State Files 29 Suits Against Citizens Owing Inheritance, Income Tax

Suits against 29 citizens for failure to pay Kentucky income taxes have been filed in Franklin circuit court. According to Department of Revenue records, these taxpayers owe the state a total of \$3,002.45 in back income taxes and penalties. All of these cases were discovered in the department's current income tax enforcement program.

Nearly half of the delinquent taxpayers being sued are residents of Louisville.

CURLIN NAMED BY WETHERBY

To Head Highway Dept. When Keck Resignation Is Effective, Feb. 15

Governor Lawrence Wetherby has appointed William P. Curlin commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Highways.

"I'm giving him full and complete authority to administer the affairs of the department," Wetherby said.

"I have asked him to make a complete and thorough investigation of all the operations of the department, and if any practices or operations are not as they should be, I have instructed him to remedy such practices or operations. He has a free hand.

"If any contractor or vendor who has dealings with the Highway Department in the past has any information of wrongdoing, I call upon him to give such information to Mr. Curlin or me.

"If any contractor or vendor gives such information, I assure him he will not be penalized in his future dealings with the Highway Department.

"The Highway Department must be administered in such a manner as to give the people complete confidence in its operations. I am confident that under Mr. Curlin it will be so conducted."

Curlin, 45, is a native of Hickman, Fulton county. He joined the Highway Department as a roadman in 1925 and is a registered professional engineer. He has been deputy highway commissioner under Commissioner John A. Keck, who resigned last Thursday, effective February 15, the day Curlin will take over.

Wetherby's statement made no direct reference to four suits in which Keck and certain highway contractors are accused of bribery, conspiracy and bid-rigging in the award of contracts. The Franklin county grand jury recently cleared Keck and the department of the charges, saying it was unable to turn up any evidence of malpractices warranting indictments.

Keck resigned soon after that. He said he did so because he feared his continuing in office "might embarrass" the Governor and the Administration.

An Old Patient With a New Doctor

SOME mild criticism has been heard locally of Governor Lawrence Wetherby's choice of a new Highway Commissioner to succeed John A. Keck who retired from the field of battle while under heavy fire.

There was no criticism of William P. Curlin, the new Commissioner, as a man. The objection was to his being a resident of Western Kentucky, and at that the views expressed were not so much in the form of criticism as the expression of political "fears." Afraid the Governor made a mistake appointing a western Kentucky man... too many appointments already from that section... should have named somebody from this part of the state, etc.

All of which is purely political, and so inconsequential, yak-yak insofar as the state of Kentucky, the soundness of its institutions and the integrity of its officials are concerned.

If Governor Wetherby has appointed a man who will make an honest effort to probe into whatever rottenness which may be infecting the Highway Department and to follow up with a major operation, if necessary, to rid the Department of these suspected sores, he has made the right appointment. Otherwise, he has failed. The Governor has indicated he expects an honest effort of Mr. Curlin. Time will tell.

The resignation from the post of Eastern Kentucky's John A. Keck did not cure the Department's ills. They are ills, we suspect, which are chronic, which date back into state history. Both Republicans and Democrats have permitted the sores to fester, close temporarily and fester again to poison the system of the body politic. We all have seen the patient suffer. We all have suffered.

How much Judge Charles I. Dawson will be able to prove of his charges that, specifically, the ills of the State Highway Department consist of bribery, conspiracy and bid-rigging, we do not know. It may be that Dr. Dawson's diagnosis is incorrect.

But he should be given every help in learning the truth. And the new commissioner of the State Highway Department and the Governor of Kentucky should sit in on the probe, as coldly, methodically and interestedly as would any doctor striving for a cure for his patient.




MEMBERSHIP GROWTH PLANS TO BE DISCUSSED BY SCOUT LEADERS AT WAMPUM MEET
A long-range plan for membership growth is being formulated by Scout leaders of Lonesome Pine Council, according to information received from E. R. Price, Wheelwright, a past president of the Council and at present the National Council representative.
Mr. Price reported that a planning meeting will be held at the Wampum Conference at Pikeville Junior College, Feb. 17, to explore the possibilities of long-range growth. Representatives from the following districts have been invited to attend the meeting: Pike district, Floyd district, Letcher district, Kentucky River district including Knott, Perry, Leslie and Breathitt counties, Johnson district including Johnson, Magoffin and Martin counties; Buchanan district including Dickerson county in Virginia, Wise district, Lee and Russell districts.
At present, the Council has a membership of approximately 2,000 boys. About one boy out of 15 of Scout age in the area is a Scout. The long-range objective is to extend the program of Scouting to the national average of one boy out of every four.

chases by Mr. Hall to not more than \$50. Purchases above that amount will be made by James Greene, chairman of the Board.

