The funeral train finally reached Lexington about dusk Friday, July 9. A torch-light procession, headed by a cavalcade of horsemen, preceded the hearse and mourners out East Main street to Ashland, where the body was deposited in the room formerly occupied by Mr. Clay as a study

Saturday, July 10, 1852, was the day of Clay's funeral in Lexington. It was estimated that upwards of 30,000 people came to the Bluegrass capital to witness and participate in the solemn ceremonies. Great crowds lined the length of Main street as the funeral procession passed. which was estimated to have been a mile and a half in lngth. The services which had been commenced at Ashland were now concluded by the Rev Edward F. Berkley, pastor of Christ
