

'Dare' Slaying of Girl Ruled Murder at Louisa; Coroner Issues Warrant

LOUISA Ky., - A coroner's jury after hearing three versions of the Filling of Susie Mac Edwards, ruled today that she had been murdered. Coroner L. Bryon Young Immediately issued a juvenile warrant for the 14-year-old girl's nephew, Waler Lowe, also 14. He was held in County Jail without bond.

Artie Edwards, Lowe's grandlather and Susie Mae's father; L. B Charles, 16, her suitor, and young Lowe were witnesses.

Susie Mae's head was almost blown away by a shotgun blast yesterday in the front yard of her home at nearby Ulysses, Ky.

The youngster, who choked up once or twice during his testimony, said: "I didn't mean to kill her."

Yesterday, Sheriff V. L. Workman said the boy told him that he and Susle Mee had argued ever her boy friend. The sheriff quoted Walter as saying she told him he was afreid to shoot her and he pulled the trigger, forgetting the gun was







LOCAL OPTION REPEAL, AIM

Of Temperance League; Legislation to be Sought On Billboard Advertising

eral Assembly

Representatives of the Temperance League of Kentucky planned an onslaught on the act at a meeting in Frankfort, Tuesday. Present law permits cities of the first four classes to vote separately from their counties on local option.

Before the 1943 act, if a county were legally dry, a liquor election could be called on a county-wide basis. If a county were wet, any district or precinct in it could call for a separate election and vote that area dry.

The 1948 General Assembly changed the historic local-option law after a hot legislative fight.

The Rev. Walter C. House, Louisville, exceutive director of the league who presided said the organization was having a bill drawn up to change the 1948 amendment. He said this bill and others would be ready when the Assembly convenes January 5.

The league agreed to support legislation recommended by ahe Alcoholic Study Commission to provide for rehabilitation of alcoholics. However, Mr. House said, the league favors legislation to prevent alcoholism more than a bill to remedy t, but doesn't now plan separate Islation on it. Other bills to be sponsored by

M league would: Prohibit billboard advertising of alcoholic beverages in dry terri-

Classify as contraband all gambling equipment, such as slot machines, with possession of the devices considered evidence of their use in gambling. The league believes this would abolish long court squabbling over possession of such machines seized by law officers.

Make drunkometer tests for drivers facing traffic charges mandatory and provide for stricter penalties on drinking, or drunken dri-