Acting to beat future shortages, the Board directed that bids be asked on school buses and furniture for next year's needs. Three buses may be purchased at the next Board meeting, two of which are to be of large capacity and placed in service on the river route to relieve overcrowding. This purchase depends, however, on State Department of Education approval of financing arrangements.

A McDowell delegation presented the Board a petition asking additional classrooms and a lunch room for their school there. It was pointed out that four rooms of the school have more than 60 pupils each and one has more than 70. The Board took no action.

Abandonment of the Steele's Creek and Bee Fork schools was voted. The latter, located approximately a mile from Bonanza, has not been in operation for about five years. Construction of the Wayland-Sizemore road makes it possible for Steele's Creek pupils to be transported to the Wayland consolidated school. Steele's Creek attendance was down to about 15 pupils. The old Katy Friend school was sold to Dr. M. T. Dotson on his bid of \$63.

C. Kilmer Combs, Prestonsburg attorney, was employed to handle the \$30,000 bond issue for construction of the Maytown cafeteria. Mr. Combs, it was explained, handled a similar transaction for the Betsy Layne school, and his services will not cost as much as one of the large bonding firms.

Salaries of James Salisbury, Martin school principal, and V. O. Turner, principal at Maytown, for July and August, 1950 were ordered paid. The principals claimed salary for the two months under teacher tenure, submitting that they reported to the County Superintendent's office for the usual annual supervisory work but were not placed at work. Superintendent Hall said they did not report.

Music departments in two consolidated schools which have been hit by the teacher shortage now have instructors as a result of Tuesday's Board action. Carol Jean Hall and Mrs. Helen Pace were named for the Wheelwright music department, and Bill Sargent was employed, part-time, for the Betsy Layne school.

Johnson Probes Death Of 'Ned' Daniels, 59; Poison Found in Auto

Paintsville, Ky., Feb. 6.—Three companions of Edgar "Ned" Daniels on the night he died testified before a court of inquiry here today. County Attorney Don Vanhoose said the testimony would be studied, along with a chemical analysis of stomach fluids from Daniel's body, before any legal action is taken.

The F.B.I. is making the analysis and is expected to report about Friday. Daniels' body was found Sunday in the home of a friend on Tom's Creek, two miles from Sitka. A 7-ounce bottle of rat poison was found near an abandoned car in which Daniels and the three other men had been riding shortly before the 59-year-old coal miner died.

Daniels recently testified before the grand jury on drunkenness and fighting charges against the three men.

GI Policyholders To Get Dividend Worth \$685,000

Payment of a second special dividend totaling \$685,000 to the holders of some 8,000,000 National Service (GI) Life Insurance policies has been announced by Carl R. Grav, Jr., administrator of Veterans Affairs. Dividends will be calculated through the anniversary date of the policy in 1951 and payment will be distributed over a period of one year. First checks will be ready in April.

VA urged veterans not to write regarding this second dividend, since correspondence would cause removal of the veteran's file from the production lines and delay payment.

The payments will cover a three-year period, from 1948 to 1951 and policies held in force for three months or more during this period will be eligible for dividends. This includes both term and permanent plan policies, including those which have lapsed or were terminated by death of the insured veteran.

The amount of the dividend earned by each policy will vary according to the number of months it was in force, the plan of insurance, face value of the policy and the age of the insured at the time it became effective. VA said studies on rates to be paid are still being made.

VA explained that the first special dividend of \$2.8 billion, payment of which has almost been completed, covered the period each policy was in force up to its anniversary date in 1948. The second dividend will be for the number of months from that date to the corresponding date in 1951. Policies issued in 1948, 1949 and 1950 will earn dividends up to their anniversaries in 1951.

Unlike the first dividend, no application will be required for the second dividend.

CONSOL COAL LEASES LAND

Cassidy Says Co. Plans To Build River Tipple And Coal Storage Yard

S. M. Cassidy, president of the Consolidation Coal Company (Ky.), Jenkins, announced Monday that the company had made a long-term lease of property along the Ohio river in Ashland for the future operation of a river tipple and coal storage yard. This property is known as the old Ashland airport. Definite plans for construction have not yet been made for facilities for unloading, storing and re-loading of coal for shipment by either rail or river. All of these facilities, including a tipple with suitable docks for river loading, will eventually be erected by Consolidation. It is expected that other coal companies will also use the plant.

