### SCIENTIFIC TREATISE

What should be a best-seller is this book, just published, telling all about chiggers and how to keep them from getting under your skin. This should be a boon to mankind, especially at berry-picking time.

The subject of this book is one of the more interesting varminths in these parts. Anybody who has never had chiggers hasn't exactly grown up. It's a subject you have to dig into, though after a lifetime of it you may feel like you're only scratching the surface, so to speak.

There was a time when they spelled it "chigoe". That was before folks learned better. I remember having an argument on this point, once upon a time. A friend of mine pulled that spelling on me and we had at it orthographically for a spell. He pulled the book on me, but I still feel I won the argument, for I pointed out the value of euphony, citing as an example that it sounds much more euphemistic to roll your tongue around something like this, "May that infidel of a chigger boil in oil even into the fifth generation" than simply to say, "Damn that chigoe".

Webster says the chigoe or chegoe is found in the West Indies and South America where it buries under various and sundry natives, and visiting firemen's skin. Maybe Noah was talking about another pest, but this chigger here, far away from those southern climes, takes the same kind of toehold.

Well, it's the Eleventh Year of the Atomic Age, now, and there have been a lot of changes. But one thing stands immutable. That's the treatment for chiggers—a liberal dose of salt in the wound, plus some grease.

Come to think of it, why don't they look up a few chiggers and see, maybe, if an atomic blast won't result in a mutation? The new critter couldn't be worse.

The decision President Eisenhower and UN leaders must make, or have made, is perhaps more momentous even than that of President Truman when he ordered American troops into Korea to meet the Communist threat. In the background, like a warning echo, there are the words of Lincoln:

"A house divided against itself cannot stand" and "... that these honored dead shall not have died in vain."

Time will tell how right or wrong we are in taking a chance on peace.

## PARTY CHANGE TO COST 200 VOTE RIGHT

### Purgation Board Acts To Comply with Law On Registration Change

Approximately 200 Floyd countians who have changed their party affiliation this year will not be eligible to a ballot at the August 1 primary election.

Their registration cards were withdrawn from the voting lists at the County Clerk's office, and their names will not be certified to the precinct election officers as legal voters in the primary.

This action was taken during this week's session of the county registration and purgation board. The board's action was in compliance with Section 110.200, Kentucky Revised Statutes, which provides that a citizen desiring to change his party affiliation must do so before the November election if he expects to vote at the following primary. The effect of this law is that a voter wishing to change from one party to another and vote in this year's primary would have had to make the change before last year's November election.

The work of the purgation board, it was explained, was not to purge from the voting lists the names of these voters who have changed their party affiliation since last November's election but simply to suspend their right to vote till their vote is legal. They will be eligible to vote in the November election.

The purgation board members, German Vance, Eugene Allen and

## BLOODMOBILE NETS 101 PTS.

### On Wheelwright Visit As Community Records Best of Recent Marks

The Wheelwright community broke the 100-pint mark Tuesday in its contribution of blood to the regional bloodmobile from Huntington, thus establishing the best of recent records made in the county.

The drive for blood donors there was directed by the Foremen's Club, and 154 persons signed appointment cards. Of these only 23, however, appeared. Thirty-seven volunteer donors who walked in without appointment, however, brought the record up. Nineteen would-be donors were rejected. Twenty-four of those who gave blood Tuesday at Wheelwright did so for the first time.

The next Floyd visit of the bloodmobile will be on July 31 at Wayland.

Despite truce talks, the need for blood mounted this week even beyond that of recent weeks as the Reds in Korea staged a terrific offensive. Casualties are heavy.

## FISCAL COURT FIXES AMOUNT

### Due County by Sheriff; Orders Deed on Highway For State Maintenance

The Floyd fiscal court, in addition to its work in joint session with the county board of education, Wednesday settled with Sheriff A. B. Meade as to any amounts due by him to Floyd county to Jan. 1, 1952.

The amount agreed upon was \$1,392, and this Sheriff Meade accepted in compromise of all claims to that date.

Noting that the State Highway has expressed its willingness to maintain and surface the Dinwood-Manton road, the court directed County Judge Henry Stumbo to execute on behalf of the county to the department a deed to the Highway. It also voted to accept the Long Fork of Buck's Branch, near Martin, into the county road system.

Further work was done toward the issue by the county of \$230,000 worth of waterworks and gas system revenue bonds to finance the acquisition of the Allen-Dwale, Wayland, Garrett-Estill, Garrett-Bosco and Glo Valley gas companies and the City of Weeksbury water system. The plan is to lease these acquisitions to the Beaver-Elkhorn Water District for an annual rental which would amortize the indebtedness over a period of years.

### Highway Department Joins Officials Here In Street Marker Job

The State Highway Department has been working here this week with Prestonsburg officials making more clear and more attractive street markings in the interest of safety.

Safety lanes have been marked out at the Court and Lake Drive traffic light, and Mayor Curtis Clark said Wednesday that a traffic light may be installed at that intersection which can be operated manually. This intersection is a traffic bottleneck on Saturdays, and it is believed manual operation of the traffic signal will permit a flow of traffic with fewer interruptions.

