There are many distinct varieties of rods, even in fly rods alone, each technically suited to some certain purpose, or at least to the user's firm belief as to what's suited for that purpose. Just buying somebody a rod would be like buying him a pair of shoes without knowing the size he wears. Find out what he

Reels-In reels, too, never were there such good values. Believe it or not, \$5 will now buy a casting reel that will cast much better and more smoothly than the \$50 reel of a generation ago. However, there are also some very poor casting reels on the market now. Better stick to the product of a maker known to be reliable. But this same advice goes for all articles of tackle. Tackle making is a highly specialized business calling for accurate technical knowledge of its many points.

Lines-Find out what sort of casting or spinning line the person uses, and get him a new one like it; he probably won't want to change. Don't give anybody a cheap fly line. This line must be of the right size to fit his rod or it's completely use-

Other things-Waders? Be sure to get them long enough in the legs, so they'll be baggy and wrinkled as he walks around. Trout creel? Only recently available, so his old one may be pretty much of a wreck. Wading jacket? See that it has plenty of pockets. Tackle box? The bigger the better. Fly boxes? Lots of nice ones are made now.



The foundation sills were twelve by twelve inches and of yellow poplar. The studs, closer than is usual, were of the same material and were mostly three by six. The plates atop the studding were six by eights, of the same material and, of course, patiently and laboriously sawed by hand.

The modern carpenter, in making a corner, nails two pieces together at right angles. Not so here in making corners. These corners were hewed and sawed out by hand, so that there would be no seam and the running pieces of length mortised in by hand. This method of cornering is, to this column's knowledge, the only instance of its kind 4,416,619.29 in pioneer architecture. On the early construction of the old house no nails were used. Every piece was mortised in, the size of the piece of wood determining the size of the hole. A generation of the later Bevinses used cut nails and here in the construction of this old house we have three methods of tying planks together-the mortise, cut nails and the modern, round, machined nails of today.

There was a diary of the early Bevins family extant at the time the house was dismantled, and this was found by a workman, amidst some cld papers in the attic. Mr the labor expended, of materials and those other immerable things necessary to the construction of a home. During the process of tearing down, with the attendant accumulation of debris, this old diary was lost. Men build and then another generation of men tear down and rebuild, but unless the rebuilding is done of stone or brick or other permanent material no more permanent structure could have been erected than the old Bevins home.



Veterans May Obtain Four Pct. Home Loan

Under a recent act of Congress the Veterans Administration is au thorized to make a loan directly to an eligible veteran of World War II under the following circumstances and conditions:

1. The loan does not exceed \$10, 000; is made before June 30, 1951 and is used for the purchase or construction of a home, or for the construction or improvement of farmhouse, and,
