Part barred from the city limits and a their enrollments to 100 pupils by the beginning of the 1954-55 school term, it was announced in Frankfort this week.

Wendell P. Butler, Superintendent of Public Instruction, pointed out that public high schools for white pupils that do not meet this enrollment minimum may be accredited from year to year, on an emergency basis, if conditions causing the emergency are considered by the State Board of Education to warrant continuance of the schools. Exempted from the 100-pupil rule are negro, private and parochial

Other high schools of this section which have fewer than 100 pupils are Cordia and Pippapass in Knott county, Blaine in Lawrence, Kingdom Come in Letcher and Canne City in Morgan.

The new ruling will encourage school districts to consolidate, said Butler. The state board has planned such a change for two years, and some districts in the state have con-

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

Federal enforcement has greatly reduced the narcotics traffic in recent years, but the Narcotics Bureau, always doing a wonderful enforcement job, now has a staff of only 270. State and county authorities can learn about enforcement from the federal bureau and cooperate with it. I don't know whether there is a

printed manual on narcotics law enforcement. There ought to be, If there isn't Kentucky ought to persuade the Fedebral bureau to write one, then have it put in the hands of all Kentucky sheriffs and municipal police chiefs.

Maybe by 1954 the legislature will see the advisability of mandatory long-term penalties for dope sellers. "Must" and "shall" should be better than "up to"