The Highway Department work here is being supervised by Donald L. Meade.

## COUNTY FUNDS GET \$615,047

### As Sheriff Settles On Tax Collections For the Year 1952

A total of \$615,047.45, exclusive of a few minor items, was collected by Sheriff A. B. Meade for the year 1952, according to a settlement made with Treasurer W. J. May and filed with DuRan Moore, county clerk. The largest of these collections was exclusive of school taxes for the general fund which received, after commissions to the sheriff and certain credits, the sum of \$185,073.53. Net common school collections were \$447,617.76 and timber tax was \$23,356.16.

Tax collections were based upon a total assessment valuation, after credits, of \$34,38,923. Corporation valuation was by far the largest of the assessment valuation, being \$18,924,331, with real estate second at a figure of \$10,528,968. Tangible valuation was \$5,298,546, and bank shares, \$644,110. There were a few other miscellaneous assessment valuations of a minor nature.

Collections for the general fund were, before commissions and credits as expected, greatest from corporations. They paid \$94,621.63. Real property brought in \$52,844.93, tangibles, \$26,492.73, bank shares, \$1,288.22, and poll taxes, \$8,100.

Collected for common school purposes before any deductions for collection fees or credits were the following sums: Real and tangible \$199,387.51, corporations, \$271,240.96 and poll taxes \$9,850. Poll taxes for school purposes was at \$2.

## TO NEGOTIATE FOR RELEASES

### On Lake Water Damage; Cooper Releases Data On Added Depth Asked

The work of negotiating with gas companies having holdings in the Dewey reservoir area for damage releases as a step toward addition of five feet of water to Dewey Lake will begin next week, E. R. Burke, Seventh district conservation supervisor, said here Wednesday.

The releases are necessary, since federal budget restriction make unavailable any funds for payment of damages.

Mr. Burke said release forms are now being prepared and that some individuals who have agricultural leases in the upper part of the reservoir area will be contacted this week.

In a letter to George W. Newman, Hi Hat, president of the Floyd County Fish & Game Club, U. S. Senator John Sherman Cooper recently enclosed data showing how much the additional water depth will increase the lake area. At 645 feet elevation, the conservation pool at which the impoundment is currently operated, the lake inundates 880 acres of land and has a storage capacity of 12,300 acre-feet. When raised to elevation 650, or an additional depth of five feet, the lake will cover 1,100 acres and have a storage of 17,200 acre-feet.

The added water will be on a seasonal basis, if the damage release favors are granted.

In the memorandum to Senator Cooper the Corps of Engineers said, "It is the opinion of the Corps of Engineers that a seasonal conservation pool to elevation 650 will not require payment of any additional compensation to the affected landowners, since the frequency and duration of flooding will be only slightly increased by such a pool."

The engineers added, however, that raising the lake by 10 feet would necessitate the acquiring of fee title to low-lying portions of a few tracts of land in the vicinity of the mouth of Brushy.

## FLOYD RACES DRAW 145

### Into August 1 Primary; 2 Candidates Withdraw, 29 Ask Jailer's Office

With the Wednesday midnight filing deadline only a matter of hours away, a total of 145 Floyd countians—119 Democrats and 26 Republicans—had registered at the County Clerk's office as candidates at the August primary.

And others were expected to be added to the list before the deadline is reached. Political maneuvering was being closely watched by those already in the several races and by their supporters.

Two withdrawals were announced this week. Mrs. Hazel Dameron George, of Ivel, in an advertisement in this edition of The Times explains that she is withdrawing to join her husband who is with the U. S. Navy in Hawaii. Ollie Campbell, of Prestonsburg, withdrew Wednesday morning from the Democratic race for Constable in Magisterial District 1.

The Jailer's office, as usual, is being sought by the largest number of candidates. Twenty-six Democrats and three Republicans were registered as of Wednesday morning for that office. Next in popularity among candidates is the Sheriff's office with 10 Democrats and four Republicans in that race. Candidates will draw Friday at 2 p.m., for position on the ballot.

## Break Ground for New Church in Prestonsburg

When ground was broken recently for the building of the Community Methodist Church in the Porter Addition here, the first spadeful was turned by O. J. Spurlock, a member of the 12th street Baptist Church of Huntington, W. Va. — naturally.

It was appropriate that the Huntington man, member of another church denomination, begin the ground-breaking ceremonies, for it was he who donated the 35x60-foot lot for the Prestonsburg church.

When Porter Addition citizens approached him, some time ago, to inquire the price of the lot, he re-

sponded, "I won't sell you a lot—I'll give you one."

He did, added some cash to his contribution, others joined with cash donations, work, materials — and so the church structure is on its way.

More than three years ago when Mr. Spurlock supplied citizens there a building for Sunday School classes, himself paying the cost of lights and heat. The structure used by the Sunday School was used by Spurlock in the operation of Spurlock's Food Service which he heads.

Taking part in the ground-breaking ceremonies were the Rev. Ger-

stle M. Haggard, pastor of the Prestonsburg Methodist Church, and Z. S. Dickerson, one of the leaders in the movement for the new church, and superintendent of the Porter Addition Sunday School, and the Rev. Howard C. Church, of the Methodist Church.