Consolidation is the largest coal producer in Eastern Kentucky, operating five mines in Letcher, Pike and Harlan counties. Coal from these mines is processed through large, modern preparation plants containing complete coal washing and drying facilities.

Navy's ROC Program Will Be Continued, Says Announcement

The navy will continue the Reserve Office Candidate (ROC) program which leads to a commission in the U.S. Naval Reserve on graduation from an accredited college, it was announced last week.

The ROC program is designed to augment the flow of officers into the Naval Reserve. Qualified and selected student candidates will attend two six weeks training courses at one of these schools during the summer months. The schools for men are located at Newport, R.I., and San Diego, Calif. Selected men candidates will attend one of the two schools, depending on the geographic location of their college or home. Selected women candidates will attend the school located at Great Lakes, Ill.

To be eligible for the Navy ROC program men candidates must be at least 17 years old. Women candidates must be 18 years old, a citizen of the United States; be enrolled, attending, and in good scholastic standing at an accredited college or university. All candidates must be physically qualified, of good moral character, and a member of the Naval Reserves. Theological, medical, dental and some other related professional students are not eligible for the ROC program.

Successful candidates qualifying for the ROC program will be paid for six weeks each summer while training, will receive travel expenses from their home or college to the training schools and also travel expenses on their return home. Uniforms, food and lodging will be furnished at the schools by the navy. Minimum pay for the first six weeks is approximately \$25 per week, and \$30 per week during the second summer.

ROC students will not study naval subjects during the regular academic year nor will they have to attend drills. The only activity will be the basic training course during the first six weeks summer period and the advanced course during the second summer. The program is slightly different this year in that juniors may be accepted in the program. During the previous two years only freshmen and sophomores were eligible.

Decision on Southern Bell Plea for Ky. Rate Increase To Be Reached by March 2

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 5.—The hearing on the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company's plea for a \$2,691,000 rate increase in Kentucky ended today. It began last August.

Chairman Robert M. Coleman of the Public Service Commission said the decision on the application will be reached by March 2, the date when the company's refund bonds expire.

Southern Bell put the final touches to its case and restated the qualifications of some of the witnesses who elaborated on testimony they had offered earlier.

Last week the company closely questioned James M. Honaker, a special consultant for the commission in this case, as to his qualifications as a witness on telephone matters.

When R. R. Stubbs, a Southern Bell vice-president and always its leading witness in rate cases, took the stand today, Assistant Attorney General Gardner Ashcraft got these replies from him:

That Stubbs is not an attorney, is not a licensed accountant, has no formal education in accounting, had never built a telephone plant, "but I believe I can still climb a pole."

Stubbs said he obtained his telephone knowledge through experience. The company put a rate schedule designed to raise \$2,691,000 a year, into effect last July 6. It posted bond totaling \$1,800,000, permitted by statute, to guarantee refund of increase if any or all of it is ruled excessive.

