TO MY FRIENDS, THE VOTERS OF THE 5th EDUCATIONAL DIVISION:

In seeking your support in my race for County Board Membership I want to present you my complete views on the whole situation as I see it.

I would like to ask the people of Bosco, and the parents who send their children there, one question. What made the County Board wait until this year to build the school there that you have needed for years? It seems to go back to the old political game: When a certain voting area is doubtful, in the minds of the politicians, they have always managed to put in a road or bridge in that area in order to sway the vote. You have needed a school building for a long, long time and only now are you getting it. Will the assumption now be that (you are satisfied and will cast your vote for those who have ignored you up until now?) I don't think that you, as intelligent people, will be swayed by this undermind-

My platform is Clear and Unmistakable and will function year after year and not just upon special occasions. This I will do as long as you are willing for me to serve you and your children.

I shall offer as my platform the following proposals:

1. County Board meetings open to the public.

2. School buildings in A-1 condition.

3. Teachers' pay according to that prescribed by leading educational leaders. 4. Teachers paid upon completion of their school month and by check to the

teachers themselves.

5. Immediate erection of fire escapes wherever they are needed.

6. School bus schedules that will get the children to and from school quick-

7. Cooperative planning for the creation of a centralized vocational center to which we can send our youth that usually drop out of school before they have received their diplomas. Many of our young people are unable to go on to college and need to learn some trade that will enable them to make a living after they leave school and are ready to begin their life's work.

8. Promote better health safeguards in our schools

Furthermore, I shall seek information from you, the voters, on what you think our schools need and together we can gain all the objectives that can only be gotten through sincerity and determined effort.






RAILROADS PAY OVER 12c TAX PER DOLLAR OF REVENUE

By reason of the fact that railroads have built and paid for their own roadways, they pay a type of property taxes which is escaped by their competitors.

In 1950, state and local taxes paid by the railroads totaled more than \$300 million, and took 31/2 cents out of each dollar of their revenue.

Easy For Competitors

Since approximately two-thirds of railroad investment is in roadway and structures, it may be assumed that virtually two-thirds of this taxation is ascribable to the fact that railroads provide their own roadways, and consequently represents a tax from which their competitors are virtually free.

The so-called taxes paid by other forms of transportation are, for the most part, partial payments for use of publicly provided and maintained highways or airports, and represent virtually no contribution to the general expenses of government or the services of public welfare.

Tax Figures Compared

Including these so-called taxes and also Federal income and excise taxes,

payments in 1949 by certificated air carriers amounted to only about 4 cents per dollar of revenue, those of Class A and B inland water carriers to only about 5 cents, and those of certificated Class I common and contract highway motor carriers to only about 6 cents per dollar.

The corresponding figure for railroads was more than 12 cents per dollar of revenue.

Low Rate of Earnings

Thus the railrods pay in taxes more cents per dollar of revenue than their competitors and in addition bear the full cost of providing and maintaining their own roadways.

The fact that railroads pay heavier taxes, and that what is left from the railroad revenue dollar after paying operating expenses and taxes must support a much larger investment in necessary facilities than in the case of subsidized motor, water and air carriers, makes all the more significant the low rate of return earned by railroads in the five post-war years, when their return on net investment averaged only 31/2 per cent.





The coal planer is a continuing mining machine that can be used in beds as thin as 24 inches. It mines coal as it is dragged back and forth across the folid face Ly an endless chain at the rate of 75 feet per minute. Several removable steel teeth are mounted on each cutting face. With plow-like action, the planer pushes the coal on a conveyor.

The planer and conveyor are operated by twin drive units, one at each end of the machine, and each powered by a 50-horsepower electric motor. Pneumatic shifters keep the machine snugly against the coal face being mined

Bureau of Mine coal technologists sent to Germany after VE-Day had watched a coal planer in operation, and more recently Bureau representatives saw an improved model in that country. As mechanization of mines in thin coal beds has progressed relatively little in the United States, despite remarkable strides in mechanical mining of thick beds. The Bureau decided it would be the latest type of German planer could be adapted to American con-

Another factor influencing this decision was that the coal planer is designed for longwall mining. This system, which is seldom used in this country, results in a higher percentage of recovery than the more popular room-and-pillar method.

Except for a small amount of blasting early in the test to cause the roof to cave in the mined-out area behind the face, no explosives were used during planer mining.



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
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
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