Plans for the church call for a brick front and block sides and rear, with Sunday School rooms in the basement. Excavation work on the lot, located on Burke avenue, has been completed.

Ambition of the congregation is ultimately to have a fulltime pastor.

## 'COB' TURNER WAIVES CASE

### Maytown Man Is Held Without Bail to Jury In Slaying of Woman

Roy C. "Cob" Turner, 35, former Maytown man who is charged with first-degree murder in Cincinnati, O., waived his case to the Hamilton county grand jury when arraigned in municipal court, Monday. The case had been continued from last Thursday when two attorneys who had been employed to represent Turner were unable to make their appearance in court that day.

Turner is accused of the slaying of Mrs. Betty Smith Frederick, 23, Middletown, O., in a hotel room in Cincinnati last week.

Police said they found the woman badly beaten and Turner's feet cut from broken wine bottles and a pitcher. Turner said he did not remember what had happened. The officers were called after reports of a disturbance.

Meanwhile, it was disclosed in an examining physician's report to the coroner that Mrs. Frederick was an expectant mother.

Detective Chief George Peary also said he was informed that Mrs. Frederick was the mother of three children who live with their father, Arthur R. Frederick, in New York state.

The young woman, who first was listed as Betty Smith, was understood to have originally come from Emporium, Pa.

Turner, who said he is a college graduate, a former Sunday school superintendent, and a basketball coach, and Mrs. Frederick went to Cincinnati after being ordered to leave Middletown after their conviction on charges of intoxication, police said.

## CONFER HERE ON SANITATION

### Foodhandlers, Others In Lake Area To Meet Ky. Health Standards

Sanitation control in the Dewey reservoir area was discussed at a meeting here Tuesday of representatives of the U. S. Corps of Engineers and the State Health Department with employees of the Floyd County Health Department.

Food handling, waste disposal and drinking water supplies were discussed, with a complete understanding reached between the three agencies. It was announced following the meeting that every cabin site, boat dock or such installation will be required to meet full requirements of state health regulations and to submit plans of proposed installations to the Floyd County Health Department which, in turn, will send them to the State Health Department for approval, with the plans then going to the Corps of Engineers for its approval.

The county health department will make regular inspection of all such installations, including parking areas.

Conferring with M. V. Clarke and J. M. Stumbo, of the county health department, were John Burgois, C. E. Fulmer, of the Corps of Engineers' Huntington district office, W. A. Kanzinger, director of the division of public sanitation, and Louis F. Birkle, executive director of the Kentucky Water Control Commission, both of the State Health Department, Louisville.

## PROJECT OFF UNLESS NEW PLANS WORK

### Lone Bid Asks Commission State Will Not O. K., Board Told

An indefinite delay in construction of the proposed half-million-dollar county high school building here was faced by the Floyd County Board of Education Wednesday as bids on the \$445,000 bond issue offered by the fiscal court, acting as the board's fiscal agent, were unacceptable to the State Department of Education.

Only one bid was submitted, and it was so unfavorable that it amounted to under-par bidding, which the state department continues to reject whenever offered.

As matters stood Wednesday afternoon, two rays of hope, neither too bright at the moment, remained for the structure:

1. To float the bond issue directly through private banking sources at a rate of interest which might be as high as 4.75 per cent.

2. To break the board's contract with the W. C. Thornburgh Company, Louisville, and try to get action through some other bond firm.

As it was, the only bid offered was signed by the Thornburgh firm and eight other bond houses, bidding for the bond issue at 4 1/2% interest, provided that the fiscal court's contract with the Thornburgh Company be amended to raise the commission fee from 3% to 4%. The commission fee provision was added in handwriting to the typewritten bid.

Desperate for funds after it already had awarded contracts on the school building and after some foundation work already had been done, the board of education voted to ask the fiscal court to approve this bid, subject to State Department approval.

## STRATTON BR. DRAWS MANY

### Engineers Improve Recreation Spots In Reservoir Area

Although Hemlock Point, which overlooks Dewey Lake near the Brandy Keg dock, has since early days of the impoundment been improved for the accommodation of picnickers, the Stratton Branch area has consistently drawn the bigger crowds, and now the U. S. Corps of Engineers has completed improvements there which make that picnicking and camping area an even greater attraction.

Swimming facilities at Stratton Branch give that spot an edge on other places along the lake, and now workmen for the Engineers have erected a barricade to keep away from the swimming area automobiles and other vehicles. Boating is barred at that point, too.

A bridge across the Stratton Branch entering the grounds has been completed, the road and parking area have been gravel-surfaced, vault-type concrete toilets have been installed and a water well drilled. Camp sites also have been gravelled, and from 15 to 20 more picnic tables added along with ovens for cooking. This brings to approximately 22 the number of picnic tables available in the Stratton Branch area.

Improvements on a smaller scale at Arrowhead Point also have been made. This is the point directly across the lake from Big (or Burckett) Branch. There five picnic tables and ovens have been installed, two pit-type toilets built and posts for the mooring of boats have been set.

