

Judge Henry Stumbo in last week's Times says "Let's Look at the Record". We have already looked at the record, Judge Stumbo, and now we propose to look into what you say. The record itself on Order Book 6 was bad enough. What you say in an attempt to explain is much worse.

You say that the omission of one fact was deliberate. Not so, Judge Stumbo. We did not have room in an article of the size necessary to explain for the public all of the ramifications of the BIG DEAL. What you say we left out was the setting up of the special fund called, "Waterworks and Gas System Project Bond and Redemption Fund for 1953". Certainly that fund was set up as the medium whereby Floyd county collected into, from the Beaver Elkhorn Water District, the revenue necessary to pay off the bondholders. You made this necessary arrangement with the bondholders so they could get their money when the bonds mature. Every bondholder expects to be paid. You merely set up the necessary legal machinery for them to collect.

You say, Judge Stumbo, in your article: "That the truth is Floyd county acts merely as a fiscal agent or as a holding company for the water and gas district, just as it has acted in the past for the Floyd County Board of Education".

You got your lines mixed on that one Judge. You mean Floyd county bought the water and gas systems and that the Beaver Elkhorn Water District is the county's agent, don't you? At least that is what the Record says in Order Book 6. That record says Floyd county bought these systems for \$230,000 and issued bonds for the money to pay. Your court made the Beaver Elkhorn Water District the agent of the county. The county is no holding company for anyone, Judge. The county is the outright purchaser. You were acting as agent for nobody. You were acting for yourself and in so doing you acted for Floyd county, much to our regret.

You say Judge, "It was considered and talked in open court". Was it, Judge? Was it in the county court room or in the now famous little cubby hole in the back of the County Court Clerk's office where you meet lots of times, and the general public can't even

get its head in? Anyway, why was it not a matter of common knowledge that Floyd county had bought these water and gas districts? You had a one-time notice of the Bond offer published in The Courier-Journal. Why didn't you give the matter wide publicity and feel the public reaction to the Big Deal? We know why, Judge. The public, if it had been properly informed, would not have tolerated it. You say: "It was not my idea, I assure you, we acted in good faith representing a group of citizens who in turn represented the water district".

Now Judge, we take you up on that one, right here. Set down and make us out a list of these people who represents the water district, and whose idea it was, since you say it wasn't yours. Write down the owners of the various water and gas districts. While you are doing that, Judge, write down what the middlemen paid for these properties. We already know what they got. We want to see what their profit was. We challenge you to prepare a list of the interested parties who worked the deal up and to write out in detail every name of the owners of these properties who sold to the counties.

Explain why the bonds were sold at a TEN PERCENT discount, and why the interest rate was much more than it usually is. Judge, explain why Floyd county bonds have to sell under par. The recent school board issue sold above par at a lower rate of

Judge, you warn people against half-truths. You better warn them against the whole truth. When the public knows the whole truth it will be righteous in anger and indignation. Only you can tell the whole truth. We challenge you to tell it in the Floyd County Times, and to leave no names and figures out.

We warn you, Judge, that the people are not satisfied with your cries of politics, and smear to your official reputation, because they are looking at your record as it is written in Order Book 6.