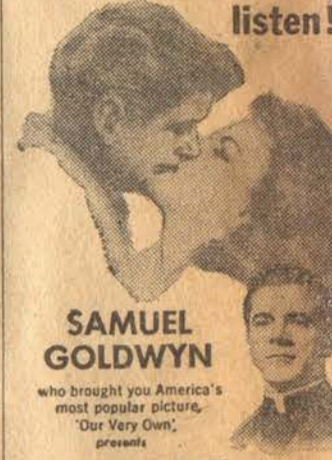

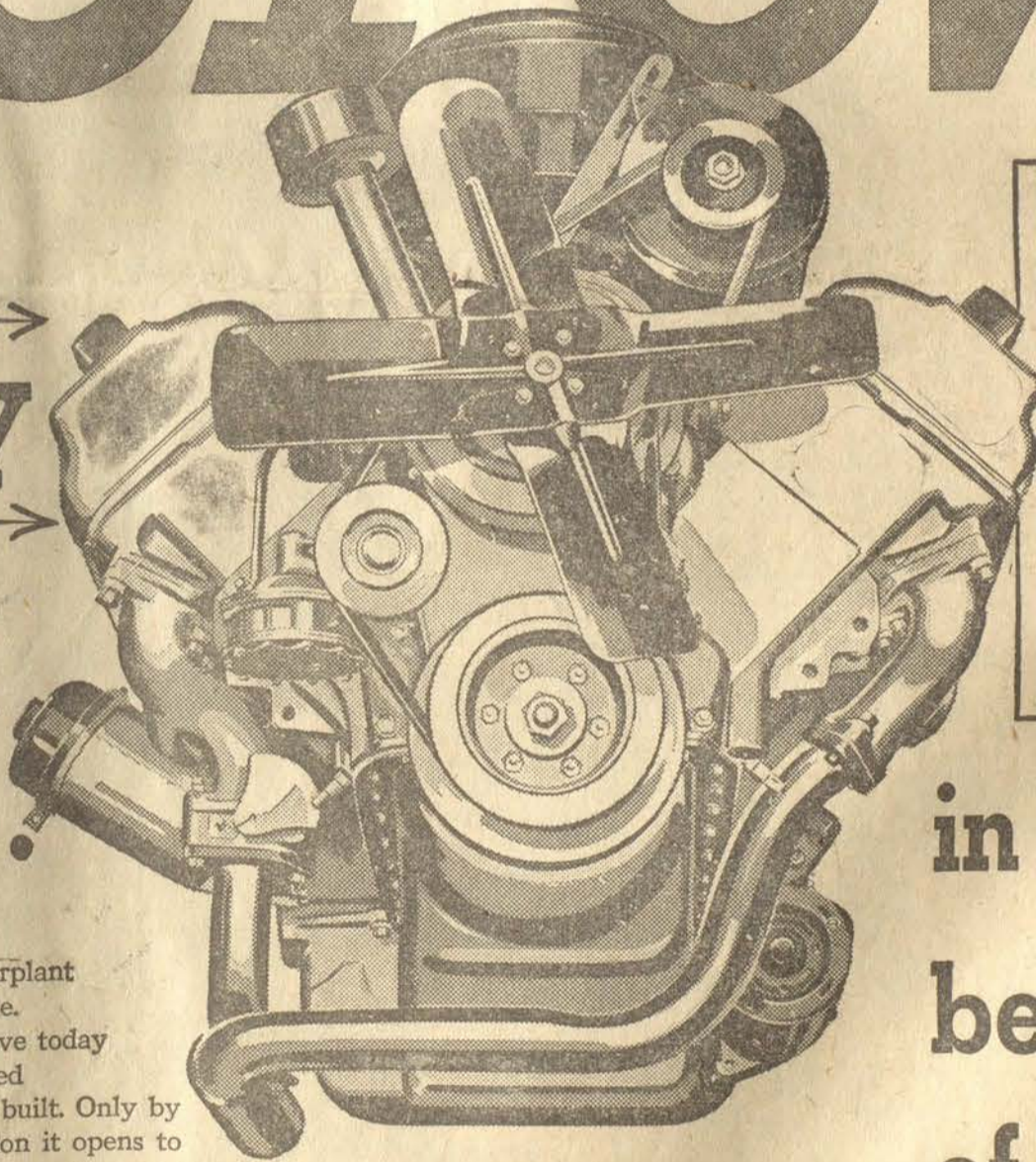

Chapman Is Assigned To Sixth Committee

A sixth assignment to an important committee job went last week to Senator Virgil Chapman.

The Kentuckian was appointed by Chairman Richard B. Russell, of the Armed-Services committee to serve on a special three-man subcommittee within the Appropriations committee.

This new assignment means that on appropriations for the army, navy, and air force, Chapman will have as much of a vote as any member of the Appropriations committee. The two others appointed by Chairman Russell are Harry Flood Byrd, Virginia Democrat, and Wayne Morris, Oregon Republican.

The Kentuckian already had one foot in the door of the Appropriations committee, the most sought-after body in the chamber. For some months, he has been a member of the Public Works committee's subcommittee on civil functions of the army. That means that on appropriations for flood control and other projects carried out by the army engineers, he has as much of a committee vote as has Chairman Kenneth McKellar of Tennessee.

Chapman's two regular committees are Armed Services and Public Works. The two appropriations subcommittees bring his total to four jobs. His fifth assignment is as a member of the preparedness subcommittee of the Armed-Services committee.

Chapman's sixth job is that of member of the Democratic policy committee of the Senate. This group, made up largely of members of the Southern wing, is to assist Majority Leader Ernest W. McFarland, of Arizona, in guiding the Senate's legislative program.

