


As the 1952 session of the General Assembly draws to a close you can say this much for it: It may have started some projects without first figuring out where the money is coming from, but our boys in Frankfort can't be accused of giving an imitatiin of what I like to call the Washington Squanderbund. From Governor Wetherby down to the youngest and greenest member of the legislature, the Frankfort crowd were close enough to the folks back home to realize that Kentuckians are fed up with public extravagance. They are much closer to back-home sentiment than members of Congress.


I was a gallery spectator in both houses a month ago and what impressed me most was confusionconfusion which may not have been as bad as it seemed. There were bills enough in the 1952 session to keep the Assembly busy twelve hours a day for twelve months, if all these measures had been taken seriously. I couldn't help recalling the late Al Smith, who was one of New York's best governors and one of the Democartic party's poorest runners for the presidency.

When quite young Smith went to the legislature, and before the session began ne took time to study the constitution thoroughly. That, he figured, was the best way to qualify himself for the Albany job. The session had hardly started when Smith realized that somebody ought to head off a lot of bills before they cluttered the work of committees.

When a fellow member would introduce a bill that wasn't constitutional, Al would interrupt with "Mr. Speaker, I beg the gentleman's pardon, but his bill is contrary to section so and so of the state constitution, and I suggest that he withdraw it." 





The gigging regulation was issued as an emergency measure due to an excess of rough fish in the streams in which gigging is permitted.

There is no restriction on the size of the gig, nor the number of hooks on the snatch line, snag line or grabbling line.

Rough fish, as used in this reglation, means any fish other than black bass (largemouth, smallmouth or Kentucky), and crappie jack salmon or walleyed pike, striped bass, sand pike or sauger, muskellunge, great northern pike, rock bass or goggle eye.

The regulation states that the limit of fish to be taken shall not exceed a total of 15 for any species, or 15 in the aggregate for all species during a 24-hour period. Each period shall start at midnight

In explaining the above-mentioned devices for taking fish the regulation points out that the word "gigging" means any instrument with two prongs or more, barbed or straight, of any size or dimension

The State collected \$15,569,307 from all sources during February, the Departments of Finance and Revenue announced. That brought the total to date during the eight months of the fiscal year to \$118,-512,459. This is an increase over the amount collected at the same date last year, \$115,825,618. Income and property taxes were among revenue categories showing increases. INVESTMENTS UP

Funds invested by the State also increased during February, records of the State Treasurer's office shows. An additional \$300,000 worth of bonds was bought for the Teacher Retirement Fund and \$119,196 was put in the county sinking funds. The teacher Retirement Fund now totals \$21,400,000 and is the largest single fund invested by the State.