Pete Fulmer and John Burgois, of the Engineer's district office in Huntington, inspected the improvements, Tuesday. Both men were impressed by the heavy public use of facilities and expressed their interest in recreation development of the lake and selected spots along its shoreline.

The access road leading to the Stratton Branch area, however, remains narrow and in at least two spots dangerous because the road-bed has broken off.

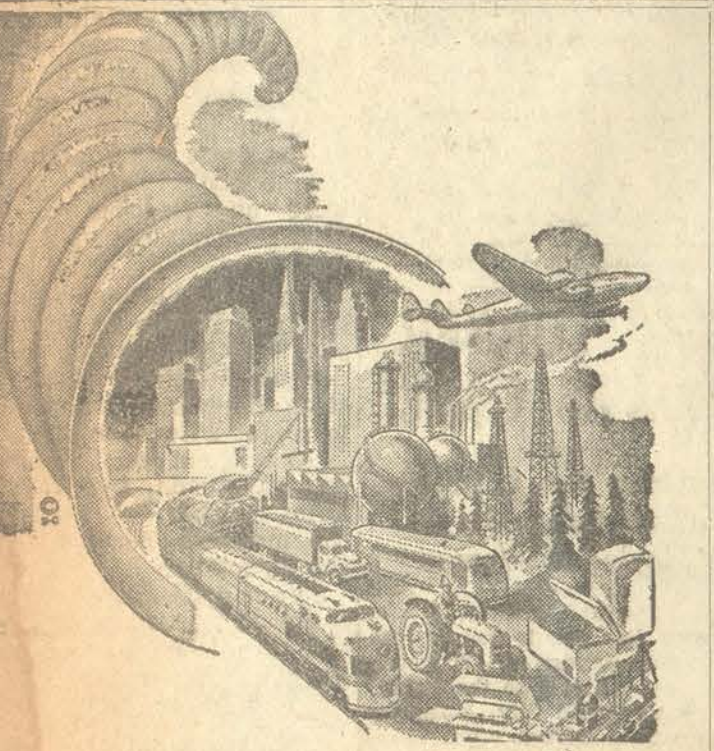

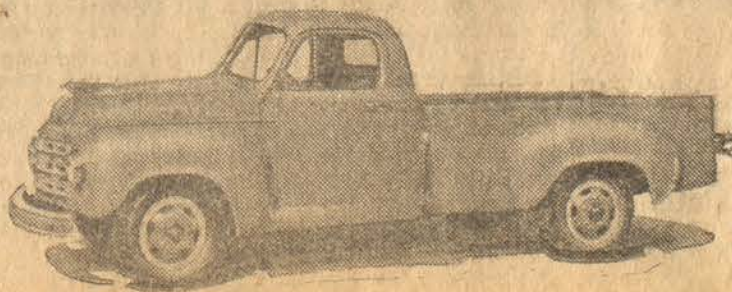

### With Olive Branch in Hand We Re-State the Issue

THE TIMES has no intention of enjoying the delights of an editorial feud with any other newspaper, least of all with its good neighbor, The Paintsville Herald. But, referring to The Times' editorial of June 4 and The Herald's of June 10, it would point out a few facts.

First of all, The Herald apparently failed to catch the import of our editorial which had to do with reports that the Paintsville-Dewey Dam-Prestonsburg road may be started from the Paintsville end. Perhaps we were guilty of ambiguity, which would explain the misunderstanding. Whatever the cause, we certainly made no claim that this body of water belongs only to Floyd county or that only Floyd paid for the dam.

Our whole contention was this: Floyd county should not stand for any plan to begin from the Johnson county end construction of this road to the dam, which—all reports to the contrary—really is in Floyd county. Floyd county should not sit quietly by while this is done, unless work is begun simultaneously on the Floyd county end.

The Times is interested in this road. It wants everybody to have access to Dewey dam and lake. But it does not propose to accept, without protest, a situation which would leave Floyd county exactly where it is today—without land access to the dam except through Johnson county—while a modern highway is built from Johnson to the dam, leaving Floyd county on one or both horns of a dilemma.

Start the highway from both ends, start it at the dam and work toward both towns at the same time—to that we will agree, and we believe the officials of Floyd county will agree. But from the Johnson county end only—no.

That's the issue—where the road shall begin, not ownership of anything or who paid for anything. And there need be no feuding.

## ARTICLE SAYS TREATMENT TO UP PRODUCTION OF OIL

Water flooding is expected to jump oil production in this area from this year's estimated 300,000 barrels to 1,500,000 barrels a year within the next 18 months.

This statement was made recently in the Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company's employee publication, The Illuminator. The increased oil production is expected to come from wells of five companies, Cumberland Petroleum, Ashland Oil and Refining Company, Patterson Petroleum, Petroleum Exploration and the Brundred Oil Company.

In the Magoffin-Johnson-Lawrence area where water flooding has been successfully carried out, the oil is forced by water treatment from a 24-foot-thick layer of Weir sand which is reached at about 1,000 feet.

The Illuminator article says: "Water from sources below the oil-bearing sand is pumped to the surface. It then undergoes purifying treatment more exact and complete than the average city water supply. This purification is necessary due to the microscopic pores of the sand through which the water must be forced. Impurities in the water, though invisible to the eye, can plug the pores of the Weir sand."

