COURT DOCKET TIMES Not To Publish That World AT NEW LOW ON VIOLENCE

Major Crime Cases For January Trial Few, Docket Shows

The docket of the circuit court with offenses involving violence may 1954 be kind to us all! among the fewest booked for trial.

To begin with, there is not a murder case listed. Only eight other cases denoting violence, such as shooting, striking or cutting and wounding, are docketed.

The drop in major criminal cases is attended by a sharp decrease in the number of indictments for gunhandling. Only one trial for carrying a concealed deadly weapon and three for reckless use of a deadly weapon are docketed.

Child desertion and liquor offenses appear most often on the list of cases. Thirty-six persons are slated for trial of desertion charges, and 23 are accused of liquor violations of one sort or another.

Included in the liquor violations are seven cases in which the defendants are accused of drunken driv-

From Allen, Sturgill; Rescinds Salary Order; Davidson Case Argued

The Floyd fiscal court at its special meeting Monday unanimously voted that two former county officials-Former County Clerk Jarvis Allen and Ex-Sheriff Troy B. Sturgill-are not indebted in any amount to Floyd county.

The action was taken on the basis of the Cotten Company audits of official records and the claims of the former officials of expenditures in connection with their ofices.

The court also unanimously voted to rescind its order of Dec. 14 authorizing County Attorney W. W. Burchett to file suit against Allen to collect approximately \$7,000 the court claimed at that time was due by him to the county.

The Cattle Low at Midnight

The little boy sat upon his father's knee, repeating the stories grandmother had told. He was four, His leg swung back and forth, keeping time, it seemed to the waxing and waning of youthful talk. It was long ago, he said, when men rode camels and fled wicked kings.

Grandmother had told him of the birth of the Christ Child and how Three Wise Men came to bring presents. Other stories, too, she told him, of olden days when there were brownies and elves and, oh, yes, there was the story of Old Christmas, when the cattle knelt in the barn and lowed and prayed, for that was when the Christ Child was born. He talked on, the swinging of the leg ceased and he stared at the Yule lire. He was soon asleep.

Now there are people who are grown and pretend to be wise by not believing the old legends. Of such was th child's father. He told him, when he was awake again, that only a few of grandmother's stories were true, that cattle did not kneel on Old Christmas night to low and pray. When Christmas Day was over the boy was full of wonder of how Santa had come down the sooty Chimney to leave such glistening toys. Wonder yielded to the pleasure of the hour. Nights he fell asleep on grandmother's lap, dreaming of the Wise Men, and of hearing the cattle low at the barn. To him it was not merely twelve days between Christmas Eve and Old Christmas. Gears were so arranged as to control the pumping of the bellows or to stop t entirely when necessary The fire was kept burning hot by the air umped from the crude arrangenent of the bellows."

A description by Stafford of the eneral process is excellent; "Tad Prourke (the foreman) mixed some red or black ore, gravish-looking limestone and black charcoal. He loaded small buggies with this mixture and men pushed these little buggies loaded with this mixture to the stack of the furnace. They dumped it in and it made a rumbling sound as it slid to the interior of the rock furnace. The red hot fire beneath was kept at great heat with the blowers constantly agitating the fire to greater heat and afer a while the clay furnace door was punched out, allowing the red-hot molten iron to flow out into the depression in the sand called the hog" and quickly spread into the 'pigs." After cooling, the iron could be picked up like sticks and car-

Once smelted the iron was hauled to the Ohio River and loaded on flatboats. A flotilla of them, when gathered, were floated down stream to Louisville, Cincinnati, and even as faraway as New Orleans, Buyers from these cities haunted the towns of the Hanging Rock section to buy the product of the furnaces.

It was a crude industry and the customs, legal and social, of the people were a little crude, too. The nearness of Ohio where freedom could be gained by negro slaves brought fleeing servants, some escaping from the law. Summary executions on a bridge by hanging were common. The town fathers used a trapdoor, instead of a gallows, cut out of the floor of a covered bridge. Convicted criminals dropped thirty feet.

Stafford recreates the atmosphere of "hanging day" when hundreds flocked into town to see the awesome spectacle of a man dropping through the bridge with a rope around his neck. They came by wagon, exeart and horseback. Some walked twenty miles in the mud of the roads stirred by the feet of many oxen and the huge ore carts to see men die. Society in the Hanging Rock iron region was crude like the charcoal iron industry

The fire marshal advised home owners to select a small tree and keep it outdoors until a day or two before Christmas. If possible it should be set in water, and not placed near a heater, fireplace, or exit. If placed near a radiator, the radiator should be turned off.

Cotton and other flammable decorations should not be used unless they have been flamedproofed by soaking in a solution of eight ounces of borax and a like amount of boric

acid to a gallon of water. The same solution may be used to flameproof filery costumes, draperies and cloth decorations which would not be damaged by water, Underwood sug-

Underwood also urged that all lighting sets be checked thoroughly for frayed wiring and short circuits, and suggested that new lights carry an underwriters label of approval. He advised against the use of of candles.

Other holiday precautions listed by him were:

Throw away gift wrappings as soon as presents have been unwrap-

Provide plenty of ashtrays for smokers, so that smoking materials may be kept away from accumulations of paper. In case of an open fire, see that

the fire screen is in place, and combustibles kept away from the fire-

Do not allow grease to accumulate in oven or boiler.

Keep box of baking soda and large pot lid near the stove. Either may be used successfully ot smother a grease fire.

Be sure your furnace is operating safely

Do not over-load circuits with electrical gadgets.







FRANKFORT, Ky., Dec. 21 Needy residents of Floyd county received \$14,127 during November under three public assistance programs, Aaron Paul, director of the ported today.

The report listed these evpendi-

Old Age Assistance, \$23,236; Aid to Dependent Children \$20.973, and aid to the Needy Blind \$1,918.

In the three categories of aid, \$3,122,429 was distributed in Kentucky in November, about \$50,000 less than October payments. Old Age Assistance payments totaled \$1,941,570 or an average of \$34.95 for each case; Aid to Dependent Children payments amounted to \$1. 086,321 or an average of \$60.94 to each family, and \$94,538 went t the Needy Blind, for an average check of \$36.86.


