

He did not kill for sport's sake but only to satisfy the exigences of hunger. Hunters came upon him in the forest to find him watching the wild things play and feed. In a land where hunting and roaming the wilderness was the usual custom with the pioneers, Elder Abner Vance was noted as a crack shot with the long rifle of the period. It was said that next to his faith and

family he loved the forested hills. Life went on for a quarter of a century with the elder and his family. The many children grew to adulthood and, with the exception of a daughter, all married. When the father came home from the circuit he was riding, preaching funerals and constituting new churches on the frontier, he noticed that this daughter was blossoming into a beautiful woman. Of all his many children, she was his favorite.

He was not pleased when a neighbor, Lewis Horton, came courting the remaining daughter of the family. For one thing, Horton was middle-aged. The overpowering objection though that the elder interposed in the way of courtship was an innate suspicion of the wealthy Horton's motives. Horton had the reputation of a libertine and a rascal. He forbade his daughter to see him. The web that was to enmesh the Elder Vance was tightening around him

It had, indeed, begun, two years before. In 1815 he had been summoned to the Russell county courthouse to serve as a juror in the trial of John Elliott for the murder of Eli McLaughlin. McLaughlin and the sheriff of Russell county, Hugh McFarland, were staunch friends. Judge Peter Johnston, father of Gen. Joseph E. Johnston, of Civil War fame, sat upon the judicial bench whose jurisdiction covered a wide circuit of counties in Southwest Virginia. He was a friend of McLaughlin and McFarland.

(The John Elliott referred to in this article moved to the present Elliott county, Kentucky in about the year 1830. He was the father of Judge John M. Elliott, former Prestonsburg resident, who was assas-

sinated at Frankfort, in 1879.-Ed.) The trial of John Elliott was marked by the obstinacy of the Elder Vance. The 11 others wanted to send Elliott to the gallows. Vance doggedly stood for a small penal sentence because most of the evidence was circumstantial. Like many a case before and since, the determined juror had his way. John Elliott was sentenced to nine years in

the penitentiary. The 11 jurors who argued for the maximum sentence on Elliott were angry and discussed the obstinacy of Vance with Sheriff McFarland. The sheriff did not forget the man who had lightened the sentence on

He thought she had decided to abide by his wishes and not see the wealthy libertine again, but he and his wife found, upon arising one morning, that she was gone from their household.