"This water is then injected into the sand over a thousand feet below the surface at a pressure of 1-200 pounds per square inch at sand face. This water, under pressure, drives the oil from the pores of the rock-hard sand. Pumping jacks are located to bring the oil to the surface.

According to the article, only 30 per cent of the oil in the three-county area has been developed by the primary recovery method. This method is the pumping of oil from pools, without any pressure forcing. Oil fields in this area were developed in this way about 1920 and produced profitably until about 1938.

The first trial of the water-pressure method was made by Joe Slagel, Oil Springs, manager of the Cumberland Petroleum Company. It was said that by forcing the oil

from the sand all but 10 to 20 per cent of the oil in the sand will be removed.

The anticipated life of the water flood is from 12 to 20 years before production drops to a point where it is not economical to continue the flood.

The article says a field in Pennsylvania similar to those in the district has been under some type of secondary recovery for over 30 years and is assumed to have potential production almost equal to the volume of oil previously produced.

James Wilson of Ballard county treated 650 acres of corn to control soil tests; application was made with a planter-sprayer at planting time.

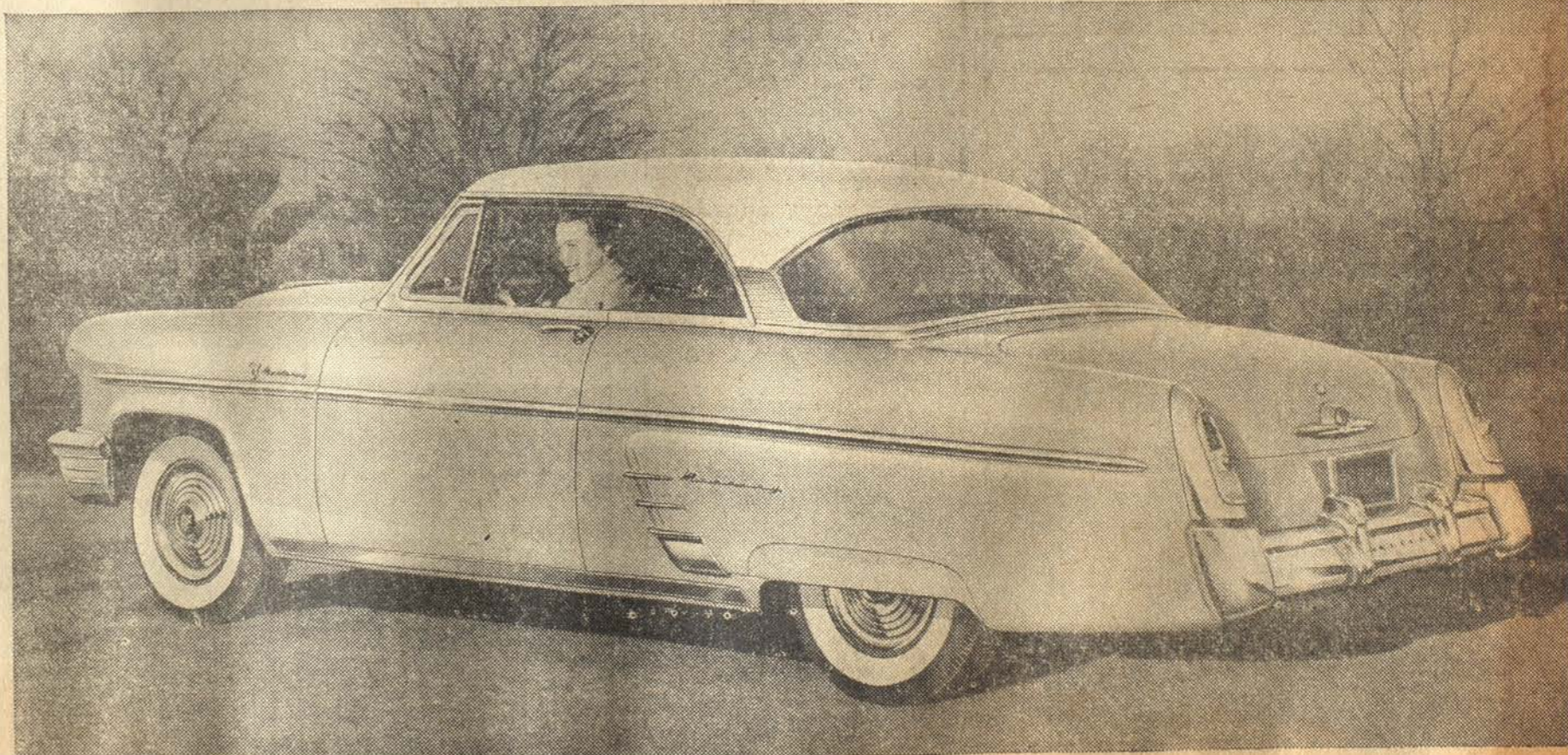

**COOLEY WILL OPERATE MINE**  
**McDowell Man Buys Weeksby Operation As Firm Quits Section**

Although the Eastern Gas & Fuel Associates announced last week that it is withdrawing from Eastern Kentucky and closing permanently its Weeksby coal operation, The Times learned Wednesday that Weeksby will continue to mine coal under new ownership.