Back in the days when Alben W. Barkley was majority leader, the policy committee was of little importance because Barkley sought single-handedly to guide the party in the path the Administration wanted to follow. But McFarland is lacking in desire to have the Senate majority follow President Truman on domestic issues or to give it personal leadership. Hence, the policy committee has grown in importance.

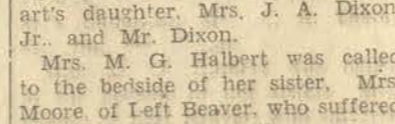

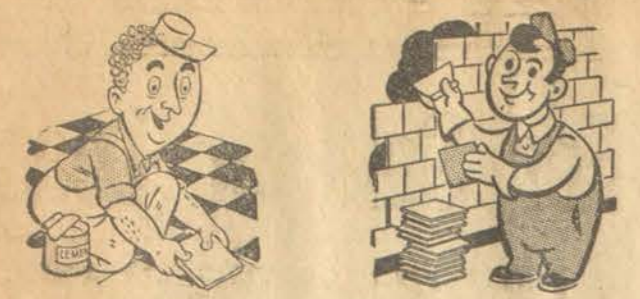

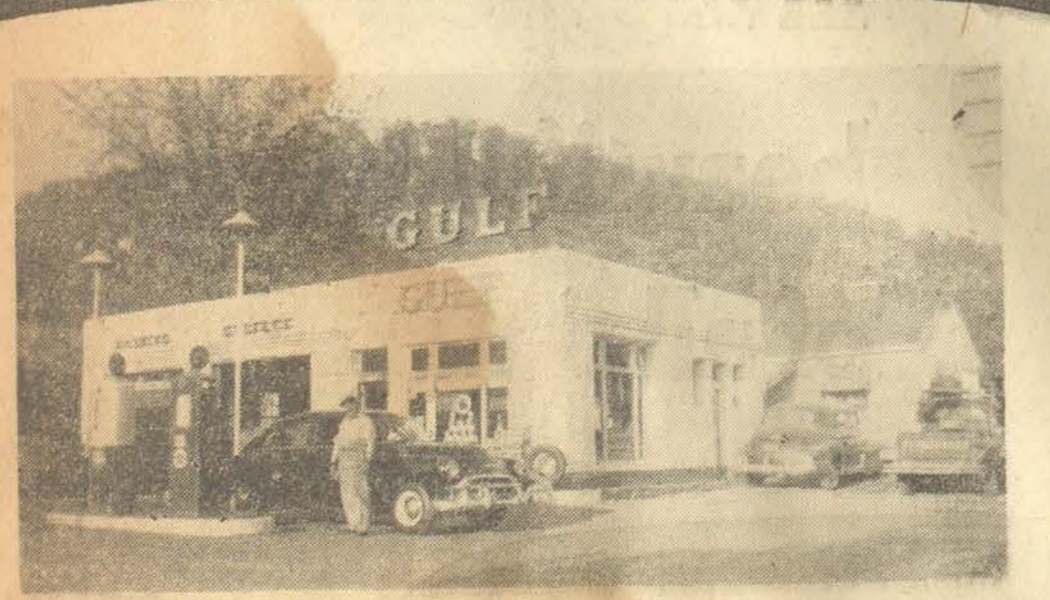

NOTICE TO FLOYD COUNTY TAXPAYERS

It shall be the duty of all persons owning or having interest in any property taxable in this state to list or have listed with the Tax Commissioner of the county in which the property is located between January 1st, and March 1st, 1951.

KRS 132-290:
 Any property which has not been listed for taxation, for any year in which it is taxable, by the time the board of supervisors completes its work for that year shall be deemed omitted property.

(2) Omitted property consisting of money in hand, notes, bonds, shares of stock, accounts or other credits, secured or unsecured may be assessed retro-actively, either voluntarily or by action, at any time within ten years from the date when it became omitted. All other omitted property may be assessed retro-actively in the manner provided by law at any time within five years from the date when it became omitted, but the lien there-by accruing on any such property except real property shall not prejudice the rights of bona fide purchasers acquired in the meantime.

