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

#### GENERAL ASSEMBLY RECOGNIZES FLOYD COUNTY SESQUICENTENNIAL

Recognition of Floyd county's Sesquicentennial observance this year was accorded by the General Assembly, Friday, busiest day of the session, through unanimous approval by both Houses of a resolution introduced by Representatives Paul E. Hayes and Henry C. Hale and Senator Doug Hays..

The resolution which follows was written by Secretary of State George Glenn Hatcher, himself a native Floyd countian.

A concurrent resolution extending congratulations and felicitations to the citizens of Floyd County upon the celebration of the Floyd County Sesquicentennial on behalf of the people of the Commonwealth of Kentucky by the 1956 General Assembly.

WHEREAS. The King of England did issue a charter on May 23rd, 1609, to colonize the territory comprising Virginia which included the now present Commonwealth of Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, the Grand Assembly of the Colony of Virginia in the year 1623 met and divided the new colony into eight shires of James City, Henrico, Warwick, Warrior's Oak, Charles City, Elizabeth City, Charles River and Acconniack, and in 1720 Spotsylvania County was created, and out of which in the year 1734 the county of Orange was created, then in 1738 Augusta county was formed, then in the year 1754 Governor Dinwiddie issued a proclamation giving George Washington authority to survey 200,000 acres of land on the Big Sandy, Guyandotte, and Kanawha rivers. This land included patents of John Frye for 2,084 acres and John Savage of 28,627 acres, a part of which were later in Floyd county, being lands purported to have been previously surveyed by George Washington; and

WHEREAS, most of the 200,000 acres proclaimed to be surveyed by George Washington was patented afterwards by the men of General Washington for bravery and valor for services at the battle of Great Meadows during the Revolution; and then in 1770 Bottetourte County was created, then in 1772 Fincastle County formed; on January 1st, in the year 1777 Kentucky, Washington and Montgomery counties; Virginia, were created from the county of Fincastle, which went out of existence, and Kentucky County (which included all of present day Kentucky) was divided to form in 1789 Fayette County from present Kentucky boundary line on the east to the Kentucky river on the west, and in 1781 Bourbon County was made covering all of the territory from present state line on the east to the Licking river on the west (including what is now Bourbon county on the west), and in 1787 Mason County was formed out of said ferritory east of the Licking river, then in 1792 Kentucky became a Commonwealth or the 15th state of the United States of America, then in 1797 Montgomery County Kentucky, was made from the lands including present Montgomery County, Kentucky, that portion of land on headwaters of the Licking river. Then in the same year 1797 Fleming County was made including the present county and lands east of Licking river and Big Sandy lands to present West Virginia

WHEREAS, on June 1st, 1800, the County of Floyd was formed from parts of Mason, Montgomery and Fleming counties, which boundary on north and west were to Forks of Big Sandy at Louisa and east to what is now West Virginia line, including lands above mouth of Quicksand Creek on the Kentucky river on the west,

WHEREAS, Floyd County is the mother county of Pike, Johnson, Martin, Letcher, Magoffin and Perry, which counties were in their entirety created out of Floyd County, and

WHEREAS, parts of the counties of Lawrence, Clay, Carter, Elliott, Breathitt, Leslie and Harlan were formed from what was originally in Floyd county, and

WHEREAS, in the year 1769 Daniel Boone came to Kentucky with John Henderson and his men to explore and trade with the Indians, and a year later was found by his brother, Squire Boone, on the waters of Kentucky river, then in 1773 be it known that waters of Lick Fork of Middle Creek of the Big Sandy river, where he made salt while his companion went back to North Carolina for ammunition; and

WHEREAS, in the year 1796 John Graham came to what is now present day Floyd County and made the first John Preston survey in Floyd County of 800 acres of land where Prestonsburg, now county seat of Floyd county stands, which land was patented to John Graham. Thus the name "Prestonsburg" was given to the Floyd county seat in memory of John Preston, who made 162 surveys in said county. John Graham received patents on about one-half of the surveys and the rest being issued to various other persons.

Whereas, Floyd County was the hunting ground of the Indians and a refuge for the pioneers in the early days of our Commonwealth, who helped hew out the destiny of our great people, and the interesting Indian lore of the past includes the story of Jennie Wiley and her escape from the Indians in 1790 where she found an abode of safety in the Harmon Station in what is now Floyd County at the mouth of Johns Creek on the Big Sandy River;

WHEREAS, the endurance and endeavor of the pioneers of the past and the progressiveness of the present day citizenry developed one of the greatest industrial sections of our Commonwealth. Starting with the day of the canoe, horseback and steamboat transportation into the present day where railroads and improved highways and modern conveniences have made Floyd county with its timber and mineral deposits an industrial empire,

WHEREAS, Floyd County has an illustrious history and has produced many famous sons active in state, national and world affairs, including those who have participated in the defense of our great nation, all of which reflects credit upon this great Commonwealth, and

WHEREAS, from July 1st to the 4th, inclusive, in this the year 1950, the citizens of Kentucky will at Prestonsburg celebrate the one-hundred-fiftieth anniversary of the existence of Floyd

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, THE SENATE CONCURRING

That the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky does hereby extend congratulations, and on behalf of all the counties send felicitations to the citizens of Floyd County on the occasion of their Sesquicentennial celebration,

That the Clerk of the House of Representatives be directed to forward a copy of this fesolution to the Clerk of Floyd County. That the Secretary of State, George Glenn Hatcher, a Floyd
