For 'Dimes' You still have a few days to get that March of Dimes contribution in. The nationwide campaign to raise polio-fighting funds closes January 31 when an estimated 1,500,000 volunteers will begin tabulating the results of their month-long efforts to raise the needed money.

### Cites Unpaid Bills

"We simply cannot let a single patient suffer for lack of funds," Mr. O'Connor said. "We must raise enough money to care for 58,000 who were stricken in 1952 and prior years and still need our

"This is in addition to the more than \$7,000,000 in unpaid bills inherited from last year, together with the responsibility for pushing our research programs to the limit. We simply can't coast during these last few days."

Although local campaign leaders are optimistic about the results of this year's drive, no one could say whether or not the necessary

funds would actually be raised. Half of all money contributed to the March of Dimes is used by our county chapter to help pay cost of treating local polio patients or, in emergencies, polio patients elsewhere. The other 50 per cent finances March of Dimes research, professional education and epidemic aid programs.

When Brutus and others way because of his encroachments on Roman rights, most of the people who rallied to support the conspirators had an axe to grind or hoped to get something for themselves in the scramble that would result when the head man was murdered. Brutus, as Anthony said, was an honorable man. He honestly felt that by killing his best friend-and the gossips said, his father-order could be restored and the ancient regime saved. When the rabble were about to mob him and the conspirators, Brutus made a high-minded speech, one that could not be improved on today, in which he stated his convictions and reasoned with the multitude. They were stilled but not convinced. Brutus rather condescendingly allowed Anthony, as Caesar's friend, to say a few words. Beginning cautiously and stumblingly, as one unaccustomed to speak before the mob, he slowly reversed the calm reason of Brutus and caused the mob to turn violently against the conspirators. Politicians who wish to learn how to sway people should study carefully Shakespeare's version of Anthony's great tirade. And it worked; the reaction against Brutus ultimately seated on the throne of the empire Augustus, and Caesar was avenged. 

Three - fourths of these chemicals will be used in the production of plantics and synthetic rubber. The rest will be utilized in the manufacture of insecticides, solvents, and miscellaneous aromatic chemicals.

Bituminous coal can be processed by carbonization, gasification, hydrogenation, oxidation, extraction, etc., to give a large number of valuable industrial and domestic products. Many of these chemicals have use as primary products; some must be processed further.

Carbonization yields ammonia; aromatic hydrocarbons such as benzene, toluene, xylene, naphthalene, anthracene, etc.; tar acids, tar bases, cyanogen compounds, ethylene, etc. Gasification of coal or coke yields synthesis gas from which a variety of chemicals are made including alcohols, aldehydes, plastics, and synthetic ammonia. An electrochemical process uses coke to produce calcium carbide and acetylene, from which vinyl resins, neoprene rubber, acetic acid, etc. are made. Hydrogenation will produce benzene, toluene, xylenes, mixed aromatics, phenols, and cresols. The relative yield will depend on the operating



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

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

> The season opened on November 20 and reports from throughout the state indicate a generally good season for the hunters of both the rabbits and the quall. In many sections reports show, the rabbit population has been at an all-time high, while quail populations have been spotty says the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, There will be no pen season for hunting in Kenucky until the squirrel season opens and the date for that season has not yet been set. The duck season ended January 10.

Kentucky may have a second rchery deer hunt during this 1952-953 season, if the Fish and Wildife Resources Commission reacts avorably to a recent proposal by officials of Bernheim Forest Park. Porest plantings at Bernheim have been damaged extensively by the herd of European Red Deer on the area, and the archery hunt has been proposed as a solution to the probem. Guns, of course, are illegal in the park, which is under contract as a state refuge.

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
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