The equipment and lease of Eastern Gas & Fuel there has been purchased by J. C. Cooley, of McDowell.

June 30 was the date set by Eastern Gas & Fuel for its withdrawal, and Mr. Cooley will probably assume control of the operations at that time.

The holdings acquired by the McDowell man include approximately 1,000,000 tons of coal in the No. 3 Elkhorn seam and about the same tonnage in the Elkhorn No. 2 seam. The lease includes some of the best metallurgical coal in Eastern Kentucky.

Eastern Gas & Fuel will continue to operate its store and fountain at Weeksby. It already has sold to miners and other residents of the town the homes built there by the company. Weeksby is an incorporated town which at the 1950 census had a population of 1,448.

Although not highly mechanized, the Weeksby operation normally employs about 250 men and produces around 900 tons of coal a day. In the days of peak production it had almost 700 on its payroll and produced more than 3,000 tons a day.

Mining operations at Weeksby began in 1917 under ownership of the Milwaukee Coke & Gas Company and the mine was operated as the Elkhorn-Piney Coal Company. The property was sold in 1928 to Eastern Gas & Fuel. Since the opening of the mine it has produced about 16,000,000 tons of coal from the leasehold procured from the Collins & Mayo Collieries Company and the Consolidation Coal Company.

**Joseph Carter, Soldier, Honored at Morgan Grave By His DAR Descendants**

A Revolutionary War soldier, born in Virginia, but who pioneered the vast area that was early Floyd county was honored Sunday, June 6, with a marker and appropriate ceremonies at the graveside in Morgan county that was a part of the original Floyd. The ceremonies were under the auspices of the Morgan county chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution.

The granite stone was unveiled over the grave of Joseph Carter, Sr., who was born in 1754 in Buckingham county, Virginia, served as a private in the Continental Army, and died in 1849 at 95 in the big house of hewn logs he built on Grassy Creek.

D.A.R. services dedicating the monument were held in a grove of oak and beech trees on a knoll overlooking the village of Mize, nine miles west of this county-seat town on U. S. 490.

Once a rustic church stood on the knoll and there were graves marked with stones in orderly rows in the grass-covered yard. But time crumbled the little church into ruin, and the eroded gravestones were scattered. There are indications now of only a few graves there.

Even the gravestone of the Revolutionary War soldier disappeared, but old people in the community knew where lay the bones of Joseph Carter, Sr., who became a Baptist preacher long after his soldiering days were done.

Carter was one of 14 veterans of the Revolution buried in this county, which they, as pioneer Kentuckians, named in honor of General Daniel Morgan, hero of the Battle of the Cowpens in South Carolina.

Principal speaker Sunday was J. Monroe Gevedon, great-grandson of the old soldier, who lives on Grassy Creek, not far from the home of his militant ancestor.

About 200 people, mostly descendants of Joseph Carter, climbed the hill to take part in the ceremony. One of the descendants who was unable to be present was Marine Maj. William E. Barber of Morgan county, who was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor last year for heroism in Korea.

The crowd gathered there in the grove, Gevedon said, "to do honor to the dust of a noble ancestor, patriot, pioneer, honorable citizen, and preacher of the Gospel." He further described his great-grandfather as "a hero who fought and suffered for the freedom that we now enjoy."


He said that the little log church that crumbled away was known as Goodwin's Chapel. The level land on the other side of the highway, he recalled, once was a pioneer ground where the militia held its "muster in." It also served as the site for religious camp meetings, wrestling matches, and horse races.

Master of ceremonies was a great-great-grandson, Ova Haney, West Liberty, former county school superintendent. The marker was unveiled by a great-great-granddaughter, Mrs. C. K. Stacy, West Liberty. Taking part in the ceremony were two great-great-granddaughters, Mrs. Dorothy Perry and Mrs. Helen Stacy Wells, West Liberty.

ment of Education approval. Soon after this action was taken, however, Wendell P. Butler, Superintendent of Public Instruction, informed the board flatly that such an arrangement is unacceptable. This decision from the top came after several telephone conversations by County Superintendent Virgil O. Turner with various education department officials in Frankfort.

Wednesday's offer was the only bid submitted on two dates advertised by the fiscal court acting for the board of education.

Higher interest rates required by the federal administration are blamed by bond firms for the uncertain market and their timorous approach to bond issues. A bond issue offered at Walton, Ky., recently failed on three occasions to draw a bid, it was said.

Under the .9% commission rate which the Board of Education a short time ago negotiated with the W. C. Thornburgh Company, the commission on the bond issue would have been \$4,005. If the 4% commission asked Wednesday had been approved, the fee would have jumped to around \$17,000.

"This," Superintendent Turner said, "is just another way to force under-par bidding. The State Department will not accept under-par bids, but a higher commission would amount to the same thing if the department would approve it."

Joe Hobson, Prestonsburg, attorney for the board, said he is advising the board to cancel its contract with the W. C. Thornburgh Company. That firm, Superintendent Turner said, has agreed to a cancellation if the bond issue is handled by private banking interests. It was indicated an attempt to break the contract to let another bond firm try its hand at the issue would be contested.

