Board of Education Yet Sharply Divided; Meeting Ends Abraptly

Teachers of Floyd county's rural schools were employed at Tuesday's rather brief but interesting meeting of the Floyd County Board of Education.

Again a perfunctory effort was made to reach agreement on a fifth member of the Board, successon to Ray Fraley, but again the Board was divided at two-all. Ezra Turner and J. C. Wells, as at last week's futile attempt at appointment, were placed in nomination for the post Dr. J. H. Allen, chairman of the Board, said he interrupted an attempt by Superintendent Palmer L. Hall to place in nomination names of teachers for the consolidated schools along with those of rural schools, by calling for a motion to approve the list of rural teachers James Green's motion to that effect was seconded by Dr. W. D. Osborne, and the vote was unani mous

The list of recommendations in addition to the rural teachers included attendance officers and others whose employment, the Board chairman said, ended on July 1 These, however, were not re-employed, since the remainder of the ecommendations were not enter

tained by the Board. Dr. Allen explained that it has ever been customary for the Board to employ all the teachers in one group, that the Board has always first employed the rural teachers.

Superinendent Hall commented little on the meeting except to say he had the entire teacher list ready for consideration and that the meeting was abruptly terminated without taking action on all his nominations.

He added that he had planned to ask the Board to consider purchase of a site here for a new high school building. The location men tioned is the Valentine Hopkins property fronting on the Mayo Trail near the former city limits here
