Martin, he stated it was quite possible that the defendant may have become hysterical and lost control of herself under the circumstances, and remained in a state of mental and physical helplessness for three or four days.

Under cross examination of Commonwealth's Attorney Afton M. Smith, Dr. Akers said he would not state that an unsoundness of mind or insanity was a probable result of what ocurred, but it would be more correct to say an hysterical condition would probably follow Under further questioning by Mr Smith he stated that he had never treated the defendant nor examined her and was basing his answers on hypohetical questions asked of him. This case was the climax to the criminal term of the Knott circuit court which removed almost the last major case from the docket of Circuit Judge John Chris Cornett.