The firm of Akers & Akers, of Banner, successful bidders on construction of the building alone, did some foundation work early in May but was halted when the first advertisement for bond bids failed to produce a bidder. If the board is forced to pay for materials already delivered at the site, it stands to lose \$8,000, plus architects' fees and other charges.

At Wednesday's meeting the board paid Hayes & Lusk, Ashland architects, \$4,516.26 on plans for the Prestonsburg building and preliminary plans on the Bosco and Ligon school structures. Of this total, \$4,017.30 was for services on the Prestonsburg building.

Superintendent Turner and Mr. Hobson were busy, late Wednesday afternoon, contacting bankers in an attempt to finance the undertaking here.

Turning to other matters, the board accepted the \$2,047.85 bid of the Van Hoose Lumber Company for all materials for construction of a one-room school in the head of Salyers Branch of Salt Lick.

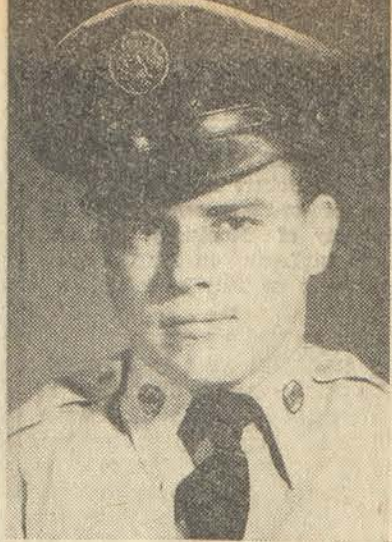
The board's attempt to consolidate the Sammy Clark school on Little Mud with the Harold consolidated school ran into a veritable hornet's nest of opposition from patrons of the smaller school. The board had planned to add two rooms to the Harold building and transport the pupils of the Little Mud school there, but bowed to wishes of patrons and employed May Akers to teach the Clark school.

The board paid C. Kilmer Combs, Prestonsburg attorney, \$700 for legal services in winning for the board in the Johnson case in connection with the Melvin school site. It accepted the resignation of Mabel Allen as teacher at Open Fork and gave a leave of absence to Mrs. Hazel D. George, teacher at Betsy Layne.

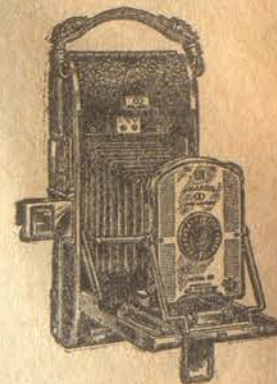

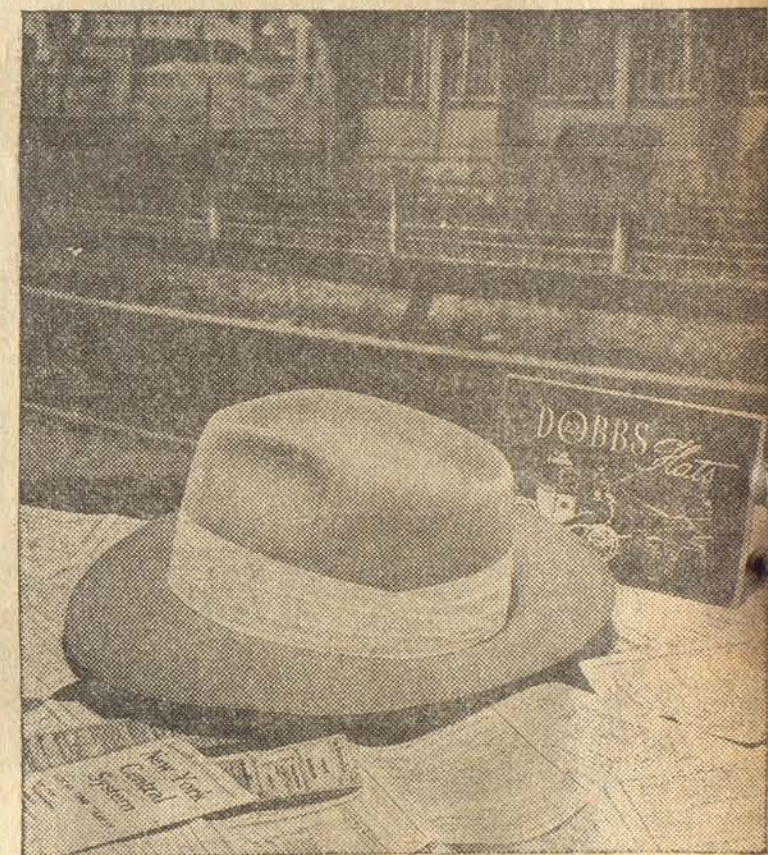

#### RULING GIVEN

Frankfort, Ky., June 15 — A person who is offered a teaching position has no vested right to teach in a particular high school, but may be transferred to an elementary school without violating the terms of a continuing contract, the Court of Appeals held in overruling pleas of Walter Conley, Magoffin county teacher, that his attempted transfer from high school to an elementary school was illegal.