(3) All omitted property that should have been assessed prior to July 1, 1949, shall be subject to the same penalties and rate of interest as provided by law for the years when the property was not assessed. All omitted property that should have been assessed as of or subsequent to July 1, 1949, shall be subject to a penalty of ten percent of the amount of the taxes, and interest at 1 per cent per month from the date when the taxes would have become delinquent had the property been listed as required by law, until the date the tax bill is prepared in accordance with KRS 133-230. When the property is assessed retro-actively by action prosecuted in the manner provided by KRS 132-330 and 132-340, an additional penalty of twenty percent of the amount of the original tax, interest and penalty shall be collected for the purpose provided in KRS 134-400 and paid into the State Treasury. All other penalties and interest shall be distributed in the same manner as the tax, (1949, ex s., c. 2, 2, effective June 28, 1949). KRS 132-570 (409a-11; 4051; 4061; 4065).

ATTEMPTS TO EVADE TAXATION; PENALTY.

(1) No person shall willfully make a false statement, or, to avoid taxation, make a temporary investment in securities exempt from taxation, or convert any tangible property into nontaxable property outside of his state, or resort to any device to evade taxation. Any person doing so shall be subject to three times the amount of tax upon his property, to be recovered by the Sheriff by action in the name of the Commonwealth in the county in which the property is liable for taxation, or by the Department of Revenue, when the taxes are payable to it, in the Franklin circuit or quarterly court.

(2) No person shall transfer or assign of record any mortgage note, bond or other evidence of indebtedness, secured by any recorded instrument, for the sole purpose of evading the taxes thereon. 1-25-41

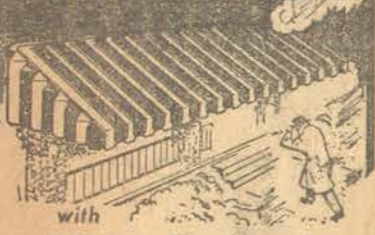

State Police Report 24,559 Were Arrested For Traffic Violations

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 30—State police today reported that 24,559 traffic arrests were made during 1950. Some 57,000 other people received the familiar red tickets warning them not to do it again.

Capt. Estill B. Jones, in charge of the Bureau of Traffic and Operations, said the 1950 arrests were 11,559 more than in 1949, and the number of warning tickets increased 55 per cent. He added:

"We have a limited number of men and we are proud of the job they did last year. The average trooper has to work long hours, but the courts are upholding him in his decisions. That is evident in the 20,734 convictions out of 25,559 arrests made during 1950.

"Kentucky's traffic problem is growing every year with the ever increasing number of automobiles on the roads, and our accident rate, which was higher last year, demands even closer supervision.

"Our men investigated over 8,000 accidents, which took a toll of over 600 lives. Our job is to help the motoring public, but they must help themselves by observing all of the safety rules and laws of the highway."

In addition to traffic, 4,326 criminal arrests were made by troopers on the road, the report added. This included such violations as drunkenness in a public place and breach of the peace.

Property recovered by the State police amounted to \$902,842.37 and fines levied by the courts totaled \$167,621.65.

Transy Student Hits Agriculture Branch In Research Paper

A Transylvania College student, Oneil Hester, of Irvine, Ky., has written a research paper in which he claims that the Department of Agriculture "has acquired for itself a kind of autonomy, a power to actually govern the people whom it is supposed to serve." Describing Secretary of Agriculture, Charles F. Brannan, he writes, "Few men in a democracy have ever had a more powerful political instrument."

Oneil Hester, senior student at Transylvania, and a veteran of the last war, was one of three men doing research on the subject of tobacco. His phase of the work was "Tobacco and Politics."

The Production and Marketing Agency, central bureau of the department, was originally formed with the intention of instituting the own meeting type of Democracy among farmers. He found, however, after three months of intensive research on the subject, that the farmer committees formed have been undermined by an unstoppable trend within the Department of Agriculture, Hester wrote.

"The state committees are over the county committees, and these state committees are appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. Men who do not conform with the beliefs of the Secretary of Agriculture can dig their graves as far as the field of politics is concerned. These appointed men are looked upon as spies for the government by the farmer."

The student stated that he believes that "It now has become clear to most farmers that the farmer committees are no more than camouflage for the real power of the Department of Agriculture."

He found that, though the farmer has gained much in the way of benefits from the government, he has done so at the cost of a considerable amount of freedom. Hester believes that "eventually the farmers will overthrow the government rule and insist upon instituting their own farm program, managed by themselves in a more democratic way."

The government attempt to control the tobacco farmer is nothing new in this country. "The Virginia Assembly of 1639," wrote the Transylvania student, "furnishes us with the earliest government control of tobacco production, reducing crops to 1,500,000 pounds by burning the remainder."

