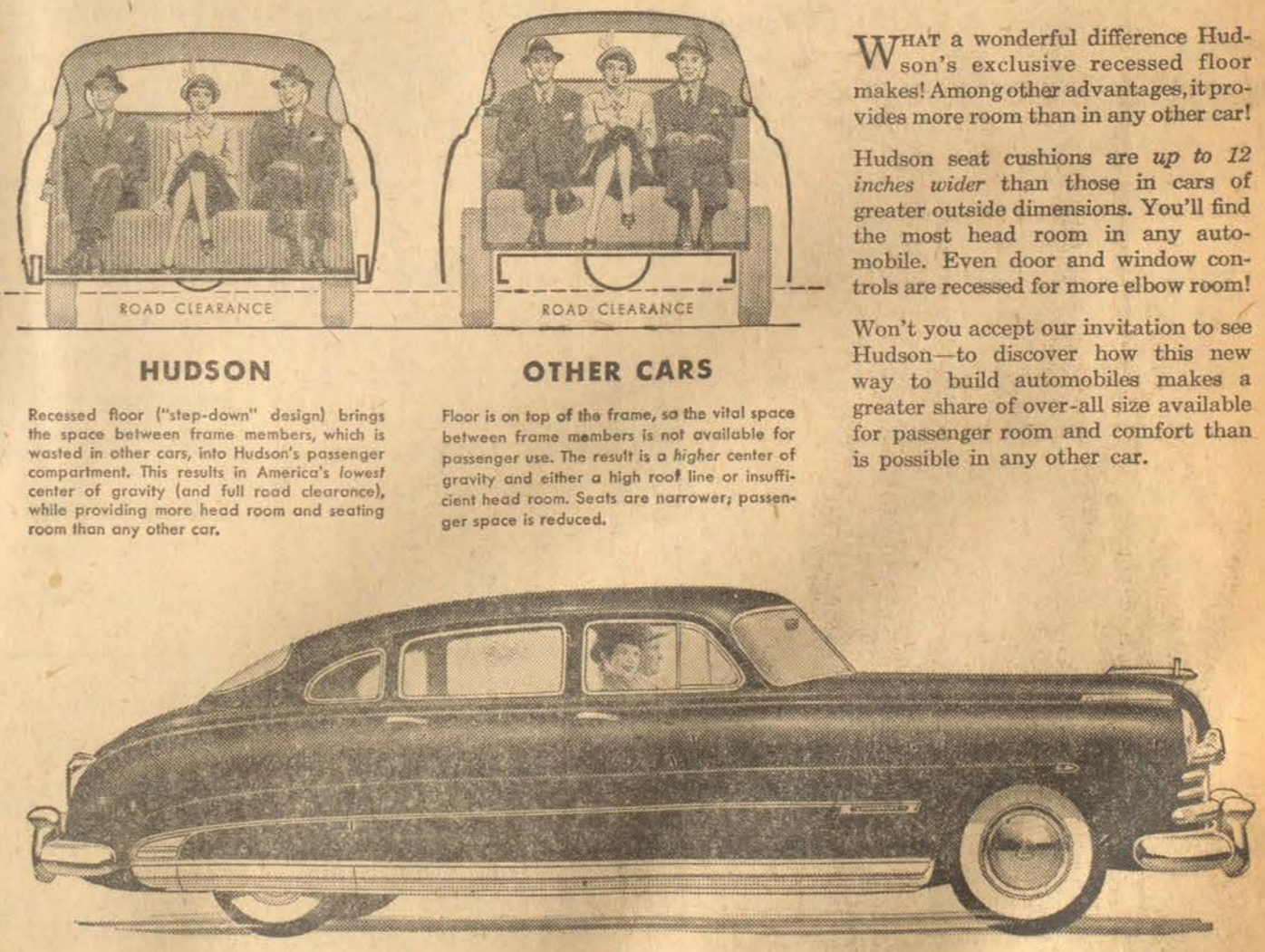
**Magoffin, Rowen Among Those Signing Assessment Contracts.**  
 After a year of organizing, training, and planning, Kentucky's property revaluation program reached the action phase when contracts were signed for the revaluation of property in four counties—Garrard, Magoffin, Rowan, and Simpson.  
 The contract for revaluation in Garrard county went to J. L. Jacobs and Company, Chicago, at a price not to exceed \$30,000; the Rowan county contract went to Doane Agricultural Service, Inc., of St. Louis, for \$26,000. Magoffin county went to Deane also for the sum of \$31,800, and Roy L. Wenzlick & Company, of St. Louis, was the successful bidder for Simpson county at \$1,430. A separate contract with Henry A. Spalding, mining engineer, covers valuation of mineral resources in Magoffin and Rowan counties.  
 These firms will inventory, describe and appraise all property in the counties in which they work. Much of the detail will be done by local people, hired, trained and supervised by the contracting firms. All of this work is in corporation with the county tax commissioners, and the information obtained will be for his use.  
 When the property has been appraised, the local taxing authorities will decide what per cent of value to use for tax purposes. The fiscal court will determine the tax rate.  
 It is believed by Commissioner H. Clyde Reeves that the four counties being revalued will establish a pattern of equitable assessment that can be used by other counties in the state.  
 Louisville and Jefferson county are now carrying on a revaluation project along the same general plan.  
 The program now under way was made possible by laws passed at the special legislative session last year.

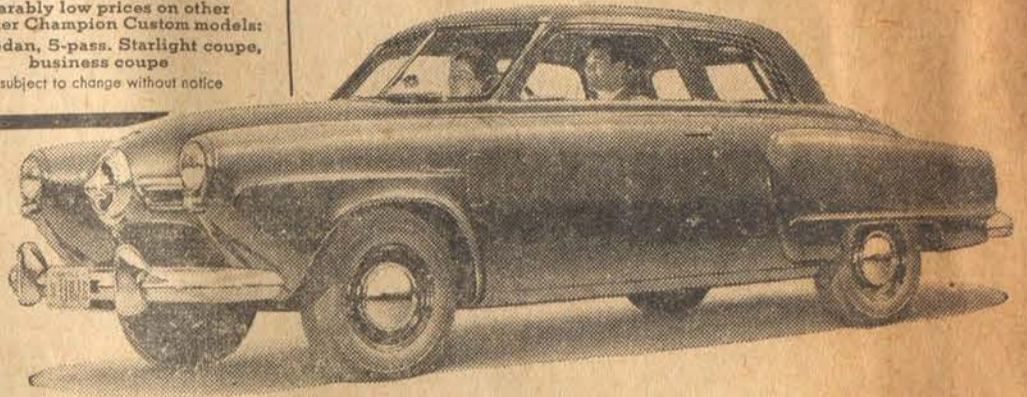