"The terms of a continuing contract relate solely to employment, and not to a particular position," the Court observed.

### COAL LOADING SHOWS GAINS

#### Upward Trend Continues Thru First Week of June As More Mines Working

Increase in coal production that began in April and continued through May in the field represented by the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Operators Association was still on the increase the first week in June, according to figures released by the Association June 6.

The cars loaded week ending May 30 was 5099.2 and for the first June week the number was 5513.6 cars of 50 tons each. This was an increase over the preceding week of 414.4 cars. However the tonnage loaded the corresponding period last year was still far above this year to the extent of 15,508.6 cars. There seems no possibility of eliminating this figure at the current rate of production.

One bright spot in the mine picture was the increase in the number of mines working the full week. The last week in May a total of 22 mines worked full time but in the next week 27 worked the full week and Stephens Elkhorn Coal Company gave its employees six days of work, the report of the Association shows. Ten mines in the last week of May had equaled its tonnage for last year but in the first June week the number had increased to 12. Several mines now have an approximate production figure for the corresponding period last year.

Truck mine operation has shown another fluctuation. It skidded slightly the first week of June, losing 12 cars of 50 tons each. The number of truck mines closing has not increased. Truck mine production this year is far less than one-half of last year and captives are only slightly under last year. However brighter a spot or two may be in the mining industry it is still very much depressed.

The local office of the Department of Economic Security advises that the increase in coal production is due to Lake orders. Glenn Anderson, manager, states that initial claims for unemployment benefits are less than half for May what they were in April. Inquiries for jobs in other states have decreased somewhat, Anderson added.

### Girl Scouts Day Camp To Have 3-Day Sessions At David Cabin in July

The Prestonsburg day camp for Girl Scouts will be in session three days in each of two weeks, beginning the first week on July 7 and the second, July 14. It was announced this week. Site of the camp will be the David Girl Scout cabin.

Mrs. Kathryn Frazier will be camp chairman, with these assistants: Miss Barbara Mandt, Mrs. A. H. Mandt, Mrs. Fred Dickerson, Mrs. N. L. May, Mrs. W. W. Burchett, Miss Kate Greenwade, Mrs. J. R. Hurt, Mrs. R. V. May, Misses Sally Hill and Mary Lynn Mahan.

Because of conflicting activities, the David Girl Scouts will not conduct their own day camp but they may join other groups in camp. David will also be the site of day camps held by other Girl Scout groups, it was said.

Miss Barbara Goddard, executive secretary of Girl Scouts in this area, will serve as Red Cross water instructor at the Prestonsburg camp, and Mrs. Robert Wallace, of Prestonsburg, will attend as nurse. There will be at least one adult leader for every six to eight girls. Each camper will have half an hour of swimming instruction daily.

Registration fee for the six days is \$1.75. Special occasions will include campfire programs, progressive meals, plays, overnight camping for intermediates and other features.

### Eligibility Requirements For David Postmastership Are To Be More Exacting

The first examination for postmaster at David, under new, more exacting eligibility requirements recently agreed upon by the U. S. Civil Service Commission and the Post Office Department will be open for receipt of applications until July 14. The Commission announced Tuesday.

The office pays \$3,294 a year. All previously existing postmaster examinations for first-, second-, and third-class post offices and lists of eligibles were cancelled recently. Higher standards of eligibility were prescribed for the filling of more than 1,700 vacant positions throughout the country.

The Commission is taking all possible steps through special publicity to civic and other community organizations to encourage well qualified persons to apply for the examination. Competitors for the postmaster vacancy at David must show that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively and that they are reliable citizens who would command the respect and confidence of patrons of the post office. They must also show that their background will enable them to maintain simple records of accounts or that it has given them a knowledge of postal procedures.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, ability, and character. There is a one-year residence requirement and applicants must be at least 21 years of age and must not have passed their sixty-third birthday.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filling applications may be obtained at the post office for which the examination is being announced. Application forms must be received in the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. not later than the closing date.

### Interviewer Examinations Announced by Supervisor

Robert L. Venzky, State Merit System supervisor, announced this week that examinations for the positions of Interviewer Examiner I and II with the Employment Service of the Kentucky Department of Economic Security will be held throughout the state during the month. The purpose of these tests is to establish lists of eligible persons from which vacancies will be filled as they occur within the next two years.

Tests are scheduled to be held on Saturday, June 27, at 8:30 a. m., in the following places: State Employment Service Office, 257 17th street, Ashland, and in the high schools at Prestonsburg, Pikeville, Hazard, Harlan and Corbin.

Starting pay for Interviewer Examiner I is \$210 per month and \$240 for Interviewer Examiner II. The positions are located in the local offices of the State Employment Service.

Applicants must be high school graduates and have either two years-college or two years acceptable experience for the lower position and three years college or three years acceptable experience for the higher position. Honorably discharged veterans will receive five points preference and those receiving disability compensation will receive 10 points preference.

Applications may be obtained from your local employment office or by writing Mr. Venzky, Capitol Annex Building, Frankfort; or, interested persons may obtain the application form at the examination center on the day of the test.