The modern and more thorough counterpart of the act of the Colonial Virginia Assembly has been the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1933. Though found to be unconstitutional in 1935, "many acts have been passed since to accomplish the same things by different methods."

Wetherby Picks Group To Study Voting Law And Rewrite Statute

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 29—Governor Lawrence Wetherby today announced selection of a committee to help reorganize Kentucky's much-criticized purgation and registration laws.

The committee is to work with the Legislative Research Commission in a study and rewriting of these statutes.

Named to the committee were George J. Kaufman, Campbell County clerk; R. Cary Graham, Franklin county clerk; Harris Coleman, former county attorney of Jefferson county; S. R. Cheek, Boyle county judge, and Dr. Gladys Kammerer, professor of political science at the University of Kentucky.

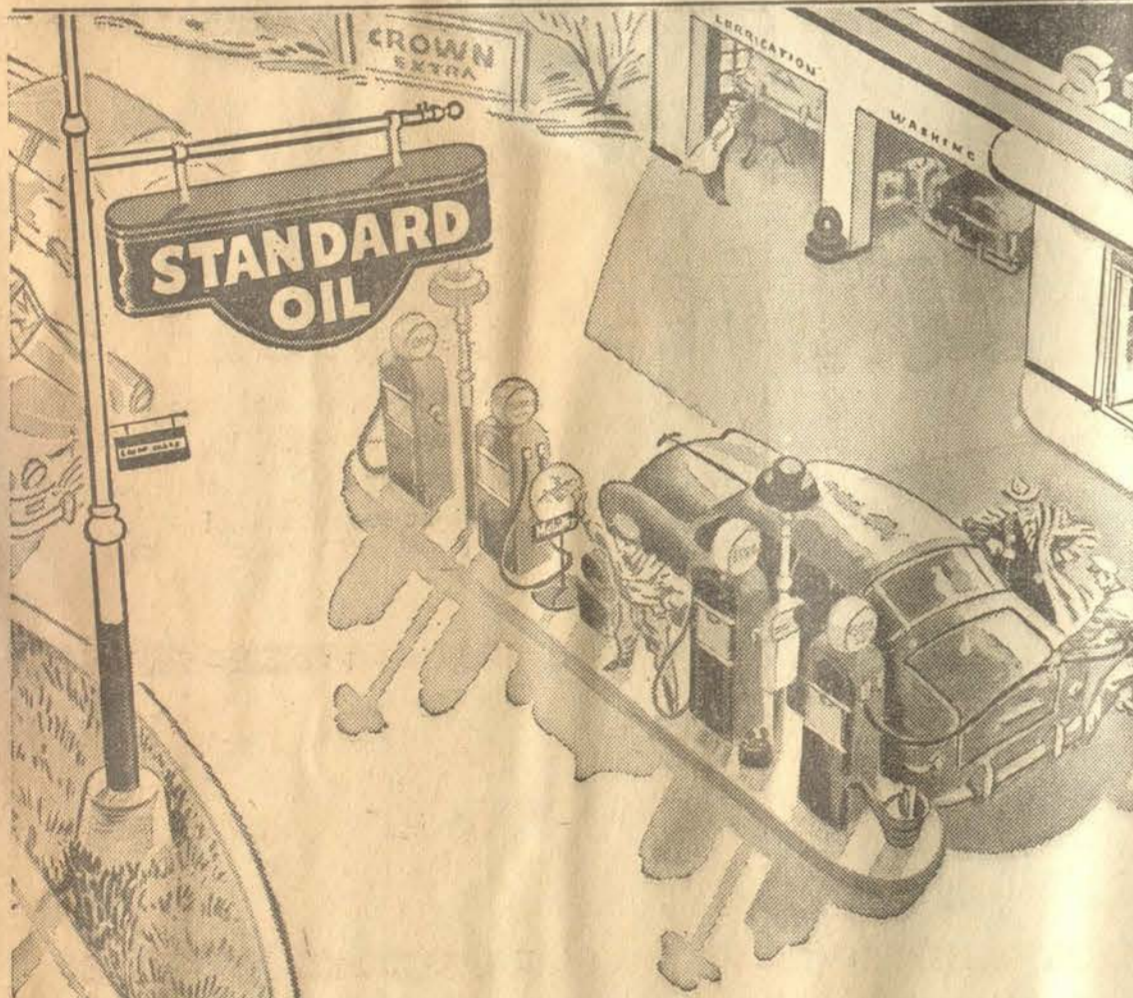

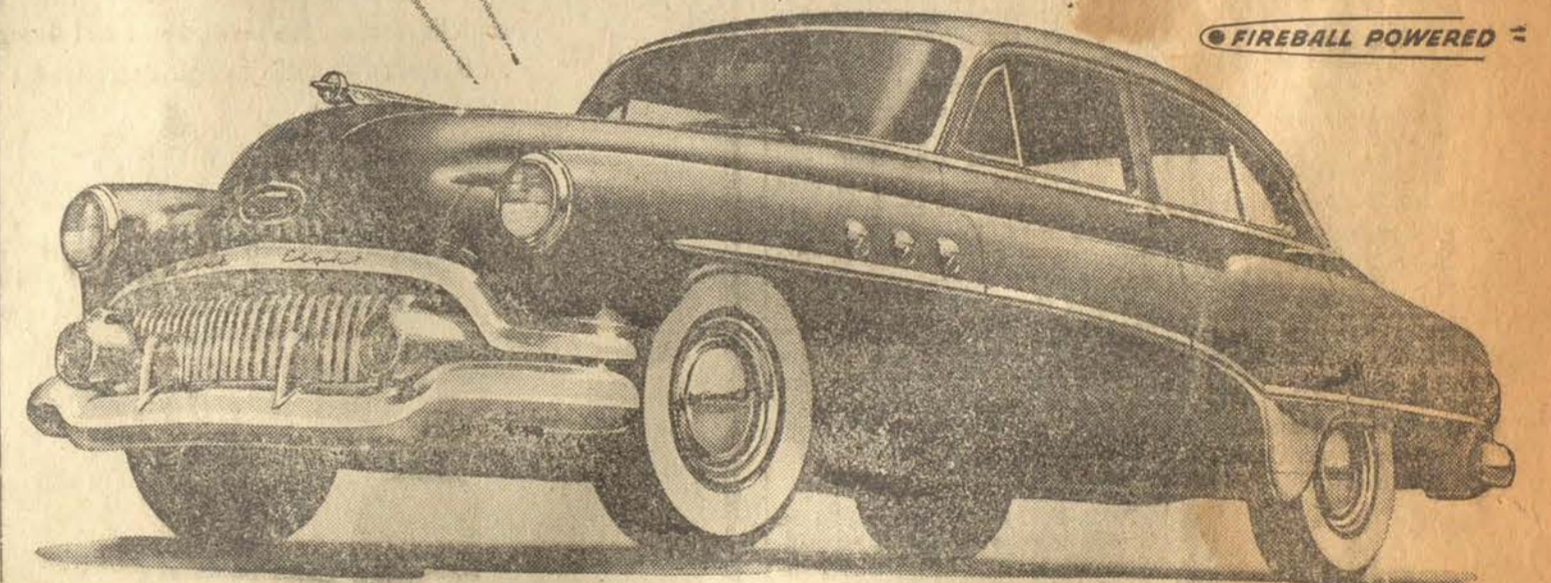

Floyd County Historical Notes

By HENRY P. SCALF

Frequently in the mail are letters from former Big Sandians who yet retain their love for the storied and historic valley. Ever there is that pride in being a native for the Sandy country—a pride possessed, perhaps by no other people in such intensity.

A letter from Mrs. Addie Burgess, 222 Capitol Avenue, Frankfort, Kentucky, while it exhibits this pride of home and people, contributes as well certain generalities on the Vaughans and Youngs that are indeed interesting.

"Permit me to state by way of introduction that I am, every whit, a Big Sandian, and that my ancestors on my mother's side were those who migrated from Virginia to Floyd county in the days when the county comprised a vast territory. For several years I have worked here in Frankfort. Although circumstances brought me here to work, my heart is still with my loved ones on Big Sandy, where my pioneer forefathers added materially to the culture and hospitality nay, not found anywhere else in the world.

"My maiden name was Hester Addie Gilkerson. I was named for my great-aunt, Hester Vaughan Spradlin. My mother was Annie Minerva Brown, daughter of James Young Brown and Martha Vaughan.

"Martha Vaughan, my grandmother, was the daughter of Patrick Henry Vaughan and Susan Hatfield Vaughan whose families came from Virginia about 1800 and settled near the mouth of Stephens Branch, about one mile below Prestonsburg. I think there is now a school building on the same site. Their graves may be seen on the left of the road, near this site.
